Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, April 5.—On orders of the day being called, Hon. Mr. Bowell called attention to the notice of motion put on the paper by Edgar, accusing Mr. Powell of receiving \$500 in connection with the Prince Albert Colonization Co. Bowell said it was not true that he had received any money from Jamieson. He never had any connection directly or indirectly, inferentially or otherwise with the colonization company. He was, however, quite willing to gratify the curiosity of Edgar, and wanted a committee at once appointed to investigate the matter against him (Mr. Bowell) were false and untrue in every particular.

White of Hastings said he hoped Edgar would give to the house the exact words of the conversation between Edgar and Hugh Sutherland, a member of this house. Edgar read over his charge to the effect that he believes he can establish by satisfactory evidence that in 1882 John White M. P. for East Hastings, who was associated with Jas. Jamieson, used his influence with the government of which he was a parliamentary supporter, to obtain an order in council for a grant of 51,200 acres of choice lands near Batouche, in the Northwest territories, with the intention of trafficking with such grant by the formation of a colonization company, the members of which should give White and Jamieson special advantages and profits; that subsequently Messrs. White and Jamieson insisted on a free gift or bonus of one-twelfth part of the expected profits, and that accordingly received blind shares to the amount of \$33,000; that the affair was conducted with the knowledge of Mackenzie Bowell, Minister of Customs and Excise, who will receive from Jamieson \$500 out of the price of said blind shares.

Sir Hector said the matter affected two members of the house, a minister of the crown, and also Edgar himself, who knew what the result would be if his attack was found to be without foundation. He would move that the matter be referred to the committee of privileges and elections, with power to bring in a finding.

John White said he had this objection to a committee, as much time would be taken up. He said he had told Edgar that he would prefer a committee of one and would name Mackenzie or Paterson or Charlton. He (White) affirmed in the presence of the charges made that he never received any favor from the Minister of Customs or any member of the government. What he had done was in the report of the inspector of colonization companies that there were half-breeds on one section of the land granted to the company, and at once he had gone to the government and asked to take back that land as they did not want to affect the half-breeds.

Hogart said in all Edgar's statement there was not a single charge of corrupt practices against White.

Blake objected to the committee of privileges and elections, and thought a small select committee would be better.

In answer, Pope said the subsidy paid the Caraque railway was \$105,200, and to the St. Louis and Richibouctou railway \$22,400.

After recess Blake moved his resolution censuring the government for not bringing down papers relating to the Northwest. He made a speech nearly all made up of the list of papers, which, he said, ought to have been brought down.

Langevin said if there were any papers in the public interest to be brought down they would be, if Blake would indicate what they were.

Hon. Mr. White showed that a large number of papers asked for by Blake had been brought down last year and were now printed in the sessional papers, and that others had been brought down this session. He said that he would hand the list prepared by Blake to the department, and if there were any not yet produced they would be brought down.

Hall moved an amendment, expressing the satisfaction of the house at the action of the government and confidence that any motion for papers asked for by parliament would be brought down.

OTTAWA, April 6. The house met at three. Several petitions in favor of excluding light wines and beer from the operations of the Scott Act were presented.

Foster moved that the resolution respecting the transfer of Cape Race light-house to the management of the Dominion be considered next Friday.—Carried.

Sir Hector moved Thursday for government days.

Mitchell protested that the government had taken all the members' days with the debate on the Riel resolution and ought not at such an early stage to take a third day in the week.

Blake thought the government ought not to take the coming Thursday.

Davies thought the house ought to sit Saturdays.

Sir Hector said the government had to look after departmental work and see to matters throughout the country and wanted Saturday for that purpose. He would agree to take Thursday of next week and thereafter.

The resolution so amended passed.

After recess, the items—Governor General's secretary's office, department of justice, penitentiaries, branch militia, secretary of state, and interior were passed in committee of supply. There was considerable debate on the interior item, as to the land system.

OTTAWA, April 7.—Thompson said the government had under consideration several amendments to the Franchise Act. White said the government was aware that the C. P. R. had sold a considerable quantity of their lands, but the government had nothing to do with these lands. All their lands when sold to individuals became subject to municipal taxation.

The house then passed to notices of motion. Mr. McDougall, of Cape Breton, moved for a statement showing the quantity of coal carried over the International each year from Spring Hill and other collieries and explained that the government had under consideration several amendments to the Franchise Act.

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A discussion took place occupying the time till recess and was participated in by Taylor, Fisher, Sprule, Casey, Hickey, Gilmor, Mills, Costigan and Carling.

The government requested an adjournment of the debate as after the expressions of opinions it might deem it advisable to take further action than contemplated by Costigan's resolutions now on the notice paper. The general opinion was that measures should be taken to prevent the substitutes being sold for butter.

(Specialist to Globe.)
OTTAWA, April 8.—In the Senate yesterday, quite a spirited debate followed a motion for the third reading of the bill to give druggists power to sell liquor in quantities where the Scott Act is in operation.

Mr. Scott, speaking to the motion, said: "When in 1878, this house devoted at least three weeks to the consideration of the Canada Temperance Act, ample provision and ample protection was made, in my judgment, for the sale of liquors and spirits of all kinds under medical prescriptions or for use in any art, trade or manufacture. The business proper of the druggist was in no way interfered with under that act. He was made the channel through which liquors could be sold for special purposes. The medical profession was given a pretty wide latitude. I don't propose now to make any comments upon the course pursued by some of the profession, but I have brought before this house through the public reports that have been sent into the inland revenue department the most ample proof and evidence that there was a good deal of misplaced confidence in giving to the medical profession the right to rider prescriptions of alcohol. I have heard no complaints from one end of this country to the other, wherever the temperance act has been in force, that the fair traffic of the druggists' pharmacopoeia was in the slightest degree interfered with or disturbed by the Canada Temperance Act. I regard the bill before the house as one of those cleverly disguised opportunities to turn the drug stores into dram shops. We are quite right in protecting the act with the safe-guards with which we surround it, and I say there is and has been no necessity for this bill. I have never heard, and my attention would probably have been directed to it as much as that of any other person, had there been prosecution against the druggists for selling the ordinary pharmacopoeia, when it is done honestly and candidly and not for the purpose of breaking the Canada Temperance Act or of availing themselves of the opportunity to sell whiskey disguised with some drug. This bill is to allow the sale of misplaced confidence in the vendor to the medical profession and to give them the capability of being used as a beverage. It is a well known fact that in the Northwest at social parties a certain patent medicine was a popular drink, which circulated round the table until it became known to the authorities, and the sale of it had to

be prohibited. I tell this house today that this continued opposition to the Canada Temperance Act by the government, and to the temperance feeling of this country, is going to do more to slatter this Senate, as at present constituted, than anything that has ever come before it. In view of this, I will move that this house be read this day six months. The house divided on the amendment, which was declared lost on the following division: yeas, 25; nays, 31.

Hon. Mr. Power moved that the bill be not now read the third time, but that the title be amended by inserting the words "Sale of Alcohol" before the word "Druggists."

The amendment was declared lost.

Hon. Mr. Dever—I move that the bill be not read the third time, but that it be referred back to committee of the whole with instructions to strike out all in section 3, and insert the following "not capable of being used as a beverage."

The motion was carried, the amendment concurred in and the bill passed the third reading on division.

POVERTY AND THE SCHOOL BOARD.
LONDON, April 3.—At the Thames Police court yesterday there were twenty seven fresh and ten adjourned summonses taken out at the instance of the School board against parents, under the compulsory clause of the Educational act, for not sending their children to school. Many of the excuses made were of the most pitiable character, some of the parents stating that they had not sent their children to school because they had no food to give them nor clothes to protect them from the weather. One man brought his eldest daughter, barefooted and dressed in rags, in court with him, who stated that her two sisters had nothing but a chemise and a petticoat each to wear, everything else having been sold for food; and notwithstanding that the man was receiving relief from the Mansion House fund and had no money, he was fined two shillings, with the alternative of three days imprisonment. Much indignation was felt in court, and the fine was at once paid by one of the solicitors who happened to be present.

THE POPE AND TEMPERANCE.
Bishop Ireland was recently asked, "What was the Pope's action on the temperance decrees of the plenary council?" "They were indorsed entirely," replied the bishop. "The church from this time places itself on the highest ground on the temperance question. The council took an extremely strong stand on the closing of saloons of liquors, indirectly putting the ban on the whole liquor traffic by stating, in these words, that Catholics engaged in it should seek a more honorable mode of livelihood. It condemns selling liquor to minors and habitual drunkards and proclaims against blasphemy and improper language in saloons. It forbids the sale of liquors and wine in any connection with the interests of the church. It solemnly approves of total abstinence societies, and requests pastors to encourage them."

Correspondence.
A FEW WORDS TO THE ELECTORS OF NEWCASTLE.
With indecent haste the Local Government has appointed Monday, 20th inst., as the date on which the people of this Province are to record at the polls their approval or disapproval of the Blair administration. The reason such short notice has been given is known to all. The Government does not intend to reduce the stampage tax, which is slowly but surely crushing the life out of the lumber business, which is the mainstay of the Northern Counties of the Province, neither does it mean to carry out any of the reforms promised on its advent to power. But in hopes that its short comings may not be properly shown up in the short time before the people can pronounce their opinion through the ballot-box, and with the knowledge that the bad condition of the roads at this season will everywhere render impossible a thorough canvass of the constituencies, the Government thinks its supporters will have a great advantage over its opponents, as most of the former have been before the public for a long while, while the latter in a great many cases will be new men, coming forward as candidates for the first time. But in Northumberland this condition of things does not exist. The friends of our two members in opposition took timely steps during the winter, to be prepared, and in response to a numerous signed requisition, we have four good men in the field as an opposition ticket.

I wish to briefly mention to the electors of Newcastle a few reasons why they should vote for Messrs. Adams, Park, Hutchison and Tweedie as a ticket, and why this Parish should roll up such a solid vote for those gentlemen that their election may be rendered sure, no matter how other parishes go. Not but that the whole County should, (and I have no doubt will) vote for the solid opposition ticket, but I wish to impress more particularly on the voters of Newcastle their duty of giving the four gentlemen named an undivided, unscratched, solid vote.

Who are the Government candidates in this County? Messrs. Gillespie and Burchill seem to be the only two who have been so far found willing to champion the cause of the Government of "great cry and little wool," the Government which promised to abolish the Legislative Council—and filled up the vacant seats in the Chamber with its own supporters. The Government which came into power pledged to reduce the number of the executive—and retained the full number of members including the Solicitor-General, who had been declared to be of no more use than the fifth wheel to a coach. The Government which was going to cut down the expenses of Government—and has increased them. The Government which has given fat printing jobs to all its friends, without asking for tenders, thus wasting hundreds of dollars of the people's money. Which has increased the Stampage to such an extent that the lumber trade is falling off year by year, so that in the Miramichi we loaded last year but 181 vessels, as against 234 in 1884 and 291 in 1883, and shipped in 1885 but 7 million feet of lumber, against 103 millions in 1884 and 143 millions in 1883. The Government which seems to think anything good enough for the lumbermen of the North, so long as the St. John River Counties are well looked after and kept contented.
