

#### LOOK AND LIVE.

HE gospel that Jesus Christ has sent into this lost world, makes the way of salvation easy. Christ's yoke is easy and his burden light.

God's salvation must be free, or else the poor could not obtain it. It must be simple, or babes could not understand it. It must be easy, or the weak, the young, the helpless and the distressed could never gain it.

The whole tenor of Scripture represents the way of life as an easy way to those who honestly seek to walk therein.

#### WE ARE TO "CALL."

It requires neither, wisdom, wit nor wealth to call. A beggar can call; a babe can call; and "whosoever calleth upon the name of the Lord shall be saved."

#### WE ARE TO "COME."

It is not difficult to come. The invitation "Come," explains itself. It is easy to come; a child may come; one may come who is feeble, who is frail, who is infirm; and Christ has said, "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest,"

#### WE ARE TO "RECEIVE."

It is easy to receive. There is nothing difficult in accepting a gift when it is proffered us; and it is said that God has loved the world, and given his only begotten Son for them, and "to as

many as received Him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God..

#### WE ARE TO "DRINK."

It is easy to drink. A thirsty man needs neither invitation nor instruction, if but once a cup of cold water be placed within his reach. And Christ hath said, "If any man thirst let him come unto me and drink!" and he that drinketh of the water that God shall give him, shall never thirst; for the water that he will give him "shall be in him a well of water, springing up into everlasting life."

#### WE ARE TO "TAKE."

It is easy to take that which is proffered. "The spirit and the bride say Come; and let him that heareth say Come; and let him that is athirst Come; and whosoever will let him take the water of life freely."

#### WE ARE TO "LOOK."

It is easy to look. Men can look when they cannot walk; they can look when they cannot talk; they can look when they can do nothing else. When the Israelites were dying in the wilderness, bitten by the fiery serpents, the one remedy prepared for them was the uplifted serpent of brass, and the one act that brought them benefit was simply to look. And so God says, "Look unto me all ye ends of the earth, and be ye saved, for I am God and there is none else."

Surely all these words tell us how simple, how plain is the way of life; how easy it is to secure eternal salvation; and with what perverse determination men pursue the path to death, and perish in spite of all the blessings that God has in store for them.

N the gar ison town of Woolwich, a few years ago, a soldier was about to be brought before the commanding officer of his regiment, for some misdemeanour. The officer entering the soldier's name said, "Here he is again; what can we do with him? He has

gone through almost every ordeal."

The sergeant major, M.B., apologized for intruding, and said, "there is one thing which has never been done with him yet sin"

him yet, sir"
"What is that, sergeant-major?"

"Well, sir, he has never yet been forgiven."

"Forgiven!" said the colonel. "Here is his case entered."

"Yes, but the man is not before you,

and you can cancel it."

After the colonel had reflected for a few minutes, he ordered the man to be brought in, when he asked what he had to say relative to the charges brought against him. "Nothing, sir," was the

reply, "only that I am sorry for what I have done,"

After making some suitable remarks, the colonel said, "Well, we have resolved to forgive you." The soldier wasstruck with astonishment, the tears started from his eyes—he wept. He thanked the colonel for his kindness, and retired. The narrator had the soldier under his notice for two years and a half after this, and never during that time was there a charge brought that time was there a charge brought him. Mercy triumphed! Kindness conquered! The man was won!

This is just the method God adopts with us in the everlasting Gospel. We are guilty. The charges are brought against us. The case is entered. But the Lord delighteth in mercy He seeks to melt us by his love. He is ready to forgive. He sends to us, saying, "Only acknowledge thine iniquities;" and then offers us a pardon—a pardon which cost Him the life of His only begotten Son—a pardon, not of one sin, but of all our sins—a pardon that will bring peace to the conscience on earth, and entitle us to eternal rest in heaven.

What would you have said, if the soldier referred to had insulted his colonel, when he told him that he had made up his mind to forgive him; and had told him he did not want his pardon, or that he did not believe him. Yet if you refuse, or neglect to humble yourself before God, and accept the pardon offered in His Word, you are acting just such a part before God. Oh, the folly, consummate folly, of the man who trifles with eternal punishment—who rejects the Saviour of sinners—who refuses to come to God by Him, that he may be pardoned, sanctified and saved!
