

"Practically all of these bilingual schools are Catholic and as a consequence the Catholic Church should be, and is in many places, in the front of the fight to have the same advantages accorded her children as are accorded those of all other demominations. That is a right that should not be denied, yet it is being denied today for the reason that these French children are deprived of an English education that will allow them to participate in the benefits of Ontario's high school system or will allow them an equal chance in the battle of life, if they have to quit school after passing the entrance examination."
