Forest Fires.

There is an act on the statute book of the Province containing stringent provisions as to fire in or near any woods.

For instance, Sec. 7 of Chap. 65 of the Revised Statutes (of the protection of woods against fire) says: "Every person in charge of any drive of timber or of any party of men engaged in lumbering, railroad building, surveying or exploring, or any other party requiring camp fires for cooking or other purposes, shall provide himself with a copy of this chapter, and shall take steps to make the men employed by him acquainted with its provisions."

A useful provision of the Act is Sec. 2, which provides that "Whenever any woods or barren shall be on fire it shall be the duty of county councillors, justices of the peace, sheriffs, coroners, supervisors of roads and overseers of highways, constables, and each and every one of them to order so many of the men living or residing in the neighborhood of the place where the fire shall be, as they shall severally deem necessary, to repair to the place where such fire shall prevail, and there to assist in extinguishing the same or in stopping its progress, and any such person so ordered who shall refuse or neglect to obey such order shall be guilty of a violation of this chapter."
