
CZECHO-SLOVAK, VETS. ON WAY TO HOMES



CHIEF'S APPOINTMENT

Important Legislation Will Have an Important Bearing On Local Situation—Appointment Must Be Acceptable To Council or Salary Can Be Reduced.

Amendments to existing statutes adopted at the recent session of the Legislature may play a very important part in the appointment of a chief of police in London. According to Dr. H. A. Stevenson, M. P. for London, who took an active interest in putting through the new legislation, the final decision as to who shall succeed W. T. T. Williams rests with the city council, if that body

wishes to exercise its authority GIVES COUNCIL CONTROL. The revised statutes give the council complete control of the salary to be paid to the citef. Should an appointment be made which is not satisfactory to the council, the salary for the position could be reduced to one dollar a year. Dr. Stevenson states that the amendment was made with the object of giving the people more direct control of appointments, and limiting the somewhat arbitrary

powers previously in the hands of the police commissioners. Other amendments with this in view make the police commission an elective body in the future, instead of an appointive one. A bill to this effect was given its third reading at the last session. MUST BE ELECTED It provides that the board of commissioners shall consist of three members of whom the head of the council shall, ex-officio, be one. The other two shall be elected at the same time and place, and in the same manner as the head of the council, and the elected members shall hold office for one year and until their successors are elected and the new board is organized.





HAMONIC MAY **REACH SARNIA** AT MIDNIGHT

Went Aground Near Harbor Beach During Dense Fog Yesterday.

CARRIED 360 PASSENGERS

Many Alarmist Stories Current At Border Points Last Night.

SARNIA, July 7 .- With passengers aboard from Toronto, and many places in Western Ontario, as well as many from various parts of the United States, it was reported late this afternoon that driven out of her course by heavy winds during dense fog, the steamer Hamonic of the Northern Navigation Company, went aground on a reef five miles north of Harbor Beach this afternoon. Two hundred and fifty passengers were aboard at the time, but no loss of life or serious damage to the steamer re-

or serious damage to the steamer resulted from the grounding.

Rush Tugs to Scene.

A message from Captain Wing of the grounded steamer to officials of the Northern Navigation Company here stated that he thought it would be possible for the boat to be launched without any assistance. The tugs, Manistique and Columbia from this port, and the coast guard from Harbor Beach have the coast guard from Harbor Beach have gone to his assistance.

Many wild rumors were current of the

Hamonic being in a sinking condition, but a wireless report from the boat, received at the Northern Navigation headquarters tonight, stated that the boat would likely dock here about midnight, as she had been moved off the sand ledge, and that there was absolutely no truth in any reports that were in circulation to the contrary.

WINDSOR, July 7.—Coast guards and tugs left Detroit late this afternoon to go to the rescue of the steamer Hamonic of the Northern Navigation Company, which with 360 passengers aboard, went aground this afternoon seven miles from Harbor Beach, with fair weather and light winds prevailing.

No anxiety for the safety of the passengers and crew was entertained until shortly after the rescuers left, when dark cloud banks on the western horizon were taken as an evil omen. The

zon were taken as an evil omen. The ship was bound down the Lakes to De-troit from Duluth.

Detroit Passengers.

The Hamonic went aground in a dense fog that prevalled over the lakes, and first reports were that she had collided with a downbound freighter. No attempts have been made so far, as is shown by wireless messages, to disembark the passengers.

Two-thirds of the passengers, it was stated at the offices of the Northern

stated at the offices of the Northern Navigation Company, Detroit, were from that city. The vessel is stranded at a point near Woods and Spares settlement, but no names were available owing to the fact that the list is in possession of the purser on board.

The Hamonic is a boat of 5,625 tons; length, 369 feet, 50-foot beam, and 28-foot depth. She was built in Collingwood in 1909. The headquarters of the owners are in Sarnia.



Privilege has had a long day in this country, but the forces that oppose unequal division of things are steadily rising, and not even the genius of a White or the adroitness of a Meighen will be able to stave off the reckoning that the Canadian people have been preparing now for many a day.

ROTARIANS AND WORLD PROBLEMS. Mr. W. R. Yendall, at the Rotary Club, in making his report of the Rotary convention at Atlantic City, referred with approval, which his winter time or 50 hours a week in the summer audience indorsed, to a law passed in one of time. the states requiring industrial disputes to be submitted for adjudication to the law courts. He pointed out and commended the part Rotarians had taken, and might yet take, in the settlement of the world-wide industrial questions. At page 230 of "Industry and Humanity," by Mackenzie King, we find the following:

"Until industrial controversy and international controversy become as justifiable as property controversy, the world's peace will be at the mercy of Force, from whatever quarter it may arise.

"It is from just such small beginnings as are afforded by opportunities of conference and the methods of procedure mentioned, that there will gradually be evolved a system of justice as applicable to human rights in industry, as existing legal justice is to property rights and matters of contract. Here and there, through agencies already at work, principles are beginning to be formulated. As the system is extended and enlarged by experience, general principles, with their necessary qualifications, will become clearer and more widely accepted. The sanction of government in one form or another will be secured. Principles will then become established, and their application will be made more and more

"The prejudice of Labor against legal methods in the settlement of disputes will vanish, as the principles revealed in the settlement of industrial differences by conciliation, investigation and arbitration accord with the law of Peace, Work and Health. In other words. Labor's prejudices will disappear as the emphasis in principles cited is placed upon human as contrasted with material onsiderations. Were resort to these agencies to become general, such emphasis would be nevitable. Out of the principles thus established, it should be possible to construct for ndustry a code of governing rules and regulations which would lay the foundations for permanent industrial peace. To attain an end so considerable, there are the strongest of reasons why employers and employees should seek to avail themselves voluntarily of methods of judicial procedure in the settle-ment of industrial controversies whenever occasion permits, and why the state should exert its supreme authority to compel such a reference whenever industrial controversy threatens the public interest."

MISS BLANCHE MILLS TELLS OF THRILLING **ESCAPE FROM TURKS**

Shortly After Year in Armenia.

The many friends of Miss Blanche Mills, niece of Mr. and Mrs. T. N. Way, Elmwood avenue, will be glad to welcome her home to the city at the end of this month, after she has spent over a year in reconstruction work in Armenia. Miss Mills, who sailed from New York a year ago last February with a party of two hundred and fifty doctors, nurses and teachers sent out by the United States Government, had signed up for but a year's service in Armenia. So pressing was the need there, however, at the end of the year, that she decided to remain longer, only leaving the country when the whole commission was compelled to evacuate, the 1st of May, on account of the invasion of the

Turks and Bolsheviks. Her description of their flight from Armenia is graphic and interesting. It appears in a letter dated May 15 and written on board the steamship Huntsville in the Aegean Sea. The Escape.

"We are on our way to Egypt. Things "We are on our way to Egypt. Things have happened within the past two weeks with such kaleidoscopic swiftness that I cannot realize it. On the 1st of May an Armenian office brought us the order from our high commissioner, Col. Haskell, to evacuate at once and to leave everything behind. At first we begged to stay, but being in the army, we could only obey. So we packed our souvenirs and left them with a responsible Armenian officer to send on later, if possible. But I fear it is good-bye, souvenirs!

"The officer told us that the Bolsheviks and Turks would soon be in the town, and we could do nothing; our flour had given out and the people were clamoring for bread, and having bread riots already; the trains would run only a week longer and then our supplies would be cut off.

"We closed up our work and turned over \$1,000,000 worth of property and supplies to a responsible Armenian. (My heart aches for them—the Turks on the south and the Bolsheviks on the north are going to wipe out the Armenians entirely, I fear).
