# FRANCE.

The death of General Chanzy, occurring between the death and funeral of M. Gamhetta, left France without her most skilful military strategist in addition to the loss of her most influential statesman. At M. Gambetta's funeral, participated in by three hundred thousand people and witnessed by many thousands more, several public men gave expressions of revengeful feelings to ward Germany, which were rather discourag ing to the prospects of prolonged peace between the two countries. Prince Jerome Napoleon Bonaparte-a cousin of the late Emperor-has raised the standard of Bonapartism by issuing a manifesto pronouncing the republic a failure and arguing that the only hope of France is in the restoration of the Empire under the Bonapartist dynasty the throne of which he claims would be his by hereditary right.
