

"The full commission met today in the ministry of foreign affairs, and again this afternoon, in order to proceed to an examination of the report and recapitulating its conclusions. The report is rather long, comprising about ten large pages. The principal author is Admiral Von Spaun (Austrian), but all the members of the commission

MEXICANS CRUSH THE YAQUI BANDS

Kill Forty and Take Many Prisoners.

La Colorado, Mexico, Feb. 23. -- 71 Mexican force, under Gen. Luis Tor-res, numbering 400, have killed 40 Yaquis and taken 167 prisoners in a two days' battle with the savages in the mountains east of this camp. When the fight ended Gen. Torres returned to La Colorado reporting inconsiderable losses. It is said there were 300 warriors in the band surrounded by Torres in the Mazatlan Mountains. About 100 of those broke hrough the Mexican lines and escaped. but the main force was hurled at a detachment commanded by Capt. Luis Barron, an old Yaqui fighter, who was guarding one of the mountain passes. He held the savages in check until the arrival of reinforcements, when they were driven back with heavy loss, and inally surrendered. The final slaught had been preceded by two days of skirmishing. The troops were worn out, the rains had set in, and Torres decided to withdraw to La Colorado with his prisoners, abandon ing the pursuit of those who had escaped. He left garrisons at all the small towns and ranches which had been abandoned, and expects to re turn to the same district if the few Yaquis who escaped continue to cause trouble. COSSACKS IN TIGHT PLACE

Chinaman Saves Them When Surrounded by the Enemy.

Cossacks which has returned from a long and perilous reconnaissance toward Korea, peneterated by mountain paths as far as Hagoumin, 18 miles northwest of the Yalu River, where they burned a large depot of Japanese provisions. 



The Cost of Northwest Autonomy The annual payments by the Dominion Government to the new Province of Alberta will fall under four

- 1. Subsidy for civil government.
- 2. A capitation grant.
- 3. A debt allowance. 4. Compensation for lands.

The first item is fixed at \$50,000 per annum for all time, the money being applied to the cost of civil government. By the terms of Confederation, New Brunswick receives for this purpose \$50,000 per year, Quebee \$70,000, Nova low-landlords, thus giving the confer-Scotia \$60,000, and Ontario \$80,000.

The capitation grant will be 80 cents per head until the population reaches 800,000, when the amount becomes stationary. In this respect the Territories receive exceptionally liberal treatment. The grant to Ontario and Quebec has been absolutely stationary, being 80 cents per head of the population as ascertained by the census of 1861. Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba and British Columbia receive the same allowance per head of population only up to 400,000. The maximum has been raised to 800,000 in the case of the new provinces in the expectation that they will show a more rapid growth than the others, with a corresponding increase of expenditure.

The third item, the allowance for debt, is the result of elaborate calculation. When Confederation was established, the Dominion assumed the debts of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia to the extent of about \$82,000,000, or \$34 43 per head. Each of them will begin provincial housekeeping with these allowances: Subsidy, civil government\$ 50,000 Debt allowance Land indemnity

\$1,039,375 In addition to this the Federal Goveinment will give each of them a gratuity of \$62,500 per year for five years, to provide for buildings and public works which their new provincial status will necessitate. The per capita grant and the land compensation will increase pro rata with the population. When either Province can boast 1,200,-000 souls, it will have reached the maximum of Federal allowance-considerably over \$2,000,000 per year. The new provinces will also have wide powers of taxation, as have the old provinces, and may supplement their revenue from the same sources, with two exceptions. 




