Mr. Gerry, in his statement denies that there was any committee of citiens associated with Hon, Adam Beck the artesian well project. He also ienies that any consent was given to

3. Denies that any committee of citizens had anything to do whatever in law, or in fact with the bylaws, necessary to the completion of the scheme passed by the city council.



Currant Bread. — Ordinary bread dough, sweetened a little, and with a small extra amount of shortening and a cup of currants makes as good a loaf as one could ask for. If one cares to go to a little more work the following recipe is excellent: Whole wheat currant bread—Scald (do not boil) one and one-half cups sweet milk and one cup water. When tepid add one-half compressed yeast after souking ten minutes in cool water, two tablespoons of sugar and one of salt. Stir in enough whole wheat flour to make a stiff batter. Allow to raise. Three heurs is long enough if kept warm, over night if cool. When light add one egg, one tablesponful of melted butter, one cup of cleaned and dried currants. Beat well, then add whole wheat flour to make a soft dough. Work well, mold into two loaves, place in greased pans, brush over with melted butter, let rise until light, and then bake in hot oven. When brown, which should take about twenty minutes, cool the oven one-half and bake thirty minutes longer.



Currant Bread. — Ordinary bread dough, sweetened a little, and with a small extra amount of shortening and dough, sweetened a little, and with a small extra amount of shortening and a cup of currants makes as good a loaf as one could ask for. If one cares to go to a little more work the following recipe is excellent: Whole wheat currant bread—Scald (do not boil) one and one-half cups sweet milk and one cup water. When tepid add one-half compressed yeast after soaking ten minutes in cool water, two tablespoons of sugar and one of salt. Stir in enough whole wheat flour to make a stiff batter. Allow to raise. Three heurs is long enough if kept warm, over night if cool. When light add one egg, one tablesponful of melted butter, one cup of cleaned and dried currants. Beat well, then add whole wheat flour to make a soft dough. Work well, mold into two loaves, place in greased pans, brush over with melted butter, let rise until light, and then bake in hot oven. When brown, which should take about twenty minutes, cool the oven one-half and bake thirty minutes longer.

Ottawa, May 5—Dealing with the question of cheese imported into Scotland. James A. Findiay, inspector at Glasgow, reports: "This is still a depressing feature of the Canadian cheese trade in respect that the accuracy of marked weights cannot be relied on, and importers find it essential to test thoroughly the weights of each shipment for shortage, particularly during the summer months. It is a serious matter to importers who have contracted to take a factory's weekly output, to find the cheese arriving showing from one-half to two and three pounds short weight per box, not to speak of odd boxes turning up five to ten pounds lighter than the market weight, which viewed in the most favorable light, can only be called gross carclessness.

"Importations into Glasgow of Canadian cheese last year fell 35,000 boxes. It is attributable to a heavier output of Scotch cheese, and also the strike making many idle. Butter importations from Canada to Glasgow are also decreasing, owing to the high price of the Canadian article."






