

FEAR DIGBY MAN WAS MURDERED

Search for Missing Edward McGregor Without Result.

John Tebo, Jr., Taken Into Custody Charged With Theft of Money From Much-Sought Man.

Digby, N. S., Oct. 31—John Tebo, jr., was arrested in Digby by Chief of Police Cowles this afternoon on suspicion of stealing money from Edward McGregor, the missing man. His preliminary examination will commence tomorrow morning before Stipendiary Magistrate Harvey.

The mysterious disappearance of McGregor, a story of which appeared in Friday's Telegraph, is now the talk of the town. Your correspondent accompanied the chief of police on a thorough search of the missing man's premises late Saturday afternoon. It was learned that McGregor left in his working clothes, that he had evidently had no intention of being gone for any length of time. It was also learned that he had saved up considerable money while living alone, which he continually carried on him, the supposed amount ranging, according to various stories, from \$250 to \$600. A large searching party again went through the woods yesterday and today, but no signs of the body could be discovered. That he met with foul play is now the opinion of almost everybody in that vicinity as well as the people of this town. All sorts of stories, of course, are being told, but only a regular investigation by the proper authorities will bring out the facts. St. John Telegraph.

SAVED CHILDREN BUT LOST HIS LIFE

Beverly Railway Employee Ran Down Track to Scare Little Ones off the track and was Killed.

Lynn, Mass., Oct. 31—To save three small children, who had wandered on to the railroad tracks in front of an express train, Stephen Jones, a Boston & Maine carpenter, gave up his life today. The children were crossing the tracks near the Chatham street grade, when Jones spied them. Shouting, he ran toward the spot and succeeded in scaring the children so that they ran out of danger, but in his excitement and anxiety the man failed to notice how close the train was upon himself and the engine struck him. He was almost instantly killed. Jones was fifty-five years of age, married, and lived at Rialside, Beverly.

ONTARIO BAPTISTS ASSIST CAMPBELLTON

Toronto, Oct. 25.—The afternoon and evening sessions of the Baptist convention on Friday were marked to enthusiastic demonstrations of missionary enthusiasm. This enthusiasm took the form of dollars and cents. In something like two hours, in the latter part of the afternoon and in the evening, a sum exceeding \$40,000 was contributed chiefly toward defraying expenses of the foreign and home mission work of the church. Nearly thirty thousand dollars was raised in the afternoon. The contributions began coming in immediately after the reading of the annual report of the foreign missions. The report itself was somewhat lengthy, and the reading occupied a large part of the afternoon. It dealt especially with the work being carried on in the Telugu at Cocanada in India. The Vizagapatam mission had been taken over from the London Mission Society, thus bringing together the Baptist missions in India. At 8 p. m. the meetings were continued, when Bloor street church was crowded. The proceedings opened with a song service, under the direction of Rev. W. E. Boyer, B. A. The Rev. Dr. Stobo, vice-president of the convention, presided, and introduced the Rev. Mr. Schurman of Campbellton, N. B. Mr. Schurman gave a brief outline of the devastation caused by fire in Campbellton, and made a strong appeal for funds to rebuild the church and other buildings. The appeal was not in vain, many were gathered from the fact that from the collection alone he received \$337, while other donations during the evening were granted to the pastor and congregation amounting to \$750 or in all \$1,087. Mr. Schurman, in thanking the assembly for their generosity, remarked that the first cheques he received after the great fire in Campbellton were from Baptists of the city of Toronto, and now they had come to the front with an even greater proof of their generosity.

HARRY J. BAIG, A SUICIDE AT MONCTON

Arrested for Strange Conduct on Train. Hanged Himself in Lock-Up.

Moncton, N. B., Nov. 1—Harry J. Baig a Jewish junk dealer of St. John, hanged himself this morning between five and half-past five o'clock. Baig had been taken off No. 9 train on its arrival here from Amherst and was locked up, charged with cutting and destroying seats in the car. Shortly after 5 o'clock when Thomas Donnelly, night call man, had occasion to visit the cells, a shocking sight met his gaze. As he flashed a light into the steel lattice cell occupied by Baig he was horrified to see the prisoner suspended by a rope from the top of the cell apparently lifeless. The man who had been placed in the cell about an hour and a half before was cold in death. Constable Donnelly notified Coroner Purdy of the occurrence a few minutes after his discovery. When the night express from Halifax arrived at Moncton at three o'clock this morning, the conductor reported Baig for creating a disturbance on the train and cutting the seats. Officer Dryden at once took the man into custody and found him apparently suffering from some mental trouble. The I. C. R. officer telephoned for the city police patrol and had the man sent to the lockup. Upon arrival at the police station, Baig was searched and \$97.67 and a flask of whiskey were found on him. He told the police he was going to St. John. The unfortunate man was about 35 years of age. A piece of rope was used by Baig to end his existence, but where he got it the police say they are unable to understand. An inquest will be held by Coroner Purdy. St. John friends of the unfortunate man were greatly shocked to hear of his suicide. It is said he was a temperate man, but that he had been acting strangely for a month or more. He leaves a wife and six children, living on Pond street.

DEATH AT CHATHAM OF MRS. CATHERINE O'SHEA

Chatham, N. B., Nov. 1—After an evening spent in Halloween games with her grandchildren, Mrs. Catherine O'Shea, aged 72, widow of William O'Shea, retired to bed and was found by her daughter, Mrs. James McLaughlin, a few minutes later with her hands crossed upon her breast and sleeping her last long sleep. Dr. Duffy was at once notified, but nothing could be done. Mrs. O'Shea and her husband were natives of Ireland, and emigrated first to the States and then to Prince Edward Island. Eleven years ago they settled in Chatham, and about seven years ago Mr. O'Shea died. Mrs. O'Shea leaves a daughter, Mrs. James McLaughlin, with whom she lived, and two sons, John and Patrick, in the States. The funeral will be held to-morrow morning.

THE SINGLE TAX.

At the present time the press of the Dominion from Atlantic to the Pacific are discussing the single tax question. Throughout the west the question been a live issue, and at a recent civic election in Vancouver a large majority of the Aldermen elected were pledged to make this reform.

At the present time the same question is being discussed in St. John. Saturday's Telegraph says: "Why do so many people with money leave St. John? Why is it so difficult to get people to invest money in local enterprises? Would the exempting of municipal bonds help the difficulty?"

These questions embodied in a letter sent out on October 15 by Mayor Frink to bank managers and capitalists in the city, asking for an expression of their opinions,

have resulted in a number of replies, suggesting various reasons for the adverse conditions, and also suggesting possible remedies. Practically all agree that the present system of taxation is the great fault.

The opinion of one of the most prominent bank men was that the city should go in for a single tax; that real estate should bear the load and especially the unimproved real estate in St. John. Block after block of land is held unimproved, he claimed, while the growth of the city is going westward (toward Lancaster and Fairville), outside the reach of the assessors. He contends that the present system of taxation encourages the holding of land unused, to the detriment of the neighborhood; it bears hard upon the salaried man and discourages families from set-

ting up a home.

The present system of taxation, in the opinion of this man, restricts people coming to the city and compels a large number to leave each year. He goes on to say that he believes there is no lack of capital in St. John for industries worthy of it. He also advocates strongly the sale of all city leasehold property and contends that the growth of the city is retarded by its ownership.

In Campbellton there has been much dissatisfaction and complaint in regard to the assessments of the past. Now that we are erecting a new town, why not embrace a new system. The single tax reform is the most up-to-date and we see no reason why Campbellton could not adopt it for its next assessment.

The committee in charge was instructed to proceed at once with the erection of a suitable lockup on the town lot.

The meeting was adjourned with the understanding that another meeting be held Thursday.

DOMINION GOVERNMENT MAKES AMENDMENT

Ottawa, Nov. 1—It is understood the government will shortly deal with Campbellton's application for aid.

Campbellton asked for the government to undertake for a number of years the payment of interest on some \$200,000 of municipal debt.

It is understood that the dominion government is willing to extend aid, in view of the unusual nature of the catastrophe, but prefers to do so finally this year.

Therefore, instead of assuming the interest on the municipal debt for a number of years, the government will ask parliament to vote a lump sum for the relief of Campbellton. Probably \$80,000 will be the figure.

THAT SANITARY BILL

The relief committee of some member of it, in explaining how the money sent in for the relief of the Campbellton sufferers had been expended, stated that nearly \$1000 had been spent for necessary sanitary arrangements after the fire, and intimated that this amount should have been paid for by the Town. If this amount of money was spent it was money virtually wasted. The closets were erected and probably the amount honestly spent but no person was appointed to look after them and we venture to say that inside a month not half of them were in service, while today there is not one in a fit condition for a human to enter. The need of such closets is nearly as pressing today as it was right after the fire, but no steps are being taken to remedy this. We would suggest that the local Board of Health, which was not consulted in the previous arrangements, take the matter in hand and see if satisfactory arrangements cannot be made without the expenditure of so much money and the work be in evidence for a longer period of time.

REV. A. E. BURKE WAS BOYCOTTED

Toronto, Oct. 24.—"Be it resolved that the editor be refused admission to any meeting of the United Irish League in future and that this resolution be published in the daily newspapers of Toronto, the Canadian Freeman, Kingston, the Catholic Record, London, and United Canada, Ottawa."

This was the resolution passed by the local branch of the United Irish League last night, F. J. Roche presiding. The editor in question was Rev. Father Burke, of the Catholic Register. What the league objected to was an article published in the Register following the O'Connor meeting here recently. "Irish affairs often get

into ruts," it said. "There is a small class of professional Irishmen everywhere butting in on these occasions, that is neither good for creed nor country and the decent element of the community is about sick and tired of them and their pretensions. This sort of thing could not fail to have a discouraging effect and the distinguished speaker was quite aware of it himself."

Previous to passing Father Burke's banishment as above there were some warm speeches in which the Register article was quoted as a wanton insult and an outrage to the canons of ordinary journalistic decency.

ABBIE WOOD BEAT FRED CAMERON ON A FOURTH TIME

Outsprints Him at the Finish—Ran Seventeen Miles Instead of Fifteen on Montreal Track—Both run at New York Friday.

Montreal, Oct. 31.—Abbie Wood of Montreal, defeated Fred Cameron, of Amherst N. S., in a fifteen mile race at the Jubilee rink here this evening.

With the exception of a couple of laps in the second mile, Cameron made the pace all the way until the last lap. Wood hung within striking distance of him all through, and on the start of the last lap started a sprint that swept Cameron off his feet. At the finish Wood had the race by about thirty yards.

This was the fourth race between the Montreal and Amherst runners, and each time, the Montreal man has won by his speed at the finish. He has been able to hang to Cameron's pace at any distance from ten to fifteen miles, and then outsprint him in the final dash to the tape.

The time of the race was one hour, 38 minutes and 35 seconds, but it was discovered afterwards that the men had run nearly 17 miles. The runners complained when the time for the first mile 5.56, had been hung up that there must be a mistake either in the timing or in the measurement of the track. The error, half way through the race was found to be in the track measurement, but the men finished out the race on the basis of thirteen lap to a mile, and

ran just a fraction under seventeen miles.

Wood and Cameron leave for New York tomorrow where the former will team up with Meadows, and the latter with Holmer in the twenty mile race at Madison Square Garden, Friday night.

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 31.—Fifty-six long distance runners from all parts of the maritime provinces competed in the Halifax Herald's annual ten-mile championship road race in Halifax today.

In 1907-8 the race was won by Hans Holmer, and last year Fred Cameron was the winner. Today Michael Thomas, a fleet long-distance Indian from the Abegweit Club, of Charlottetown, captured the race, and is now the amateur champion long-distance runner of the maritime provinces.

Thomas took his lead at the start and was never passed during the ten miles, finishing first. A feature of the race was the large number of Indians entered, four red skins being among the first six to cross the finish line.

The team prize for the first four men to cross the finish line was won by the Chebuctos of Halifax, with the All-St. John team second.

Sterling, of St. John, was looked upon as a winner, but not in condition for today's race and only got fifth place.

The winner's time was 58.52 2-5.
