"In the Kasino Valley our troops attacked the enemy and, in spite of severe cold and heavy snow, succeeded, after eleven hours of desperate fighting, in driving him south of the Kasino and Suchitza Valleys."

700,000 SLAVES ARE FORCED TO

Invaded Regions of Northern France Are Depleted by Forced Labor.

NO DISTINCTIONS MADE

Age and Sex Ignored by the Enemy in Forcibly Enrolling Laborers.

Paris, Jan. 27 .- Seven hundred thousand inhabitants in the invaded regions of the north of France are engaged in forced labor for the Germans, according to M. Dibudeville, the mayor of the town of Corchy, who has just arrived from the occupied region at Evian.

The mayor's estimate, he says, is based upon careful, serious calculation, taking as a basis the numbers of inhabitants personally known by him as having been taken from the communes in his region. Three hundred out of the 900 inhabitants of the village of Esmery-Hallonhe, declares, have been obliged to serve the German occupying force, the recalcitrants being either imprisoned or exiled to Germany. No distinctions are made as to age or sex in the choice of the forcibly enrolled laborers, M. Dibudeville says.
