Sroakstions won Janvary,--Hee that no loose boards around your barn let in cold winds to chlif the poor anmals in their stalls. Feed regularly, and in quantly sufficient to keep stock thriving. A iltle grain and ronta given to sheep every day will be repald generously when they come to market. Take advantage of any mild weather and cat surface trains from low pleces of land, and thas ald ingetting them ready to work early in kpring. Keep tools under cover; clean and paint them. The forcing-beds and green-houses will, of course, require particular attention; and the active man may find komething to do in preparing for a more genial season. Poles and rods for beans and peas may be ready to be used when needed; manure collected ; compostheaps formed; frutt-trees pruned; bedges elipped, and asparagus-beds top-dressed, preparatory to belng dug when frost has ceased.

Suggestions por Februamy,-Lay out plans for spring and summer work. Note desirable farm hands, and, without doing a disereditable action toward any nelghbor, sectre good and trusty help.

Of course you keep a good aupply of fuel near the stove for the good housewife, for "her season of rest" Is very often long deferred-until that debt is paid off. Carefut farmers will see that the supply of fuel for the whole year is secured during the winter months, and phed away in the shed.

Give fowls any old scraps of meat, cut up into little pleces, as well ns pounded bome, atut an abundance of dry ashes or fine sand to dust themselves with ; as also, fresh, warm water dally.

Hod-Beds--Every farmes should be provided with that cheap and simple means of employment, a not-bed, for forwarding tender vegetables. A plain box of suitabic, size and ngure, with a sash and shutter to fit, uniler which plants of cathage, tomatoe, egg-plant, eten may be raised, will answer.

3rd Month. MARCH, 31 Days. Begins on Friday.


Avgentions yor Marcit.-Examine land and note the felds needing draining. Care should be exercised in preparing and cleaning seeds for spring planting, selecting only the best and plumpest of each kind for stich purpose.
Farming Implements.-Tools may be examined, harness olled, etc.
Let all your preparations for spring work be marching on to oompletion. Remember that a few acres of carly peas will amply repay for the trotibie of preparation, besides leaving the ground in good condition; and when the proper time arrives to sow, have a good spot ready for them. They furnish exeellent food for stock or plgs raising litters, as they produce an abundant flow of milk. Decide what crop is best for ${ }^{3}$ given plece of land, and sow that particular one thereon if possible.
Paint your dwellings and outhouses, for the wood is in such a condition as to be most benefltetd just at thls season.

Sugaeations yor May.-With the enrly dawn he shonld be at work, planting corn, potatoes, etc., as well as preparing ground for other crops, Corn ground should receive thorough preparation, and the seed planted in straight, even rows; half a pint of tar to a peek of seed-corn will secure it from the crows,

Young ealves should have dry, comfortable yards, with shelter. Two may at times be profitably raised by one cow. A good field of carrots may be planted, and will prove a most valuable addition to winter fect. Husband manure; buy hay rather than pasture mowing-lands ; sow onlons eurly, four pounds of seed to the acre, fourteen inches apart; keep poutry out of the garden.

Sugokstions por June,-Keep the soil mellow and free from weeds It is said one weed will sow seed for it thousand, I, the loorse cultiva. tor frequently pass between the rows of growing crops, Let corn be sown In thick drills for fodder.

Let a thorough cleanlng fip occur in and around the farm butldings, having all swept out clean, the old hay, reed, and other oold materials removed, and the whole premises pht in good order for the recepion of the new crops,

Cattle in the pastures should not be overlooked; and if any are found ailing, removed to the stables, nursed, and provided for,

Peas and oats may be sown together, about two bushels of each sced, well mixed, to the acre, and drilled In well; or drill in the peas three Inches deep, and sow the oats brosicast, barrowing them in. The whito fiel- -bean may be planted in drills two feet aparl.

Sugaestioss yor July.--Girain-felds will demand attention if any weeds are found thereln; and when the heads are fatrly developed, go through the felds and plek out such spots as looik best, and save the grain thereon for next season's seed. Oats blown down or lodged may be cut and cured for hay, and odd spots of wheat and barley may require the same treatment.
Wheat-stacks are best built long and narrow, with one side a little higher than the other, with boards to cover the stack.
Potatoe Ground.-If dug early for market, set cabbages fast as ground is cleared.
Cabbages may also follow field-peas if the ground is rich; and if not, a tine rich eompost may be plowed in.
Corn, sorghum, millet, and Hungarian grava may be sowed for solling or for hay.

Rugarstions for August.-Fartow cows, Intended to be fatted in the fall, should be dried offat once; and to do thls, mllk only enough to relieve a painfal distention of their $\operatorname{tdders}$.

Spring colts and calves shonld be gradually weaned this month. Confine them in clean, dry inclosures, Soe that none of the young s:ork suffer from lnck of a botintiful supply of clean water, with good grass or fine hay and walt.

Stir the groand frequently around carrots, and, if manure is needed, apply it in liquid form while rain is falling, so that the leaves will not be injured.

Orchnrds will be benelltted by allowing sheep and swine to run in them and plek up all injured fruit.

Colleet ecgs dinily, and paek those gathered In oata, in a cool, not damp, room. In a dark rocm, pass the eggs, two in each hand, before a IIght; If the shells are clean, had onos will easily be discovered.

Suggestions fon Octonkr,-This is a very favorable season for nill general repairs that do not reguire the getting out of heavy frames, ete., which is properly winter work; at ail events prepare good protection for all live stock, Pine boards are not so expensive an outside protection as an inside lining of provender.

Soft corn, pumpkins, and graus at this season fatten cattle fanter than corn, roots, and ofl-cako in winter. The bulk of fiesh should be latd on now, preparatory to the later finishing off.

Butter--Sceure as full a flow of milk as possible, by feeding roots or pumpicins as the pastures fail, and add ofl-cake, bran, and soft corn, or the like, to produce a maximum yleld of butter.

> Carrots.- Dig before there is danger of the ground freezing, even very slightly. Keep in the cellar and away from frost. The tops before they are frosted are good feed for cattle.

COURTS OF ONTARIO.

## Lav and Equity.

Courts of Error and Apreal.- - Constituted for the hearing of appeals in civil cases from the Courts of Queen's Bench, Chancery and Common Pleas; and appeals in criminal cases from the Courts of Queen's Bench and 'Common Pleas. From the jadgment of this Court, an appeal lies to Her Majesty in Privy Council, in cases over el, 000 , or where annul rent, fee, or future rights of any amount, are effected. Judges-Chief Justice of the Court of Error and Appeal in Ontario, Hort. IV. II. Draper, C.B.; Chief Justice of Ontario, Hon. William Buell Richards ; Chancellor of Untario, Hon. Couet of Queex's Bevoli- - The jurisdiction of this Count extends to all manner of actions, causes and suits, criminal and eivil, real, personal and mixed, within Upper Canada, and it may proceed in such, by such process and course as are provided by law, and as shall tend with justice and despatch to determine the same; and may hear and determme all issues of law, and also with the inquest of twelve good and lawful men (except in cases otherwise provided for) try all issues of fact, and give judgment, and award execution, thereon, and also in matters which relate to the Queen's Revenue (including the condemnation of contraband or smuggled goods) as may be done by Her Majesty's Superior Courts of Law in England. Chiof Justice, Hon. William Buell Ruchards: Puisne Judges, Hon. Joseph C: Morrtson, and Hon. Adam Wilson; Clerk of the Crown and Pleas, Robert G. Dalton; Reporter, Chis. Rol.inson, Q.C.; Senior Clerk, John Small; Junior or Docketing Clork, William Lynes.

Court of Chancery.--This Court has the like jurisdiction as the Court of Chancery in England, in cases of fiaud, accident trusts, executors, administratore, co-partnerships, account, mortgages, awards, dower, infanis, lunatics and their, estates, waste, specific performance, discovery and to prevent multiplicity of suits, staying proceedings at law prosecuted against quitey and good conscience, and may decree, the issue repeal or avoidance of letters patent, and generally the like powers which the Court of Chancery in England possesses to administer justice in all cases in which there is no adequate remedy callat Wright's Nates Itoom.

County Courts.-Presided over by a resident Judge in each county. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed $£ 50$; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contmet, where the amount is ascertained lay the acts of tho parties or signatures of the defendant, to $£ 100$; and to all bail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to any amount; but not to ceses involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superion Courts of Law.

Surrogite Couats.-The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceasod persons having estate or effect in Upper Canada, and all matters arising ont of or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or adminstration, subject to an appenl to the Court of Chancery. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts. Chief Surrogate Clerk at Toronto, Sir J. L. Robinson, Bart.

Courts of Genken. Sessions.- The County Judge in each county, holds a Court of General Bessions in his county semiannually on the second Tuesday in June and December, except in the County of York, in which county said Court is held three times, commencing on the second Tuesday in March, July and December, for the trial of cases of felony and misdemeanor, but treason and capital felonies are exempt from their jurisidiotion.

> Terms of the Courts.

Court of Erbor avd Aypkal.- This Court holds its sittings trice a year at Toronto, in the months of January and Jume, upon such days as it may by rule or order from time to time nppoint, and may didjourn such sitting from day to day, or for any such longer period as it may deem expedient, and may also appomt days for giving jutgment or for disposing of business as in its eliscretion it shall see lit.

Law Trims.-Hilary begins firtst Monday in February, and ends Sajurday of the ensuing week; Easter begins third Monday in May and ends Saturday of the second week thereafter; Michaelmas begins third Monday in November and ends Saturday of the second week thereafter. By the Act 29 and 30

Fl. onp. 40, Trinity Term, hitherto commencing on the Monday after the 21st August, is abolished ; but the same statute gives power to the Court of Queen's Benchand Common Pleas at their discretion, to hold sittings in banc in time of vacation (except long vacation), by virtue of a rule or order of the Court, respectively to be made in or out of term, for the hearing of such special cases or rules for new trials as shall be named in a list to be attached to any such rule or order, and for giving of judgment in cases previously argued, and for disposing of such other business as the Court in its discretion shall see fit. Notice of such rules to be given in form and manner prescribed by the Act, six clear days before the day appointed.

Chancery Terms.-Examination Teme.-From 1st Tuesday of February to the Baturday after the 2nd Tuesday of April; and from list Tuesday of September to the Saturday after lst Tuevday of November. Hearing Terms-From 4th Mronday in April until Suturday of the following week and from 3rl Monday in November until Maturday of the following week. The Court also sits every Tuesday (except during the regular vacations) throughout the year, for hearing motions for Decrees, motions for or to dissolve special injunctions, and appeals from the reports of the Master or Deputy Masters.

County Court Terms. - The several County Courts in Ontario hold, semi-annually, terms to commence on the first Monday in January, and July and end the following Naturday, except the County Court of the County of York, which holds three terms, to commence respectively, on the first Monday in January and April and the last Monday in August, and ending on the Saturday of the same week.

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## DIVISION COURT.

This Court is for the summary disposal of cases by a Judge ; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contracts amounting to $\$ 100$; injuries or torts to personal property amounting to $\$ 40$. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge.

## CLERES MAY EXTER JUDGMENT.

"Special Summons" shall be returnable on the 11th day after the service thereof ppon the defendant in case the defondant or one of the defendants reside in the county is which the action is brought and unless the notice required by the second section of the Act of 1869 has been given by a sole defendent, or by one or more of several defendants, and leave to dispute the plaintiff's claim has not been given by the Judge, the clerk after receiving a return of the "Sperial summons." with the proper affidavit of service, may, on the 12 th day after the service of the strmmons, enter judgment agamst the defendant or defendants so smerved as atoresand, for the claim or so much therof as has not been disputed; if the plaintiff is contept with judgment for such part.

If the plaintiff is not content to take judgment for the part not disputed, he must proceed to trial as 11 ordinary cases, and the part of such chim not disputed, shall be considered as admitted and confessed by the defendani or defendants.

## SETCLEMENT AND PROGRESS OF THE TOWNSHIP OF OF RAMSAY.

The.Township of Ramany is situsted in the County of Lanark, sind is nea:ly midway, in a north easterly direction, between Brockvilie on the St. Lawrence and the village of S.ml Pomt on the Ottawa river, and is traversed in its whole length by tho B.ockville and Ottama Railway. It is mumpund. et by a healthy and populous farming country, and seme years ago iris the mort noted of the townships in Centent Carada for the quantity and the quality of the agriculcural produce, partienlarly fall wheat, which it furniohed to lo $\times 1$ purchasers, as well as to the geeat lumber emporium of Bytown now transformed into Ottawa City, the capital of the Dominion of Canada. For some years past, owing to the openness of the country, this grain bas been linble to more or less winter killing, consequently farmers have turned their attention to other banchos of agricultural products, parti-ularly sto $k$ 1sising, which, since the American war, has been a most profinble employment. The soil is generally good, embracing great variety from the light silieions to the heary alluvial. The township, contains about 63 (OY) acres, of which 58,488 are occupied. The Canadian Miswissippi, a lurge body of water, traverse it angulatiy, and enriches it with several most splendid water powers, giving every facility for the ecection of machinery' of various kinds, and which have heen made largely availabie for manufacturng purposes; it is also suppliel with smaller streams, some of which have beon utilized in like manner. Fine quarrios of building stone, both lime and randstone, are accessible; iron ore of different kinds is abundant, but has never been wrought; a lead mine was carried on for sone time, but was abandoned, we believe, for want of sufficient outfall for drainage. During the poriol of clearing the land, large quantities of potashos were mannfactured, and from being always a cash article, proved a nseful resource to the settler. Great quantitios of square timber, rod and white pine, oak and elm, were abro sent to Quebeo, although of the finest quality, not alwayn with the most prolitable results. It is unnecevary to say that both of these branches of industry are among the things that wore, although other and more benefical and lasting lines heve been and are boing largely developed.

The township was principally settled in 1851 by operatives from Glangow and Paisley, who emgrated under the anspices of the govemment. They were furnished on their arrival in Quebeo with a free passage (such as it was) to the village of Ianark, then the nearest place at which aocommodntions could be procured for them, till, they had an opportunity of going upon their land; they had also there a choice of location, the oliey in Wrighi's Nales \$oom.
townchips of Lanark, Dalhousie and Sherbrooke being open for zettlertent at the same time. Meads of familios received a grant of a hundrel zores of land; the govermment*also furnished them witha fow tools, blankets and other necossaries; the sum of erght pouds storling was also given by instalments to every individual, which it was then understood was to be repaid after a few years, but was aiterwarde entirely remitted. Here it may be remarkod that those coming to any part of Cana la now have notidet of the hirdships that these pionecrs of the present comfortable homes of Canada hud to.endure. After a long and crowited passage in a sailing ship, they were put into what was then cefled a steamboat at Quobee, which after three or four days, mived at "the foot of the current" at Montreal, up which they had to be towed by horses and oxen; then transfere i by car to Lachine, and stored iii military shede, till battoux coald be found to take them to Pre. cott, the men getting out at the rapids to tow the clamsy owsfts up the stream; from: Prescot they wended their weary way in ox wegons, by Brockville end Perth to Lanark, th:ough What was then a thinly zettle I country, and mere tracks thoo' the woods. On ariving at this promised haven of lest, each had to proride himself with a wigwem, of brush or other materia!, as his means or ingenuity emabled him. Sickness, as a matter of course, raged, especially among the young, and comfoits were not to be prosured, e en by the few who had the means. Whe of the bost-oft families among the muy hundreds who came out, found their first shelter in a humim hab. itation in Cansdr, in the house of a gentleman in Perth, the late Col. Taylor, well known to all in those days for his kind. nses and philanthropy. After all this had been gone through the land was to be selected and located; roads were not; the river or the surveyors lines were all that these inexperienced woodsmen hai to guide them. After selecting ther lots, a few of the most enterprising built scows, and in these most of the Ramsay settlers got down to the nearest points on the river to where they intented to settlo, and uader them many of their families lived for weeks of the cold, wet wenther of September and October, till they got their primitive shanties built, no easy job with unpractised men, and with only ther neighbors to help them to carry the logs, man of whom lad never sean a full grown tree in their lives, till they came to Candu. Contrast all this with the troubles of the emigiant of to-day. Hurried over the Atlantic in a magnificent steamship, only eight or ten days out of sight of land; from Que. bec, rushing at whirlwind speed on the finest stermer in the world, or on the swifter railway, towarls the setting sun, through towns and cities vieing with oach other in their eagerness to serve them, and reaching their destination on the far-
off shores of Huron or Nipis ing. in less time than it then took between Quebec and Montreal, or between Brockville and Perth, strely we may say that thet lines have fallen in pleasant places. Could those who now complain of their haidships only realize those of the emigrant of half a century ago, they would sturely show a less discontented spirit.

The Ramsay settlers, from their former mode of life, being necessarily macquainted with agriculture, and not having been accustomed to serere labor, had, as miglit be expected, many privations to endure for the first few years; they were in the undesimble situation of the African traveller; "no cows bad they to give them milk, no mills to grind their com," but alas! this, was not all, for during the first nom second years the great difficulty was to procure com or indeed provisions of any kind, In 1822 there was but one $o x$ in Ramsay, owned by Mr. James Metcalf, ninth line, and one horse, Mr. Robert Mansell's ; cows were plentier, for there were two, Mr. Mansell and Mr. John Gemmill having one each. The clearings were small, all the loggiag, do., having to te done by hand, and the woods sladed a gieat part of the small crops; whit ginin was sowed hal to be exered with the hoe: the returnwere therefore small, and many families were educed to great distress, and were obliged to live on the most unsavory and often unwholesome viands, but with the plentiful crop of 1823 all their hardships were forgoten, and no serious difficulties of the kind ever afterwards occurned.

During the fall of 1823 a new trouble came upon a portion of them ; the Government brought out a large portion of Irish emigrants, chiefly from the Counties of Limerick and Coik, under the charge of Hon. Peter Robinson, brother of the late Chief Justice ; they were established for the winter in a camp, which they called "Ballygiblin," about the place whore McGuire's furniture establishment now stands, in the presont Village of Almonte, where they received military rations, and were fed upon the fat of the land. As the landlords in Ireland, who had the selection, naturally wihheel to rid themselves of the most improvident and unruly, it was no wonder that, with a few notable exceptions, they were disposed to follow their old system in Camada; leading idle and dissolute lives. Fre want of other amusement they took to fighting among themselves, and, as a variety, to teating and maltreatmg others; for any end for no cause, unoffending men were beaten nearly to death; some dared not to sleep in their own houses, and to such a pitch had they got that on the morning of the first Sunday in May, 1824, the militia of Perth and vicinity, under command of the authorities, made an attack upon the camp, killing one and wounding and capturing many of the most turbulent, which put an effeotual stay to their out.

It is worthy of remark that of those who remained about the camp during the winter, very few evory came to any good, while those who settled at once upon their land, and their descendants, are at the present time among I'm most repoctable and wealthy people in the townshep. $\therefore$ inuch for xoiziag time and opportunity.
dan her eremy for a few years troabled these alventurous nes and their families. From the admission of the sun inte the gaal sloarin si, and the want of thorough virculation of ais, the desyin: resetable matter produced a miasma causing great prevatenco of ferer and ague. This is general. Iy the cave in $n$ climata like this, in similar circumstances; the enlargement of the clearings, promoting froer circulation always as here, does away with any endemic disease of this kind, and since that time the settlement has been the healthiest on the continent.

The chnge since $1 \times 21$ has beon rapidand great; the forest has given way before the stroke of the axe; the wigwam of the Indian and the shanty of the settler have been discarded for comfortable and substantial dwellings of frame, stone or brick; well cultivated and verdant fields have taken the place of woods and swamps; bridges, mills, schools, and churches have spring up as if by magie; villages dot the surface of the township, and one of them, Almonte, already rivals many towns in size, as it far exceeds them in business and manufactures. The Public Libraries in the county of Lanark in the year 1866 were one hundred and twenty-four, containing 21, 319 volumes, and of this lavge intellectual provision the people of Ramzay, true to their descent, enjoy a largo proportion. The Township is also head quarters for the North Riding lanark Agricultural Society. Of the manufacturing and business resources of the township, and particularly of the village of Almonte, it is impossible here 1 , speak, especially as the latter deserves an article to itseif. This material prosperity would gladden the hearts of the old settlers could they now see the fruts of their hardships and labors, but alas! they are fast passing away, not more than eight or ten of the original losatees of 1821 being left, but their clescendants are enjoying in peace and comfort the results of their arduous struggles. Let those who are now coming to the country take courage from a knowledge of the suceess that crowned their labors, and go on perseveringiy in the firm belief that they can do the same, nay, in the altered and improved conthtion of the country, they may with less hardship accomplish much more. Canada is no country for any man to sit down with folded hands, but he who has strength and a stout heart is sure of plenty for himself and those given to his care, and ultmate comfort if not affluence.

## THE SCHOOL. ACT.

Her Majesty, by and with the adviee and eonsent of the Legislative, Avembly of the Provinec of Ontario enacts as follows :-

1. All Common schools, which shall horeafter be designated and kbown as Public Kchools, shall be free schools; and the Trustees of sehool sections, and the municipal conncils of cities, towns, villagex and townships, shall. In the mamer now povided by law, levy and collect the rate npon all the taxable pfoperty of the school division, or manicipality, (as the ease may be) to defray the expenses of such schoghs, as deternained by the Trastees thereor ; Provided that Publle Rehook Boards In eities, towns and villages, may, if they deem it expedient, collect from parents and gaardians of childron attending their sehood, a xum not exceeding twenty eents per month, per pupit, to defray the, eost of text books, stationory and of iove contingencles.
2. Each Rehool corporation shall provide midequate accommodations for all chiflen of sehool age in their school division or muncipality,
3. Every depositor's aecount ait this be kept with the PostmasterGeneral, and aflepsistor may pay into his or her account with the Poet Omee Savings Bank, at any of the savings Bank Post Offees which at the titme may bost suit hifs convenience, and may exerelse the sume eholve in irawlag eat money, subject only to the obligntlonaf prokuchng the pass-book, in proof of identity -whenever paying in or drawing out money.
8. Intereat at the rate of 4 per cont, per annum will be allowed on deposits lying in the ordinary deposit accounts, but wben a depositor has $\$ 100$ deposited, he or she may request the Postmaster-tieneral to transfer this sum th a spectal nceount, and will then recelve certificate of such special $\$ 100$ deposit, bearing interest at 5 per cent, per unnom.

## A FEW STATISTICAL FACTS AND FIGURES.

A legal stone is fourteen pounds in England, sixteen pounds in Holland. A fathom, six feet, is derived from the height of a full grown man. A hand, in horse measure, is four inches. An Irishe mile is 2,240 yards; a Scotch mile is 1,984 ; a Ger$\mathrm{man}, 1,806$; a Turkish, 1,626 . An acre is 1,840 square yards, 1 foot and 3 s inches, each way. A square mile, 1,760 yards each way, contains 640 acres. The human body consists of 240 bones, 9 kinds of articulations or joinmgs, 100 cartilages,
or ligaments, 400 muscles or tendons, and 100 nerves, besides blood, arteries, veins, \&c. Potatoes below three feet do not vegitate ; at one foot they grow quickest, and at two feet they are retarded two or three months. There are no solud rocks in the Arctic regions, owing to the severe frosts. The surface of the sea is estimated at $150,000,009$ square miles,taking the whole surface of the globe at $190,000,000 \mathrm{sq}$ nare miles. Its greatest depth is supposed to be equal to the height of the highest mountain, or four miles.

    Buekwheat, which must be eut before the frost hurts it, and put up in new gavels, the tops being tied round the shed ratn, will go on filling out, though but few grains were fully formed at the time of cutting.
    Fotatoe vines decaying Indicates the maturlty of the crop and early scrts may be dug and housed at once, Should any show appearance of rot, market them at once.

    Corn.-Go through the fields and select ears a little above the medium slae, close, 71 m, well tipped over, tieht and full at the end. Mark them in some way, and in husking-time lay such husits aside unhusked for seed.

    Beans.- Pull when they turn yellow; make small heapestacked about poles, raised from the ground by kticks or stones; green ones will ripeu.

    Butter,-Put down well for winter and market; take great care, in order to realize high prices.
