

The History of the Methodist Church in St. Marys Reviewed

ARVED on the memorial of John Wesley in Westminster Abbey are three of his memorable sayings:
"I look on all the world as my parish"; "God buries His workmen, but continues His work"; "The
best of all is God is with us." These sentiments have ever been controlling forces in the Methodist
Church. The spirit of John Wesley reappeared in the heroic itinerants of primitive days in Canada,
On foot with carpet-bag in hand, or on horseback with their saddle-bags, the pioneers of Methodism
sought out the early settlers.

"I see them in the saddle for journeys long and sore,

I hear their voices ringing at the lowly cabin door,

They call the poor to worship upon the prayer-blessed sod,

They warn the irreligious, and sinners point to God."

It is with gratitude that we review the history of the rise and progress of the Methodist Church in St. Marys. At a time when the Township of Blanshard was almost an unbroken forest, Ephraim Evans, D. D., Chairman of London District from 1838 to 1840, made his way into Blanshard and may have been the first itinerant to visit the early settlers and preach the Gospel in their dwellings. Another of the pioneer preachers was Rev. Robert Corson, ordained in 1825. He is remembered as one who came in on horseback and went from house to house ministering to the spiritual needs of the people. The family record of Rev. Samuel C. Philp shows that he preached in Blanshard in 1842, when stationed in Oxford.

In the Missionary Report of 1844-5, this statement is made by the Missionary at Devonshire (now Exeter), the Rev. Thomas Williams: "In September last I was visited by the Chairman of the District, who advised me to withdraw my attention from Goderich and spend my alternate Sabbaths at Devonshire and Blanshard, which I have continued to do

to the end of the year." In the Missionary Report of 1848 the following record appears: "This Mission, as you are perhaps aware, was heretofore connected with the London Circuit; last year it was set off and a distinct position given to it; the names of one hundred and seventeen members were returned to me. The circuit embraces the whole Township of Blanshard, parts of Fullarton, Downie and Nissouri. In the centre of the work stands the new but flourishing Village of St. Marys, in which and its vicinity we have a society of between forty and fifty members, a growing confidence and good congregations and a prosperous Sunday School. Here we have four village lots granted to us for sites of church and parsonage and a burying ground." This is the first record of an organized society of Methodists in St. Marys.

After worshipping for a few years in the stone schoolhouse on Queen Street, the Methodists of St. Marys built a church on the lot where stands the present building. This church was dedicated in 1856 during the pastorate of Rev. J. Ormerod and his colleague, Rev. Stephen Bond. After the opening of this new church, services twice a Sunday were held in St. Marys. Thomas Noice, Superintendent of the Sunday School, was succeeded in office by John Neelands. In the same year the first parsonage was built.

In 1869, St. Marys was created a station with a membership of one hundred and sixty-eight. In the same year, under the pastorate of Rev. Richard Whiting, the church was enlarged and a frame schoolhouse built. The next very important historic event was the erection of the present church building. This was accomplished in 1879, under the superintendency of Rev. S. D. Rice, D. D. In 1896, when Rev. John Learoyd was pastor, the church was remodelled and renovated, giving us the beautiful auditorium we now possess. The Sunday School building, including Epworth Hall, was erected in 1893 and the parsonage in 1905.

The unions of 1876 and 1883 brought into one body all the Methodists of the town, and the societies which began with but a few members have together grown strong and are represented by a membership of five hundred and seventy-five, and a Sunday School of four hundred and fifty-six.

There is much in the history of the past sixty years to excite in us both humility and gratitude. The innumerable and invaluable blessings received and the present prosperous state of our church afford abundant proof of the Scripturalness of our doctrines, ordinances and means of grace. Let the review of what God hath wrought rejoice our hearts!

The Pastors of St. Marys Methodist Church During 60 Years From 1848 to 1908



Rev. Thomas Williams.

1848-9—Rev. Thomas Williams. Ordained, 1845 superannuated, 1882; died, 1899. He was the first Methodist minister to occupy a parsonage in St. Marys. [He laid foundations upon which others have builded. His faithfulness is not forgotten.

- 1850—Rev John Williams. Ordained, 1845; died, 1854; aged 36 years.
- 1851-2—Rev. Thomas Fawcett. Ordained, 1837. In 1859 he was killed by an accident on the Great Western Railway; aged, 51 years.
- 1853—4—Rev. Charles W. M. Gilbert. Ordained, 1842; superannuated 1859; died, 1890.
- 1855—Rev. Richard Pinch. Ordained, 1855. Health not good; only seventeen effective years. Died. 1890.
- 1856—Rev. J. Ormerod. Discontinued in our ministry, 1857.
- 1856—Rev. Stephen Bond. Stephen Bond began his ministry in St. Marys in 1856. The District meeting that recommended him to the Confer-

ence was held in St. Marys. After a long and distinguished ministry of fifty-two years he has chosen to have his name placed in connection with St. Mary's, and is, therefore, a member of our Quarterly Official Board. He was super-

annuated at his own request, June, 1908, and now resides in the City of Toronto. In the highest courts and offices Rev. Stephen Bond has for many years been one of the most representative men of Canadian Methodism.

1857–8—Alexander Campbell. Ordained, 1852; died at Newcastle, 1865; Rev. Samuel C. Philps, jr., and Rev. Daniel Connelly were his colleagues.

1859-60—Rev. Andrew Edwards. After a ministry of thirty-three years he was superannuated in 1885. His colleagues were Robert Shaw (1859), and W. F. Morrison (1860).



Rev. John Wakefield, D. D.

1861–2—Rev. Thos. Cosford. Ordained, 1843. Was Chairman of Goderich District, 1861 Died in London, 1892; aged, 79 years. His colleagues were T. E. Garbutt (1861) and Daniel E. Brownell

- 1863-5—Rev. John Learoyd. Ordained, 1860. As Chairman of Districts, President of Conference and Delegate to five General Conferences, Mr. Learoyd was distinguished as a leader in the Methodist Church. He was superannuated in 1900; died in London in the jubilee year of his ministry, 1906 (aged 76 years), and was buried in St. Marys.
- 1866-8—Rev. J. W. McCallum. Ordained, 1845; superannuated, 1885; died, 1891.
- 1867—Rev. J. W. Holmes. Ordained, 1867; superannuated, June, 1908, after a long and distinguished ministry of forty-five years. He is at present residing in Saskatoon, Sask. Mr. Holmes was for many years Chairman of Districts, was President of Conference in 1891, and Delegate to every General Conference from 1886 to 1902.
- 1869-71—Rev. Richard Whiting. Ordained, 1849; superannuated, 1889; died, 1900; aged, 80 years.
- 1872—Rev. James Gray. Ordained, 1850; Chairman of District, 1872; Treasurer of Superannuation Fund, 1885–1892, when he died, aged 72 years.
- 1873-5—Rev. John Wakefield, D. D. Ordained, 1856; superannuated, 1903. Mr. Wakefield celebrated his ministerial jubilee in 1902. As Chairman of Districts, President of Conference, Delegate to General Conferences (1882-1902), and Delegate to the three Ecumenical Conferences, Rev. John Wakefield has been one of the most honored men of the Methodist Church. He is now residing in the City of Toronto. During his ministry in St. Marys, the church was blessed with a gracious revival.
- 1876-7—Rev. John Philp, M. A., D. D. Ordained, 1864; died, 1904. His ministry extended over fortythree years, and was strong and fruitful of many conversions.

1878-9—Rev. Samuel D. Rice, D. D. Began his ministry in 1837; was superannuated in 1882; and died December 15, 1884. From the beginning, his ministry was distinguished for ability and he was soon recognized as a leader in the Church. His gifts as an administrator were of exceptional value and he was, in order, elected to almost

every office within the power of his brethren to bestow. The confidence of the Church was notably expressed in his election to the position of Governor of Wesleyan Pemale College, Hamilton. This office he filled from 1803 to 1877. He was elected first President of the United Church, 1883, and in 1884 was chosen Senior General Superintendent. The present church building is a monument of his ministry in St. Marys, 1880-2—Rev. James Hannon, D. D. Ordained 1863; superannuated, 1905, and at present residing in London. Mr. Hannon is one of the most beloved and honored ex-pastors of St. Marvs.

1883-5—Rev. W. C. Henderson, M. A., D. D. Ordained, 1860; superannuated, 1906, and now residing in the City of Guelph. His pastoral and official records show a long and honored ministry.





Rev. A M. Phillips, B. D.

1886-7—Rev. A. M. Phillips, B. D. Ordained, 1878; died, December 16, 1896; aged, 49 years. During his brief ministry, Rev. A. M. Phillips became known as one of the most thoughtful, devoted and effective of Christian ministers. At the very zenith of his power he was called to rest from a life full of arduous labours.



Rev. John Scott, M. A., D. D.

1888-90—Rev. T. M. Campbell. Ordained, 1870; superannuated, 1903. His home is in Toronto. Rev. T. M. Campbell is another of the pastors of St. Mary's whose ability as a wise counsellor and a leader have been recognized by the church in his appointment to some of its most responsible offices.



Rev. H. A. Graham, B. A.

1891-3—Rev. John Scott, M. A., D. D. Ordained, 1871; superannuated, 1903; died, 1907, in Toronto. In the home and foreign fields Rev. John Scott's ministry was eminently useful. His gifts were of the exalted and versatile character and his record uniformly good. 1894—Rev. Andrew Cunningham. His ministry began 1867 and closed with his death in 1899. Aged, 55 years. Rev. A Cunningham was an amiable, devoted and honored minister. His physical strength was insufficient for his ambitious spirit.

1895-7—Rev. John Learoyd. This was the second term for Mr. Learoyd. His ministry is remembered with gratitude.



Rev. Thos. Manning, B. A.

1898-01—Rev. Geo. W. Henderson. Ordained in 1880, Mr. Henderson is now in the thirty-third year of his very useful ministry. He is stationed in Charlotte Street Church, Peterborough. His pastorate in St. Marys is remembered as one of gratifying prosperity.

1902—— Rev. Thomas Manning, B. A. The pulpit ministrations of Rev. Thos. Manning are remembered as amongst the strongest in the history of the church. His courageous and aggressive spirit was a wholesome stimulant to the religious life of the people. During his pastorate the present commodious parsonage was built. Mr. Manning was ordained in 1878 and is in the strength of a useful ministry in the City of Windsor.

1905-8—Rev. Humphrey A. Graham, B. A. Ordained, 1899, and is now in the thirteenth year of his ministry. He is stationed at Wellington Street Church, London. Mr. Graham's promotion has been exceptionally rapid, and the success that is following his work shows that his ability merits the confidence of the people. St. Marys made a good record during his pastorate and a very expensive and beautiful Casavant Organ was purchased and installed.

1908—Rev. D. N. McCamus. Ordained, 1882. Appointed to St. Marys, June, 1908.



The New Connexion Methodist Church in St. Marys

HE New Connexion Methodist Church, which began its mission in Canada early in the Nineteenth Century, was represented in St. Mary's by Rev. Joseph Oates in 1853. After him the ministers in succession were: Reverends Francis G. Weaver (1854-5), Walton Preston (1856-7), James B. Kershaw (1858-60), Samuel B. Gundy (1861-4), David D. Rolston (1865-7), David Smyth (1868-71), and George Jackson (1872-4).

In March, 1867, the stone schoolhouse on Queen Street was purchased, enlarged and dedicated for religious purposes. The Trustees were: Corneil Switzer, Joseph Beavers, Christopher Sparling, John Jarvis and Wm. Maybew.

In 1874, union with the Wesleyan Methodist Church was consummated. During the years from 1853 to 1874 the Church increased from eighty to one hundred and eighty-one members.

The Methodist Episcopal Church in St. Marys

HE Methodist Episcopal Church Circuit was known as St. Marys and Nissouri Circuit. It is believed that the very first sermon delivered in St. Marys was preached by Thomas B. Brown, a local preacher of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Canada. At that time there were not a half-dozen houses in St. Marys. Mr. Brown was ordained an elder in 1844, and continued his faithful ministrations for many vears. His son, Elisha H. Brown, was Steward in the Methodist Episcopal Church for thirty-eight years, and Recording Steward for a quarter of a century. He is now a venerable and useful member of the Methodist Church of this town. In 1877 Rev. Stephen Knott was pastor in St Marys with I. B. Cutler as Colleague. He was succeeded by I. A. Bloodsworth and W. N. Vollick. The last before the union was Rev. Dixon Sharp. During this period-1877-1883-the Presiding Elders were Rev. Edward Lonsbury and Rev. Dr. James Gardiner, now living in Belleville, Ontario.

The Trustee Board

LL PROPERTY, real and personal, deeded to the Methodist Church shall be held in trust by Trustees appointed for that purpose. The members of each Board of Trustees are empowered to administer their trust on behalf of the congregation whom they represent according to the discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

The first record of a Trustee Board of the Wesleyan Methodist Church is dated May 15, 1851. At that time they purchased a lot—50 feet x 150 feet—on the corner of Church and Elgin Streets. Here the first Methodist Church was

built and dedicated 1856.

The Trustees of that Board were: George Mercer, Thomas Elder, Joshua Brink, William Carroll, Edward Long, William L. Armstrong, Jacob Legear and Francis S. Burdick. The lot was purchased from James Ingersoll, who represented the Crown. It was, therefore, a Crown grant, the consideration being only five shillings.

For some reason James Ingersoll made a new deed to the Church in April, 1864. On this deed the following names appeared as Trustees: Edward Long, Robert Eaton, Robert Birtch, John Harrison, William Carroll, George Simpson,

Richard Box and James Eaton.

A further purchase of property was made August 1st, 1876. The cost was four hundred dollars. The deed shows that the Trustees of the St. Marys Congregation of the Methodist Church of Canada were: John Wesley Polc, Richard Box, Joseph Dufton, Robert Eaton, William Lyell Hutton, Joseph Peart and Thomas Rogers—all of St. Marys—and William Aiken, of the Township of Downie. The property now held in trust for the Methodist Church of St. Marys, consists of:

THE CHURCH—Built of brick and stone; value, \$35,000.00; seating capacity, 1,200.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL-Built of brick; value, \$9,500.00.

THE PARSONAGE-Built of brick; value, \$5,000.00.

THE SHED-Built of stone; value, \$1,500.00.

The Woman's Missionary Society

A NAUXILIARY of the Western Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church was organized at St. Marys on the 5th day of October, 1885, with the following officers: President, Mrs. W. C. Henderson; Vice-President, Mrs. Robert Eaton; Corresponding Secretary, Miss Hilliard; Recording Secretary, Mrs. H. L. Rice; Treasurer, Miss Gill. Members enrolled, twenty-three. Amount of money raised, \$40.50. Membership fees, \$22.75.

Since that time the following women have held the office of President: Mrs. Henderson, 1885-6; Mrs. Phillips, 1886-8; Mrs. Campbell, 1888-91; Mrs. Scott, 1891-4; Mrs. Cunningham, 1894-5; Mrs. Roberts, 1895-8; Mrs. George W. Henderson, 1898-1902; Mrs. Roberts, 1902-8.

The present officers are: Honorary President, Mrs. Vice; Honorary Vice-President, Mrs. Jos. Pearn; President, Mrs. Roberts; First Vice-President, Mrs. Gill; Second Vice-President, Mrs. Lindsay; Third Vice-President, Mrs. Copeland; Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Southcombe; Recording Secretary, Mrs. Bailey; Treasurer, Mrs. Dunseith; Pianist, Mrs. F. The Sunday School

HE first Methodist Sunday School in St. Marys was organized over sixty years ago under the superintendency of Thomas Noice. In 1856 the school was removed from the stone schoolhouse to the new Methodist Church on Church Street, where it grew in numbers and efficiency, keeping pace with the progress of Methodism. In 1869, a frame school room was built. This was occupied until replaced by the present commodious building, erected in 1893, under the superintendency of H. L. Rice, B. A. The Superintendents in order of time were: Thomas Noice, John Neelands, W. L. Hutton, Robert Eaton, Joseph Peart, G. Y. Eaton (who died during his superintendency greatly beloved and sincerely lamented. The memorial service is still remembered.) J. J. Crabbe, Thos. Butcher, T. F. Harrison, H. L. Rice, B.A. (1892-4), T. H. Follick, M. A. (1894-6), A. H. Lofft (1896-7), F. E. Butcher (1897-1900), H. L. Rice, B.A. (1900-1), F. E. Butcher (1901-2), W. C. Box (1902-4), F. E. Butcher (1904-6) and Wm. A. McIntyre (1906-8).

The Staff of Officers and Teachers is represented in the accompanying photograph. They consist of ten officers and twenty-five teachers. The School has an aggregate attendance of 425, and a Cradle Roll of 31.

The Choir

THE Choir dates back to 1856, and was organized by the first leader, John Ford. Subsequent leaders were: J. W. Sparling, Joseph Peart, Mr. Taylor, Amos Harrington, Mr. Broadway, Mr. Cliff, J. J. Crabbe, M. J. Beam, T. H. Follick, M. A., Miss Mennig, T. T. Garner, A. Ross Love, and the present incumbent, F. C. Thomas, L. R. A. M., A. R. C. O.



Among the organists during these years were: C. S. Jones, Miss Bond, Miss Carrie Lone, Miss Lizzie Carter, Miss Shellington, Prof. Goodfellow, Miss Cosford, Prof. Adamson, Mr. Mason (a young Englishman whose brother and sister sang in the choi-g, Miss M. Shillington, Miss B. McCallum, Miss E. Watt, Miss Bessic Austin, Miss Ella Recsor, and Mr. Hamilton Butcher.

In the early days the choir was composed of Joseph Peart (Leader), the Misses Pearce, Geo. Gavin, Thos. McCullough, the Misses Jones, Miss S.

Bailey and Thos. Jones.

The Epworth League

A T A time antecedent to 1890 the young people of the Methodist Church, St. Marys, were called together and an organization formed for mutual moral and religious improvement, and was known as the "Young People's Society." This Society was further enlarged in its sphere of usefulness in 1890 by the creation of an Auxiliary called the "Help" Department. The purpose of the Help Department was for works of charity and beneficence. Of this Department the officers-elect were: Miss Jessie Colley, President; Miss Cash, Vice-President; Dr. Gillrie, Secretary; and Wm. C. Box, Treasurer.

On November 9th, 1891, the Young People's Society resolved to accept the constitution and name of the Epworth League of Christian Endeavor, and the following officers were elected: Honorary President, Rev. J. Scott, M. A.; Mr. S. Little, President; W. C. Box, First Vice-President; Miss Clark, Second Vice-President; Miss S. Wright, Secretary: Mr. T. H. Follick, M. A., Treasurer.

The Epworth League (1908), has a membership of sixty, and raised for missions last year, \$115.00. The officers are: H. C. White, President; Miss Salvadge, First Vice-President; Miss Mary M. Whiles, Second Vice-President; Miss Birdie Hamilton, Third Vice-President; Miss Maud Freeman, Fourth Vice-President; Mrs. W. H. Marshall, Fifth Vice-President; Miss Mary L.
