SECOND SESSION OF THE TWENTY-SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Wednesday, March 16, 1864.

THE House having, by several Proclamations hereto annexed, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the dispatch of business;

And being met—

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Robert Hyndman, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod:

Mr. Speaker;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber, instant.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber;

And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported, that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy, which he read to the House, and is as follows:—

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

Your Address of Congratulation to your Sovereign on the Marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales has been laid before the Queen, and Her Majesty was much gratified by the expressions which it contained of loyalty and attachment to her throne and person.

You, I am confident, warmly participate in the joy to which the birth of a Prince has given rise throughout Her Majesty's dominions.

I am desired by the Secretary of State for the Colonies to inform you that Her Majesty has not been able to comply with the prayer conveyed in the Address which you adopted during last Session, on the subject of the Report of the Commissioners appointed to enquire into the differences between landlords and their tenants.

It is the wish of the Secretary of State, that in communicating this decision to you, I should invite your attention to suggestions made by his Grace, in a despatch, which will be laid before you.

His Grace, in this despatch proposed that the local Government should be authorized to issue, annually, a certain amount of debentures, and to apply these debentures in assisting to buy up the landlords' rights, with their consent.

His Grace further proposed that sales should not be compulsory on the landlords, but that a fixed rate of commutation should be indicated, by authority, as the Government price. That this assessed rate of purchase, viewed as receiv-

ing a certain moral support from Government, should regulate the amount of assistance to be given in each case from public funds.

As the terms of commutation proposed by his Grace were in some respects less favourable to the tenantry than those which had already been offered by the proprietors, and as it seemed likely that little practical good would result from their adoption, in consequence of his Grace stating that they would not be compulsory on the landlords, it was deemed expedient that Delegates should be sent to England to ascertain the views of Her Majesty's Government, and to facilitate a settlement of the question.

The Report of the Delegates will be laid before you.

After mature consideration of this Report and of the whole question of a settlement, I trust your best efforts will be directed to maturing such measures as may not only conduce to the amelioration of the condition of the tenantry, but also receive the sanction of the Imperial Government, and the concurrence of the proprietors.

The Administrator of the Government of Nova Scotia has addressed communications to me on the subject of a proposed Union of the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, under one Government and Legislature.

I have directed that these communications be laid before you.

A Bill to prevent the fraudulent marking of merchandize will be proposed to you. You will also be asked to take under your consideration a suggestion made by the Secretary of State for the Colonies respecting the establishment of a Maritime Court of Enquiry into the causes of wrecks.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

The Estimates for the current year will be laid before you. They have been framed with due regard to economy.

The Accounts for the past year will also be submitted to you. I observe, with great satisfaction, that the Revenue of the past year far exceeds that of any previous year, and leaves a large surplus over the expenditure.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I rejoice to be able to congratulate you on the general prosperity of this Colony during the past year.

The labours of our agricultural population were blessed with an abundant harvest.

An unprecedented demand increased materially the value of our staple produce; and the quantity which left our shores exceeded the export of any previous year.

I now commit to you the business of the Session; may your deliberations conduce to the honor and welfare of this Island.

The Hon. G. Coles then moved that the House do now adjourn.

And the motion being seconded, and the question put thereon

MR. Maclellan from the Special Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses at the opening of the present Session, presented to the House the draft of an Address as prepared by the Committee ; and he read the same in his place and delivered it in at the Clerk's table, where it was again read.

On motion of the Hon. G. Coles, seconded by the Hon. F. Kelly

Resolved, That this House will to-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into consideration the said draft Address.

Then on motion of the Hon. J. H. Gray, seconded by Mr. Maclellan.

The House adjourned until to-morrow, at Ten o'clock.

Friday, March 18, 1864.

PRAYERS.

THE Hon. D. Davies from the Committee appointed to receive tenders for the printing of the Journals of this House, for the present Session, and to report thereon to the House, presented to the House the report of the said Committee ; which report was again read at the Clerk's table.

The Hon. D. Davies moved, seconded by the Hon. A. Laird, that the Report of the Committee be adopted.

The Hon. G. Coles moved in amendment to the motion, seconded by the Hon. F. Kelly, that all after the word "that" be struck out and the following substituted "the report be committed to a Committee of the whole House."

And the question being put on the said motion of amendment, it was carried in the affirmative.

The main motion, as amended, was then put and carried,

And then the House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. John Yeo took the Chair of the Committee ; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. John Yeo reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee, and had made an amendment thereto ; and the report so amended, being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth :—

The Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the Journals of the House for the present Session, have to report that they have received six tenders, viz :—

First—From Daniel Bethune, proposing to bind the Journals in the usual way for Three shillings and six-pence per copy ; for stitched copies, one shilling each.

Second—From F. W. Hughes, proposing to print the Journals on superior English paper, the same as sample (No. 1), for Seventeen shillings and six-pence per sheet of four pages ; on paper the same as sample (No. 2), for Sixteen shillings and nine-pence per sheet ; for half-binding each copy, four shillings ; for stitching, one shilling and three pence.

Third—From Edward Reilly, undertaking to print the Journals at the rate of Eighteen shillings per sheet, on paper the same as specimen marked (A) ; for Seventeen shillings and six-pence, on paper the same as specimen marked (B) ; for Seventeen shillings on paper the same as specimen (C) ; for half-binding each copy, Three shillings and six-pence ; for stitching, one shilling.

Fourth—From George T. Haszard, proposing to print the Journals on paper the same as sample marked (A) for Nineteen shillings per sheet, of four pages ; on paper the same as sample (B), for Eighteen shillings per sheet ; for half-binding ; Three shillings and nine-pence per copy ; for stitching, one shilling and two-pence per copy.

Fifth—From Henry Cooper, proposing to print the Journals on paper the same as specimen, for Twenty-two shillings and six-pence per sheet of four pages ; for binding, Three shillings and nine-pence each copy ; stitching one shilling and three pence.

Sixth—From John Ings, offering to print the Journals for Twenty-three shillings and six-pence per sheet of four pages, on paper the same as specimen ; for binding Three shillings and nine-pence per copy ; stitching, one shilling and three pence.

From a comparison of the specimens of paper submitted, your Committee are of opinion that F. W. Hughes' specimen, marked (No. 1), and offered at Seventeen shillings and sixpence per sheet ; Edward Reilly's ditto, marked (A) at Eighteen shillings per sheet ; and George T. Haszard's ditto, marked (B) at Eighteen shillings per sheet, are as nearly as possible of the same quality. The inferior specimens, your Committee reject as unfit for the Journals.

Your Committee recommend that the tender of Mr. F. W. Hughes on specimen (No. 1), at Seventeen shillings and sixpence per sheet, be accepted.

Then, on motion of the Hon. G. Coles, seconded by Mr. John Yeo,

The House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

The Order of the Day for the House in Committee on the consideration of the draft Address reported from the Special Committee, in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to both Houses, at the opening of the present Session, being read—

Ordered, That the House do now go into the Order of the Day.

A motion being made that Mr. Sinclair do take the Chair of the Committee,

The Hon. G. Coles moved in amendment, seconded by the Hon. F. Kelly, that Mr. John Yeo do take the Chair.

And the question being put on the said motion of amendment, it was carried in the affirmative,

The main motion, as amended, was then put and carried.

And then the House resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. John Yeo took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again; which the House agreed to.

Then, on motion of Mr. Haslam, seconded by Mr. Montgomery,

The House adjourned until to-morrow, at Ten o'clock.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :

1. We, Her Majesty's faithful subjects, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, beg respectfully to

tender our thanks for the Speech with which your Excellency was pleased to open the present Session.

2. We thank your Excellency for the information that our expressions of loyal congratulation to Her Majesty, on the Marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, have been laid before our Gracious Sovereign.

3. We indeed heard with great satisfaction the happy tidings of the birth of a Prince, and we warmly participate in the joy which that auspicious event has afforded to all classes of Her Majesty's subjects.

4. We regret to receive the intelligence that Her Majesty has not been able to comply with the prayer conveyed in the Joint Address which the Legislative Council and House of Assembly adopted in the last Session, on the subject of the Report of the Commissioners appointed to enquire into the differences between Landlords and their Tenants in this Island.

5. The Despatch received by your Excellency from His Grace the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and to which your Excellency refers, with the suggestions contained therein, when laid before us, shall receive our consideration.

6. We agree with your Excellency that it was expedient that Delegates should be sent to England for the purpose of ascertaining the views of Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies on this important question of the land tenures, previous to the meeting of the Legislature, and thereby facilitating the settlement of this long agitated subject.

7. We shall have much pleasure in receiving the Report of the Delegates, referred to by your Excellency.

8. We assure your Excellency that our best consideration will be given to this Report, as well as to the whole question connected therewith, and that our earnest efforts will be directed to the maturing of such measures as will in our opinion conduce to the amelioration of the condition of the

Tenantry, and at the same time be calculated to receive the sanction of the Imperial Government and the concurrence of the Proprietors.

9. The communications received by your Excellency from the Administrator of the Government of Nova Scotia on the subject of a proposed Union of the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, when laid before us, shall receive due consideration.

10. The Bill to which your Excellency adverts, relative to the fraudulent marking of merchandize, together with the suggestion of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, respecting the establishment of a maritime Court of Enquiry, when submitted to us, will receive our best attention.

11. We thank your Excellency for having directed the Estimates for the present year, and the Public Accounts for the past, to be laid before us.

12. We are happy to learn that the Revenue of the past year has exceeded that of any previous year, and has been so much in excess of the Expenditure.

13. The general prosperity of this Colony during the past year, and the abundant harvest which has rewarded the labours of the husbandman, are indeed subjects of congratulation; and it is gratifying to learn that the Export of our staple commodities has exceeded that of any previous year.

And the first to the fifth paragraphs, inclusive in the said reported Address being again severally read, were, on the question being separately put thereon, agreed to by the House.

The sixth, seventh and eighth paragraphs, inclusive in the said reported Address being again severally read,

The Hon. G. Coles moved, to amend the said reported Address, by striking out the whole of the sixth, seventh and eighth paragraphs of the said Address, and substituting the following:—

“The House of Assembly have received with dutiful consideration your Excellency’s announcement in regard to a certain despatch from the Secretary of State, containing suggestions relative to a settlement of the Land Question; and also the information in reference to the sending of Delegates to England for the purpose of proposing other terms of settlement than those suggested by His Grace the Duke of Newcastle.

The Report of the Delegates as well as the Despatch of the Duke of Newcastle will receive our best consideration when submitted to us.

But the House of Assembly regrets that your Excellency’s Government should have deemed it advisable to send Delegates to England with the view of effecting the settlement of so important a question, without being fully instructed by the House of Assembly as to the terms which should be proposed to the Proprietors of land. The House humbly believing that in the absence of a direct appeal to the country, they alone should be allowed to determine the basis of a compromise with the Land Proprietors on a question which so materially affects the welfare of the Island generally.”

ON motion of the Hon. J. H Gray, seconded by Mr. Howat,

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration the various Despatches and papers transmitted by Message to this House this Session, and other references.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Sinclair took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again; which the House agreed to.

Then, on motion of the Hon. D. Davies, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

The House adjourned for one hour;

And being met—

A memorial of Edward Morrissey, of Charlottetown, Iron Founder, was presented to the

House by the Hon. D. Davies, and the same was received and read, setting forth the hardship of being compelled to pay the high duty of Ten per cent. on the importation of the raw material of Pig Iron, and praying the House to grant him such encouragement in the premises, as may be deemed meet.

Ordered, That the said petition do lie on the table.

On motion of the Hon. D. Davies,

Ordered, That the thirteenth rule of the House be suspended to enable a Member to present a petition; and thereupon

A petition of William C. Bourke, was presented to the House by the Hon. D. Davies, and the same was received and read, setting forth that he is the pioneer of Steam Navigation on the Hillsborough River, and two years since applied for a monopoly of the carrying trade on said River, which was not granted, and praying the House to throw open to competition by tender, the carrying trade on the Rivers.

Then, on motion of the Hon. D. Davies, seconded by Mr. Montgomery,

Ordered, That the said petition be referred to the Committee of the whole House when in consideration of the several petitions presented to the House this Session, praying for an amendment of the Act 17th Victoria, Chapter 7,

relating to Steam Navigation between Charlottetown and certain parts of the Hillsborough and Elliot Rivers.

A petition of George Jones and others, was presented to the House by Mr. *MacLennan*, and the same was received and read, praying for the passing of an Act to prohibit the going at large of Cattle, Swine and Geese, within an area of a quarter of a mile from the Court House at Saint Eleanor's.

Ordered, That the said petition be referred to a Special Committee to examine the same and report thereon, by Bill or otherwise.

Ordered, That Mr. *MacLennan*, the Hon. D. *Davies*, and the Hon. A. *Laird* do compose the said Committee.

A Message from the Council, by Mr. *Cooper*, their Clerk :

Ordered, That the said petition do lie on the table.

On motion of the Hon. J. Longworth, seconded by Mr. Duncan,

Resolved, That the House will at the afternoon sitting resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House to take into consideration the several petitions laid on the table this Session, praying for an amendment in the law regulating the sale by license, of spirituous liquors.

The Hon. G. Coles rose in his place, and stated to the House, he had observed that alterations had been made in the Report of the Controller of Customs, which had been laid before this House on the 4th instant, and referred to the Committee on Public Accounts,

which alterations were unauthorized and therefore a violation of the rules of this House, and a breach of its privileges;

And thereupon,

On motion of the Hon. G. Coles, seconded by the Hon. F. Kelly,

Resolved, That this House do now resolve itself into a Committee of Privileges.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. MacLennan took the chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. MacLennan reported that the Committee had come to two Resolutions which he was directed to report to the House.

The Resolutions reported from the Committee were then severally read by the Clerk, and on the question of concurrence being separately put thereon, they were agreed to by the House, and are as follow:—

1. WHEREAS it appears to this House that a certain Report with tables containing statistical information, signed by the Controller of Customs at Charlottetown, was laid before this House, on the 4th day of April instant; and it further appears that a sheet containing additional statistics, was subsequently attached thereto, which had been prepared by Mr. Daniel J. Roberts, who had assisted in compiling the original tables, and that certain alterations were made in such tables, by the said Daniel J. Roberts, after the same had been laid on the Table of this House, without the leave of the House, by which a breach of the privileges thereof was committed: **RESOLVED, THEREFORE**, that the said Daniel J. Roberts be called upon to explain to this House, the circumstances under which the said addition and alterations were made.

2. WHEREAS it further appears to this House, that an erasure was made in the body of the Report of the Collector of Customs above referred to, by some person or persons unknown, having struck out a portion of such report, after it was laid on the table of this House: RESOLVED, THEREFORE, that the person or persons by whom such erasure was made, has been guilty of a breach of the privileges of this House, and as such, is deserving of the censure thereof.

Mr. Speaker read to the House a letter addressed to him, and signed by Mr. Daniel J. Roberts, as follows:—

To the Honorable the Speaker of the House of Assembly.

SIR;—I beg to state that the only alterations made by me in the Accounts laid before the House, and now under discussion, were in a Statistical Account of the area, population, &c., of Prince Edward Island;—That part of that Account was made out in sterling money, a part (through wrong data furnished me) in Currency; that the figures altered by me were merely to reduce the whole to a uniform standard; and that I made the said alterations in entire ignorance of any wrong I might thereby be committing, and regret that I have so done; by no means intending to shew any want of respect to the House.

Then, on motion of the Hon. G. Coles, seconded by Mr. Howat,

The House adjourned for one hour;

And being met—

On motion of the Hon. the Col. Secretary, seconded by Mr. Haslam,

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House to

take into further consideration the various Despatches and papers transmitted by Message to this House, this Session, and other references.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Sinclair took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported that the Committee had come to several Resolutions which he was directed to report to the House.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again; which the House agreed to.

The Resolutions reported from the Committee were then read by the Clerk, and are as follow :

1. RESOLVED, That Orange Lodges—the Institutions for the incorporation of which, this House in its last Session, passed the Act intituled “An Act to incorporate the Grand Orange Lodge of Prince Edward Island, and the subordinate Lodges in connection therewith,”—are not forbidden by any law in force in Prince Edward Island; and further, that Orange Lodges, although they have existed in this Island for several years past, have not in the opinion of this House, proved detrimental to the best interests of this Colony.

2. RESOLVED, That it is the constitutional right of the Legislature of this Island, to make and ordain such Laws for the public peace, welfare and good government of this Island, and of the people and inhabitants thereof, as may be considered necessary; subject only to the proviso, that such laws be not repugnant to the laws and statutes of Great Britain.

3. RESOLVED, That, therefore, His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, by refusing to submit the Act intituled “An Act to incorporate the Grand Orange Lodge of Prince Edward Island, and the subordinate Lodges in

connection therewith,” for the Royal allowance, deprive the Legislature of this Colony of its constitutional right to make, ordain and carry into effect a Law, which was deemed expedient and desirable by a large majority of this House—(the motion that the Bill do pass having been carried in the affirmative, by a majority of seven, in a House consisting of twenty-three Members, exclusive of Mr. Speaker)—and which would have conferred upon the large numbers of Her Majesty's loyal subjects who compose the Grand Orange Lodge of Prince Edward Island, and the subordinate Lodges in connection therewith, the simple privileges of incorporation, never before, in this Colony, denied to any association for lawful purposes.

And the said Resolutions being again read,—

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary moved, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that the said Resolutions be agreed to.

The Hon. E. Whelan moved, seconded by the Hon. G. Coles, in amendment to the motion, that all after the word “that” be struck out, and the following substituted: “the said Resolutions be disagreed to;” and also, that the following be inserted in lieu thereof.

“WHEREAS this House admits the constitutional right of this Legislature to make and ordain such laws for the public peace, welfare and good government of this Island, and of the people and inhabitants thereof, as may be considered necessary; but as His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, in his Despatch notifying His Excellency that he could not submit the Act incorporating the Orange Societies of this Island, for Her Majesty's assent, for the reason that in his opinion such Institutions are calculated (if not actually intended) to embitter religious and political differences, and which must be detrimental to the best interests of any Colony in which they exist: THEREFORE, RESOLVED, that our constitutional rights have not been interfered with by the rejection of said Bill—no similar Bill having been passed by the Parliament of Great Britain, or by any of the Colonial Legislatures.”

The House divided on the motion of amendment.

Message to this House this Session, and other references.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Sinclair took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported that the Committee had come to a Resolution which he was directed to report to the House.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again; which the House agreed to.

The Resolution reported from the Committee being again read by the Clerk, was on the question being put thereon, agreed to by the House, and is as follows:

RESOLVED, That the Despatches of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, of the date of 12th December 1863, relative to the Duty imposed by the Revenue Law of this Colony upon wrecked articles and cargoes, be referred to the House when in Committee of the whole House on the consideration of Ways and Means, during the present Session.

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary from the Committee appointed to search for precedents to ascertain how far the course pursued in the mode of introducing to this House, the Bill for the regulation of the Oyster fisheries, is in accordance with the rules and practice of Parliament, and to report thereon to the House, presented to the House the report of the said Committee, which report was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:—

The Committee to whom was referred the Bill for the regulation of the Oyster Fisheries in this Island, with instructions to search for precedents with the view of guiding the House in coming to a decision, as to whether said Bill was properly introduced to, and before the House, without the propositions involved in it, having been first considered in a Committee of the whole House, and agreed to by the House,—have made due search, but have not been able to discover any precisely similar precedent. On examining the Bill in question, it appears to be of a two-fold character: One part of the Bill simply imposing a restriction upon the catching, shipping, buying, selling or exposing for sale, of any Oysters within certain prescribed limited times or seasons of the year, under certain penalties, &c., (for the double purpose, it is presumed, of protecting the fisheries and the public health.) A second object of the Bill is to empower the Executive Government to sell and grant the exclusive right of fishing or catching Oysters, in certain Rivers of this Island, to the highest bidder, or the person offering the

highest yearly rent, at a public sale, vesting the purchaser with certain exclusive rights in and over the localities to be specified in the grant. The rent to arise from these grants is not specifically appropriated by the Act, but being payable to the Government, it must be presumed to be for general Government purposes.

Under the proposed Bill, your Committee submit—that two points are presented for consideration, namely, whether

1st. The Bill in both or either of its branches, relates to Trade or the alteration of the laws concerning Trade.

2nd. Whether the Bill in either of its branches imposes any public charge upon the people.

If coming fully within either of these two classes, it should have been first considered in a Committee of the whole House.

The legal general signification of Trade is Traffic or Merchandize.

First—Does the proposed Act relate to Trade, or alter the Laws concerning it?

Bills to regulate the sale of Beer, Bread and Marine Stores have been required to originate in Committee.

The Burgh Harbors' (Scotland) Bill, 1852, was held to be one concerning Trade, and having been introduced without a Committee, was withdrawn, and other Bills concerning Harbors have since originated in Committee.

On the other hand, it is laid down that “on several occasions, Bills for the regulation of Fairs and Markets have been ordered without a Committee, having been treated in the light of police regulations rather than of Trade, and Bills for the regulation of Weights and Measures have been treated as questions of public policy, affecting the whole community, and not merely the interests of Trade, and brought in without a previous Committee being required.” See May on Parliament, page 449.

Under the second head:—as to whether it imposes any public charge upon the people, May on Parliament, page 450, lays it down, that all Bills that directly impose a state charge upon the people, must originate in Committee. To bring it under this proposition, it must directly involve a charge upon the people; but this rule has been held not to apply to Bills authorizing the levy or application of rates for local purposes, by local officers or authorities, representing or acting on behalf of the rate payers.

On the 15th July, 1858, objection was taken to the introduction of a Bill for the main drainage of the Metropolis, without a preliminary Committee, as it was alleged to be a Bill for imposing charges upon the people; but as it appeared that the expence of the proposed works, was to be paid out of local rates upon the Metropolis, and it was intended to propose a Resolution in a Committee of the whole House for a Treasury guarantee for the repayment of money borrowed on the security of these rates, it was ruled that the Bill

could at once be brought in—local rates never having been regarded as coming within the standing order.

On the 16th July 1858, exception was taken to a clause in the Corrupt Practices Prevention Bill, that it imposed a charge upon County and Borough rates; but the chairman held that such a charge, not being for public Revenue, could regularly be proposed in Committee on the Bill, without a preliminary resolution. See May on Parliament, page 451.

It is laid down in the Parliamentary Precedents, page 192, that "where a Bill for establishing Church Rates, gave a power to the Vestry in each particular Parish, to levy a Tax upon Pews and Seats, for the maintenance of the Parish Church, held that a previous Committee of the whole House was unnecessary to the Bill, not proposing to levy a general Tax upon Pews and Seats."

The Right Honorable Charles Shaw Lefevre, the Speaker, upon the debate upon the motion to bring in the Church Rates Bill, above referred to, on the 25th May 1841, laid down the doctrine that where "it is the intention merely to give a power to the Vestry, in each particular Parish, to levy a Tax upon Pews and Seats for the maintenance of the Parish Church, in such a case, it is unnecessary to proceed by a Committee of the whole House. For although the old rule of the House applied to all Taxes, the practice of the House has, of late years, been different, and the Highway Bill, Municipal Corporation Bill, Irish Poor Law Bill and Scotch Prisons Bill have all been introduced without a previous Committee of the whole House, being considered Bills imposing Taxes of an entirely local nature. Under these circumstances, (the Speaker observed), I consider that the Bill may very properly be brought in, by motion, and that it is not necessary for the House in the first instance, to resolve itself into a Committee."

Neither has the rule been construed to apply to Bills imposing charges upon any particular class of persons for their own use and benefit.

Thus in 1848, the Merchants' Seamen's Fund Bill imposing a duty of a shilling a ton on all Ships in the Merchant Service, for the raising a fund for the support of aged Seamen, and the maintenance of lights, was brought in without any previous vote of a Committee authorizing such duty.

Should the Bill in the opinion of the House not come within the first class indicated, namely, the class of Bills relative to Trade or the alteration of the laws concerning Trade, it is submitted that the first part of the Bill which merely provides regulations for the protection of the fishery, by defining the periods within which the fish may be taken, &c. will not come under the classification of Bills imposing a public charge upon the people, whatever the opinion of the House may be, with regard to the second part of the Bill which restricts the right and use of the fishing localities, to the grantee of the Government.

It was laid down by the Right Honorable Charles Shaw Lefevre, Speaker of the House of Commons, in a debate on the question of going into Committee on the Coal Whippers Bill, August 9th, 1843: "If a clause in a Bill not introduced in a Committee of the whole House, contains words which may be interpreted as continuing a Tax, the proper course is, on coming to the clause in Committee, to strike out the words which create the doubt; if the omission of them does not wholly cure the defect, the Bill must be withdrawn and a new one introduced." See Parliamentary Precedents, page 197.

All which your Committee submits for the consideration of the House.

The Hon. the Col. Secretary moved, seconded by Mr. Howat, that the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration the Bill for the regulation of the Oyster fisheries in this Island.

Mr. Speaker declined receiving the motion, stating as his reason, that as the Bill in question contains clauses or provisions imposing a tax upon the people, it ought to have originated in a Committee of the whole House.

The Hon. J. H. Gray, a Member of Her Majesty's Executive Council, presented to the House, the following papers which had been laid before His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council, and referred to the House, viz:—

1. Report of the Hon. John Aldous, relative to a petition of certain inhabitants of Township No. 42, respecting a new line of road from the Portage, Township No. 41, to Naufrage, Township No. 43, with a sectional sketch of Townships Nos. 41, 42, and 43, embracing the present and proposed road.

2. Copy of presentment of the Grand Jury for Queen's County at the last Hilary Term of the Supreme Court, suggesting an amendment of the Jury Act; an alteration in the time of holding the Supreme Court in winter, the establishment of a Justices' County Court, with a criminal jurisdiction similar to that of the Police Court of the City of Charlottetown, together with remarks on the state of the County Jail, and the dangerous conduct of a convict therein confined, and the necessity of

affording the keeper additional means of protection and safety.

3. Copy of presentment of the Grand Jury for King's County, at the March Term of 1864, on the state of the Jail of that County.

4. Various papers relating to the new line road on Townships Nos. 41, 42 and 43.

RESOLVED, That the Government allowance to the master of the said Grammar School in Charlottetown, shall be £100 per annum; and further, should any Students chosen for scholarships in connection with the Prince of Wales' College, be entered at any Grammar School in this Island, at the Government expense preparatory to admission into the College, the Master of such Grammar School shall be entitled to receive out of the Treasury of this Island, a tuition fee for each of such students at the same rate as shall be receivable from the Parents of other Students in attendance at such Grammar Schools.

4. RESOLVED, That the tuition fees arising or accruing from the Grammar School in Charlottetown, shall be under the control of the Trustees and Governors of Prince of Wales' College, to be applied by them in supplementing the salary or Government allowance of the Master of the said Grammar School, to such extent as they may deem fit or necessary, and in procuring the services if need be, of a second Master or Usher in said Grammar School, and towards providing fuel, books, maps and other requisites for said School.

5. WHEREAS the School District on Township Number Twenty-four, known as the Anglo-Rustico District, is very populous, and in consequence thereof, one District School therein has been found insufficient to afford the means of Education to the large number of children therein: RESOLVED, THEREFORE, that it is expedient especially to empower the Board of Education to divide or alter the said District in such manner, as they may deem fit and necessary to meet the circumstances of the case, and to establish a second or additional school therein; but the Teacher to be appointed to take charge of such additional school, to be a duly licensed Teacher, and he, as well as the Trustees of his School to be bound to conform in all respects, to the requirements of the Laws relating to Education.

6. RESOLVED, That in the case of any other School District in this Island similarly circumstanced with the Anglo-Rustico District as mentioned in the last preceding Resolution, the Board of Education shall have the like power to alter the same, and establish therein a second District School, upon the same terms, and subject to the same restrictions as in the said Resolution is set forth.

7. RESOLVED, That it is expedient to define more clearly, the person by whom the tuition fees due, and to become due and payable under the Act 23rd Victoria, Chapter 17, shall be collected and received.

8. RESOLVED, That the Board of Education shall have power to establish an additional District School in the Eastern Section of Charlottetown Royalty,—the salary of the Teacher to be at the usual rate.

—1 shilling per gallon.
Pitch, Tar and Rosin—2 per cent.
Chain Cables and Anchors—1 per cent.
Bread and Crackers of all kinds, except Ship
Bread and Navy Bread—10 per cent.
Cigars—20 per cent.
Iron, (Pig)—free.

2. **RESOLVED**, That in all cases in which ships or vessels shall report or enter at any Excise Office or Custom House within this Island, preparatory to, or with the intention of trading or selling such goods, the cargo of such ship or vessel shall on such entry, be landed or checked by the Collector of Impost or Controller of Customs, or by some Revenue Officer deputed by him, for that purpose; and the duties to which the cargo on board such vessel, shall be liable, shall be paid, or the payment thereof secured, in the same manner as though such goods had been landed for sale in the ordinary course of trade.

3. **RESOLVED**, That any Distiller neglecting or refusing to make his return, and paying his duties to the Collector of the District wherein his Distillery is situate, within the time herein allowed, the License so granted shall be forfeited, and that no other Licenses shall be granted to any person for distilling for the period of six months afterwards, in said Distillery.

Ordered, That the question of concurrence be now separately put on the said Resolutions.

And the first of the said reported Resolutions being again read,

First.—Because, as one of the great objects of the proposed Act is to protect the British manufacturer in the legitimate advantages arising from his labour and skill, if the first amendment proposed by the Legislative Council were agreed to, and the clause declaring that sales or contracts for sales made by parties in this Colony should be deemed to be made with a warranty of the genuineness of the Trade mark attached to the article sold, or agreed to be sold, accordingly struck out, the intention of the Statute, to a great extent, would be frustrated.

Secondly.—Because the effect of retaining the clause in question, will be to induce traders in the Colony to exercise caution in the selection and purchase of goods, and thereby, while securing to the consumer the advantages of a sound and good description of commodities for home use and consumption, it will have the direct tendency to protect and encourage the manufactures of those persons who have acquired a just celebrity for the superiority and high qualities of their respective productions.

Thirdly.—Because the objections hereinbefore urged against the first amendment made by the Legislative Council, will apply with equal force, to the second amendment pro-

posed by that Honorable body, which, if carried out would have the effect of depriving the manufacturer or producer of an article, of the protection which the place of manufacture, as set forth in his trade mark, is calculated to ensure to him.

Resolved, That a Conference be desired with the Council on the subject matter of their amendments to the said Bill ; and that upon such Conference, the managers on the part of this House do communicate to the Committee of the Council, the above reasons for disagreeing to their amendments.

Ordered, That the Hon. J. Longworth do go to the Council and desire the said Conference.

Ordered, That the Hon. J. Longworth, the Hon. J. H. Gray, the Hon. G. Coles and the Hon. A. Laird be a Committee to manage the said Conference.

On motion of the Hon. J. Longworth,

Read a third time, as engrossed, the Bill intituled “ An Act to consolidate and amend the several Laws imposing an Assessment on all Lands in this Colony, and for the encouragement of Education.”

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.

Ordered, That the Hon. J. Longworth do carry the said Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence.

The Order of the Day for the second reading of the amendments made by the Legislative Council to the Bill, intituled “ An Act for the regulation of the Oyster Fisheries in this Island,” being read,

The said amendments were accordingly read a second time.

Ordered, That the tenth rule of the House be suspended in this case ; and then the said amendments were read the third time.

Resolved, That the said amendments do pass.

Ordered, That the Hon. the Colonial Secretary do carry back the said Bill to the Council, and acquaint them that this House hath agreed to their amendments.

Then, on motion of the Hon. A. Laird, seconded by Mr. Ramsay,

The House adjourned until to-morrow at Ten o'clock.

THE Order of the Day for the House in Committee on the consideration of the Report of the Special Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts, being read,

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Green took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

And Mr. Green reported that the Committee had gone through the Report of the Special Committee, paragraph by paragraph, and had adopted the same without making any amendment thereto; and the report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts for the year ending 31st January, 1864, having examined the various matters to them referred, have to report—That the Revenue from all sources for the year, amounts to £61,688 14s. 4d. The Expenditure for the same period, £54,662 3s. 6d., leaving a surplus in favor of the Colony for the year, of £7,026 10s. 10d., which surplus deducted from the balance standing against the Colony on 31st January, 1863, exhibits a Public debt due 31st Janu-

ary, 1864, of £75,178 17s. 1½d. This balance includes all Treasury Notes, Warrants and Debentures issued up to that date, as will more fully appear by reference to the annexed tabular statement, marked (A.) No credit has been given to the Colony in the foregoing statement, for any sums due on Public Lands sold, nor for any estimated value of Public Lands still unsold.

Your Committee have to remark, that the Revenue as shewn by the classified statement is £1000 in excess of the actual Revenue for the year. This is caused by Debentures amounting to £1000 issued in part payment of the Montgomery Estate having been included in the receipts at the Treasury for the year, and carried by the Auditors to the credit of the Colony. Another apparent error, consequent on the foregoing, also, appears in the account current for the year appended to the Classified Accounts.

The expenditure is there charged as One thousand pounds more than it appears by the detailed statement. This is owing to the One thousand pounds charged for Debentures issued in part payment of the Montgomery Estate, in the detailed statement of expenditure having been neutralized by the same sum being entered as a credit in the receipts for the year; and it therefore became necessary to add the amount to the expenditure for the year.

The Classified Accounts contain a short table, shewing at a glance the amount of duties received on different kinds of goods. In the first copy of the Accounts submitted to the House, this table appeared to have been compiled carelessly, and contained many errors which appear to have been rectified in the corrected statement now before them.

The Revenue for the past year when compared with the preceding year, shows a highly satisfactory increase of £22,896 1s. 3d.

Several tables have been prepared by your Committee, and are annexed hereto, from (A.) to (E), inclusive, containing particulars of Revenue and Expenditure.

The total amount of the receipts on account of Public Lands for the Financial year, ending 31st January, 1864, amounts to £5324 18s. 7d., and from Crown Lands £139-6s. 0d. The expenses for the same period, including interest and loss of Land Tax, amount to £2514 5s. 6d., leaving a surplus of £2949 19s. 1d. in favour of the Public and Crown Land Department.

During the year, parts of the Montgomery Estate, situated on Lots 51 and 59, were purchased, containing 6953 acres, at a cost of £2085 18s. 0d.,—5844 acres of which have been resold to the occupiers at a small advance on the original cost.

The sum total of the balances due on Public Lands, Bonds, Deeds, &c., and bearing interest, amounts to £34,960-4s. 1d., and exceed the sum due at the corresponding period of the preceding year, by £1813 17s. 0d.,—34539½ acres remain on hand unsold, being a decrease in the quantity on hand last year, of 4252½ acres.

With reference to certain statistical tables referred to your Committee, they have to remark, that said tables appear to have been compiled from Custom House returns which are generally carelessly made by importers; when contrasted with the statistics for the year as exhibited by the Impost Accounts, these tables appear inaccurate in some respects.

In table (5) of these Accounts, a clerical error appears. The Imports being stated at £29,341 4s. 11d., instead of £293,431 4s. 11d.,—the figure 3 having been omitted in copying.

Your Committee recommend that this error be corrected before the tables be printed. A certain portion of the Report prefixed to these tables appears to have been erased.

Your Committee recommend the publication of the Report as altered by such obliterations.

Further, The Legislative Council do not perceive that the holding of the Georgetown Term, one week earlier in March, would dispense with the necessity of convening the Legislature during the previous month, as the time for this purpose must always, in future, as heretofore, depend upon the amount of Legislative business, and the special circumstances of the case; nor does it appear to the Legislative Council, why the sitting of the Supreme Court at Georgetown, should as a rule, require the adjournment of the Legislature.

May it please your Excellency ;

On behalf of Her Majesty's faithful Commons of Prince Edward Island, I have now to present the following Bills of Aid and Supply, voted to Her Majesty during the present Session, to which I have humbly to request your Excellency's assent, viz:—

An Act in further amendment of the Laws relating to Education, and also to explain and amend the Act relating to the establishment of the Prince of Wales College.

An Act to continue for certain purposes the Land Assessment Act of the Eleventh Victoria, Chapter seven, and the several Acts in amendment thereof, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to consolidate and amend the several Laws imposing an Assessment on all Lands in this Colony, and for the encouragement of Education.

An Act in addition to, and in extension and amendment of the Act authorizing a Cash Account to be opened by the Governor in Council with the Bank of Prince Edward Island.

An Act to provide for the payment of certain Debentures.

An Act for appropriating certain Moneys therein mentioned, for the service of the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and Sixty-four.

To each of which His Excellency was pleased, in Her Majesty's name, to give his assent.

And then His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses :

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

I thank you for the attention which you have given to the various subjects, which, at the opening of this Session, I recommended to your especial consideration, and, also for the labour which you have bestowed on the general business of the Province.

I have forwarded to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, your congratulatory Addresses to Her Majesty the Queen, and to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, on the occasion of the birth of His Royal Highness Prince Albert Victor of Wales.

It will afford me great satisfaction to transmit for the consideration of the Colonial Minister, the Act which you have passed for settling differences between Landlord and Tenant, and to enable Tenants on certain Townships to purchase the fee simple of their farms.

This Act contains much which is calculated to ameliorate the condition of the Tenantry affected by it. I trust its terms are such as will receive the sanction of Her Majesty's Government."

I am glad to observe, among the numerous enactments to which I have just given my assent, "An Act for the Establishment of a Bank for Savings." I confidently hope that the people throughout the Island, will hasten to avail themselves of the advantages which it offers.

The Delegates whom in conformity with your Resolution, I shall proceed to appoint, for the purpose of discussing the expediency of a Union of the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, will, I am confident, enter upon the duties committed to them, with a full sense of the importance of their office.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

In Her Majesty's name, I thank you for the Supplies which you have granted for the Public Service.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

The deep interest which His Grace the Duke of Newcastle has taken in this Colony, will cause you to hear with regret, that His Grace has retired from the Colonial Department of Her Majesty's Government.

I rejoice that I am now able to release you from further attendance here, by proroguing this General Assembly.

After which, the Hon. the President of the Legislative Council said :

Gentlemen ;

It is the will and pleasure of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that this General Assembly be prorogued until Tuesday the Seventh day of June next ; and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until Tuesday the Seventh day of June next, to be here then holden.

Sir;

I have received your Despatch, No. 34, of the 9th of April, transmitting an Address to Her Majesty from the Legislative Council and Assembly, of Prince Edward Island, on the subject of the recent Land Commission.

The Council and Assembly after stating at length the appointment of a Commission to examine into the Land Question, the nature of the recommendation or Award submitted by them to Her Majesty, and the circumstances under which certain Bills, based upon that recommendation, failed to receive her Majesty's allowance, proceed to observe, that the question whether this Award can, or cannot, be made legally binding on the parties concerned, is one proper for the consideration of Her Majesty's legal tribunals; and they conclude by praying Her Majesty to inform the Proprietors of land in Prince Edward Island, that unless cause to the contrary be shewn before a legal tribunal to be provided by Her Majesty, a Bill giving effect to the Commissioners' Award will receive the Royal Sanction. As I am not aware of any method by which this question could be submitted to any Court of Justice, and as the Council and Assembly have not suggested any

such method, I considered that the course most satisfactory to them would be that of ascertaining from the Law Officers of the Crown, first, whether the so called Award were, in itself, liable to any objection, founded upon any principle of law or equity, and next, whether it were possible, by any proceeding in law or equity, to give effect to the wish of the Prince Edward Island Legislature, by enabling the Proprietors or Tenants to show cause why Her Majesty's Assent should or should not be given to the proposed Bill.

I transmit a copy of the answer which I have received to my question.

You will observe that in the opinion of Sir W. Atherton and Sir R. Palmer, the report of the Commissioners is not properly to be called an Award at all; and in particular, "that a recommendation, that the price to be paid by a Tenant for the purchase of his land, should be settled, in each particular instance in which the Landlord and Tenant may differ about the same by Arbitration, is not either literally or substantially within the scope of the Commissioners' authority."

They further state that any Act for the settlement of this question must be judged of upon its own merits, and "not upon any supposition of an Award legally or morally binding, having been made in this case."

I trust that this opinion embracing the legal and moral aspects of the question, and founded on the plainest principle of law and common sense—the principle that a man who has agreed to refer his case to one Tribunal, cannot therefore be forced to submit it to another—will satisfy the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, that the course which they have suggested must be dismissed, as impracticable, and will lead them to consider, with patience and moderation, some other means of settling a question, which is at present productive of so much public inconvenience.

The Government of the Colony, acting in the interests of the Tenants, have already rejected a proposal made by the Proprietors, that their lessees should be allowed to purchase a fee simple in their holdings, at fifteen years purchase of the reserved rent, the purchase money being paid at once in cash. I can imagine that they may have had good reasons for that refusal, but I cannot help observing that, as the Commissioners have suggested a maximum

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rate of twenty years purchase, the proprietors' proposal must, in some instances, have involved a considerable sacrifice on their part, and that its rejection by the Tenantry, transfers to them the obligation of suggesting some reasonable basis of compromise.

The ground being thus cleared for a fresh proposal, I think myself bound to bring before the Colonial Government the views which I have been led to form on the subject.

As to the general principles on which this matter ought to be settled, I feel little difficulty.

In the first place, I dismiss the idea of imposing on the Proprietors, by law, any general rate of commutation.

The enquiries of the Commissioners were pointedly directed to this object, and they have pronounced it unattainable.

I think that the objections to a compulsory arbitration are equally insuperable. The expense would probably be so large, and the practical difficulty of securing a fair adjudication, and compelling a Tenant to perform the terms of an unfavorable Award, would, in the present state of public opinion, be so great, that the proprietors could not, with any justice, be required to submit to them.

I also dismiss the notion of any Imperial guarantee or advance of Money. The Legislature of Prince Edward Island must take it as certain that Her Majesty's Government cannot propose any such measure to Parliament.

As, however, the project of a Loan, under an Imperial guarantee, has met with universal favor, I assume that means might be found in the Colony to pay interest on a Loan of less amount, without such a guarantee.

I also infer from the tone of the Commissioners, that any general rate of commutation which is adopted or indicated by authority, should hinge more or less upon the reserved rent.

From the eagerness with which I have been pressed to confirm the Award of the Commissioners, I infer that the Award is acceptable to the Tenants, that is to say, that the Tenants are ready to pay the fair price of their lands—as settled by impartial arbitrators—in instalments spread over ten years, and to continue the payment of rent—or rather, of interest on the unpaid instalments,—until the land is thus enfranchised.

From the scheme of the Proprietors I infer that they, on their side, are in all cases ready to sell their rights, for fifteen years' purchase of the reserved rent, paid at once in cash. But I conceive that basis of commutation to have been defective, for two reasons—first, that it required an immediate cash payment in full, which the Tenants cannot make; and secondly, that it based the price of an Estate solely on the rate of reserved rent, without reference to the question whether that rent had been, or could be collected. It could not be expected that Tenants who had never paid their rents, would buy off their obligation to do so at the rate of fifteen years purchase.

With these preliminary observations, I desire to consider the present condition of the question, with a view to determine not what is just or legal, on which of course no agreement can be expected, nor yet what would be most advantageous to the Tenants or Landlords, if either of them were possessed of unlimited power to effect what they wished—which is an easy but impractical question—but to the more useful and difficult enquiry; can these Tenures be extinguished on terms, which, under present circumstances, are mutually advantageous to Tenant and Proprietor?

It must steadily be borne in mind that in calling upon the proprietor to relinquish his present claims, the Colony is calling upon him to sacrifice admitted legal rights. By what inducement can he be reconciled to that sacrifice? Plainly by giving increased security to those rights which he retains. Payment in cash would dispose of all question of security, but this the tenant cannot effect. Payment by instalments gives the Landlord no fresh security. It is merely the substitution of one promise to pay for another, the parties remaining the same.

It appears to me, however, that in many cases, at least, the position of the Landlord would be materially bettered, if he received the security of the Colony, instead of the security of the Tenant for his annual income; or in other words, if the purchase money were paid down at once, but were paid either wholly or partially in Debentures.

I will assume in order to facilitate the explanation of my meaning, that the purchase money is paid, one third in cash, and two thirds in Debentures.

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I should then, in the first place, propose that the Government should be authorized to issue annually a certain amount of Debentures, bearing six per cent interest—say not exceeding fifteen thousand pounds a year for five years;—and to apply these Debentures in buying up, or in assisting to buy, the Landlords' rights, with their consent, at a fixed rate of purchase, which I will call the Government price. When a Tenant is prepared to pay down in cash, one third of the Government price, I would propose that the Government should issue Debentures to the amount of the remaining two thirds, and that the purchase being thus completed, the Tenant should receive a conveyance in fee of the land, subject to the liability to pay the interest on the Debentures, and ultimately, by contribution to a sinking fund, or otherwise to discharge the principal.

If the Tenant could not advance this proportion of the purchase money, the Government might buy the property on its own account—as has been done with the Selkirk and Worrell Estates—and recover its advances, as it could, either by resale of the Lands, or by the recovery of rent from the Tenant, in which the Government, with full power of Legislation at its command, ought not to find any difficulty.

In this case, however, it might be necessary for the Government to raise, by the sale of Debentures, perhaps at a loss, the proportion of the purchase money, which was to be paid in cash.

This being the machinery of redemption, it follows to enquire what shall be the Government price. The assessed rate of purchase which will regulate the amount of assistance to be given in each case from public funds, and which may be viewed as receiving a certain moral support from Government. Although this rate is not compulsory, and may, therefore, be increased or diminished in particular cases by private arrangements between Landlords and Tenants, it is highly desirable that it should be so fixed as to be tolerably applicable to the majority of sales, and to inform Landlords, with some precision, what they have to expect, and what terms of escape, (for so I will call it) from their very invidious position, are practically open to them.

In this enquiry, I shall assume the rate of Interest in Prince Edward Island to be that at

which the Debentures are issued, namely, 6 per cent. A rent reserved on land would, at this rate, be worth about 16 years purchase. And, considering that two-thirds of the purchase money is to be paid in Government Debentures, I do not think that a Landlord, who has looked after his property, and is in the receipt of the full reserved rent, could be expected to part with his interest—including a more or less valuable reversion at the expiration of the lease—for a less amount. Nor do I see why the Tenant should be disinclined to redeem at that rate.

But in many cases Landlords have not looked after their interests, and have not received their full rents. In proportion, as this has been the case, the Tenant will be unwilling to redeem, at a high rate, a rent which he has never paid; while the Landlord will be ready to sell, at a low rate, a rent which he has never received. In all these cases, therefore, a proportional reduction must be made in order to satisfy the Tenant, and may be made without dissatisfying the Landlord. In all these cases I would propose—to use an ordinary phrase—to “split the difference” between the strict rights of the Landlord, and his actual receipts.

It would be easy to ascertain, in any case of intended commutation, the average payment of the Tenant for the 8 years preceding the 1st of May, 1858, being the date up to which the Commissioners propose to remit arrears. Having done this, I would propose to take, as the Government price, a sum equal to 8 years purchase of the reserved rent, plus 8 years purchase of the average actual receipts.

I will illustrate the proposal, by three cases of farms, rented at £50 a year each. In one, I will suppose that the full rent has been regularly paid—in the second, that it has been half paid—in the third, that it has not been paid at all.

Of this sum I have already said, one third would be paid in cash by the Tenant; the remaining two-thirds would be advanced by Government in Debentures. A payment for twenty-five years of 8 per cent, on the amount borrowed, would probably suffice to meet the annual interest of the Debentures, and to pay off the principal, if the terms of the Loan rendered it possible to invest the annual payment towards the sinking fund in the redemption of the Debentures, *i. e.* at 6 per cent interest. If not, the slight loss might possibly be borne by the public Treasury, in consideration of the public benefit which this commutation might be expected to effect.

If this were so, the result to the Tenant, in each of the three preceding cases, would be as follows:

When a rent of £50 had been paid in full, the Landlord would receive £800. The Tenant would pay £266 13s. 4d down, and an annuity, say for 25 years, of £42 13s. 4d.

When the reserved rent was £50, and £25 had been actually paid, the Landlord would receive £600, and the Tenant would pay £200 down and an annuity of £32.

When nothing had been paid, the Landlord would receive £400 and the Tenant would pay £133 6s. 8d. down, and an annuity of £21 6s. 8d.*

I suggest the payment by way of annuity, because I suppose this to be the most convenient to the Tenant. But, of course, arrangements might easily be made to enable those who preferred it to pay their money more promptly.

In any case, however, it must be distinctly understood—as this is the basis of the whole arrangement—that the obligation to pay the principal and interest of the Debentures, as between the Government and the Debenture holder, rests exclusively on the public Treasury, and is in no degree, whatever, affected by the failure or neglect of the Government to recover the money from the Tenant.

As these sales will not be compulsory, it is not necessary to enter upon any question as to

the nature and duration of the leases to which the right of purchase should apply. But, with regard to arrears, I assume that, in any case of commutation, the Tenant and Landlord will alike be satisfied to abide by the Commissioners' recommendation, that arrears which accrue prior to May 1st, 1858, should be remitted, but that all subsequent arrears should be paid up.

I have heard two objections raised to that part of the scheme which relates to Tenants who have not hitherto paid their rents. The one is that so large a remission professedly depending on the fact that rent has been withheld, is, in fact, an encouragement to dishonesty. The other is, that those who have hitherto successfully resisted the payment of any rent whatever, will not be willing to pay the proposed commutation, in order to get rid of an obligation which they have never performed.

The one objection is, that the indulgence to non-paying Tenants is immorally large—the other, that it is suicidally small.

These objections, to a certain extent, answer each other. But the truth is, that any practicable arrangement must be open to both of them. The state of things is this: The Landlords cannot seriously hope to recover their strict legal rights in full, while the Tenants, who have not paid rent, cannot, without extravagance, expect to be supported in their present refusal to do so. It is assumed—for without that assumption all hope of a pacification is impossible—that the Landlords will find it to their interest to waive their right to much that they are entitled to, if the Legislature of Prince Edward Island will honestly assist them to obtain more than they at present receive. This is the only possible basis of compromise. The real question is not whether the proposed arrangement is free from objection, but whether it will not, in a large number of cases, be for the advantage alike of Landlord and Tenant to secure their own interest by closing with such terms as I have indicated. My own hope and impression is that it will be so; and I, therefore, cannot but hope that the terms would be largely accepted, if put forward with the support of Government; though I am bound to add that some, at least, of the Landlords are not satisfied with them. There would, of course, remain a few special cases to be dealt with

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separately. But the experience of this country has shown, that when a reasonable principle of voluntary commutation is once put forward, it is, before long, freely accepted by the majority of those concerned, while the minority either establish a fair ground of exception, or are eventually compelled to follow the stream.*

I am under the necessity of requesting you to inform the Legislature that Her Majesty has not been able to comply with the prayer conveyed in their Address. But I wish you, in so doing, to lay the present Despatch before them, and invite their attention to the suggestions which it contains, being, I can assure you, the result of much anxious consideration, and of an earnest desire to promote the interests of Prince Edward Island and its inhabitants.

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Law Officers to the Duke of Newcastle.

TEMPLE, June 9th, 1863.

MY LORD DUKE,—

We are honored with your Grace's commands, signified in Sir Frederick Rogers' letter of the 9th May, ultimo, stating that he was directed by your Grace to request that we would take into consideration the enclosed copy of an Address to the Queen from the Council and Assembly of Prince Edward Island.

Sir Frederick Rogers was also pleased to state that that Island was granted during the last century to certain persons, by whom a large portion of it was let to the present occupiers. The Tenants are very anxious to obtain a fee simple interest in their lands, and to escape

payment of rent, and this desire has produced a series of disputes of various kinds.

That in 1860, a proposal was made to appoint a Commission to investigate the matter, and the Proprietors suggested as a preferable method "that three Commissioners or Referees be appointed—one to be named by Her Majesty, one by the House of Assembly, and one by the Proprietors of land, and that these Commissioners should have power to enter into all the enquiries that may be necessary, and to decide upon the different questions which may be brought before them, giving, of course, to the parties interested, an opportunity of being heard."

This proposal was accepted by the Assembly of P. E. Island, who agreed "on the part of the Tenantry to abide by the decision of the Commissioners, or the majority of them, and to pledge themselves to concur in whatever measures may be required to give validity to that decision."

That three Commissioners were appointed for enquiring into the said differences, and for adjusting the same on fair and equitable principles." And in a report (of which a copy was enclosed) "awarded," *inter alia*, that the Tenants should receive a certain remission of arrears—that they should be entitled to purchase their holdings at twenty years purchase of the reserved rent, and that any Tenant who thought this rate of commutation too high, might tender what he chose; and that on the refusal of the Landlord to accept that tender, the value should be adjusted by Arbitration.

That to this the Landlords objected, though Sir S. Cunard, in a letter (of which a copy was annexed) that they were ready to be bound by the decision of the three Commissioners, but that they were not prepared to hand over their interests to the proposed Arbitrators, and to embark in the expense and dispute consequent on a multitude of petty arbitrations. On this ground they refuse to accept the Award; and your Grace, on the same ground, refused to advise that Her Majesty should concur in the Legislation which was necessary for enforcing it.

That the Landlords, however, offered terms, not including an arbitration, but giving to the Tenants the remission of Rent proposed by the

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Commissioners, and the right to purchase the fee simple of their land at fifteen years purchase of the reserved rent.

That the Council and Assembly of Prince Edward Island state that they do not seek by the passing of a law to compel compliance with an award liable to an objection founded on any principle of justice or equity, but submit that the question as to whether that Award can or cannot be made legally binding on the parties concerned, is one proper for the consideration of Her Majesty's judicial tribunals.

That they therefore pray, that unless cause to the contrary be shewn before a judicial tribunal, Her Majesty's allowance may be given to a Bill to give effect to the said Award of Her Majesty's Royal Commissioners.

Sir Frederick Rogers was further pleased to state that there is in Prince Edward Island a Supreme Court invested with the usual powers appertaining to the English Supreme Courts of Equity and Common Law, and that under these circumstances he was directed to request our opinion on the following questions:

1. Whether the Award is in itself liable to any objection founded on any principle of law or equity.
2. Whether there is any proceeding in law or equity by which it would be possible that the Proprietors or Tenants in P. E. Island could shew cause why Her Majesty's assent should or should not be given to a Bill to be passed by the Prince Edward Island Legislature, for giving effect to the Award of the Commissioners.
3. Whether there is any proceeding at law or in equity, by which that Award can be enforced upon the recusant Proprietors.
4. Whether in case there is no such proceeding, the Legislature of P. E. Island could, with justice and propriety, pass a law giving effect to that Award.

In obedience to your Grace's commands, we have taken this matter into consideration, and have the honor to report:

1. That we do not think the term "Award" applicable with any propriety, to the Report of the Commissioners of inquiry, appointed by Her Majesty's Commission of the 25th June, 1860.

For there was no reference or submission properly so-called; the gentlemen who signed the letter to your Grace, dated the 13th February, 1860, having been incompetent to bind the general body of Proprietors of land in P. E. Island, and not having professed or attempted to do so; while, on the other hand, it is clear that they did not propose, or intend by that letter to bind themselves, individually, unless the general body of Proprietors would be also bound.

Passing, however, by this point—which is, nevertheless, of the greatest importance with reference to the two following questions—we are of opinion, upon the substance of the case, that the Commissioners have not executed the authority which alone was proposed to be conferred upon them, the part of the land-owners who signed the letter of the 13th February, 1860, so far as the proprietary interests of those or other land-owners are concerned, viz: "To negotiate with the Proprietors of township lands, for fixing a certain rate of price, at which every Tenant might have the option of purchasing his lands; and also to negotiate with the Proprietors for a remission of the arrears of rent in such cases as the Commissioners might deem reasonable." And we think that a recommendation that the price to be paid by a Tenant for the purchase of his land, should be settled, in each particular instance in which the Landlord and Tenant might differ about the same, by arbitration, is not either literally or substantially within the scope of that authority.

We are confirmed in this view, by the perusal of the Act of Assembly, passed on the 2d of May, 1860, which although not assented to by Her Majesty—for the reasons stated in your Grace's despatch of the 2d January, 1861—appears to us to show, both by its preamble and by its second and third enacting clauses, that an Award by the Commissioners, which, without any delegation to other arbitrators, should itself settle all matters in difference between each particular Landlord and Tenant, and should therefore determine and govern the title to the land in each Township, was what the Assembly, as well as the land-owners, really had in contemplation.

* 2 and 3. Our answer to both these questions, is in the negative.

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4. This is a question of public policy. Such an Act, if passed by the Colonial Legislature, and assented to by Her Majesty, must be founded and justified, not upon any supposition of an "Award" legally or morally binding having been made in this case, but solely for reasons of public advantage, such as those which have at various times induced the Imperial Legislature to pass statutes for the enfranchisement of Copyholds at the option of the Tenant; for the enfranchisement of perpetually renewable leaseholds in Ireland; for the commutation of Tithes; for the compulsory acquisition of lands for Railway and other public works, at prices to be fixed by a jury, or by arbitration; and for other similar purposes, involving, for the general good, more or less, interference with the tenure of private property.

Sir;

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 103, of the 16th of December, 1863, enclosing a statement of expenses connected with the Land Commission, which have been incurred by the Government of Prince Edward Island.

The share of the costs of this Commission, intimated to you in my Despatch, No. 96, of the 21st of March, 1862, as having been undertaken by Her Majesty's Government was,

1. The sum of £200 originally fixed upon for the remuneration of the Commissioner appointed by the Crown (as well as of the other Commissioners), together with the additional remuneration of £200 granted to each Commissioner, in all eight hundred pounds.

2. The personal outlay of the Commissioners, amounting, according to an account received from Mr. Gray, to two hundred and forty-four pounds fifteen shillings and fivepence.

3. Mr. Wightman's account, of three hundred and sixteen pounds seven shillings and sixpence.

Of the last named amount, Mr. Wightman received from the Commissioners two hundred and thirty-nine pounds fourteen shillings and two-pence, which has been repaid to them. And I have to authorize you to draw upon Her Majesty's Government for the balance of seventy-six pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence, which appears to have been paid to Mr. Wightman by the Government of Prince Edward Island.

With reference to the concluding paragraph of your Despatch, I have to repeat what was intimated to you in 1862, viz: That Mr. Howe received from the Imperial Treasury his total remuneration of four hundred pounds, of which the local Government was liable for two hundred pounds, the reimbursement of which sum by the local Government was rendered unnecessary by that Government having previously issued

I have had under my consideration your Despatches, No. 65 and 67, of the 5th of August 1863, enclosing respectively, the authenticated copy of an Act entitled "An Act to authorize the Government to sell the Military Barracks in Charlottetown," and a Petition from the Municipal Council, praying that that Act may not be confirmed.

I think it clear that the Land relinquished by the War Department should be transferred to the local Government, to be dealt with in such manner as they shall think best,—the proceeds of its sale being applied to military purposes, and the local Government being under the obligation to provide Barracks for any soldiers who may hereafter be sent to the Colony.

I should, therefore, have advised Her Majesty without hesitation, to confirm the Act, but for a doubt which has occurred to me as to the correctness of the description contained in the 1st clause.

You will observe the Western boundary line of the Town Lot, No. 70, is differently laid down in the two plans which accompanied the Petition of the Mayor and Council, and which I now return. If Lot 70 is properly laid down in the copy of Mr. Wright's plan (plan No. 1), the Barrack Ground is correctly described in the 1st clause of the Act. But if the plan, No. 2, (purporting to show the Barracks, as they now stand,) is correct, a line drawn "from the North West angle of Town Lot No. 70, to the North of Water Street," would cut off and transfer to the Government some parts of Lots 35 and 3. If this is the case, it is evident that the Act should be amended, and the Eastern Boundary of the land to be vested in the Crown, should be made to coincide with the Western boundary of Lots 3 and 35.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY ;

Your Excellency having submitted to me a Plan, showing the position and boundaries of land occupied as Barracks, &c., in this Island, marked No. 2 ; also having directed my attention to an Act passed by the Legislature, of Session 1863, intituled "An Act to authorize the Government to sell the Military Barracks in Charlottetown," wherein in Section 1, the boundaries of said Barracks, &c., are particularly described, and desiring an explanation of an error, or discrepancy which would appear to exist, either in the Plan or in Section I, of the said Act.

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I beg to report: [That] a description of the Barracks, &c., was furnished by me to the Law Clerk of the House of Assembly, as necessary to the framing of the Act; but no plan accompanied it. The plan No. 2, was furnished by me to the Corporation of Charlottetown, showing the position of the Barracks, &c. with the adjoining properties.

The first Section of the before recited Act—description of Barrack land, reads thus, “On the North by Sidney street, and extending along the South side thereof Eastwardly from the shore of the Hillsboro’ River to the Northwest angle of Town Lot No. 70,” &c. But it would appear by the plan No. 2, that the said line running Eastwardly did not extend to the Northwest angle of Town Lot No. 70, and if it did so, the Legislature by enactment would be encroaching on Town Lots No. 35 and 3, from Dorchester street to Water street.

I beg to observe, that Town Lot No. 70 is bounded North by Sidney street, East by Town Lot No. 71, South by Dorchester street, and West by Town Lot No. 69, which said Lot No. 69 is comprised within, or rather constitutes the Northeast angle of the ground occupied by the Barracks, &c., consequently the description as extending to Northwest angle of No. 70 is correct, although exhibiting by plan No. 2, a want of connexion or extension. The Town Lot No. 70 is still there in its extent, although a portion has been used as a thoroughfare to other property; but, in a survey, or in mapping of such survey, streets and lanes are shown to exist without reference to their being a portion or the whole of an original Lot.

Allow me to recapitulate, plan No. 2 was furnished to the Corporation of Charlottetown, not as exhibiting the boundaries described by Section 1 of the before recited Act; nor were the boundaries described by Section 1 of the Act intended to be delineated or represented by plan No. 2.

I regret that until the present time I have not been enabled to reply to the communication I had the honour to receive from Your Excellency, on the 14th December last, enclosing a copy of a Despatch from His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, on the subject of the Act passed by the Legislature of this Colony last Session, intitled Cap. XVI., "An Act to incorporate sundry persons by the name of the President, Directors and Company of the Farmers' Bank at Rustico." It became necessary for me to communicate with several members of the Company, resident at some distance in the country, respecting the objections to the Act which were referred to in the Colonial Minister's Despatch, and the time occupied in this has in a great measure contributed to the delay that ensued the receipt of Your Excellency's communication.

APPENDIX (A.) A

I have now to acquaint Your Excellency that it is represented to me by the principal parties interested in the passing of the Act referred to, that with respect to the disparity between the first capital, which by the second section is fixed at the sum of £1,200, and by the 38th Section is allowed to be increased to £21,200, they respectfully conceive that the guarantee for the responsibility of the promoters of the scheme should not be tested either by the original smallness of the proposed capital; or the amount of the license to increase it; but (as in other Banking Acts) by the requirements of the Act itself, and the rules and enactments regulating and establishing the liability of the shareholders, the amount to be paid on each share, before operating upon it, and also the extent of the paper issue redeemable in specie, permitted by the Statute. They consider that the enactments of the Statute are as stringent with respect to the liability of shareholders, as the Act now in force incorporating the Bank of Prince Edward Island, 18th Victoria Cap. 10, or the Act of last Session, 26th Victoria Cap. 4, to incorporate the Union Bank of Prince Edward Island as they are (see Section 19) liable to pay twice the amount of stock then actually held by them over and above, and in addition to the amount of stock actually by them paid into the Bank.

The whole amount of the original capital must in the case of the Farmers' Bank, be paid in gold and silver before operations can commence; whereas in the case of the Bank of Prince Edward Island, and the Union Bank, operations are allowed to commence whenever one third of the capital shall have been paid in gold and silver; and although the increase from £1,200 to £21,200 may seem very large, yet it would not be made at once, but may be made gradually, and (see 41) banking operations can only take place on the additional stock, when its amount has actually been paid into the Bank in gold and silver, and all additional shares (Section 42) are subject to all the rules, &c., to which the original shares are liable.

The friends of the Act further urge, that the extent of paper issues which the Farmers' Bank is authorized to make, is limited by Section 21, to twice the amount of the capital stock paid in, whereas the Acts above referred to relating to the Bank of Prince Edward Island, and the Union Bank of Prince Edward

Island) allow an issue to the extent (Sec. 13 Vic., Chapter 10, Section 20, and 26th Vic. Chap. 4, Sec. 21) of three times the amount of the capital stock paid in.

Having thus submitted to Your Excellency the reasons adduced in support of the enactments of the Farmers' Bank of Rustico almost precisely in the shape in which they have been communicated to me by the promoters of the scheme, I do not feel that I can add any further explanations that can be deemed useful on the subject.

Sheweth that your Memorialists have, for many years, been in the habit of employing Trade Marks for the purpose of identifying the articles of their manufacture, and that these trade marks have become very widely known, not alone in the British dominions and the Colonies, but in almost every country of the world, and are accepted as valuable and reliable proof of the genuineness of the manufacture, as well as of the character and quality of the article to which such Trade Marks are attached.

That the articles of your memorialists' manufacture have from the reputation acquired by your memorialists for the goods they produce, attained such a reputation, as to command a very much higher price than goods of the same kind, manufactured by various other houses, many or most of them of inferior quality, and not identified by Trade Marks.

That the increased price, which your memorialists' commodities command, has led to constant imitations and forgeries of their trade marks, but which have greatly been checked in the United Kingdom, by the operation of recent legislation.

That your memorialists find in the course of their dealings with many of the Colonies of the United Kingdom, that they are far less protected

against the trade frauds, to which allusion has been made, than in the United Kingdom itself, or in those countries between which and Her Majesty's dominions commercial treaties exist.

That in most of the British Colonies, the piracies complained of (and which are even greater evils to the public than to your memorialists) continue practically unchecked.

Various cases have recently come to the knowledge of your memorialists in which the forgeries of trade marks have been perpetrated, and where the class of frauds alluded to, are matters of daily occurrence, and carried on with the utmost openness, and practically, with perfect impunity,—a condition of things which your memorialists have reason to be well persuaded, would be materially ameliorated were the laws of the various Colonies of the empire, assimilated to the improved law of the Mother Country.

Your memorialists humbly pray that the Department over which your Grace presides, will be pleased to adopt such measures as may be necessary, with a view to the Governments of the Colonies of the British Crown being moved to make the requisite amendments in their law.

I enclose the copy of an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament “to establish the validity of Acts performed in Her Majesty's possessions abroad, by Clergymen ordained in foreign parts and to extend the powers of Colonial Legislatures with respect to such Clergymen.”

This Act has been rendered necessary by the circumstance that Clergymen deriving their ordination from Bishops consecrated under the Act of Parliament, 26 George III. Cap. 84, and incapacitated by that Act from performing their functions within Her Majesty's dominions, have, notwithstanding, solemnized marriages, and performed other clerical Acts of which the legality may be impeached.

The Statute now passed, besides establishing the validity of these Acts, will, I hope, remove all occasion for future irregularity by enabling Colonial Legislatures within their respective jurisdictions to authorize the performance of clerical functions by Clergymen incapacitated by the Act of 26 George III.

I think it advisable to explain that this Act does not extend to Clergymen of the Scottish Episcopal Church, because those Clergymen are under no statutory disability in the British Colonies, since the Act 32 George III., Cap. 68 does not apply to all Her Majesty's dominions, but only to England, Ireland and Berwick upon Tweed.

It is proposed that the same rates of postage, and division of the postage, as well as the same general regulations that exist in the case of books exchanged between the United Kingdom and the several Colonies, shall be made equally applicable to Patterns; but as it is necessary to be explicit in defining what constitutes a Pattern, in order to avoid misconception, the following rules (which are those which govern the Pattern Post with Canada,) and given as those which it would be desirable to apply to Patterns sent to or from the Colonies generally:

1. The Patterns must not be of intrinsic value.

This rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and indeed whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a Pattern; nor must the quantity of any material sent ostensibly as a Pattern be so great that it could fairly be considered as having, on this ground, an intrinsic value.

2. The Patterns must not bear any writing other than the address of the persons for whom they are intended, a manufacturer's or trade mark, numbers, and the prices of the articles.

3. The Patterns must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination.

Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen, or other material; but closed bags, although transparent, must not be used for this purpose.

4. The rule which forbids the transmission through the post of any article likely to injure the contents of the Mail Bags, or the person of any Officer of the Post Office, would of course be applicable to Patterns; and anything of the kind would be stopped, and not sent to its destination.

My attention has recently been called to the expediency of defining the relations which ought to subsist between the Government of a British Colony and the Colonial Militia and Volunteers.

Her Majesty's Government are of opinion, that the best and most constitutional mode of dealing with the question will be to follow strictly in regard to all Colonial Volunteers, the general principles on which the Volunteer system rests in this country.

Under that system the Lord Lieutenant of each county, as the Queen's Representative, is the Commander-in-Chief of the whole force of county Volunteers, so long as they are not called out for actual service, while as soon as they are so called out, they come under the Mutiny Act and articles of War, and pass from

the chief command of the Lord Lieutenant to that of the General Officer of the District.

Acting on this analogy therefore, it is very desirable that the Governor of each Colony, where Militia or Volunteers exist, should, as the Queen's Representative, be constituted by law the Commander-in-Chief of all the local forces raised in that Colony, and that all arrangements connected with the organization, drill and discipline of such forces, should within the limits of the Act of the Legislature under which they are established, be made by his authority through such officers as he may appoint. Provisions to this effect are already in force in Canada and other Colonies, and, if they are not already adopted in the Colony under your government, I should wish you to embrace the earliest practicable opportunity of procuring their enactment. Wherever this is effected the local Colonial Forces will occupy their proper constitutional position, and a better guarantee for their efficient organization and good discipline will be secured, than can be afforded by any other feasible arrangement.

In recommending that the English analogy should be followed, I wish you to understand clearly, that although the Lord Lieutenant of a county is formally the Commander of the county force, and in that capacity exercises a general superintendance over its arrangements, and practically appoints the officers, he does not take the command of the force when called out for duty even in time of peace, nor interfere in the ordinary discipline of each corps within his jurisdiction.

In reply, my Lords direct me to state to you, for the information of the Duke of Newcastle, that it appears to them very desirable that provision should, if possible, be made in all the British possessions abroad, for the constitution of Courts authorized to hold such enquiries; but in order to effect this, it rests with the Legislative authorities to frame such measures for the purpose, as the available resources and institutions of each Colony will admit of.

What in the case of Barbadoes, these resources may be, my Lords have no means of judging; but they desire me to observe, that it is very important that in the institution of any such tribunal, care should be taken to secure its being independent and judicial in its character

and form of proceedings, and that the members composing the Court, should be free from local influence.

It is also essential that the Court should, where necessary, have the aid of nautical skill and experience.

I am directed by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, to offer the following observations for the consideration of his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, upon the subject of inquiries into wrecks happening on or near the coasts of Her Majesty's Colonial possessions.

APPENDIX (A.)

The recent loss of the steamship *Anglo Saxon*, off Cape Race, Newfoundland, and the proceedings connected with the inquiry which my Lords have instituted in this country in the matter of that wreck, have induced their Lordships at once to bring to the notice of the Secretary of State the inconvenience and the difficulty of conducting these investigations in this country, in cases where the casualty has happened in a distant country some weeks, or it may be months, previously. In such cases, it often happens that the officers, ship's crew and passengers have dispersed or remained abroad, and it becomes a chance whether the most important witnesses can be produced at the hearing.

To obviate the difficulties above alluded to, my Lords desire me to suggest that it is very desirable that measures should be adopted for the establishment, in the larger Colonies at any rate, of Marine Courts of Inquiry, whose duty it should be to investigate on the spot, and at once, any case of wreck calling for inquiry, which may happen on or near the coast of those Colonies.

Such a step has been contemplated by the Imperial Legislature in passing the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854. (See 242,) amended by 25 and 26 Vic. Cap. 63. (See 23), and has been adopted in some of the British possessions, e. g. in India, at the Cape of Good Hope, in some of the Australian Colonies, and at Hong Kong, and their Lordships are able to bear testimony to the satisfactory reports of investigations that have from time to time been received at this department from the courts so constituted.

It appears to my Lords that the Duke of Newcastle might, with advantage, call the attention of the Governors of those Colonies in which no Courts of Inquiry into wrecks (at present exist, to this subject,) with an intimation of the opinion of Her Majesty's Government that it will be desirable, in every Colony where the requisite means exist, to establish Courts of Inquiry which shall investigate wrecks of British ships happening on their respective coasts as soon as possible after the casualty has occurred.

Fourteenth Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent of the Lunatic Asylum, embracing the Insane and Paupers therein, to Jan. 31st, 1864.

CHARLOTTETOWN,
January 31st, 1864.

GENTLEMEN;

In compliance with the requirements of my annual duties, I have the honor to furnish to your Board the accompanying report, being a Statistical view of the results of our operations in the Asylum for the Insane, for the year ending January 31st, 1864.

The number of patients remaining at last report, was fourteen males and seven females, amounting in all to twenty-one.

There have been admitted during the last twelve months eight males and three females, making a total under treatment of thirty-two. The number discharged has been eight, viz., five males and three females.

During the past year two deaths have occurred among the Lunatics, viz., one in a female from Pulmonary Consumption, and another in a man from an Epileptic seizure.

The unimproved Chronic cases amount to five; eight have improved, eleven much improved, and six have regained their reason; while twenty-four yet remain under treatment.

Among the Paupers, four deaths have occurred, viz., one an old man aged 80, from Cerebral Plethora, another aged 66, from Bronchitic Consumption; and two other, death was occasioned by Epileptic attacks. Only four Paupers now remain.

We have still to deplore the tardiness with which Lunatic patients are forwarded to the

Asylum. When the seizure exceeds in duration a period of upwards of twelve months, the malady frequently becomes settled, chronic and complicated, and the remedial measures adopted, uncertain in their results. Thus of six cases admitted during the past year, the following are the durations of their attacks, viz., one of two years; three cases of four years each; one of five years; and another of forty-two years standing.

In many such cases, from inattention or ignorance of the nature of Insanity, the unfortunate sufferers become chargeable to their friends or the country for life; whereas by prompt attention to the first invasion of the attack, the diseases of the mind are found to be almost as amenable to proper treatment, as those of the body.

We have to regret the limited accommodations for our paying patients or Boarders, as every bedroom in the Hospital is in occupation, and the first applicant who makes his appeal for Hospital relief, must of necessity be thrust into the cellar!

We continue to suffer the disadvantages connected with a building most faulty in its original construction, and limited in its dimensions, and it is no trifling grievance to find that while the neighboring Provinces have erected Palatial structures for their Insane, and continue every few years to expend thousands in their amplification, we must find accommodation for our sufferers in the regions under ground. On

several occasions our Asylum has been visited by Medical Superintendants of large Hospitals, and the system of lodging patients in the cellar has by them been reprobated in measured terms.

As a means of directing the attention of our Representatives to our limited accommodation, I beg to quote the following proposition made by a meeting of the Association of Medical Superintendants of all the American Asylums for the Insane, held at Philadelphia in May, 1851. It is this—"that no apartment should ever be provided for the confinement of Lunatic Patients, or as their Lodging Rooms, that are not entirely above ground."

The Hospital though thus limited, continues in a state of thorough repair, several improvements have been adopted during the past year, with respect to the comfort and classification of the patients.

But as our numbers increase we find that our principal attendant on the male Lunatics has to perform more than double duty ; having to serve and wait upon seventeen male Lunatics and four Paupers, instead of ten the usual authorized number, and as the work is not a little onerous, this of course demands an additional assistant.

As nothing of further importance has occurred during the year, I herewith respectfully submit to the consideration of your Board, this my Fourteenth Annual Report.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND LAND QUESTION.

Correspondence between His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, and a Deputation from the Government of Prince Edward Island on the subject of the Land Tenures of said Island.

CHARLOTTETOWN,
1st February, 1864.

SIR ;

We have the honor to acquaint your Excellency, that in execution of the order of your Excellency in Council, made on the 27th day of August last, by which we were directed to submit to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle certain propositions connected with the land question of this Island, we proceeded to London.

We arrived there on the 16th of September.

Owing to the absence from town of the Duke of Newcastle, we were unable to obtain an interview with that minister until the 13th of October, on which day we proceeded to the Colonial Office, by appointment, and had then the honor of being received by his Grace, to whom we submitted the propositions which will be found in our letter addressed to his Grace on the 13th October, and appended hereto.

The substance of the arguments urged in support of these propositions, will be found in the same letter.

During the discussion which we had with his Grace, it was by his Grace suggested that we should communicate with Sir Samuel Cunard, and the proprietors associated with him, and submit the resolutions directly to them.

To this suggestion we did not feel ourselves at liberty to assent, inasmuch as the question involved had long previously been acknowledged a subject of public policy, the necessity of dealing with which, in our opinion, had especially devolved upon the Secretary of State for the Colonies. We, nevertheless, expressed our willingness to confer with the proprietors, if required, for the purpose of affording any information or explanations which they might desire to obtain.

The result of our endeavours to discharge the trust confided to us will be learned from a perusal of the annexed correspondence, to which we beg respectfully to refer your Excellency.

MY LORD DUKE ;

The undersigned, referring to the subject discussed at the interview with your Grace, with which they were yesterday honored, beg leave respectfully to submit for your Grace's consideration, the following propositions, expressive of certain concessions and privileges, which, if granted by the proprietors of land in Prince Edward Island to their tenants, would be accepted by the Government of that Island, as a settlement of the land question, and in lieu of the award of the Land Commissioners :

FIRST—The undersigned propose that in the terms of the award of the royal Commissioners all arrears of rent prior to May, 1858, be remitted ; and that in all cases, if any there be, wherein tenants have paid to their landlords, at any time since the 13th of February, 1860, sums of money for rent, which sums in the whole exceed the rent which has accrued due from such tenants since May, 1858, the amounts by which such payments shall exceed the rent which shall have accrued due since May, 1858, shall be placed to the credit of the tenants who shall have paid the same, by the landlords to whom the same shall have been paid ; the tenants in such cases, to have the privilege of appropriating such over-payments towards the purchase of the fee simple of their respective holdings ; and in all cases where lands leased originally at rents not exceeding one shilling per acre, have been re-let at rents exceeding

one shilling per acre, the rents of such lands shall be reduced to the rate of rent reserved in the original leases of such lands when leased in their wilderness state; the latter stipulation is considered by the undersigned as necessary to meet those cases wherein arrears of rent have heretofore been remitted on condition that the tenants owing such arrears should take new leases, reserving a rent exceeding the original rent by a sum equivalent to the annual interest which it is assumed such arrears would yield the landlord were they paid to him and by him invested.

SECOND—The undersigned infer from the scheme submitted by the proprietors, in the draft of the Bill transmitted by your Grace to the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, that the proprietors are in all cases willing to sell their leased lands for fifteen years purchase of the reserved rents, payable in one payment in cash; the undersigned therefore propose that all tenants holding under leases granted for terms of forty years and upwards, and who shall not be indebted one whole year's rent, shall at all times, within twenty years, from the first day of January next, have the right to receive a conveyance of the fee simple of their farms, on tendering to their landlords fifteen years purchase of the reserved rent, together with the rent which may be due by such tenants in respect of such lands.

THIRD—That all tenants holding, as in the foregoing proposition is mentioned, who shall be indebted in more than one year's rent, shall, within the like period of twenty years, have a similar right to the fee simple of their respective holdings on payment of sixteen years' purchase of their reserved rents.

The undersigned most respectfully submit to your Grace that the compliance of the entire body of the landed proprietors of Prince Edward Island with the foregoing propositions, and the enactment of a law to carry them into effect, would work such a settlement of the land question as would satisfy the majority of the people, realize the fullest expectations of the royal Commissioners, and for ever terminate those unhappy disputes between landlord and tenant which for several generations have kept alive an agitation which has most materially retarded, and which, so long as it shall exist,

must necessarily continue to retard the development of the resources of the Colony, and thereby would most amply compensate such proprietors for any sacrifice of their strict legal rights which such compliance would involve. The conversion of the entire leasehold tenures of the Colony into freehold is the end sought to be attained.

The rate of purchase should, the undersigned suggest, be such as to present an inducement to the tenant to become a freeholder. The rate of interest received in Prince Edward Island for money, generally, materially exceeds six pounds per centum per annum; and if the value of the freehold be fixed at sixteen years' purchase, the number of purchasers will be far less than if the rate should be fixed at fifteen years purchase. Many tenants, it is assumed, would purchase their farms, if allowed the privilege to do so at fifteen years' purchase, who, rather than buy at sixteen years' purchase would continue to pay rent, and invest their money in such a manner as to give them more than sufficient to discharge the claims of their landlord. The apparent loss which the landlords would sustain by selling at fifteen years' purchase, would, to a very great extent, be made up to them by reason of their being enabled to procure six pounds per centum per annum for their money, free from the risk and expence which necessarily attend the collection of rents. The undersigned deem it not improper to state, that the rate of interest charged by the Bank of Prince Edward Island, has not been less for several years past, than seven pounds ten shillings per centum per annum; and also that the estates which have been purchased by the Government of the Colony, namely, the "Worrell Estate," "Sir Hunt Johnston Welsh's Estate," the "Selkirk Estate," the "Sandfield Estate," and portions of the "Montgomery Estates," the whole comprising an area of upwards of one hundred and seventy thousand acres, together with all arrears of rent due thereon, have been acquired at a rate per acre less on the average than five years' purchase of the reserved rent.

The Selkirk Estate comprised 62,059 acres. The arrears of rent due by the tenantry thereon exceeded £9000 sterling. This Estate, together with the arrears, was purchased in 1860 for £6,612 sterling, which is less than two

shillings and two pence per acre, and not equal to three years' purchase of the reserved rent.

The proposal to give to tenants owing to their landlords more than one year's rent, the right to acquire the freehold of their farms, on payment of sixteen years' purchase of the reserved rent, in other words, allowing tenants in arrear for rent to discharge themselves from all liability to pay such arrears, with the exception of one year's rent, on their paying down fifteen years' purchase of the reserved rent of their holdings for the purchase of the freehold, it is submitted is one which would operate beneficially alike to landlords and tenants. The settlement of the land question, which would be the result of the acceptance by the proprietors of the foregoing propositions—the statutory confirmation of proprietary titles—the subsidence of all agrarian agitation—the general absence of sympathy with those who would resist the just demands of the landlords—and the terminating of those extravagant hopes and expectations on the part of the tenantry that they would be enabled to acquire their lands at nominal prices, which have heretofore been entertained, and which will necessarily be cherished so long as the land question remains unsettled—would necessarily have the effect of materially increasing the value of proprietary estates. Very many of the well-to-do tenants would immediately prepare to purchase their farms, and all who would be able to pay rent would do so with regularity, conscious that it would be useless to expect the proprietors to allow their rents to fall into arrear, at the risk of losing them.

It is assumed by the undersigned that the Government of Prince Edward Island would adopt the suggestion contained in the despatch of your Grace to Lieutenant Governor Dundas, No. 24, dated 11th July, 1863, and be prepared to advance to all tenants desirous of purchasing their farms, either seven and one half or ten years' purchase of the reserved rent of such farms, on receiving from such tenants the balance of the requisite purchase money, and thus to enable such tenants to pay their landlords in one payment in cash. Assuming that such accommodation should be offered by the Government of Prince Edward Island, it is evident that the inducement to those tenants who are indebted in arrears for rent, to purchase the freehold of their farms, would be very great.

Take the case of the tenant indebted in six years rent; the landlord insists upon receiving his rent, and the tenant knows that he must satisfy the demand or lose his farm, such a tenant would necessarily be driven to purchase the freehold of his farm, for, if he paid the six years' rent to his landlord, as rent it would be virtually thrown away; whereas, if he paid this money to the Government, his farm would be purchased for him, subject only to a mortgage for a sum equivalent to ten years' purchase, (this is assuming that the Government will agree to advance ten years' purchase to the tenant.)

The undersigned are well aware that the increased energy with which landlords would in future insist upon the payment of their rents, would be complained of as one of the results of the adoption of the foregoing propositions; but they are prepared to meet this objection by shewing that the benefits to the tenants generally would far exceed the evils which might result to the few. The allowing rent to accumulate, the undersigned believe, is, on the whole, no less injurious to the interest of the tenant than to that of the landlord.

In offering the foregoing propositions as a settlement of the land question, and in lieu of the terms professed by the royal Commissioners, the undersigned cannot refrain from expressing their convictions that a settlement of the land question at the present moment is a matter of the utmost importance to the proprietors and to Prince Edward Island. The differences between landlords and tenants in the Island, have, in consequence of the appointment of the royal Commission in 1860, more especially, assumed the importance of a public question. A long and painstaking inquiry has been instituted into these differences, and a remedy for them has been indicated by the royal Commissioners. The proprietors who assented to the appointment of the Commissioners, and pledged themselves to abide by their recommendations, have refused to give their tenants the privileges which the Commissioners unanimously considered should be extended to them, and now seek to nullify the proceedings of the Commissioners, by urging against their legality objections which they might waive, but which they insist upon, thereby crushing those reasonable hopes of relief which the tenantry had cherished, and intensifying and extending the feelings of hos-

ility towards the landlords, which, ere their endeavour to avoid the award, were but too general and too bitter. Should the proprietors, in addition to repudiating the award, refuse those reasonable concessions now required at their hands, the undersigned fear that disaffection among the tenantry will become very general, and that the due maintenance of good order will prove a task of no ordinary difficulty in a Colony the inhabitants of which exercise self government, and where universal suffrage obtains.

MY LORD DUKE;

In replying to the proposals made by the Delegates from Prince Edward Island, as set forth in their letter of the 13th ultimo, it may not be out of place to advert to the original granting of the Island, about ninety years ago, in large lots, which has been so much and so severely commented upon. It was an act of necessity, the Island at that time being derelict, and it was absolutely necessary to make arrangements for taking possession of it. The grantees have all lost very heavily by accepting the grants; but no individual on the Island, at present, has been injured by that proceeding; on the contrary, these grants have been made a fruitful source of profit to the present generation, for when money is required for any purpose, a law is passed to raise the amount by a tax on the proprietors' land. I can recollect the following taxes, viz.: one for making the great roads in the Island; another for the encouragement of education; and

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another for erecting in Charlottetown a large building for the Parliament to assemble in and for all other government purposes. This was a most costly edifice, being constructed in cut stone, imported into the Island, and I believe the tax was continued after a sufficient sum had been raised to cover the cost.

In the adjacent colonies all these services are defrayed out of the general revenue of the country, but in Prince Edward Island they have been raised by taxes levied chiefly upon unproductive property, the cultivated paying only half the rate of the uncultivated land. There are many tracts of poor land which have been taxed in this way to four times the amount that the land would sell for; and in very many instances where the agent had not sufficient money from the produce of the land to pay such a tax, parcels of the best land have been sold, under execution, to satisfy the claim, with the addition of heavy costs.

I have paid for land taxes on my own, and my son's wilderness lands, between the years 1841 and 1862, the sum of £8641. It may be said that there has not been land for new settlers, but that is not correct, the proprietors have always been willing to supply any quantity, upon most easy terms; and the Island government have now also large quantities of land, which cost only 2s. 2d., per acre, and as the government are too liberal to make money by the poor settlers, they will of course sell the land to them at cost price, so that persons wishing to procure land are not dependent on the proprietors. I therefore repeat that the grants, so much complained of, have not been an injury to the present inhabitants, but a profit to them.

In my leases, the rent and purchase money are made payable in British sterling money, and were so paid for many years, until an Act was passed reducing the £1 sterling to 16s.; for instance, if a tenant owes me £5 sterling for rent, under his lease, and I owe him five sovereigns for any article purchased of him, he would pay me £3 15s., and I should have to pay him £5, thus the Act reduced the value of my rent and sales twenty-five per cent.

A landlord is not allowed to proceed in the small debts Court for the recovery of rent, while all debts under £5 are recoverable in that Court; and he cannot sue in the Supreme Court for a debt under £10, and as the rent is

frequently from £2 to £2 10s., four or five years must elapse before he can proceed in the Supreme Court; and there are also difficulties placed in the way of recovering rent in the Supreme Court. I annex a printed copy of the Act passed on that subject. [Cap. 16, of 1860.]

I mention these circumstances to shew the vexatious Acts that have been passed to injure the proprietors; they have been most unjustly deprived of one fourth of their property, and difficulties placed in the way of the collection of the remainder.

Some of the propositions of the delegates appear to be complicated and difficult to be understood, but all of them interfere with the written agreements between landlord and tenant, and go to deprive the landlord of his just rights. One proposal is for remission of arrears of rent prior to May, 1858; another to reduce the term of purchase from 20 to 15 years; this would not appear to be a very just proposition, when it is considered that an Act has already been passed reducing the sterling money in which the rents and purchases are payable, to the extent of £25 per cent., so that this further demand is a further additional reduction of twenty-five per cent. Another proposal is, that land leased originally at one shilling per acre, and now paying a higher rate, should be reduced to one shilling. Some of my tenants are in that position; any changes that have taken place have been matter of agreement between my agent and the tenants, and always at the request of the tenant, and for his interest. I happen to recollect an instance that will serve to illustrate the case:—two tenants on adjoining farms owed each £50 for rent, one paid the debt, the other proposed to pay six pence additional per acre as commutation for the £50, to which my agent agreed, and granted him a new lease; the current interest of the Island being six per cent, the £50 gave him £3, and he paid for additional rent only £2 10s.

It was therefore to the advantage of the tenant, and he wished to have the use of the money; these two farms would now sell in the market for £600 or £700 each. Can it be just to ask to disturb such arrangements?

I will now state the terms upon which land can at all times be had. A poor man applies to my agent for fifty acres of land, he obtains

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it on the following terms: one year at 3d. per acre, one year at 6d., one year at 9d., and thereafter at 1s. per acre (I having previously made a road to the land.) The tenant has the privilege of cutting timber for building his house and outhouses, as well as for fuel, and also to sell for shipbuilding and other purposes; if he be an industrious man, he will have a comfortable homestead at the end of four years, together with his fifty acres of land, and for which he is to pay annually 37s. 6d. sterling, or at the rate of nine pence per week, and the privilege of purchasing the fee simple at any time for £37 10s.; his agreement is for £50, but by the Act of the Legislature the money value is reduced to £37 10s.

Now compare or contrast the situation of this man with the farm laborer in Great Britain, who cannot get a shelter for his family for double that rate per week, and is liable to be turned out at any moment by the omission to pay only one week's rental.

I have granted 1,496 leases within the last twenty-five years, many of the parties are comparatively rich, while some of them have purchased their freeholds; others would do so, but prefer retaining the money, being aware that they have the privilege of purchasing at any time.

I have not been able to consult with any of the proprietors, they are out of town, and I have also been away, I am therefore only now expressing my own sentiments, but I will take the earliest opportunity of seeing them, and I hope to be enabled to submit to your Grace some proposals in the form of a Bill, which I trust may meet your approbation, and be the means of producing a better feeling in the Island.

With reference to the letter which I had the honor to address to the Duke of Newcastle on

the 14th November, relative to the proposals made by the delegates from Prince Edward Island, I now beg to submit, for the consideration of his Grace, the draft of a Bill to which I then alluded. I have since consulted with some of the principal proprietors in this country, who have given their assent to the Bill; the greater number of the proprietors reside on the Island, and I have reason to believe that they will also give their concurrence to it.

In making these concessions, we do not recognize the right of delegates, or any other party, to interfere with written agreements existing between landlords and tenants; but we make the concessions in the hope that they may produce peace, and obedience to the laws. It is to be fully understood that this Bill shall be taken to contain the terms upon which the Land Question of Prince Edward Island shall be settled; and it is further expressly understood, that in case any alterations shall be made in the provisions of the said Bill, by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, the proprietors will not in any wise be bound thereby.

A Bill for settling differences between Landlord and Tenant, and to enable Tenants on certain Townships to purchase the reversion of their farms.

Whereas by a certain Address of the House of Assembly, pursuant to certain resolutions passed by the said House, it was prayed that Her Majesty's Government would be pleased to direct a Commission to inquire into the existing relations between landlord and tenant, and to negotiate with the proprietors for abatement of arrears of rent, and also for terms to enable the tenants to purchase the reversion of their farms.

And whereas Sir Samuel Cunard, Baronet, Edward Cunard, Sir Graham Montgomery, Bart., James Montgomery, the Right Hon. Laurence Sullivan, Daniel Hodgson, William Cundall, John Roach Burke, the Hon. Thomas

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Heath Haviland, John A. McDonald and the Hon. Edward Palmer and Henry Palmer, proprietors of the several township lands mentioned in the schedule to this Act, marked (A), did agree to the issuing of such commission. And whereas a royal commission was thereupon issued; and whereas the said commissioners, by their report, did find and declare that the said township lands were not liable to forfeiture in consequence of any omission to perform, or any non-performance of any of the conditions in the original grant thereof; and also, that no arrears of quit rents by the said grants reserved are now due or recoverable from the proprietors, tenants or occupiers of such lands; and also that the proprietors, their tenants or occupiers should be quieted in their possession of certain parts of the said lands called or known as the "Fishery Reserves;" and did also declare and award that all arrears of rent which accrued due to the said proprietors in respect of any of the said lands previous to the 1858, should be remitted to the tenants; and did also give certain rates at which they should have a right to purchase the reversion of their farms; and whereas the said commissioners did also, by their report, direct and provide, that in certain cases the value of the land should be ascertained by arbitrators, to be appointed by the landlords and their tenants, in making which last direction or provision the said commissioners exceeded the authority intended to be given them by the Assembly and the said proprietors, and the said report or award is therefore void; and whereas it is nevertheless expedient for preventing the tenants being deluded by the agitation of impracticable projects, based on certain questions called in the said resolutions "the escheat question," the "fishery reserves question," and "the quit rent question," that the declaration, provisoes or directions relative thereto shall be confirmed in the manner and under the provisoes hereinafter mentioned. And whereas it hath been agreed between the said proprietors and certain delegates or agents of the government of Prince Edward Island, to remit to their tenants, on their respective estates, certain arrears of rent hereinafter mentioned, and also, that the tenants on the said estates shall have the right to purchase the reversionary interest in their farms, at the rate and in the manner hereinafter expressed:

1st—Be it therefore enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, that from and after the passing of this Act, and until the first day of May, 1884, every tenant of any of the proprietors in the said schedule named, having at the time of desiring to exercise the right of purchase hereinafter given, an unexpired term of not less than forty years, under written demise, in any of the township lands of such proprietors, shall have a right or option to purchase the reversionary interest of such proprietor, his heirs or assigns therein, at sixteen years' purchase of the yearly rent reserved and made payable by and under such demise. Provided always, that in any case where the said yearly rent during the first portion or years of the term shall be no less than the yearly rent reserved during the residue of such term, the amount of the purchase money shall be computed by multiplying the maximum or full rent reserved during the residue of such term, by sixteen.

2d—Be it further enacted, that the herebefore recited declarations or award of the said commissioners respecting the escheat or forfeiture of the said township lands, and the arrears of quit rents, and also concerning the lands known or called "the Fishery Reserves," be, and the same is hereby declared to be binding in law and in equity.

3d—Be it further enacted, that the arrears of rent which have accrued due to any of the said proprietors from any tenant of such township lands previous and up to the first day of May, 1858, and which at the passing of this Act are unpaid, be, and the same are hereby remitted and given up; provided always, that nothing in this Act shall extend to remit or release any arrears of rent for which judgment in any Court shall have been recovered against any tenant previous to the first day of October, 1863, nor to remit or release any rent due from any tenant, the unexpired term of whose lease shall not exceed forty years; and provided further, and it is hereby declared that nothing in this Act shall be construed to entitle any tenant, who, subsequent to the 1st day May, 1858, shall have paid a sum larger than was sufficient to cover or liquidate the rent accruing due between the said first day of May, 1858, and the time of his making such payment, to have the overplus or amount remaining, after deducting the rent so accruing between the said

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first day of May, 1858, and the time of such payment, applied in or towards the liquidation or payment of any rent accruing after such payment; but such overplus shall be taken and held to have been appropriated by the landlord in payment of arrears that accrued due previous to the said first day of May, 1858.

4th—Be it further enacted, that any action hereafter to be brought by any of the said proprietors, their heirs or assigns, against any such tenant for the recovery of rent which may have accrued due previous to the first day of May, 1858, under any such demise as aforesaid, that act (as to so much of the demand as relates to rent accrued due previous to such last mentioned date) shall be a good defence under the general issue, without the same being specially pleaded in bar thereto.

5th—That nothing in this Act shall be construed to entitle the tenant of any farm or lands comprising any mill site or water power, capable of being used for the driving of any saw or grist mill, whereon any such mill now is or hereafter has been erected, to any such remission of arrears of rent, or a right to purchase the reversion thereof as aforesaid.

6th—That no tenant shall be entitled to claim the right or option to purchase under this Act, unless all arrears of rent, and which may be recoverable by action, or for which judgment previous to the first day of October, 1863, shall have been recovered, shall be fully paid and satisfied.

7th—That in case the tenant shall desire to purchase between the periods or days on which the rent falls due, the same shall be apportioned, and the portion there found to be due, added to the purchase money payable by such tenant under the provisions of this Act.

8th—That nothing in this Act shall extend to any lease made after the passing of this Act.

9th—That no landlord shall be compelled to sell under the provisions of this Act, unless the whole of the purchase money be tendered or offered to be paid.

MY LORD DUKE;

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from Mr. Elliot, dated Downing Street, 10th December, instant, in which was transmitted to me, by your Grace's direction, (for any observations which I might have to offer,) a copy of a letter from Sir Samuel Cunard, accompanied by the draft of a Bill for the settlement of the Prince Edward Island land question; and also a Copy of a previous letter from Sir Samuel Cunard, dated the 14th ultimo, communicating to your Grace his own views on the subject.

Referring, my Lord Duke, to the communication of Sir Samuel Cunard to your Grace, dated 14th November last, which purports to express the sentiments of that gentleman, and to be in reply to the proposals for the settlement of the Land Question of Prince Edward Island, submitted to your Grace by Mr. Palmer and myself on the 13th October last, I regret to acquaint your Grace, that the character and tendency of the statements therein made by Sir Samuel Cunard, are, in my opinion, such as imperatively demand from me, on public grounds, more than a mere acknowledgement.

Sir Samuel Cunard commences his communication by adverting to the original granting of the Island in large lots—a subject not even alluded to in the proposals to which he professes to reply—in the following terms :

“It may not be out of place to advert to the original granting of the Island, about ninety years ago, in large lots, which has been so much and so severely commented upon. It was an act of necessity, the Island at that time being derelict, and it was absolutely necessary to make arrangements for taking possession of it. The grantees have all lost very heavily by accepting the grants, but no individual on the Island at present has been injured by that proceeding; on the contrary, these grants have been made a fruitful source of profit to the present generation, for when money is required for any purpose, a law is passed to raise the amount by a tax on the proprietors' land.”

It is not my intention, my Lord Duke, in this communication, to argue the question whether the alienation of the entire lands of an infant Colony, in one day, to a hundred individuals, by lottery, was or was not, a disposition of them, forced by necessity upon his Majesty's Government in the year 1767, or whether it was a judicious or injudicious mode of dealing with the Colony.

The assertion of Sir Samuel Cunard, that “no individual on the Island at present has been injured by that proceeding, but that the present inhabitants have been benefitted by the original alienation of the lands of the Colony, for when money is required for any purpose a law is passed to raise the amount by a tax on the proprietors' lands,” is not, to me, very in-

telligible. It is undeniable, my Lord Duke, that several of your Grace's predecessors in office have declared this disposition of the public property of the Colony a fruitful source of discontent on the part of its inhabitants, as the records of the Colonial Office amply testify.

The lands of the Island generally, of the thousands of small freeholders and leaseholders, as well as of the owners of townships and of several thousand acres—who are generally intended by the designation “proprietors,” are, and for years past have been taxed, in order that a revenue might be raised for the public service; and the taxes which it is now found necessary to impose for this purpose upon the land, it is fair to assume, are greater than they would have been had not the Colony, in its infancy, been deprived by the original grants, of the lands which should have formed the public demesne, and, as in other Colonies, proved a fruitful source of revenue.

In support of the extraordinary statement that “when money is required for any purpose, a law is passed to raise the amount by a tax on the proprietor's land,” Sir Samuel Cunard instances three taxes imposed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island. “I can recollect,” writes Sir Samuel Cunard to your Grace, “the following taxes, viz: one for making the great roads in the Island, another for the encouragement of education, and another for erecting in Charlottetown a large building for the Parliament to assemble in, and for all other government purposes; this was a costly edifice, being constructed, in cut stone, imported into the Colony; and I believe the tax was continued after a sufficient sum had been raised to cover the cost.”

First—As to the tax “for making great roads in the Colony.” The only law that has, within the recollection of Sir Samuel Cunard, been in force in Prince Edward Island, rendering the lands of proprietors liable to contribute to the making of great roads was the Act of 10th George 4th, cap. 10, which was intitled “An Act to regulate the laying out and altering of Highways, and to provide a mode of obtaining compensation for those who may thereby be injured, and to cause those who are benefitted thereby to contribute towards their formation.” This Act, together with the Act in amendment, has been consolidated by the Act 12th Vic. cap. 1.

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The Act 10th Geo. 4, cap. 10, authorized the Lieutenant Governor and Council of Prince Edward Island to open roads, where necessary, through cultivated or wilderness lands, and enacted, that when any road should be ordered to be opened, under the Act in question, the Sheriff should be directed, by a writ from the Supreme Court, to ascertain by the oaths of a jury, or juries, the injury or advantage which such road would occasion to the owners of the land through which it should pass, and that the owners should be compensated, or required to contribute towards the cost of such road accordingly.

The only expensive road ever ordered to be constructed through uncultivated lands, by virtue of this Act, was ordered to be opened in the year 1838. It was the great highway to the northern extremity of the Island, and was projected through lands owned chiefly by Sir Samuel Cunard.

The inquests of the juries were returned into the Supreme Court in the autumn of the year 1838. The amount thereby assessed to be paid by Sir Samuel Cunard was upwards of one thousand pounds.

No appeal was demanded against the findings of the juries, nor was any application made to have them quashed, by Sir Samuel Cunard or his agents.

The local government was allowed to proceed with the construction of the highway, and to finish the same at a cost of upwards of sixteen hundred pounds—(the government were by law required to make the road before the proprietors could be called upon for the amount assessed against them)—then, as will appear to your Grace, by reference to the report of the then Attorney General, (now the Chief Justice of Prince Edward Island,) transmitted to your Grace's predecessor Lord Stanley, by the Lieutenant Governor of the Island, in a despatch No. 110, dated Government House, Prince Edward Island, October 24th, 1843—for the first time objections were started to the proceedings taken under the Act, and an application was made to the Supreme Court to quash the writs, and all proceedings under them, on the ground of irregularity.

The irregularity was this, the assessment was not made within the time limited therefor by the writ, but subsequently thereto.

The application to the Supreme Court was

unsuccessful; the writs were quashed, and Sir Samuel Cunard, by a purely captious objection, evaded the payment of upwards of a thousand pounds, and reaped the advantage of the road constructed through his property, at the expense of the people of Prince Edward Island.

The effect of opening this road upon Sir Samuel Cunard's property may be inferred from the following paragraph taken from the report of the Attorney General, transmitted to Lord Stanley in the despatch of the 24th October, 1843, before referred to:

“As a proof of the increased value of a portion of the lands, viz. townships numbers 4, 5, and 6, (the property of Sir Samuel Cunard) it is matter of fact that in the year 1839, before the expenditure of the public money upon the roads and bridges, they were purchased for the sum of £9,600 sterling, and subsequently, in the year 1842, after the roads and bridges were made, agreed to be resold for the sum of £25,000 sterling, affording a profit of the sum of £15,400 sterling, this gain no doubt arising in a very great degree from the expenditure of the public money in making the roads and bridges in question.”

That Sir Samuel Cunard was the proprietor of the land in question, and that the amount which he was assessed to pay was about the sum of £1000, will appear by reference to the memorial of that gentleman to Lord Stanley, dated Halifax, May 2d, 1843.

How far the original grants have been made “a fruitful source of profit to the present generation,” in that Island, by reason of Sir Samuel Cunard's extensive estates, held under them, having been taxed for the making “great roads,” your grace will have little difficulty in determining.

The next evidence adduced by Sir Samuel Cunard, in proof of his assertion “that the original grants have been made a fruitful source of profit to the present generation,” is the disposition of—

“The tax for the encouragement of education.”

This tax is imposed by the Acts 11th Victoria, cap. 7, and 24th Victoria, cap. 35, and is not, as Sir Samuel Cunard would have your Grace infer, “levied chiefly upon unproductive land, the cultivated paying only half the rate of the uncultivated land.”

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The taxes to which the lands of the colony are now subjected for education and all other purposes are imposed by these two Acts.

Cultivated land is rendered liable for the payment of six shillings and eight pence per hundred acres.

Uncultivated land to the payment of nine shillings and two pence per hundred acres.

These taxes are equivalent to the tax imposed by the Act 7 William 4 cap. 31, increased by the imposition of an uniform tax of one half-penny per acre, which is especially declared to be for the purposes of education.

In the year 1861 the whole amount derived from "the taxes on the uncultivated lands" of the colony was £811 5s. 0d., currency, while the cultivated land, in the same year paid £3,819 4s.

The penal, or differential tax, upon wilderness land in 1861, was equivalent to the small sum of £221 15s. 0d. currency, or less than £150 sterling.

I shall now, my Lord Duke, consider the third evidence adduced by Sir Samuel Cunard, in proof of this extraordinary assertion, viz :

"The imposition of the tax for erecting in Charlottetown a large building for the Parliament to assemble in, and for all other Government purposes."

The only taxes ever levied upon the lands of the Colony for the purpose of erecting public buildings, were imposed by the three Acts following, viz :

1st.—The Act 49 Geo. 3, cap. 9. This Act imposed an uniform tax upon all lands, of Two shillings currency per hundred acres.

Under this Act was collected about £1,400.

2nd.—The Act 11 Geo. 4, cap. 17. This Act imposed the same rate of tax as the Act 49 Geo. 3, c. 9.

Under this Act was collected £3,516 15s. 2d.

3rd.—The Act 7 Will. 4, cap. 31. This Act imposed a tax of Two shillings on every one hundred acres of cultivated land, and four shillings on the like quantity of uncultivated land.

Under this Act was collected £18,133 8s. 3d.

These Acts produced in the aggregate £28,050 3s. 5d.

By reference to the 12th section of the Act 11 Geo. 4. cap. 17, your Grace will observe, that it was thereby enacted, that this Act should have no force or effect "until it should be ascertained, that His Majesty shall have been pleased to relinquish all claim to the **QUIT RENTS**" during the continuance of the above recited Acts.

A similar provision was inserted in every subsequent Act, imposing a land tax.

The **QUIT RENTS**, taking the rate as reduced by the Prince Regent's proclamation in 1818, viz : Two shillings sterling per one hundred acres (about one half the average rate imposed by the original grants) during the sixteen years of the operation of the Acts 11, Geo. 4, cap. 17 ; and 7 Will. 4, cap. 31, would have amounted to £34,066 16s. 0d. currency. It follows, therefore, that by reason of these enactments, of which Sir Samuel Cunard complains, the owners of land gained no less a sum than £6016 12s. 7d.

If this sum be added to the arrears due at the time of the passing of the Act 11 Geo. 4, cap. 17, which arrears were generously remitted by the Crown to Sir Samuel Cunard and others, who now appear so reluctant to grant concessions to their poor tenants—it would represent a sum many times exceeding every tax that has ever been levied, in respect of the lands of Prince Edward Island, from the date of the original grants to the present hour.

The next statement of Sir Samuel Cunard, to which I would direct your Grace's attention, is the following :

"In my Leases the rent and purchase money are made payable in British sterling money, and were so paid for many years, until an Act was passed reducing the £1 sterling to 16s. Thus the Act reduced the value of my rent and sales, 25 per cent."

My Lord Duke, I shall not, I think, have much difficulty in convincing your Grace that this statement of Sir Samuel Cunard is not borne out by the facts of the case.

The Act referred to by Sir Samuel Cunard, as reducing his rents and sales twenty-five per cent, is the Act 17 Vic. chapter 6.

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This Act was passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, under the following circumstances :

In the early days of the Colony, when sterling money of Great Britain was paid, the equivalent in currency was determined by the addition to the sterling of one ninth. For instance, the landlord whose tenant had covenanted to pay him £5 British sterling money, as the annual rent of one hundred acres of land, granted an acquittance therefor on receiving £5 11s. 2d., of the current money of the Island.

This practice continued until 1854, and in fact is still observed, with very rare exceptions, altho' for many years past the currency of the Island has been so depreciated that the British one pound has been, as it now is, equivalent to thirty shillings currency.

In 1854, the Legislature, believing that very many tenants had signed leases, in which the rent was reserved in British sterling money, under the belief that they would never be called upon to pay more than the currency of the Island, with a ninth added, and that doubts had been raised as to whether such rents could not be legally enforced in sterling money, irrespective of the long established usage which had prevailed, and which still prevailed, passed the Act 17 Vic. cap. 6, which Act, after reciting the Act 12 Vic. cap. 24, declared—

“That the enactments contained in the ninth section of the said recited Act, made and passed in the 12th year of Her present Majesty, intituled “An Act to regulate the specie currency of Prince Edward Island,” shall extend and be construed to extend and apply with regard to the mode of converting sterling money into currency, that is to say, by adding one ninth part to such sterling money, in order to bring it into currency, to any lease, bond or other monetary obligation made and entered into before the passing of the said last recited Act; unless in cases or in any case where a contrary course may have been mutually recognized, and acted upon by the party or parties to any such bond, lease or obligation, either before or since the passing of the said last recited Act, anything in this Act to the contrary notwithstanding.”

The ninth section of the Act 12 Vic. cap. 24, above recited, is as follows :—

“And be it enacted, That as in certain cases the fees in public offices have been defined by statute to be payable in sterling money, and as it has been customary heretofore, in payment of the said fees to convert the sterling into currency by the addition of one ninth part, such fees shall continue to be paid and received at the usual rates, anything in this Act to the contrary notwithstanding.”

The Act 17 Vic. cap. 6, evidently affects only those leases and contracts in which are covenants or agreements for the payment of sterling money, made before the passing of that Act, and such leases and contracts only in cases in which the parties to such leases or contracts shall have mutually recognized the practice of converting sterling money into currency, by adding one ninth part to such sterling money, so that if Sir Samuel Cunard is correct in his statement that “in his leases the rent and purchase money are made payable in British sterling money, and were so paid for many years, until an Act was passed reducing the £1 stg. to 16s.,” he must necessarily be in error when he asserts that the Act to which he alludes “reduced the value of his rent and sales 25 per cent.”

As to the alleged “unjust” and “vexatious” laws which Sir Samuel Cunard states to have been passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, by which he and other proprietors ‘have been deprived of one fourth of their property, and had difficulties placed in the way of the collection of the remainder;’ I have no further observation to offer to your Grace, than that the Acts thus characterized were duly approved by your Grace, or your Grace’s predecessors in the office of Secretary of State for the Colonies, by whom they were submitted for Her Majesty’s allowance.

Sir Samuel Cunard next proceeds to state to your Grace the terms upon which he lets his lands in Prince Edward Island. The poor man, says Sir Samuel Cunard, who applies to my Agent for land, “obtains it on the following terms, viz: one year at 3d per acre, one year at 6d per acre, one year at 9d per acre, and thereafter at 1s per acre.

After enumerating the privileges which the "poor man" becoming his tenant on these terms would have, such as "the privilege of cutting timber for building a house and out-houses, as well as for fuel and other purposes," Sir Samuel Cunard informs your Grace, that if the "poor man," who takes a lease of fifty acres of his land in Prince Edward Island, "be an industrious man," he will have a comfortable homestead at the end of 4 years, together with fifty acres of land, for which he is to pay annually 37s 6d sterling.

Sir Samuel Cunard adds, "I have granted 1496 leases within the last 25 years; many of the parties are comparatively rich, while some of them have purchased their freeholds, others would do so, but prefer retaining the money, being aware that they have the privilege of purchasing at any time."

My Lord Duke, it is well known to all who are acquainted with the North American Colonies, that no man, without capital—no English farm laborer—it matters not how industrious he may be, can go into the woods, and procure from the soil sufficient to support a wife, and pay rent for fifty acres of land, at three pence an acre, and at the end of four years possess a "comfortable homestead."

The able and experienced author of the Appendix to the Report of the Royal Commissioners thus treats on the subject of

CLEARING UP A FARM.

"When a new settler begins without capital, it is as much as he usually can do to clear two acres per year; at the end of four years, when his rent is sixpence an acre, he may have eight acres cleared, say two in potatoes and turnips, two in wheat, and two in indifferent hay."

"The rent goes on increasing from three pence an acre, at the end of two years, to a shilling; at the end of eight years, when it becomes 18 dollars and 56 cents per hundred acres—at that time there may be an addition to the above crop of about two or three tons of hay, and no pasture,—the rent being about 1 dollar and 80 cents per acre for the useful land, (equal to about eleven shillings and three pence currency.) The tenant may leave

out the oat crop and get better hay, or continue the oats until the land will not bear hay,—the value taken off the ground will, in either case, be about the same."

"Where money has to be raised, oats seem to be the only resource, although the exhaustion makes it unprofitable in the long run. At the end of eight or ten years he may have 20 acres cleared, and about the same area of ground in crop as before; the remainder of clearing being in pasture, then stumping comes on, and a second course of cropping, at the rate of about two acres a year, (the clearing being continued), till, at the end of 20 years there are, perhaps, 30 or 40 acres of cleared land, with from 15 to 20 under the plow, and one half of that pretty well worn out by cropping."

"Sometimes clearing is carried on at a more rapid rate, circumstances may be peculiarly favorable, or there may be grown up sons in the family, which is equivalent to capital, but in the majority of cases this is a pretty fair account of a new settlement. Except in very favorable circumstances it is impossible to pay the rent, and support a family by what is raised upon such a farm. If 50 or 60 acres were cleared, and in good heart, the demand might be easily met; this, however, requires either capital or time. The few persons who have capital do not lay it out in this way; the demand for rent comes on too soon, and even if not paid, remains an incubus upon the energies of the farmer, and prevents improvements."

Sir Samuel Cunard has also informed your Grace, that

"Many" of his tenants are "comparatively rich."

I shall proceed to prove to your Grace that "many" of Sir Samuel Cunard's tenants, as well as the tenants of other proprietors, are in very destitute circumstances.

First, as to Sir Samuel Cunard's tenantry:

When the Royal Commissioners held their Court in Prince Edward Island, they were furnished by Sir Samuel Cunard, or his Agent, with a tabular statement, which your Grace

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may find by reference to the Appendix to the Report of the Commissioners, in your Grace's possession; it is intitled,

"SYNOPSIS OF ESTATE OF SIR SAMUEL CUNARD,
IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, 1860."

From this return, it appears that the number of tenants holding under lease on Sir Samuel Cunard's estates, is 971.

That they hold 64,889 acres, which is equivalent to an average of about 66 acres to each tenant.

That the reserved rent amounts to £3,434 18s. 0d., or a little over one shilling per acre.

That the amount of arrears due in 1860 was £17,073 6s. 0d.

At the foot of this table is the following note: "As the rent is not considered due till the Autumn, the arrears should be reduced by the amount of the yearly rent reserved, which would leave the arrears about £14,000."

Taking the arrears at £14,000, the amount due, divided among the 971 tenants, would give to each tenant a sum exceeding Fourteen pounds, or upwards of four shillings an acre for every acre leased; and as "many" of Sir Samuel Cunard's tenants "are comparatively rich," it may fairly be assumed that they owe no arrears of rent, hence it necessarily follows that many of them are very heavily in arrear.

This synopsis shews that on Sir Samuel Cunard's townships, 63 and 64, there are 173 tenants holding 11,010 acres, and that they are indebted in arrears £5,451 10s., which, allowing the annual rent to have been paid in 1860, and in every year since, would leave the arrears upwards of seven shillings an acre, supposing every tenant to be alike indebted.

Townships Nos. 44, 45, and 46, are mentioned as having on them 122 tenants, holding under Sir Samuel Cunard—occupying 7809 acres, and indebted for rent in arrear upwards of £2300, which is equal, on an average, to nearly six shillings per acre.

The condition of the tenantry on these last mentioned townships is specially noticed in the Appendix to the Report of the Royal Commissioners,

"The produce raised by each tenant, carefully ascertained from the returns of the census, made up by sworn enumerators," is given, and the whole is summed up in the following words:

TOWNSHIP 44.

"Here are 52, out of 57 persons, who have barely a sufficiency of grain and vegetable food, without the means of getting meat, or wool for clothing, not to say foreign luxuries, or payment of rent."

TOWNSHIP 45.

Of the fourteen tenants of Sir Samuel Cunard, who are divided into two classes, 9 first class and 5 second class, the produce of whose land is given, it is reported that after deducting one tenth of the product of the farms of the first class for seed, the remainder will about provision "an average family of six and a half persons, and feed a horse while doing the farm work, nothing to spare. The second class must get provision from some other quarter, or starve."

TOWNSHIP 46.

Of this township it is said—"Here are fourteen (families) in fair circumstances; four, very little, if anything, to spare, and thirteen with about half the year's provisions."

My Lord Duke, the foregoing, as well as the following extracts, from the Report of the Royal Commissioners, are better calculated to give your Grace a correct estimate of the condition of the tenantry of Prince Edward Island, than the representations of interested parties.

The extracts following are the conclusions drawn from the census returns of 1861, and were prepared so as "to give a proper idea of the means derivable from the soil, at command of the tenants, for the payment of rent and maintenance of families:

"Tables deduced from the Census, of 1861, shewing character of the leases, the quality and produce of the lands leased in twenty-two townships, indiscriminately selected, and the means derivable therefrom for paying the stipulated rent.

"These tables are extracted from the returns of the enumerators of the census of 1861 and the value of the produce computed so as to give a proper idea of the means derivable from the soil at command of the

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tenants for the payment of rent and for the maintenance of families.

- “The most striking feature of these tables is the small value of produce upon many of the farms. For instance, on nine Lots in King’s County, the produce of four-sevenths of the tenantry is below thirty pounds in value; the average being about £15 6s. currency, or £10 4s. sterling.
- “Another seventh have produced between thirty and forty pounds; average thirty-five pounds; the remaining two-sevenths run between forty and one hundred pounds; average sixty pounds. But eighteen families out of the nine Lots average one hundred and seventy-nine pounds; and four others, two hundred and seventy-six pounds.
- “The food of one person for a year, at the prices calculated, will hardly be less than four pounds; say two pounds for bread and potatoes, and two pounds for meat and fish; and taking the average family at six and a half persons, the amount will be twenty-seven pounds; to which add thirty bushels of oats for feeding a horse while at work, say thirty pounds in the whole, besides milk and vegetables in the summer. But considering the small quantity of fodder for seven months’ feed of cattle, and the pooriness of the pastures in summer, the relief from milk cannot be very great. Taking the provisions of the family at twenty-seven pounds a year, it is only 10s. 4d½ currency, or six shillings and eleven pence sterling, per week; there is no surplus for the payment of rent or purchase of foreign articles. But of four-sevenths of the tenants this is the maximum income; the average is only about one-half of this sum. There is also another seventh but slightly raised above this. Nor is this state of things occasioned, except partially, by the newness of the settlement; an examination of the tables shews that the new farms are not numerous, and that in the greater number of instances small crops are drawn from farms long settled upon.
- “It may be surmised that these persons get a good deal of their living by fishing, but

this can hardly be the case, as the greater part of the poor tenantry are in the interior of the townships out of reach of the fishery. As regards clothing, these people can make for themselves, if they had materials, but the source from which they are to be drawn is not obvious. By the tables of 1855, all the sheep in these townships averaged but eight to a family, and as the more wealthy have a larger share, the number owned by the poorer class can hardly be put at more than three or four to each family. How clothing and shoes are obtained by these people to meet the rigors of winter, is a question difficult to solve. It has been said that there is a great deal of suffering among them at times, and the statistics prove that it must be true.”

Having replied to the statements of Sir Samuel Cunard, in reference to subjects not introduced in the proposals for the settlement of the Land Question, I shall now proceed to consider his observations directly bearing upon the propositions submitted by Mr. Palmer and myself.

Sir Samuel Cunard informs your Grace, that some of the propositions of the delegates appear to be complicated and difficult to be understood, but all of them “interfere with the written agreements between landlord and tenant, and go to deprive the landlord of his just rights—one proposal is for the remission of arrears of rent prior to May, 1858; another to reduce the term of purchase from 20 to 15 years; this would not appear to be a very just proposition when it is considered that an Act has already been passed reducing the sterling money in which the rents and purchases are payable, to the extent of 25 per cent, so that this further additional demand is a further additional reduction of 25 per cent. Another proposal is that land, leased originally at 1s per acre, and now paying a higher rate, should be reduced to 1s.”

I regret, my Lord Duke, that the propositions submitted by the delegates should appear to Sir Samuel Cunard complicated and hard to be understood.

That they interfere with the written agreements between landlord and tenant, and go to deprive the landlord of his strict “legal rights,”

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I freely admit. If such were not the fact, the mode of settlement proposed would not have required, nor would it have been submitted, for the approval of Sir Samuel Cunard and his fellow proprietors.

Your Grace has already expressed the opinion, that the land owners of Prince Edward Island cannot even "hope to recover," from their tenants, "their strict legal rights;" and that a settlement of the differences, now unhappily existing between such land owners and their tenants, is desirable,—even at the sacrifice of much that is the legal right of the land owners.

My Lord Duke, at several periods between the date of the original grants of Prince Edward Island and the year 1833, had the Crown exacted the arrears of Quit Rents—its "strict legal right"—many proprietors would have had to pay sums of money exceeding the value of their estates, or would have been deprived of them.

The objection to the proposal to fix the rate of purchase at fifteen years, based upon the assumption "that an Act has already been passed, reducing the sterling money in which the rents and purchase monies are payable, to the extent of twenty-five per cent., I submit it is of no force.

I have already proved to your Grace, that this Act referred to by Sir Samuel Cunard, does not at all affect any lease, granted since the year 1854; that it applies only to leases granted prior to that year, and as to such leases simply declares that the landlord shall continue to receive his rents reserved in sterling, at the rate of exchange, at which previously to that year, such landlord had been accustomed to receive them.

No landlord, therefore, can truthfully assert that by reason of that Act, the receipts from his lands have been lessened to the extent of one penny.

My Lord Duke, in the year 1840, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, examined, before a Committee, the Agent of Sir Samuel Cunard, as to the manner in which payment was required from the tenants of that gentleman, in whose leases rents were reserved in sterling money. The following questions and answers, put to, and given by that Agent,

who was the Solicitor General of Her Majesty for the Island, while they conclusively determine the credibility due to the Statement of Sir Samuel Cunard, to your Grace, that in his leases the rent and purchase money are made payable in British sterling, and were so paid for many years, until an Act was passed reducing the £1 to 16s.,—must, I think satisfy your Grace, that the Act 17 Vic. cap. 6, was neither a "vexatious" Act, nor one which "unjustly deprived" that gentleman, or any other proprietor, of "one fourth" of his property; but, on the contrary, was a necessary and proper Act.

The questions and answers are as follow:

COMMITTEE ROOM, SESSION 1840.

JAMES H. PETERS, Esquire, Solicitor General, called in and examined:

Q. "Are you a land Agent, and for whom?"

A. "I am the agent of my father-in-law, Mr. Cunard."

Q. "Have you settled any persons on the lands (of Mr. Cunard) and on what terms?"

A. "I have given leases for about eight thousand acres this last year."

Q. "On what terms were these tenants or occupiers settled?"

A. "Those who had been there a number of years, on leases of nine hundred and ninety-nine years, at one shilling sterling per acre."

Q. "What do you consider to be one shilling sterling?"

A. "I add one-ninth to the currency of the Island, and I consider this makes a sum in currency equivalent to the sterling."

Q. "If five pounds, sterling, be the rent of a farm, what sum in currency will be equivalent thereto, for payment of the rent of the leases you have given?"

A. "Five pounds eleven shillings and two pence, or thereabouts, of the currency of the Island."

Q. "If the matter be gone to the rigour?"

A. "Then I would not feel obliged to take the currency. I would take dollars at five shillings, and add one-ninth; that is, I would

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take £5 11s. 2d., in dollars at five shillings.

Q. "Is the Committee to understand that the tenants, under your leases, must pay in dollars at five shillings?"

A. "I do take, at present, all moneys current in the Island, but could enforce a legal tender as before explained."

Although the Act 17 Vic. cap. 6, complained of by Sir Samuel Cunard, was passed in 1854, since which time many leases have, I presume, been granted to tenants on his estates, reserving rent in sterling money of Great Britain. I believe it to be the fact, that neither Sir Samuel Cunard, nor any other proprietor, has ever required such rent to be paid other than after the rate mentioned in the Act.

This my Lord Duke is an important fact, evidencing the justice and propriety of the Act.

The proposal that rents which had been raised from one shilling to one shilling and sixpence per acre, should be reduced to one shilling, was, as was clearly stated in the proposals, intended as a means of carrying out the "remission of all arrears prior to May, 1858," as awarded by the Commissioners.

It now remains, my Lord Duke, to consider the "Draft Bill," submitted to your Grace by Sir Samuel Cunard.

The main feature in any Act, intended as a settlement of the Land Question, must necessarily be the rate at which every tenant shall have the right to convert his leasehold into freehold.

In the Act submitted, the rate of purchase is fixed higher than in the draft Bill previously furnished to your Grace by Sir Samuel Cunard; and although it is the same as is suggested in the plan of settlement laid down in your Grace's despatch of the 11th July last, the plan suggested in your Grace's despatch differs from that laid down in the draft Bill of Sir Samuel Cunard, in this material point, that the latter does not make any distinction, based upon the difference in the quality and value of the lands.

I respectfully submit, my Lord Duke, that if the leasehold tenures of Prince Edward Island are ever to be converted into freeholds, this end will not be accomplished by any Act which fixes an uniform rate of purchase, without

recognizing the differences which exist in the quality and value of the land.

I deem it quite unnecessary, my Lord Duke, at the present time, to offer any observations upon the details of the Bill just submitted by Sir Samuel Cunard.

I am, my Lord Duke, most anxious that a settlement of the existing difficulties, arising out of the Land Question, should be arrived at, and I beg respectfully to request that your Grace will be pleased to call the attention of Sir Samuel Cunard to the third proposition of the delegates, and request that he will inform your Grace, whether that, or any similar proposition, will be agreed to by him, or by the large proprietors resident in this country.

My Lord Duke, the Legislature of Prince Edward Island have given the strongest evidence of their desire to settle the differences arising out of the relations of landlord and tenant, on just and equitable principles.

They, as is well known to your Grace, in their address to Her Majesty in 1859, prayed for the appointment of a Commissioner or Commissioners who should be authorised to enquire into the differences existing between landlords and their tenants, and to negotiate with the landlords for purposes of establishing the rate of purchase at which every tenant might be enabled to convert his leasehold into freehold; and also for a remission of arrears of rent, and to report the result of their inquiries and negotiations to Her Majesty the Queen.

The proprietors, not desiring a report which would not be binding on the parties, suggested the appointment, by the Queen, of three Commissioners, whose decision should be accepted by all parties as final.

The suggestion of the proprietors was adopted. The tenants, or the Legislature on their behalf pledged themselves to abide by the decision of the Commissioners, and three Commissioners were appointed wholly in accordance with the desire of the proprietors. They exhausted the materials for enquiring into the facts of the case, and in due time placed in your Grace's hands their decision.

This decision of the Commissioners was not such as pleased the proprietors, and they repudiated it, on the plea that the Commissioners

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had exceeded the authority intended to be conferred upon them.

The people of Prince Edward Island, my Lord Duke, were not, to any extent, responsible for the irregular manner in which the matter of the Commission would appear to have been conducted. They did all that was required of them. And now, my Lord Duke, they feel that they have been subjected to cruel disappointment.

The Commission, instead of reconciling differences between landlords and tenants, has had the contrary effect, and has with all, cost the colony a sum of money such as its limited resources could ill afford.

Although, my Lord Duke, the Commission failed to accomplish the settlement of the Land Question, and caused much excitement among the tenantry, they have, nevertheless, furnished your Grace with information as to the nature and extent of the evils which they attempted to remedy, such as cannot fail to be of essential service—information which, by reason of the eminent abilities of those by whom it was collected, and their entire disinterestedness, is entitled to be regarded as reliable.

From the returns furnished to the Commissioners by the agents of Sir Samuel Cunard, who is the most extensive proprietor of land in Prince Edward Island, the melancholy truth is revealed that, in 1860, the arrears due by his tenants were equivalent, on an average, to upwards of four shillings per acre on the entire area of his leased lands; and it is not too much to assume, as I have already stated, on the faith of Sir Samuel Cunard's recent communication to your Grace, in which he states that "many of his tenants are comparatively rich," that one-half of them are free from debt to their landlord.

On this assumption it must be granted that those who are indebted, are burthened with arrears of rent, equivalent to no less than eight years purchase of the reserved rent.

The report of the Commissioners also further shews that, on Sir Samuel Cunard's estates, on Townships 44, 45 and 46, the majority of his tenants do not raise from their farms, more than barely sufficient to keep them from starvation, and this, too, on the assumption that six and a half persons can be supported on seven

shillings sterling a week; and also that, taking the tenants throughout the Island, forty per cent do not procure from their farms a sufficiency of food.

My Lord Duke, a country so largely peopled, as is Prince Edward Island, by tenants, in such unhappy circumstances, cannot advance.

The effect of arrears of rent upon the tenants of Prince Edward Island, is, in the report, thus described:

"The tenant finds it to his interest to improve no more than he can help. Improvement would only invite purchasers. It is rather for his interest to take all he can get out of the land while the opportunity continues. In fact it is Ireland on a small scale."

My Lord Duke, wholesale evictions cannot, I presume, be resorted to. In Prince Edward Island many poor people, in various parts of the colony, have expended their youth and strength in clearing the forest, and are now, in their old age, deserted by their grown up sons, who naturally refuse to improve land which is charged with arrears of rent, in many cases quite equal to its freehold value. These persons, with wives and helpless children, are dragging out a miserable existence in a country where snow covers the ground for six months in the year, and where the cow, that supplies milk to the poor family, must be housed and fed for seven months of the twelve; and they cannot be thrust out into the highways to perish or become dependent upon public charity.

My Lord Duke, this picture is not an exaggeration. May I not add that a remedy for these evils is imperatively demanded.

High as may be the respect entertained for the legal rights of the land owners, there are cases in which they should give way to the requirements of "public policy."

The ministers of the Crown, in my opinion, would not have acted wisely had they sought to enforce the payment of the quit rents, after having allowed them to fall into arrear until they amounted, in many cases, to the value of the land in respect of which they were due. Under such circumstances they freely remitted them.

The example of Her Majesty's Government in their dealings with the defaulting proprietors,

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in the matter of the quit rents, first reducing them one half, and afterwards freely remitting many thousands of pounds, should, I respectfully submit, to some extent, commend itself to Sir Samuel Cunard and his fellow proprietors as worthy of emulation in their dealings with their tenants.

My Lord Duke, the tenantry of Prince Edward Island are already deeply indebted to your Grace for the great personal exertions hitherto made by your Grace to bring about a settlement of the Land Question as a remedy for the evils under which they suffer, and I have gone thus fully into the subject of these evils, feeling that it is one which affects directly the happiness of thousands of families, and indirectly, that of a colony which is under your Grace's care; and that it also is one upon which it is most desirable that your Grace should be fully and correctly informed.

I have also done so in the earnest hope that your Grace's sympathy and influence may continue to be exerted in support of the effort now being made to remedy those evils, which, owing their origin to the indiscreet exercise of the royal prerogative, have so increased, that they are no longer endurable.

SIR;

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 1st instant, transmitting an extract of one from Mr. W. H. Pope, and requesting that I would enable the Duke of Newcastle to answer Mr. Pope's enquiry as to whether the Prince Edward Island land proprietors, resident in this country, will be disposed to agree to the third proposition of the delegates from the Island, contained in their letter of the 28th October last.

In reply I beg to acquaint you, for the information of his Grace, that in my letter of the 14th November, in reply to the propositions submitted by the delegates, I was reluctant to trust myself to make any remark upon the third proposition, lest I should make some observation that might be deemed unpleasant, especially as the delegates hold the highest official situations in the Island, I therefore passed it over, merely stating that it was difficult to be understood.

Being now called upon specially to reply to this proposition, I will endeavor to explain what would be its operation.

A tenant holding a farm consisting of 100 acres, for which he is bound by his lease to pay £5 rent per annum, and to pay it annually, would, under this proposition, avoid paying his landlord, being encouraged thereby to do so, but would deposit his rent in the Bank, where he can get 6 or 7 per cent interest, and at the end of twenty years the accumulated rent and interest would amount to more than £150; this sum should in justice, belong to the landlord; but the tenant can then take £80 of it and demand from his landlord a deed in fee simple of his farm, and has the remainder of the £150 as a reward for dishonesty. The only large proprietor I have been able to communicate with, fully accords with the opinion herein expressed, and I am quite satisfied that the other proprietors, who are out of Town, will equally coincide with the view I have taken on the subject.

From the foregoing remarks, I think his Grace will readily admit that the proprietors in this country, and in the Island, cannot agree to the third proposition made by the delegates.

SIR;

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 7th instant, in which you transmitted me, by direction of his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, a copy of a letter from Sir Samuel Cunard, on the subject of the third proposition in the letter on the Prince Edward Island Land Question, which was addressed to his Grace by Mr. Palmer and myself, on the 13th October.

For the information of his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, I beg to communicate to you the following observations upon Sir Samuel Cunard's letter:

1. The third proposition of the letter referred to by Sir Samuel Cunard, would entitle a tenant holding under lease, and indebted in more than one year's rent, to demand from his landlord, at any time within twenty years, from January, 1864, the fee simple of his leasehold land, on payment, in one sum in cash, to such landlord, of sixteen years purchase of the reserved rent.

This proposition was intended to meet the case of those tenants who are indebted for rent in arrear, in sums, in many cases, exceeding the fee simple value of the lands, and who have heretofore paid little or no rent, and whose lands—unless emancipated from the arrears which, in the great majority of cases, the landlords cannot hope to recover—must remain in a most impoverished state, to the injury alike of the landlord and of the Colony.

Sir Samuel Cunard refuses to consent to this proposition, because its operation, he alleges, would be as follows:

"A tenant holding a farm consisting of 100 acres, for which he is bound by his lease to pay £5 rent per annum, and to pay it annually, would, under this proposition, avoid paying his landlord, being encouraged thereby to do so, but would deposit his rent in the Bank, where he can get 6 or 7 per cent interest, and at the end of twenty years, the accumulated rent and interest would amount to more than £150, this sum should, in justice, belong to the landlord; but the tenant can then take

£80 of it and demand from his landlord a deed in fee simple of his farm; and has the remainder of the £150 as a reward for dishonesty."

The foregoing statement of Sir Samuel Cunard, as to "what would be the operation" of the proposition in question, is absurd unless upon the two-fold assumption:

1st. That the tenant possesses the means of paying his rent, and

2nd. That there does not exist in the Colony a law, by virtue of which the landlord may compel such tenant to pay his rent, or in default thereof may dispossess him of his land.

That these assumptions are completely groundless, I think I shall have little difficulty in proving.

As to the first assumption—

I have already, in my letter to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, of the 18th of December, referred to the evidence afforded by the "Synopsis of the estate of Sir Samuel Cunard in Prince Edward Island," laid before the Royal Commissioners, and by them attached to their report to his Grace, from which it appears, beyond all question, that on some of the estates of Sir Samuel Cunard the arrears of rent due are equivalent to upwards of seven shillings an acre, for every acre leased; assuming that the tenants are equally indebted; and from the report of the Commissioners it further appears that the majority of these tenants are in abject poverty—that they do not produce from their farms sufficient to procure for them food and clothing; and from the same report, it also appears that, taking the whole tenantry of the Colony, there are forty per cent who do not raise from their lands a sufficiency of food.

As to the second assumption,—

The landlord in Prince Edward Island has the right, at all times, to distrain upon his tenant for rent in arrear.

In all cases where the amount of rent due is upwards of £7 sterling, the landlord can bring an action therefor against his tenant in the Supreme Court of the Colony.

In cases where the amount of rent due is under £7 sterling, and there is no distress

upon the lands, the landlord is allowed to proceed for the recovery of such rent against his tenant, in the small debts Court of the Colony.

The landlord can proceed by ejectment, in cases where there shall not be upon the lands of his tenant sufficient distress to countervail six months' rent.

All these remedies are available, and for years past have been freely resorted to by landlords.

If the tenant be in occupation of land from which he cannot raise a sufficiency of food, the landlord cannot of course get his rent; but, if the tenant have goods or chattels they may be distrained or taken under execution, or the landlord has the power, in the absence of distress, to dispossess the tenant and re-enter upon the lands.

Such being the remedies available by the landlord, it cannot be supposed for a moment that any tenant would be allowed to withhold his rent, and to act in the manner set forth in Sir Samuel Cunard's letter.

In Sir Samuel Cunard's letter to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, of the 14th November last, much stress was laid upon the operation of the Act 23d Victoria, cap. 16, upon proprietary rights.

Reference to the Act in question will satisfy his Grace that Sir Samuel Cunard is incorrect in his assertion contained in the letter last referred to, that "a landlord is not allowed to proceed in the small debts Court for the recovery of rent."

With as much propriety might it be said that a landlord is not allowed to proceed in the courts of this country, under the Imperial Act of 4th Geo. 2, cap. 28.

This Act contains a proviso that no proceedings shall be taken against the lands of a defaulting tenant, under this Act, unless there is not to be found upon his land sufficient distress to countervail six months' rent.

The Colonial Act of which Sir Samuel Cunard complains, contains a similar proviso.

If the landlord who seeks to recover rent in arrear, makes oath that there is not upon the lands in respect of which such rent is due,

sufficient distress to countervail a half year's rent, he may proceed by action in the small debts Court against his tenant.

The only restriction upon the landlord's proceeding by distress against his tenant, is imposed by the Act 6th Vic. cap. 19, which declares to the effect that horses and cattle, hay and straw distrained upon after the 1st December, shall not be sold until after the 1st June following, provided security be given for the due return of such horses and cattle.

In conclusion, I regret to say that I cannot construe Sir Samuel Cunard's communication on the subject of the proposals for the settlement of the Land Question, in any other sense than as indicative of unwillingness, on his part at least, to make any such reasonable concessions to his tenants as would afford that relief which is essential, in order to secure the Colony generally from those much to be dreaded evils, which necessarily result from wide-spread agrarian agitation.

MY LORD DUKE ;

1. I have the honor to transmit, herewith, duplicate copies of the Blue Book for the year 1862.

2. Notwithstanding the depression of trade which has prevailed since the commencement of the War in the North American Union, I have a favourable report generally to make of the state of the Colony.

3. The inhabitants are chiefly engaged in agricultural pursuits, sudden vicissitudes of fortune, do not therefore frequently occur; but there appears to be a gradual improvement in the culture of the soil, and new farm houses and buildings are invariably of greater pretensions than those which preceded them,—signs, I trust, of increasing prosperity.

4. There is one great source of wealth round the coasts of this Island which is almost neglected by its inhabitants. I allude to the Fisheries. During the summer months, hun-

dreds of Schooners are attracted to the shores of this Island from the neighbouring Provinces, and from the United States, while it is the exception to find a vessel belonging to this Island engaged in this occupation.

5. I shall now proceed to notice some of the Returns of the Blue Book, as compared with similar Returns of the previous year.

6. *Revenue and Expenditure.*—The Revenue of the Colony for the year (£25,861 13s. 5d.) fell short of that of the preceding year, by £2,144 12s. 9d. This decrease chiefly occurred under the head of Imports and sales of Public Lands.

7. The Expenditure for the year—£34,451 15s. 1d.,—was larger by £1,651 17s. 6d. than that of the preceding twelvemonth. This principally arose from an increased expenditure on Roads, Bridges and Wharves. The present arrangement by which the care and management of Roads and Bridges are entrusted to local Commissioners, is not, in my opinion, economical, nor is it satisfactory in its working; a measure which would transfer the general control of Roads and Bridges to a

competent Engineer, would, I am confident, prove a judicious one.

8. The Expenditure for the year was £8,590 1s. 8d. in excess of the Revenue.

9. I brought this inequality between Revenue and Expenditure, to the notice of the Legislature at the opening of the Session of 1863. The Legislature took steps which are likely to prove effectual towards improving the Financial condition of the Colony. It yielded to the Executive, the initiation of money grants in the Assembly. It diminished the Public Expenditure on Education,—an item which in 1862, absorbed £11,000, of the Revenue (£25,000), by giving to the several Districts power to raise part of the Teacher's salary by local assessment. It also increased the ad valorem duties on Imports. These points however will be considered more fitly in the report which will accompany the Blue Book for 1863.

10. The Public Debt at the close of the year 1862, was £54,803. To meet this debt, there were about 42,000 acres of Public Land in the hands of the Government, and the sum of £24,483 19s. 5d. was due as instalments on account of sales, bearing interest at five per cent.

11. *General Commerce*—The value of Imports for the year was £211,240 18s. 6d.,—an increase of £1,305 2s. 7d. on the value of those of 1861. The value of Exports was £150,549 2s. 1d. £12,565 5s. 9d. less than that of the preceeding year. The value, however, of 57 vessels of 7715 Tons, transferred to other Ports, is not taken into account.

There is a slight increase in trade with Great Britain, both in value of Exports and of Imports. In trade with the United States, the Imports have increased in value by £4,700. The Exports thereto, have decreased by £3,300.

13. *Public Lands*.—I enclose a summary of the accounts of the several Estates in the hands of the Government. All accounts in this return are in currency money, which is of 1-3 (one third) less value than sterling.

14. *Government House and Furniture*.—I have in accordance with Colonial Regulations caused a general report of the state of Government House and Furniture, to be inserted in the Blue Book. I may report that the House and Furniture generally, have been very considerably improved since my arrival in 1859.

The House is furnished partly by the Government, and partly at the expense of the Lieutenant Governor. The House and Government Furniture are under the control of a Committee appointed by the Legislature.

15. The ground on which the House is situated, forms part of a piece of ground consisting of about 80 acres of Land (plan of which I enclose), which in the year 1789 was granted by Lieutenant Governor Fanning to the Governor General, or in his absence to the Lieutenant Governor for the time being, for their "use and accommodation forever."

16. *Councils and Assemblies*.—In consequence of the Act to render the Legislative Council Elective, having received Her Majesty's special confirmation, I, on the 2d December, dissolved the existing Council by Proclamation. On the following day, I also dissolved the Assembly, which under the Quadrennial Act would have ceased to exist in the spring of 1863. The Elections for each of these bodies took place early in 1863.

17. *Military Expenditure*—The item of £414 for Volunteers, includes £266 13s. 4d. granted for the Volunteer service. And the sum of £16 13s. 3d. the salary of the Adjutant General. The remainder is composed of extra grants made by the Legislature for various small items. It is gratifying to me to be able to report that notwithstanding the inadequate provision made by the Legislature towards the Volunteers; this force during the year increased in numbers and efficiency.

This is entirely owing to the patriotism and spirited conduct of the Volunteers themselves, who have necessarily under present circumstances to incur much expenditure, which in my opinion, should be defrayed from the Public Treasury.

18. I think it right to direct your Grace's attention to the state of the Militia Law.

In 1851, an Act was passed (14 Vic. cap. vi.) enacting that the Militia should not be liable to be called out for muster or training, except only in times of war, civil commotion, or other sufficient emergency.

Another Act was passed in 1858, (21st Vic. cap. ix.), which gives the Lieutenant Governor power to call out this force "whenever it shall,

in his opinion, be advisable so to do, by reason of war, invasion or insurrection, riot or civil commotion, or imminent danger of any of them."

The enrolment directed by the Act 3, Wm. IV., Cap. 30, appear to have been habitually neglected, and the Militia is in consequence completely disembodied.

19. I have no wish to call in question the wisdom of the Legislature, which in 1851, did away with the annual muster and training; but I trust that the present Legislature, may

ere long, take into consideration the changes which have occurred on the American continent, since that period, with a view to passing an enactment which will not only provide for the enrolment of men liable to service, but also for their annual muster and regular drill.

Report on the Volunteer Brigade of Prince Edward Island for the year ending 31st January, 1864.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY ;

In accordance with your Excellency's directions, I have the honor to submit a Report upon the Volunteer Force of this Province.

I regret that I am unable to state exactly the strength of this force owing to the great irregularity shewn by Officers commanding Companies in not forwarding their Quarterly Returns during the past year.

This is the more to be regretted, as it has in consequence been impossible to forward accurate Returns to the Imperial Government, as required by the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

I have by your Excellency's command issued a Circular of date 30th January, 1864, stating your Excellency's intention of superceding any officer who is hereafter guilty of disobedience of the General Order (5th April, 1862) which requires these Returns.

There are 34 Companies enrolled ; 21 in the Queen's County Regiment ; 7 in the Prince County Regiment ; 6 in the King's County Regiment. The minimum establishment for a Company is 50 enrolled Members. Some companies have fallen below this strength, whilst others exceed it. During the Summer of 1863 all the Rifles were called in to be marked in accordance with instructions received from the Imperial Government. Major General Doyle sent the Armorer Serjeant 2-17th Regiment, with an assistant, to mark these arms ; and also consented that these Armorers should make any repairs which the Rifles,—some of which had been 3 years in service,—might require. In order to facilitate matters, further assistance was, at the Armorer's request, afforded by Bombadier Laird of the Charlottetown Artillery and Rifle Company.

Armorer Serjeant Miller, with assistants, was engaged in marking and repairing Arms from 16th June to 19th August, when the Armorer Serjeant received orders to rejoin his Regiment. At his departure 1289 stand had been marked, and the greater part of them repaired. Bombadier Laird has since been engaged in completing the repairs, and in marking the remaining Rifles. There still remain about 80 stand to be marked. A considerable saving of expense will for the future be effected, in consequence of Bombadier Laird being resident in the Island, and being competent to make the ordinary repairs, of which Rifles in use stand periodically in need.

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While the Rifles were being marked, Lieut. Col. McKinstry was sent to inspect them on behalf of the Imperial Government. The Arms on the whole were in better order than might have been expected. The Armorer Sergeant's account, including assistant's travelling expenses, and board and lodging, etc., was £99 12s. 3½d; of this sum about £30 is due from the Imperial Government, as the marking was done under its orders and its expense.

Most of the Arms have been reissued to the different Companies. Each Captain is liable for the Rifles, &c. issued to his company. In one case a Rifle was given to a member of a company by its Captain, and this member was allowed to make an alteration in the stock, on the understaking, that he should pay the value of the Rifle if called upon to do so. It is obvious, that in so doing the commanding officer exceeded his authority, and it cannot be too strongly impressed upon commanding officers, that the Arms are a loan to the Province; that the Colonial Legislature has by law enacted that the Commander-in-Chief may direct these Arms, and also accoutrements to be issued under such regulations as he may deem necessary.

Although the Commander-in-Chief takes a Bond from the Captain of each Company for the value of the Arms, &c. issued to him, it must be clearly understood, that the Commander-in-Chief has no authority to sell these Arms, &c.; that to detain them for private purposes, or to alter them in any way is unwarrantable, and that notwithstanding, that the value of the article be claimed on its non-production, the article itself is liable to be re-claimed, as Her Majesty's property, whenever it is discovered.

From a detailed account of the expenditure of the past year, it appears that

1. £99 12s. 3½d. was expended in marking and repairing arms.
2. £91 12s. 5d. was expended on drill instruction.
3. £222 0s. 5½d. was paid for military stores and their carriage from Halifax.
4. £30 was paid for services of Inspector General; £10 for travelling expenses and remuneration of Assistant Inspector.
5. £54 0s. 1½d. was paid for various items, including £35 rent of Armory, £10 4s. 9d. expenses attending prize shooting, and the balance £8 16s. 2d. for small incidental expenses.

The above expenditure is £507 6s. 1d., apparently £107 6s. 1d. in excess of the appropriation for the year; but there was a balance in hand (after deducting amount paid for certain expenditure of 1862 which was not paid until after the accounts for that year were submitted) of £48 3s. 4d. of the appropriation for 1862.

A sum also of £79 17s. 3d. has been paid by companies for ammunition, leaving a balance of £20 14s. 6d. £30 is also due from the Imperial Government.

With regard to No. 2. £91 12s. 5d. was expended on the drill of the following companies:

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Your Excellency received Reports of Inspections from which it appeared that many of the other companies to which it had not been found practicable to send Drill Instructors, were drilled by their own officers, and showed considerable efficiency; under these circumstances your Excellency determined to equalize the expenditure on each company as far as possible, and instructed me by order, 29th December, 1863, to set aside £5 out of the grant for 1863 as an allowance under certain conditions for each of the Companies, which had not been provided with drill instruction from head quarters.

These allowances to the amount of about £70 had not all been paid at the time of the making up of the accounts for 1863, and are not included in those accounts.

With respect to the item for ammunition, the only charge, (with the exception of a small amount of blank cartridge) which has as yet been enforced by the Imperial Government for ammunition, whether for large guns or for rifles, is the one included in this item, £215 2s. 4½d; of this about £75 appears to be an over charge made by the Military Store Department, at Halifax, which it will be requested to refund. Deducting this, £140 is the whole amount which the Colony has been called upon to pay. Of this the Volunteers themselves have paid £79, and there is ammunition in store to the value of at least £50.

Towards the payment therefore of all the ammunition which has been used in this Province, since the organization of the Volunteer Force, whether for field pieces or rifles, at practice or at prize shooting, the Public Funds have contributed about £10. The remainder has been given by the Imperial Government, (with the exception of the amount to the value of £79 sold during the past year, and paid for by the Volunteers themselves.)

The Imperial Government has in all given 14,000 Rounds of Rifle Ball Cartridge to the Volunteers of Prince Edward Island.

I may summarize as follows, the support given by the Imperial Government which has not been confined to the gift of ammunition alone.

In 1859, it sent 1,000 stand of arms and accoutrements complete; and gave 100,000 rounds of ball cartridge.

In 1860, 3 iron 9 pounder guns, with a supply of ammunition; 50 Cavalry swords, with belts, &c

In 1861, 4 brass field pieces, with a supply of ammunition; 50 Infantry swords; 400 rifles and accoutrements.

In 1862, it remitted a charge of £900, including a charge for 40,000 rounds of ball cartridge.

It could not be expected that the Imperial Government would continue this support, and the Province is now called upon to pay for all the stores which are issued to it.

It may not be out of place to represent the disadvantages, as regards the support they receive from public funds, which the Volunteers are under in this Island, as compared with the Volunteers of the neighboring Provinces.

In Nova Scotia the Grant for 1863 was £6,000, (P. E. Island Currency) a considerable portion of this was, however, expended on the Militia.

Each Volunteer Company received a contingent allowance of about £9, 40 round of ball cartridge per man, targets, and Drill Instructors. Effective members are also exempt from Statute Labor. In New Brunswick the grant was £3,000, all expended on Volunteers except £125, the allowance to Adjutants of Militia Battalions.

Each Company received a contingent allowance of £24, 60 round of ball cartridge per man, and 600 rounds of ball cartridge per Company. Cloth for their uniforms and drill instruction. Effective members are also exempt from Statute Labor.

On drill instruction alone, £1,000 was expended in that Province during the past year.

The whole grant appropriated by the local Legislature of this Island,—£400 for the Volunteer service—would just suffice to allow 60 rounds of ball cartridge for each of the 1,400 rifles lent by the Imperial Government.

It reflects the highest credit on the Volunteers themselves, that receiving, comparatively speaking, so little support from public funds, they have been able to hold their own with the

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more favored Volunteers of the other Provinces. I need hardly allude to the occasion on which they have competed with the rifle. Two out of three Inter-colonial prizes won by Island Volunteers, remain a testimony to their proficiency.

To expect that they will keep pace with their neighbors in drill is out of the question, unless the Legislature makes a grant which will enable your Excellency to support a Staff of Drill Instructors, similar to those in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Your Excellency has recently determined to throw upon the Officers commanding Companies the responsibility of providing for the drill of their several corps. This step was deemed advisable on account of the impossibility of furnishing a sufficient Staff of Instructors from Head Quarters, out of the present grant. Your Excellency was also anxious to encourage a spirit of self reliance among the officers themselves, by offering every inducement to them to instruct their own companies. Few of the corps are now without effective members who might with great advantage impart to others the knowledge of drill which they have themselves acquired.

By your Excellency's command, I announced to the officers commanding companies, that (in the event of the Legislature making a grant sufficient for the purpose) £12 paid half-yearly would be the allowance for each company of 50 enrolled members, that a deduction of 5s. would be made for every man under this number, not present in uniform at each half-yearly Inspection.

That £5 would be the allowance for each subdivision, *i. e.*, corps where enrolled members do not exceed 49. That a deduction of 5s. would be made for every man under 28, not present in uniform at each half-yearly Inspection.

The success of this plan must depend in a great measure, on the Inspection which will take place in the months of August 1864, and January 1865. All the arms, &c., which are in the possession of the several corps are to be produced at these inspections, and a deduction made from the allowance, for any damage which may have arisen, and also a deduction of the value from any which are not forthcoming.

Your Excellency has intimated to me your intention of being present yourself, at as many of the Inspections as your Excellency may be able to attend, during the ensuing Summer.

A difficulty of a serious nature is likely soon to arise from the uniform of the longest established Corps requiring to be replaced.

In New Brunswick, cloth is supplied gratis. It would be a great encouragement, and an encouragement which, I may venture to say, the old companies deserve, if cloth could be furnished here to them without charge, but at present the grant is insufficient.

It would, however, I believe, be a saving to the Volunteers if a supply of cloth was imported for resale, at cost price to the Volunteers. The War Office I understand, supplies Red Serge, double width, and a fast color, at 2s. 11d., sterling, per yard. The application to be made by 1st June, the article to be served out 1st November following. A further saving might be effected by the making up of the uniform being contracted for.

I have alluded to the support given by the Imperial Government. I cannot conclude this Report without also alluding to the encouragement which has been given by the influential classes in the community.

The support of the Imperial Government has to a certain extent been withdrawn, for ammunition is no longer supplied except on payment. The individual expenditure of the Volunteers must therefore be considerably increased, for it is out of the question to issue ammunition gratis, unless the appropriation made by the Legislature is very considerably increased.

Under these circumstances, support and encouragement are the more needed from the people of the Colony.

The Volunteers give their time and provide their own uniforms. They have in addition, to pay for every round of ammunition which they fire, and to meet numerous incidental expenses.

It is reasonable to expect that those who do not give their time should contribute in some way to the movement.

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The spirit is good, and the material second to none ; but to prevent the Volunteer Force from degenerating into a few isolated corps in the wealthier Districts, a certain amount of pecuniary assistance is indispensable.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE,
27th August, 1863.

The Board were summoned to meet this day, to take into further consideration, the despatch of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, on the subject of the Land Question. When after mature deliberation of the subject, the Board expressed their opinion, that two gentlemen should be appointed to proceed to England for the purpose of conferring with His Grace the Duke of Newcastle on the subject of His Grace's Despatch, and to suggest to His Grace, as a proposition for the settlement of the Land Question, the subject of the following resolutions.

RESOLUTION No. 1.—That all arrears due on the first May 1858, be remitted.

RESOLUTION No. 2.—That all Tenants holding under Leases granted for terms of forty years and upwards, shall have right to fee-simple, on payment, within twenty years from this date of all rent due and of fifteen years purchase.

RESOLUTION No. 3.—That within same period, such tenants who may be indebted in arrears to have same rights at sixteen years purchase, including remission of all arrears of rent.

RESOLUTION No. 4.—That all rents which have been raised above one shilling sterling per acre, since the granting of the original Leases, shall be reduced to the rent reserved in the original Leases of such Lands when leased in a wilderness state.

RESOLUTION No. 5.—That the Executive Government be empowered to propose, as a solution of the Land Question, the resolutions just passed, and that such proposal be made through the Agency of two Delegates who should be empowered to proceed to London without delay, and be authorized to accept the terms of such propositions, if to be had. In the event of any modification of such Resolutions being suggested, the same to be reported by such Delegates to the Executive for their approval.

The Honorable Mr. Attorney General, and the Honorable the Colonial Secretary were then appointed Delegates, who were requested to proceed to England as a Delegation from this Board, for the purpose stated in the fifth Resolution.

DEAR SIR;

In compliance with the Order of the Board, dated the 5th ultimo, I address you. I submitted before Statistics of several schools inspected in course of my tour through the Western section of my Circuit; now I respectfully submit the accompanying supplementary sheets, comprising Statistics of Schools in the Murray Harbor and Belfast Districts.

As the harvest work commenced immediately after hay-making, the attendance in all the schools was small, with few exceptions, the children present were very young, and learning the elements of the lowest branches; they were evidently assembled to keep up the average.

I visited Murray River District, and after the examination of the school, I proceeded to the neighboring settlement to inquire among disinterested persons if the division of the district was expedient, and provided two schools would be established, could the complement of scholars, as the Statute prescribes, attend each school.

I travelled through the settlement in several directions; then called a public meeting of the inhabitants, when the site of the new school-house was amicably determined, with the exception of one person.

The school-house erected in the lower end of the settlement is a neat building; if it will be finished and furnished as reported to me, it will be comfortable and convenient.

I received a letter from Alexander McLean, William Ross and A. McWilliams, Esquires, suggesting that I would recommend the establishment of a minor school in Culloden; I visited that and the adjacent settlements, Sconser, &c., accompanied by the Rev. D. McNeill, who

has promised to attend a public meeting in these localities when the people can attend ; in order to make the necessary arrangements for their mutual benefit.

Great changes have taken place in the condition and circumstances of the people since the passage of the law authorising the establishment of Free Schools. The same arrangements that were convenient then, are inconvenient now.

I travelled through the districts which Messrs. McLean, Williams and Ross were commissioned to inspect, I know that many in several settlements are opposed to the changes proposed by them.

In this connection I refer to disputes in the Toronto and the St. Mary districts. Many of the people and some of the Trustees are very dissatisfied with their teachers.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

GENTLEMEN ;

I submitted last year, a concise outline of the prominent features of the past history of public education, in contrast with the distinguishing characteristics of the improved system in operation.

When Free Schools were established, the frame work merely, of the new system was constructed ; the Normal School instituted ; provision made to pay the salaries of teachers out of treasury, and the " District System " adopted. From year to year owing to the extension of schools ; the multiplication of teachers ; disputes about the settlement of the proper sites for school-houses, and the dimensions of Districts, together with the difficulties of emerging, accumulating expenditure of the General Revenue accrued so that at last, the continuous claims made on the Government to sustain the Educational Department necessitated an expedient to attain the ends which persons in earnest about popular education had most at heart.

When the Statute was revised it was generally supposed that the amendment imposing upon the inhabitants of Districts supplementary aid to teachers would excite a popular panic, a school-masters' rebellion ; however, the antagonism and murmuring are subsiding, and soberer and more practical views succeeding.

To disabuse the minds of such as think, that this device to provide for teachers, is a perversion of the principles on which " Free Education " is based, I advert to the sources from which a Revenue for the maintenance of this system in Massachusetts is obtained.

Local taxation there is the main source of supply. The inhabitants of towns are required, at the annual meetings, " to raise such sums of money for the supply of schools as they judge necessary, which sum shall be assessed in like manner as other town taxes."

It is of course conceivable, that a municipality may, under the impulse of short-sighted parsimony or some other disturbing cause, neglect or refuse to make the necessary financial provision. For such contingency the law has a sufficient remedy. Any guilty of this dereliction of duty, shall forfeit a sum equal to twice the highest sum ever before voted for the support of schools therein.

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The extent to which it is found necessary to enforce this law, and also of the degree in which the citizens of this State appreciate the advantages of education, may be estimated from the fact, that the appropriation made by the towns, in the year 1860, amounted in the aggregate to a sum four times as large as would have been sufficient to satisfy the legal requirement.

But the schools enjoy another source of income, supplementary to local taxation. There is what is called "the Massachusetts School Fund."

In Canada, the Public Schools are likewise supplemented on a similar basis, so that the amendment relating to local contribution, in our Revised Act, coincides with the law for the maintenance of Free Schools in countries in which the system has been adopted.

Our new law has not yet had a fair trial, as many of the School-masters now teaching had been engaged before it came into operation. There are many trained teachers applying for employment when vacancies occur, sufficient time should therefore be allowed to test the provisions of the law for the advancement of education with efficiency and economy; and this year ought to be regarded as one of transition. The hasty abandonment of the profession by some of our teachers would be a serious loss. The position of several may be affected at first, but will in due time recover itself. Certainly the profession of a teacher should be one of such honor and advantage that men will make personal sacrifices to fit themselves for it.

Such as intend to relinquish the profession, have prospects of more remunerative occupations, and although the inducements to enter it are not tempting; yet, there is no lack of youth of both sexes, who have been trained and licensed, to supply the demand for teachers, and keep the schools in operation.

In Cardigan, commendable arrangements have already been made to erect a commodious school-house. T. Owen, Esquire, has given sufficient space for the building, and guaranteed liberal aid to finish and furnish it in suitable style. Similar provisions to sustain efficient schools is being made in other localities.

In fact, the measures being initiated in some localities are encouraging indications, that ere long, the salaries of teachers will be raised, and the profession elevated to its legitimate status in public estimation.

It is to be regretted that in some places of late, through favoritism and family influence, persons have been preferred to appointments, and candidates of superior qualifications rejected, in such cases disreputable artifices, in providing supplementary aid, have likely been practised; the experiment to ascertain what results the spontaneous efforts of the people will achieve, depends, in a great measure, on the perseverance and aptitude exemplified by school-masters.

It is true that our teaching-staff is in the meantime chiefly composed of young men, who prepared themselves for the profession in the Normal School, and are wanting in experience. The old maxim, "docentes discimus," teaching we learn, is sound philosophy.

Our best teachers, who are reported to have resolved to relinquish the profession in which they have labored skillfully and successfully, entered in it without any special training. Aptitude to teach is an indispensable qualification. A distinction should be made between such as assume the profession as a stepping stone to some other occupation, and those who choose it for permanent employment.

With the general body of the teachers, in my circuit, there is reason to be satisfied; of several of the more experienced, I can speak with approbation and respect; the faults of a few of the older are to be attributed to age and want of training.

As there is no "Career" in the vocation, it cannot be in a thoroughly thriving condition.

What reward awaits eminence? What provision is there for old age? But it is difficult to devise a scheme adequate to stimulate school keepers to aspire to excellence.

The institution of sub-inspectorships and the preferment of experienced teachers to such appointments, would perhaps raise the ardent and able, and animate them to cherish the spirit and ambition of professional emulation.

Professional work of any kind is always best performed by men who have made the principles and practice of the particular profession a special subject of study. Inspection as it must in the meantime be conducted, can only arrive at general conclusions, it cannot pretend to test the specific progress and attainments of each scholar, and a man must be an educator to some extent at least, in order to form a correct judgment of the merits of schools, and the results of education. Special preparation and practical experience are requisite to attain excellence in any art or profession.

The character of teachers and schools has received great improvement within the last few years. This important change has been brought about through the instrumentality of the Normal School.

SPELLING.—In this important branch, visible improvement has been made, in the last two years, by means of dictation lessons. The exercises might be rendered very attractive and interesting by various methods, if suitable black-boards would be furnished. It is a well known fact, that many who can spell words correctly when standing in a class, are not able to write them with accuracy.

READING.—Special attention is now given to this branch, “the key of knowledge,” by most of teachers who have drilling exercises, on derivation, meanings, pronunciation, and simultaneous reading. In schools in which instruction in vocal music is a regular practice, there is generally an improved style of reading, as greater attention is given to the modulation of the voice.

WRITING.—The decided improvement, that has been made during the last year in this art may be fairly attributed to the practice in dictation.

ARITHMETIC.—The method of teaching this important branch is unchanged, in some schools there are oral exercises in mental calculations, but it is to be regretted that book-keeping is almost entirely overlooked.

GRAMMAR.—The old process of teaching on Lennie’s system is still followed. Morrell’s method of analysis has not yet been adopted, though it has been a prominent branch of study in the Normal School.

GEOGRAPHY.—The classes are taught on the old routine of examination, on the Hemispheres. In some schools Lovell’s Geography is used, but there is a culpable neglect in almost all of them of the history and typography of our own Island, and none of them have a map of the neighboring provinces.

The tabulated Returns indicate in detail, the attendance, the subjects and course of instruction of which the following synopsis is a

STATISTICAL SUMMARY:

Register, 4258; Present, 2512; Algebra, 43; Mensuration, 42; Geometry, 13; Grammar, 1024; Geography, 1288; Book-keeping, 45; Arithmetic, 2214; Composition, 155; Copies, 1607; Dictation, 1480; Reading, 4258; Holy Scriptures, 1506.

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The accommodations provided in the districts, lately established, are decidedly superior in every respect, to the old log-houses which have served their time. The new houses, on Lot 49, and in the Murray River settlements, deserve distinctive notice.

There are urgent applications for minor schools from Union Road, Lot 51, and Culloden, Lot 62. The inhabitants of Pleasant Valley, Lot 62, insist on the establishment of their settlement as a regular district.

In view of these and other demands that may be expected, I suggest that contiguous districts containing but few children would be united, as ten or twelve scholars do not justify the keeping up of a separate organization. The employment of females in such localities would be less expensive than that of males. The chief objection to this suggestion is, that a young woman is not able to control rough boys, but males are not generally preferable to females, in the art of teaching or preserving order, I am persuaded that females would be advantageously employed in many districts; moreover, that our schools with rare exceptions, would be less expensive and equally efficient if this class of teachers would be adequately sustained.

It is not to be supposed, from my commendations of teachers and schools, that in my estimation our system of education has attained the perfection at which we should aim; it does not become us to boast of success or rest satisfied with what has been accomplished, while there are so many deficiencies to be supplied, errors to be corrected, and improvements to be made; some of the imperfections to which I refer may be easily corrected, others must be left to time and a more enlarged experience, to discover and remedy.

There were only 14 children present, seated around the stove on rickety forms—judging the organization from the proficiency of the children examined, it is notoriously imperfect. The statistics were given from memory by the teacher, who informed me that he had forwarded his Register to the Board, on the 22d instant (March), and had been engaged for another year, the Trustees having promised to make the necessary provisions to fulfil the requirements of the Act. I told him he would not be allowed to keep the school open in such a disreputable condition, and advised him to report my opinion without delay to the Trustees, as I was bound to acquaint the Board with the glaring deficiencies, and the renewal of his engagement.

6. I regret that no statistics of this school could be obtained. The teacher exerted himself with extraordinary persistency to sustain it, but he labored in vain; he paid two-thirds of the cost of the building; provided books, &c., although the people did not appreciate his services, yet he succeeded, by ingenious devices, to have the average attendance that secures the Government salary. At last, some of the people interested in the school, expressed to me their dissatisfaction with Mr. Brooks--the objectionable election of Trustees, and intimated that it was desirable to close the school until it could be re-organized according to law. Persons in the immediate neighborhood approved of this expedient. I devoted some time in investigating this case, and had a conference with the persons acting as trustees, the teacher, and a few of the parents of the children enrolled in the school-house, (which was at that time in a wretched condition), to whom I intimated that the school should be discontinued until the Board would decide the questions in dispute.

The inhabitants, with few exceptions, formerly resided at Belle Creek, they are evidently enterprising and energetic. They removed their small Chapel from Belle Creek, to a central site in the settlement. Some interested in the school told me they wished to open it under the management of one of the McPhail family, and that, in course of two or three months, the new building would be finished and furnished. I suggested an application for that privilege to the Board.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR THE ISLAND OF PRINCE EDWARD.

GENTLEMEN ;

In submitting to you my first quarterly report, on the schools in the Western Division of the Island, I feel considerable hesitation in expressing any decided opinion on the condition of every school visited—the method of teaching practised therein—and whether the provisions of the several Acts, and the orders of the Board, have been complied with. I have visited seventy-two schools since my appointment in May last ; but, before entering fully into these particulars, I think it will be necessary to repeat my visits, more especially, as I have not any copies of the orders which may have been issued by the Board.

I have much pleasure, however, in bearing testimony, so far as my limited experience enables me to do so, to the improvement in the general character of the school teachers. The young men trained in the Normal School do credit to that Institution ; and those teachers who have not had that advantage, have adopted the system recommended in most respects, and have profited, I believe, from the knowledge acquired during their attendance on the Board.

APPENDIX (N.)

It is difficult, on a single visit, to judge accurately of the condition of a school, or the method of teaching; so far as the most accurate and careful examination I could institute enables me to do so, the system appears to be but little varied, and that in no material points; the education given to the children seems to be sound as far as it goes; and pains are, I think, taken to make them thoroughly understand the books placed in their hands, and the branches of learning in which they are instructed. The season of the year, however, at which this, my first examination has taken place, is extremely unfavorable to the arriving at a correct conclusion in these respects; almost all the more advanced scholars were absent, being necessarily engaged in agricultural labors; and their places were supplied by a junior class, who were mostly in an elementary stage of instruction. The numbers too have been much below what I understood to be the usual average attendance in every instance, and thus the statistical information sought for by the Board will be imperfect. Another cause which has diminished the attendance in the north-west part of the Island, has been the prevalence of the Whooping Cough, which has had a very material effect in this respect.

I have adopted the plan of taking full minutes of the result of the examination of each school, for my own information and future guidance; and these minutes shall be at the service of the Board if they require them. As, however, they are somewhat diffuse, I subjoin an abridged Schedule, containing only the general results, taken, I fear, imperfectly in many instances, but which my next circuit will enable me to correct. In preparing this Schedule, I have not thought it necessary to particularize each class, or its progress, as I have done in the more extended list.

The state of the school-houses, though evidently much improved of late, still requires much attention. In some instances, I am happy to say in but few, they are still wretched hovels, so contracted in space and height, as to be most injurious to the health both of the teachers and scholars; I have noticed this in one of the columns of the Schedule, and have, in these cases, addressed a note to the trustees, urging their immediate attention.

In the north-west part of the Island, a new arrangement of the School Districts, in consequence of changes in the roads, and of new settlements arising, would be most beneficial if it could be effected by common consent. I have alluded to this in my correspondence with the Board, and some of the inhabitants are most anxious for such an alteration. I think the benefits of education may thus be more widely diffused, without materially increasing the charge on the public revenue. I was much pleased to see a desire for instruction, and that in English, springing up among the French inhabitants of these districts.

The supply of books and other school requisites, is a matter of some difficulty in this remote neighborhood; and I have found many of the schools very deficient in these respects. I think means might be devised to remedy this want, but I am not at present prepared to make a suggestion.

I cannot close my report without remarking on the irregular attendance of the children at the schools, and the early age at which they are required for the labors of the field. The latter obstacle is perhaps unavoidable and irremediable in this country, where labor is scarce and expensive, and where the seasons are short; but their irregular attendance while nominally at school can only arise from indifference on the part of the parents to the education of their children. To remove this indifference should be the earnest endeavor of all who are friendly to the spread of education among the people; and what well informed person is not, at the present day, most anxious for its general diffusion.

Much might be done by the trustees, but they too often partake of the general apathy; though in some instances, I have pleasure in recording, the attendance of several of them at my examinations, and in noticing the interest they took in the results.

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This subject is important, and well deserves the attention of the Board, whose experience and acquaintance with the Island will, no doubt, enable them to devise a mode of alleviating, if not of remedying the evil.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION, CHARLOTTETOWN.

GENTLEMEN;

During the past quarter I have visited sixty-three schools; the particular results as to each will be found in the subjoined Schedule.

The season of the year, during which I necessarily completed my circuit, was peculiarly unfavorable to the attendance of the scholars; and it was rendered still more so by the uncertain weather which prevailed during the last harvest. Every child that could be of use in gathering up the grain was employed in the harvest field, and the schools were composed generally of the younger members of families, so that my examination does not by any means afford correct data as to the state of education throughout the western portion of the Island. In more than one instance, children were sent for from the school, on the weather clearing up in the afternoon, to assist in binding or turning the grain, which would otherwise have received serious injury. I am sorry, however, to be obliged to add, partly from my own observation, and partly from the information of the teachers, that the general attendance is by no means so regular as it ought to be; and I have endeavored to suggest some means by which an evil, so detrimental to the progress of the children may, at any rate, be palliated. It has occurred to me, and I am borne out in my opinion, by the concurrence of nearly every person, especially the trustees, whom I have consulted throughout my district, that the autumnal vacation should be extended to three weeks, instead of two as at present; and that the trustees of each school district should be empowered to fix the time, either in the months of September or October, or partly in one and partly in the other, instead of being restricted to the latter month alone. Thus the wants of each district might be better supplied according to its local circumstances; the children would be released from school during the height of harvest, or during potatoe digging, or partly for the one and partly for the other; and there would be less inducement to the parents to keep them at home at different times; a practice which, by separating the members of a class, not only retards the progress both of these present and the absent, but, in a large school, greatly increases the difficulties and labor of the teacher. Of course the School Visitors would, in this case, so arrange their circuits as not to visit during either of the months I have mentioned.

Another suggestion bearing in some measure on the same subject, has been made to me, on which I offer no opinion at present: that the daily averages should be taken half-yearly, instead of quarterly as at present. I have already stated the obstacles to a full, or even an average attendance in the autumnal quarter. In the winter quarter, the snow drifts and the state

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of the roads present difficulties to the attendance of young children, more especially in large and thinly settled districts, and in very many instances, the want of clothing, particularly of shoes—a want which, in country places, it frequently takes time to supply—prevents the school from being filled as it ought to be at that season. I have known, during my recent visits, quite young children to walk, barefooted, two miles through the snow to their school, and I also know that this is often a very serious cause of non-attendance.

I trust I shall be pardoned for expressing an opinion, formed perhaps somewhat hastily, but to which I have been led by the foregoing considerations, that the averages under the last Act of Assembly are somewhat too high, and that it would be a boon to the country if they were reduced, under proper regulations, to their former standard.

My further acquaintance with the schools in my division of the Island enables me to confirm my last report, as to the general efficiency of the teachers, the uniformity of the system pursued, and of the books made use of in each school, a note of which will be found in the 13th column of the Schedule.

Among the schools comprized in my present report, I have met with no school-house so bad as some of those I had occasion to mention in August last, but one or two are rebuilding; two or three others require it; and repairs and improvements are wanting in many—all these are particularized in the 15th column of the Schedule—Maps, either of the World, or of the Island, but chiefly of the latter, are deficient in many; and that useful assistant to the teacher, the black-board, has not been introduced in several. The 56th Sec. of the Act 24 Vic., Cap. 36, requiring the keeping a "Trustees Book" has been complied with by a few only of the trustees; and in some cases where one has been kept, it has not been left at the school-house. Perhaps this may often have been owing to the want of a proper repository, not only for this document, and for the teacher's journal, but even for the books of the scholars—a want which must of course tend to their rapid destruction. I have not failed to call the attention of the trustees to these deficiencies, and hope that in my next circuit I shall find that many of them have been remedied.

The want of books is a serious impediment to the proper management of the schools, and to the improvement of the scholars. This is more especially the case in the more distant sections of the Island, where there is no ready and immediate communication with Charlottetown. An issue of books to the trustees of any school district requiring it, at reduced or cost prices, would be beneficial; but it should be given only to those who may have provided a proper place in the school-house for their reception and safe custody. I have recommended the use of the 1st and 2nd Sequels to the 2nd Book of the Irish National Series for the younger children, in these schools where they had not been introduced.

The abolition of the Government allowance to Acadian teachers, thus putting the French population on precisely the same footing as their fellow subjects, was, I think, a judicious enactment, and it will tend most strongly to the general introduction of the English language in districts throughout which it has hitherto been of rare occurrence. I believe, indeed, that the most intelligent among the French are fully sensible of the disadvantage under which many of them have labored, from their ignorance of the language in which the business of the country is conducted. There are however some few localities (and they are not confined to the French inhabitants) in which it is difficult, if not impossible, to remunerate a licensed teacher to the extent required by the Act; and I suggest that in these cases, which may be considered as exceptional, a power should be vested in the Board for a limited period, to make a special grant, according to circumstances, to teachers, who, though not competent to instruct in the more advanced branches of education, may yet be able to give instruction in reading, writing, and arithmetic, and may be willing to accept employment for such a remuneration (added to the grant) as the inhabitants of these poor settlements may have in their power to bestow.

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Probably in a short time this would be unnecessary, and, it may then be advisable to place all on the same footing; I therefore suggest it as a temporary measure only to prevent the inconvenience arising from the sudden suspension of the schools in question.

I have ventured to submit these hints to the consideration of the Board, hoping that they may tend to the removal of those obstacles which retard the advancement of education throughout the Island, and to the diffusion of its advantages to the more remote districts, as well as to every class of its inhabitants.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

GENTLEMEN;

In compliance with the wish expressed at the December Meeting of the Board, I submit the returns of part of my second circuit which I have just commenced. It was my intention to have presented a more complete view of the state of education throughout the districts over which my inspection extends, but I find that this can only be done after repeated examinations. One great obstacle to this result is the change of pupils which takes place with the change of seasons; many of the scholars, who were present at my visits in the summer and autumn, are now absent, and their places supplied by others.

The Schedule embraces only a small proportion of the schools, but I will endeavor to extend it as soon as possible, so as to give the most ample information in my power as to the educational statistics of the districts in question.

The necessity of keeping a regular Record of the transactions of each School District, in the "Trustees Book," as required by the Act of Assembly, (to which I adverted in my last report) cannot be too strongly enforced on the trustees. This would be often the means of preventing discontent and disputes among the inhabitants, and would be most satisfactory, I apprehend, to the Board, as well as to the parties more immediately interested.

The state of the School Houses is another important point; two new ones have been built in the very limited number referred to in this report, and both of them appear to be well adapted for the purpose; others are proposed, and will, I hope, shortly be commenced.

I have endeavored to ascertain the effect of the provisions of the Act 26 Vic., Cap. 5, on the schools generally. So far as I have hitherto gone, I know of no school closed under the operation of this Act, except the Acadian schools, and with reference to them, four applications have been made through me for registry, in order that they may be placed on the footing of ordinary district schools. On the whole, I confidently hope that one effect of requiring a portion of the teachers' salary to be raised by the inhabitants, will be to ensure a more regular attendance of the children, and to excite a greater interest among the parents.

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It will be observed that in many of the districts, there appears to be a decrease of scholars since the last examination; this, I think, is owing in a great measure, to the fact that many of the scholars, from want of shoes or clothing, have not yet commenced their winter attendance.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR THE ISLAND OF PRINCE EDWARD.

GENTLEMEN ;

In the several reports I have already submitted to your consideration, I have gone so fully into the subjects which occurred to me as deserving attention, that I have little to add to my previous suggestions. My two first reports, embracing the whole of my first circuit, comprize 135 schools, but there were a few which, from various circumstances, I did not visit at that time. Subsequently, and on my second circuit, I have inspected 105; and I am now endeavouring to complete the examination of the whole, the statistical results of which shall, from time to time, be transmitted to your Secretary.

I will shortly recapitulate the matters which I consider most urgently to require your attention.

1st. The securing a more regular and punctual attendance of the children. I think the alteration I have proposed in the autumnal vacation, by lessening the inducement to parents to keep their children at home irregularly and at different times during harvest, would tend to effect this object.

2nd. An alteration in the averages—the taking them half-yearly, instead of quarterly—and reducing them, on proper conditions, to their former standard would, I think, be beneficial; and I find that the public opinion is very generally in favor of such a change.

3rd. The state of the school-houses in many instances, requires attention; several new ones have lately been built, and others are in progress; but there are still many but ill adapted for the purpose.

4th. The supply of books and maps at a cheap rate, and the providing a proper receptacle for them in each school-house, if it would be accomplished, could be most useful.

5th. The encouraging the registry of schools lately taught by the Acadian Teachers, and, if it could be obtained, an allowance, for a time, to schools of an inferior description in poor and thinly settled districts, would prevent many children from being wholly deprived of the benefits of education.

6th. A new and general arrangement of the School Districts, in many localities, would be advantageous, but this attended with considerable difficulty.

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On the whole, I can report favorably of the progress of education, especially in the important branches of reading, writing and arithmetic, throughout my division of the Island. A practical knowledge of book-keeping would be beneficial to many of the scholars in after life, and I have found this attended to in some few instances only.

CUSTOM HOUSE RETURNS.

CUSTOM HOUSE, CHARLOTTETOWN, PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND,

2nd April, 1864.

To His Excellency GEORGE DUNDAS, Esq., *Lieutenant Governor, Commander-in-Chief, &c. &c. of Prince Edward Island.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :

I herewith have the honor to submit to your Excellency the Annual Returns of Trade and Navigation for the Province of Prince Edward Island, for the year ending the 31st December, 1863.

The year 1863 has been an extraordinarily prosperous one for Prince Edward Island, owing principally, no doubt, to the very bountiful harvests with which God in His great mercy favored us, to the very remunerative prices our Agricultural Products obtained in the neighbouring Colonies and the United States, and to the high average price of Tonnage in the United Kingdom throughout the past year.

The total value of goods imported into Prince Edward Island in 1863 was £293,431 4s. 11d. sterling, against £211,240 18s. 6d. sterling in 1862, shewing an increase of £82,190 6s. 5d. sterling.

The Impost and Excise Duties on these goods amounted to £30,704 17s. 8d. sterling, against £25,704 6s. 5d. in 1862, shewing an increase of £6,000 11s. 3d. sterling.

The total value of goods exported from Prince Edward Island in 1863 was £209,472 9s. 6d. sterling, against £150,549 2s. 1d. sterling, in 1862, shewing an increase of £58,923 7s. 5d. sterling.

These returns shew that the value of the Imports into Prince Edward Island in 1863, exceeded the value of the Exports during the same year by £83,958 15s. 5d. sterling. This is accounted for by the fact that a large portion of the materials used in the construction and outfit of the new vessels built here for sale in the United Kingdom, appears in the accounts as imports, while the new vessels do not appear as exports.

APPENDIX (O.)

The new vessels built in Prince Edward Island during the year 1863, number 100, of an aggregate burthen of 24,991 tons old measurement. Calculating the value of this shipping at £5 sterling per ton, the amount of £124,955 has to be added to the general exports £209,472 9s. 6d. sterling—giving a total of £334,427 9s. 6d. sterling, exports, against £293,431 4s. 11d. sterling, imports, leaving a balance in favor of the Colony of £40,996 4s. 7d. sterling, for the year 1863.

The principal articles of export—excluding shipping—are agricultural products. Of these the following amounts were shipped during the year 1863.

Oats,	1,459,130 Bushels.

Potatoes,	408,122 “
Oatmeal,	201 Tons.
Dry Fish,	15,086 Quintals,
Pickled Fish,	7,570 Barrels.

The principal articles imported are Materials and Rigging, &c., for the new vessels built here, Cloathing of all kinds, Coal, Crockery, Flour, Ironmongery, Salt, Spirits & Wines, Tobacco, Tea and West India produce.

From the United Kingdom this Colony has imported nearly half its requirements, and to the United States it has exported rather more than half its products during the year 1863.

The new vessels built in Prince Edward Island for the past 34 years have averaged 70 vessels 11,934 tons for each year.

In 1854, 106 vessels, 24,111 tons, and in 1857, 104 vessels, 24,060 tons were built. As stated before, last year 100 vessels 24,991 tons were built, being the greatest amount of tonnage ever launched from Prince Edward Island in any one year.

The Revenue of Prince Edward Island for the year 1863 as appears by the Treasurers Accounts, amounted to £41,125 16s. 3d. sterling, being very nearly 35 per cent. in excess of any previous year.

The average Revenue for the past 10 years, 1853 to 1862, both years included, has amounted to £26,926 3s. 7d. sterling, yearly.

The expenditure of Prince Edward Island for the year 1863, amounted to £36,441 9s. 0d. being about £2,000 sterling, in excess of the previous year, but nearly £5,000 sterling, less than in 1860, and scarcely exceeding that of the years 1856 and 1854.

The average expenditure for the past 10 years, 1853 to 1862, both years included, amounted to £31,810 9s. 6d. sterling, yearly.

As to prospects of the coming year, it is impossible to predict with anything like a feeling of certainty, the protracted hostilities in the United States, and the agitated state of political feeling in Europe, alike preclude any certain inferences.

Report of the Honorable John Aldous, relative to a petition of certain inhabitants of Township No. 42, respecting a new line of road from the portage, Township No. 41, to Naufrage, Township No. 43, with a sectional sketch of Townships Nos. 41, 42 and 43, embracing the present and proposed road.

To His Excellency George Dundas, Esquire, Lieut. Governor in Council.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY ;

In accordance with instructions received from Your Excellency, relative to a petition from certain inhabitants of Township No. 42, respecting a new line of road from the portage, Township No. 41, to Naufrage, Township No. 43,

I beg to report, that I have inspected the present line of road as also the proposed new line of road, the present road is an excellent road, dry, free from hills, and difficulties of approach to the bridges thereon, the McAskel River and Hollow River bridges are slightly out of repair, and the Naufrage beach is much exposed, and doubtless, at certain seasons, and in its present state, must cause inconvenience in the crossing thereof.

The proposed line of road will require as many bridges as the present road, and more difficult of approach ; a large portion of the road (say 2½ miles) is swampy and wet, and its length I consider equal to the present road with one exception, (French Creek) all the bridges are built and nearly completed, the road is nearly cut through, but not any of it completed.

The petition praying for a new line of road, (presented to the House of Assembly, 1st April, 1861,) describes the present road as circuitous and expensive to maintain, unsheltered and dangerous to travellers. The proposed new line of road may obviate the two latter difficulties, (though I deem the danger is but seldom felt, and but little exceeds that of St. Peter's Bay,) the former are increased most decidedly as to expense. I find from the appropriations of ten years (1852 to 1861 inclusive) the average outlay was barely £30 per annum for roads and bridges from O'Hanley's to Naufrage including the beach, since which time, little or nothing has been expended on the present road or bridges, not even statute labor, so informed; still I deem the road good, and consider less than the usual average outlay would put all the bridges in excellent repair. I find the appropriation of 1862 for the new road, including

bridges and compensation to Dixon, £153; and for 1863, £63, which is deemed sufficient to complete the work throughout, that is, I presume to the division line of Townships Nos. 41 and 42, which terminates District No. 3; there will yet remain about 50 chains in District No. 2, to connect it with the portage road, Township No. 41.

Having submitted to your Excellency the foregoing statistics and statement, together with a sectional sketch of Townships Nos. 41, 42 and 43, embracing the present and proposed road; that the subject of the petition may be more clearly elucidated, I would beg to submit for your consideration whether it might not be deemed advisable to adopt as much of the proposed line of road as will avoid the danger alluded to in the petition of 1861, commencing East of Naufrage Beach to connect with the present road at Big Marsh road, and to relinquish any further extension of it westwardly across Township No. 42.

Copy of presentment of the Grand Jury for Queen's County at the last Hilary Term of the Supreme Court, suggesting an amendment of the Jury Act; an alteration in the time of holding the Supreme Court in winter, the establishment of a Justices County Court, with a criminal jurisdiction similar to that of the Police Court of the City of Charlottetown, together with remarks on the state of the County Jail, and the dangerous conduct of a convict therein confined, and the necessity of affording the keeper additional means of protection and safety.

MAY 14, PLEASE YOUR LORDSHIPS

The Grand Inquest of the County having concluded their labors, would present to the court the difficulty they have had in performing that part of their duty which requires them handing into the court the names of fit and proper persons to serve as Fence Viewers and Constables, part of the County was entirely unrepresented on the Jury, no Jurors having been present from Townships, Nos. 50, 57, 58, 60 and 62; they therefore suggest that the Jury Act be so amended as to remedy this evil.

The Jury would also suggest that were the time of holding the Court altered from the first to the last Tuesday in January, it would be a very great convenience to country Jurors as well as Suitors, Witnesses and others having to attend the Court. Concurring perfectly in the remarks of your Lordships in your charge that the Criminal Jurisdiction recently conferred on the Police Court of this City has tended to lessen materially the business of the Grand Jury and the Supreme Court, they would, if not out of place, suggest the propriety of a County Court with a similar Jurisdiction in Charlottetown, at the Quarterly or Monthly sittings of which, the County Magistrates could attend, taking with them or transmitting the informations laid before them of all petty larcenies, &c., with the recognizances of accused, at which court the accused if they so elected could be tried; this process would tend to lessen still farther the business of the Supreme Court and Jury, and in consequence, the expenses necessarily attendant on the trial of petty offences.

The Jury in visiting the County Jail was pleased to observe the degree of good order and cleanliness in which that establishment is kept, and with one exception, highly satisfactory, as far as means at command will admit. Confined in one of the cells is a prisoner, Wm. Young, under sentence of death, who on account of his dangerous and savage conduct has been the means of placing the keeper entirely at the mercy of the other prisoners, by his being obliged to procure their assistance to defend him from the furious attacks of the prisoner Young, while in execution of his duties.

APPENDIX (P.)

The Jury would therefore, respectfully present, that such a state of things ought not to exist, and hope such steps will be taken to place at the disposal of the keeper, means as will enable him to protect his life and that of the other prisoners, and provide for the safety of the building from the dangerous conduct of the prisoner.

Copy of presentment of the Grand Jury for King's County, at the March Term
of 1864, on the state of the Jail of that County.

To HIS HONOR JUDGE PETERS, &c., &c.

The Grand Jury having examined the state of the Jail of this County, as directed by your Lordship, have to report that the accommodation said Jail affords, is altogether unequal to the requirements of the County; for the following reasons: There are only two small rooms or cells for criminals prisoners of every shade or magnitude of crime; and none for female prisoners, nor any separate space in which to walk when in doors, wherein persons of different sexes can be kept apart, and in one debtors room as many as thirteen prisoners have been confined at one time during last year.

We also find one female prisoner whom the Jailor is obliged to allow sleep with his own children, and he at the same time having too scanty house room for himself.

We therefore humbly recommend that the present dilapidated and confined state of the Jail of this County be brought under the notice of the proper authorities of the Island, that the much required and most necessary enlargement or alterations be duly made.

To His Excellency Lieut. Governor in Council

The petition of the undersigned inhabitants of Township No. 42, King's County, humbly sheweth : That petitioners are very much dissatisfied with the way in which the public moneys and statute labor have been expended for (defaced) year in this part of the District. Although the Government is opening up a new line of road, to all appearance, and by the way things are conducted at present, neither new or old will be fit to travel upon.

This petition further sheweth that they consider it a hard case to be compelled to fence the new line of road, which will require one thousand rails for every ten chains, and also lose the crop of one acre of ground, when there is no prospect of the new road being fit for summer travel, for two or three years, unless the Government is prepared to grant £200 or £300 to bring it to a speedy completion, as the £50 appropriated for the eight miles of new road will not complete more than two of it, as there are nearly four miles of swamp, and a large part of that wilderness, which has to be stumped and straightened, as there are not two miles at present, which adds considerably to the eight miles ; the bridges also that are made are scarcely worth making a road to, as they are not in line with the road, and made of small round timber nothing but sap, which will stand a very short time. The bridge at Naufrage is nearly five chains in length, including abutments, which will require as much as all the bridges on the old road to keep it in repair, and all this unnecessary outlay to the country, in place of benefiting the people, is only causing dissatisfaction against the Government, and lawsuits between the people and Commissioners ; Your petitioners therefore, humbly pray, that your Excellency in Council will be pleased to send a competent person to examine the old and new line of road and report the state thereof to your Excellency before any more of the public moneys or statute labor be expended thereon ; and your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray, &c., &c., &c.

There were about 50 men travelled the road through with me on the day of sale, all of whom deemed the job too cheap.

Exparte the Government of Prince Edward Island.

This is a case for the opinion of Counsel on behalf of the Government of Prince Edward Island, principally as to the means of carrying out on behalf of the Tenants as against the Proprietors, a certain Report or Award of a Royal Commission appointed to enquire into the differences relating to the rights of Landowners and Tenants in the said Island, with the view to the settlement of the same on just and equitable principles.

In 1764, Prince Edward Island was divided into 67 Lots or Townships of about 20,000 acres each, and with the exception of three small reservations intended for three County Towns and the two Lots or Townships Numbers 40 and 59, were disposed of in one day, by lottery in London, before the Board of Trade and Plantations. In August, 1767, grants were ordered to be issued to the several Allottees and to contain certain terms and conditions among which were the following:—

The payment of a certain Quitrent, varying according to the several Lots, from six shillings to two shillings sterling, per 100 acres, payable annually, on one-half the grant, at the expiration of five years; on the whole, at the expi-

ration of 10 years from the dates of the grants, with reservations of such parts of each Lot, as might afterwards be found necessary for fortifications or public purposes, and of 100 acres for a Church and Glebe, and 30 acres for a Schoolmaster, lands on the sea shore, for free fisheries, and all Mines of Gold, Silver and Coals.

That the Grantee of each Township should settle the same within 10 years from the date of the Grant, in the proportion of one person for every 200 acres.

That if one-third of the Land, was not so settled, within four years from the date of the Grant, the whole should be forfeited.

On these terms the original Proprietors accepted their Grants,—the Island at this time being within the Government of Nova Scotia. In the year 1769, the Proprietors petitioned that the Island might be erected into a separate Government, and proposed, in order to defray the expense thereof, but half of the Quitrents which would not be payable until five years after the date of the Grant, (namely in 1772) should become payable from 1st May, 1769, and the payment of the remaining half, postponed for twenty years. This application was

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acceded to by his late Majesty's Government, and in 1770, the local Government was organized accordingly. One of the first acts of the Legislature, was the taking into consideration the nonperformance of the terms and stipulations of the Grants.

During the ensuing five years the Quit Rents were not paid as stipulated.

During the first 10 years, the terms of settlement, with reference to population, were complied with, only in certain Townships; but in no case do the settlers appear to have been foreign Protestants. In 1776, it having become evident that a fund dependent upon the payment of the Quit Rents was entirely too precarious to maintain the Local Government, his late Majesty's Government, on the application of the Proprietors, provided for the same, in the Annual Estimates, commencing on the 1st January, 1777. But the Lords of the Treasury at the same time, directed that all proper means should be taken to enforce the payment of the arrears and the accruing Quit Rents.

In 1851, Her Majesty, on the establishment of Responsible Government in the Island, and the passing of a Civil List Act, upon the terms and conditions pointed out by Her Majesty's Government, transferred to the Colony the revenues and territorial rights of the Crown. Whatever rights, therefore, the Crown at that time possessed over the proceeds of the casual and territorial revenues, the Quit Rents, the Crown Land Funds, the Crown Lands, and permanent Revenues which had before accrued or should thereafter accrue, became vested in the Local Government, remaining however, in the Queen's name, as the constitutional head of the Empire.

During the whole of the period preceding this change in the Government of the Island, a constant agitation upon the question of the land tenures had been kept up, to the great disadvantage of the Island; and it having been deemed advisable by the Legislature, that the different questions which had hitherto formed the subject of that agitation, should be finally put at rest, certain Resolutions were passed by the Assembly, and subsequently embodied in an address to Her Majesty, which is as follows:—

House of Assembly, March 16, 1863.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN.

We, your Majesty's Loyal and devoted

subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in Parliament assembled, beg leave to approach your Majesty, and most humbly to submit to your Royal consideration, that in the year 1859, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island submitted to your Majesty an humble address in which it was represented that:

“In certain despatches from one of your Majesty's Ministers, the Right Honorable Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, Baronet, Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated Downing Street, 2nd October, and 3rd December, 1858, the Right Honorable Baronet therein states, that the whole question of the land tenures in this Island, is engaging his most anxious attention, and that it would give him unfeigned pleasure to receive such suggestions for their amicable settlement, as could be accepted by your Majesty's Government.

“Having taken these Despatches into consideration, after mature deliberation, and with an earnest design to terminate the disputes which have so long disturbed the peace and harmony of the Colony, the House have adopted the following Resolutions:—

“Whereas certain questions arising out of the original grants of the lands in this Island severally called the Escheat Question, the Fishery Reserve Question, and the Quitrent Question, have for many years caused much discussion and difference of opinion amongst the people of this Island, and many delusive projects, and impracticable measures have been, and are, from time to time, enunciated respecting such questions, whereby the tenantry have been, and are greatly imposed upon, and induced to support the propounders of such measures, under the delusive hope that by doing so, they will be relieved of the payment of rent; and the attention both of the People and Legislature being occupied with such deceptive schemes, measures intended to develop the resources of the Colony are not only neglected, but a state of society equally opposed to the moral, social, and political welfare of the people and their true interests, is produced. And whereas various despatches have, for a great number of years, declared that Her Majesty's Government will not consent to any compulsory interference with the lands and rights of the Proprietors, and which has

been strongly reiterated in the despatch of Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton, now Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated 20th October, 1858, and 3rd December, 1858; from which it is clear that any measures for the benefit of the tenantry, must result from an amicable arrangement with the Proprietors. And whereas the agitation of hostile measures such as Escheat, Fishery Reserves and Quitrents, must not only result, as they always have done, in leading the Tenantry into costs and trouble, without in any way ameliorating their condition, but will also engender a feeling in the Proprietors, rendering them disinclined to listen to proposals, which, if such agitation were at an end, they would be likely to entertain. And whereas Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton in his despatches above referred to, while refusing to sanction measures which in England are considered inconsistent with the rights of property, has expressed the readiness of Her Majesty's Government to co-operate with the Legislature in furthering measures for the settlement of the land tenures, if conceived in a spirit of fairness and conciliation to all parties; therefore,

Resolved, 1st. That an humble Address be presented to Her Majesty, praying that Her Majesty will be pleased to direct a Commission to some discreet and impartial person not connected with the Island or its affairs, to inquire into the existing relations between Landlord and Tenant, and to negotiate with the Proprietors for such abatement of present liabilities, and for such terms for enabling the Tenantry to convert their Leasholds into Freeholds, as without infringing on the rights of the Landlords, may be fairly and reasonably asked for, to ameliorate the condition of the Tenantry.

2d. *Resolved*, That in the opinion of this House the basis of any such arrangement should be a large remission of arrears of rents now due; and secondly, the giving every Tenant holding under a long Lease, an option of purchasing his land *at a certain rate*, at any time he might find it convenient to do so.

3rd. *Resolved*, That a remission of arrears of rent may be reasonably asked, inasmuch as the existence of these arrears, although it is due partly to an unwillingness of the Tenants to pay rent, under the idea that Escheat or some other delusive scheme would enable them

to evade; yet it is also due in part to the laches and remissness of the Landlords and their Agents, in not enforcing it; and because in many cases, the arrears—however incurred,—amount to so large a sum that the exacting them would prove ruinous to a large number of loyal and industrious people, and would further entirely put it out of their power to avail themselves of the plan suggested in subsequent resolutions, for purchasing their farms.

4th. *Resolved*, That as the circumstances of the tenantry would not in general enable them to pay down any large portion of the purchase money, the best and only means for converting the tenures into freeholds, lies in the adoption of the plan which would practically constitute every Farm a Savings Bank for its owner, in which he could from time to time, invest his savings at interest, towards the purchase of his farm,—an arrangement which could be effected by the following means, viz:—that the Landlords should agree to permit the Tenants to purchase their farms for such sum per acre, as shall be fixed upon, and providing further, that when any tenant (whose rent was paid up) should be desirous of paying any sum not being less than £10, towards the purchase of his land, he should have the option of doing so, and that the interest on the £10, or other amount so paid, should thenceforth go in reduction of his yearly rent, and so on for every payment on account of purchase, until the whole was paid, when he should receive his deed, and that similar covenants should be inserted in all future Leases for terms over 40 years; such an arrangement would not only give the Tenant the advantage of paying an instalment of his purchase money, and at the same time reducing his rent whenever he chose, without subjecting himself to the vexation and costs incident to cases of inability to meet instalments agreed to be paid at a particular day, but would in the opinion of this House, gradually but certainly change the tenures into freeholds without the aid of loans and the expensive subsistence of Public Offices, by which heavy liabilities have already been, and would if persevered in to a much greater extent, be imposed on the public finances.

“We do therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be pleased to take the foregoing

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matters into your Royal consideration, and to appoint some fit and proper person or persons, Commissioner or Commissioners to inquire into the relations of Landlord and Tenant in this Island, and negotiate with the Proprietors of Township lands, for the fixing some certain rate of price at which every Tenant may at any time have the option of purchasing his land, or of paying instalments of such purchase, and thereby gradually reducing the yearly rent, until the whole price thereof is paid; and also to negotiate with the Proprietors for a remission of the arrears of rent in such cases and on such Townships as the said Commissioner or Commissioners, from the circumstances of the Tenantry, or otherwise, may deem reasonable and expedient; and also to make such report respecting the Fishery Reserve Question and other questions relating to the Township Lands of this Island, as we confidently hope will effect a final settlement thereof, and prevent all agitation regarding the same in future."

This address having been forwarded to Her Majesty's Government, the following correspondence took place, and was duly transmitted by His Grace the Duke of Newcastle to the Lieutenant Governor of the Island:—

SIR;—I have to acknowledge Sir D. Daly's despatch No. 29, of the 13th May last, addressed to Sir E. B. Lytton, transmitting an address to Her Majesty, from the House of Assembly, in pursuance of certain resolutions of the House, praying that Her Majesty would direct a Commission to inquire into the existing relations of Landlord and Tenant in the Island, with a view to the passing of remedial measures. The House of Assembly also propose that this Commission should direct its attention to the Fishery Reserve Question.

The resignation of Her Majesty's late Government has prevented an earlier answer to your despatch.

The Assembly in their address not only pray for the appointment of a Commission, but they likewise indicate in detail, the measures which in their opinion, should form the basis of that arrangement between Landlord and Tenant,

which the Commission should endeavour to bring about. Now without expressing any opinion adverse to the appointment of such a Commission, I am convinced that any prospect of a beneficial result from its labours would be nullified if its action were fettered by such conditions as the Assembly would thus impose.

I cannot advise Her Majesty to entertain the question unless it is fully understood that the Commission are at liberty to propose any measure which they may themselves deem desirable.

I have communicated this correspondence to Sir S. Cunard as representing the Landowners in this country, with a Letter of which I enclose a copy.

MY LORD DUKE;

We have been furnished with a copy of a Memorial addressed to Her Majesty, by the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, on the subject of the questions which have arisen in connexion with the original grants of Land in that Island and the rights of Proprietors in respect thereof.

We observe that the House of Assembly have

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suggested that Her Majesty should appoint one or more Commissioners to inquire into the relations of Landlord and Tenant in the Island, and to negotiate with the Proprietors of Township Lands, for fixing a certain rate of price at which every Tenant might have the option of purchasing his Lands; and also to negotiate with the Proprietors for a remission of the arrears of rent in such cases as the Commissioners might deem reasonable, and proposing that the Commissioners should report the result to Her Majesty.

As large Proprietors of Land in this Island, we beg to state that we shall readily acquiesce in any arrangement that may be practicable for the purpose of settling the various questions alluded to in the Memorial from the House of Assembly, but we do not think that the appointment of Commissioners in the manner proposed by them, would be the most desirable mode of procedure, as the labors of such Commission would only terminate in a Report which would not be binding on any of the parties interested.

We therefore beg to suggest, that instead of the mode proposed by the House of Assembly, three Commissioners or Referees be appointed, one to be named by Her Majesty, one by the House of Assembly, and one by the Proprietors of land; and that these Commissioners should have power to enter into all the inquiries that may be necessary, and to decide upon the different questions which may be brought before them, giving of course to the parties interested an opportunity of being heard.

We should propose that the expense of the Commission should be borne by the three parties to the reference, that is to say, in equal thirds; and we feel assured that there will be no difficulty in securing the adhesion of all the lauded Proprietors to a settlement on this footing.

The precise mode of carrying it into execution, if adopted, would require consideration, and upon that subject, we trust that your Grace would lend your valuable assistance.

SIR;—With reference to my despatch No. 11, of the 6th September last, in which I informed you that I had communicated to Sir Samuel Cunard the correspondence which had taken place upon the subject of the appointment of a Commission to propose measures of arrangement between Landlords and Tenants in Prince Edward Island, I transmit to you the copy of a Letter which has been addressed to me by Sir Samuel Cunard and several other Proprietors of Land in the Island. The Proprietors, it will be seen, do not think that the appointment of a Commission in the manner proposed by the House of Assembly in their address of the 9th of May last, would be the most desirable mode of proceeding, as the labours of such a Commission could only terminate in a report, the conclusions of which would not be binding on any of the parties interested. They suggest therefore instead, that three Commissioners or Referees should be appointed, one by Her Majesty, one by the House of Assembly, and the third by the Proprietors, and that they should be invested with power to hear and determine all the questions in dispute. It is further suggested that the expense of the Commission should be divided equally between the Crown, the Tenants and the Proprietors. If the consent of all the parties can be obtained to this proposal, I believe that it may offer the means of bringing these long pending disputes to a determination. But it will be necessary before going further into the matter, to be assured that the Tenants will accept as binding the decision of the Commissioners or the majority of them; and as far as possible that the Legislature of the Colony would concur in any measures which might be required to give validity to that decision. It would be very desirable also that any Commissioner who might be named by the House of Assembly on behalf of the Tenants, should go into the inquiry unfettered by any conditions such as were proposed in the Assembly last year.

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I have therefore to request that you will ascertain and report to me whether the Tenants of Prince Edward Island or the House of Assembly on their behalf, are prepared to agree to the proposed reference.

The foregoing correspondence having been received in the Island on the 14th April, the following Resolution were passed by the Assembly—

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND,
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY,
Saturday, 14th April, 1860.

Resolved, That this House deems it expedient to concur in the suggestions offered for the consideration of the House of Assembly, as set forth in the despatch from his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, dated "Downing Street, 21st March, 1860," on the subject of the proposed appointment of a Commission of enquiry for the arrangement of the long pending disputes between Landlords and Tenants of this Island.

The House of Assembly therefore agree to the appointment of three Commissioners, one by Her Majesty, one by the House of Assembly, and the third by the Proprietors, the expense of the Commission to be equally divided between the Imperial Government, the general revenue of the Colony, and the Proprietors.

The House of Assembly also agree on the part of the Tenantry, to abide by the decision of the Commissioners or the majority of them, and pledge themselves to concur in whatever measures may be required to give validity to that decision.

Resolved, That in order to carry into effect the suggestions of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, as set forth in his Despatch to his Excellency Lieut. Governor Dundas, of the 21st March last, for settling the long pending questions between Landlord and Tenants in this Island, this House do hereby name the Honorable Joseph Howe, of Nova Scotia, as Referee or Arbitrator on behalf of the Tenantry of this Island, to act under the Commission to be issued by Her Majesty's Government, as set forth in the despatch referred to, the other two Referees or Arbitrators under the said Com-

mission to be named as intimated in the said Despatch, one by Her Majesty's Imperial Government, and the other by the Proprietors.

These Resolutions and notice of the Act having been transmitted by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, the following despatch was sent to the Lieutenant Governor.

No. 23. DOWNING STREET,
16th June, 1860.

SIR;—I have had under my consideration your despatches No. 15, of the 16th of April, and No. 22, of the 30th of April. In the former despatch you enclose a Resolution in which the Assembly agrees to the proposed appointment of Commissioners on the subject of tenures of lands, binds itself to abide by the decision of those Commissioners or the majority of them, and pledges itself to concur in whatever measures may be required to give validity to that decision. In the second despatch you inform me that a short Act has since passed through both Houses, giving effect to the foregoing Resolution.

I cannot do otherwise than express my sense of the promptitude and completeness with which the House of Assembly has thus given its support to the plan devised, in the hope of putting an end to the differences which have prevailed in Prince Edward Island.

In Mr. Howe, the Assembly acting on behalf of the Tenantry, have selected a Commissioner whose known ability and prominent public position must well qualify him for the proposed inquiry.

From Sir Samuel Cunard I have received a Letter, of which a copy is enclosed, naming as the Commissioner selected by the Proprietors, Mr. John William Ritchie of Halifax, who I doubt not, will honorably discharge his functions.

I have written, in exercise of the choice belonging to Her Majesty's Government, to request Mr. John Hamilton Gray of New Brunswick, to undertake the remaining office of Commissioner. Mr. Gray has recently conducted another public inquiry with a degree of ability, carefulness and justice which entitles him to the confidence of all concerned in the intended investigation.

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That the Report or Award, or one part thereof, to be made by the three Commissioners or Arbitrators, or any two of them, to be nominated and appointed by the several parties respectively, and to be authorized and empowered by Her Majesty, agreeably to, or in conformity with the suggestions contained in the hereinbefore recited despatch of His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, when in all respects signed and completed by the said Commissioners, or any two of them, shall be delivered to the Lieutenant Governor of this Island, who shall endorse thereon, under his own hand and signature, a note of the day and year when received, and it shall thereafter be registered at full length in the Office for the Registry of Deeds in this Island; and the original part thereof after being duly registered, shall be filed and kept in the Office of the Colonial Secretary of this Island. And that the said Award when so completed and delivered to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, shall be and be deemed and taken to be final and conclusive, and the rights, interests and Estates of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen of, in, and to all the aforesaid Township Lands, Tenements, hereditaments, in so far as Her Majesty stands seized therein or vested therewith on behalf of the Government or Inhabitants of this Island, and so far as the said rights, interests and estates shall be submitted to the consideration and determination of the said Commissioners; and the rights, estates, rents, issues and profits of such estates, liberties, franchises and interests of all and every person and persons whomsoever, of, in to, out of, or concerning the said Township lands, tenements and hereditaments, whether acquired before or after the making of the said Award or Report shall be, and become subject to, charged and chargeable with and bound by the Award or Report of the said Commissioners or any two of them, in such manner and to such extent and for such time as shall in the said Award or Report be awarded, ordered or required.

By virtue of the Commission from the Queen, the Commissioners proceeded to Prince Edward Island in the month of August, and after some preliminary investigation and examination of public documents, opened a public Court of Inquiry, in Charlottetown, on the 5th September, pursuant to Proclamation in the *Royal Gazette*. This Court was held in the Hall of

the General Assembly and was opened to the public.

The Members of the local Parliament and persons of permanent public standing were invited to attend by special Circular, and all others in any other way interested in the questions submitted for consideration, or in the general welfare of the Island, were also invited by notification in the public newspapers.

This Court was held, with continuous sittings, from the 5th of September to the 1st of October, either in Charlottetown or the two other Shire Towns of the Counties into which the Island is divided.

The local Government and Tenantry of the Island and the Proprietors whose names are subjoined to the Memorandum forwarded by the Duke of Newcastle to the Lieutenant Governor, were ably represented by Counsel of eminence and distinction. The Members of Government and of Parliament, and public men of all shades of politics attended and were heard. Numerous delegations presenting memorials from the various Districts which they were selected at Public Meetings to represent, Tenants, Proprietors and Agents also attended, made their statements, were heard, examined, and cross-examined in open Court, by the Counsel, and all means of exhausting the sources of information were adopted. On the 1st of October, the Commissioners adjourned their sittings to Halifax, in the month of December following, whither in the meantime the Journals of the House of Assembly and copies of other Public Documents were to be sent.

In the month of February, 1861, a Despatch, of which the following are extracts, was transmitted by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle and laid before the Legislature.

No. 45.

DOWNING STREET,
2nd January, 1861.

SIR;—I have had under my consideration the two Acts passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, and enclosed in your Despatch No. 56, of the 1st of October last, entitled No. 1025, "An Act to authorize grants of the Shores of this Island," and No. 1026 "An Act to give effect to the Report of the Commissioners to be appointed on the Land Question."

* * * * *

With regard to the Act for giving effect to the Award of the Commissioners, I gladly acknowledge the promptitude with which the Provincial Legislature has hastened to give effect to what they supposed to be the desire of Her Majesty's Government, conveyed in my Despatch of the 21st of March last, and I very much regret that an apparent misconception of my meaning has led the Legislature to pass a Law which appears to be premature.

My object was not to require immediate legislation for the purpose of giving prospective effect to the Award of the Commissioners, but only to obtain from the House of Assembly, as representing the whole body of the Tenants, an unequivocal acceptance of the proposed reference, and from the Legislature a pledge that the Laws necessary to give effect to the Commissioners' Award should be passed when it appeared what legislation would be necessary for that purpose.

But the present Act or any other Act which could be passed at the present moment, might in the event, prove either too sweeping or too limited for that object. It would be too sweeping if it were found that the referees promulgated decisions respecting lands belonging to persons who have not consented to the reference, or if they made awards respecting questions (like that of escheat) which did not fall within the scope of their enquiry.

It would be too limited or at least inadequate for its purpose, if it failed to make such provisions of detail as were necessary to give practical effect to the general principles laid down by the Commissioners.

For these reasons, it appears to me impossible to advise Her Majesty to assent, at the present moment, to any such general law as that which has now been forwarded, nor do I see that any present legislation could be valuable, except such as may be based upon suggestions to be made by the commission, with a view of defining the persons and questions to which their inquiry was to extend, or of conferring on them the powers (like those of compelling the attendance of witnesses and of examining on oath) which are requisite to enable them to carry on their inquiries to the satisfaction of all concerned.

I trust you will impress upon the Commissioners (if requisite) the necessity of avoiding as far as possible any steps calculated to excite unreasonable expectations, or to stimulate

agitation; on the other hand while assuring the Proprietors that the Award of the Commissioners will not be enforced by her Majesty's Government against any persons who have not either personally or by their representatives consented to refer their claims to arbitration, I should wish you also to observe to them that their refusal to concur frankly, in a measure which was intended to compose existing differences, and which so far as it has yet proceeded, has been assented to by a large portion of their body, may materially influence the conduct of Her Majesty's Government, if called upon hereafter to support them in any future disputes with their Tenants.

In July, 1861, the Commissioners concluded their labours and unanimously signed an Award or Report in which (inter alia) they
" Report and Award."

- 1st. That Tenants who tender 20 years' purchase to their Landlords, in Cash, shall be entitled to a discount of 10 per cent and a deed conveying the fee simple of their Farms. Where the Tenant prefers to pay by instalments, he shall have the privilege, but the Landlord shall not be bound to accept a less sum than £10 at any one time, nor shall the Tenant have a longer term than 10 years to liquidate the debt.
- 2nd. That Tenants whose lands are not worth 20 years' purchase, and who therefore decline to pay that amount, may tender to their Landlords what they consider the value of their Farms. If the Landlord declines to accept the amount offered, the value shall be adjusted by arbitration. If the sum tendered is increased by the Award, the Tenant shall pay the expenses; if it is not, they shall be paid by the Landlord. If the sum awarded is tendered in cash, a discount of 5 per cent to be allowed; if not, payment to be made by yearly instalments of not less than £10, the term of payment in no case to exceed 10 years.
- 3rd. That the rent shall be reduced in proportion to the instalments paid, but no credit shall be allowed for any such instalments, until the 3 years' arrears allowed by this

award have been paid, nor while any rent accruing after the adjustment of the value of the farm remains due.

4th. That Proprietors, who hold not more than 1,500 acres, or those who desire to retain particular lands to that extent, shall not be compelled to part with such under this Award.

5th. That leases under a term of less than 40 years shall not be affected by this Award.

And also,—

“That all arrears of rent due by the Tenants previous to the 1st May, 1858, be remitted.”

In the month of January, 1862, the Government of Prince Edward Island, through the Lieutenant Governor, applied to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle for a Copy of the Award of the Commissioners, to this application the following reply was received :—

No. 94. DOWNING STREET,
7th February, 1862.

SIR;—I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch No. 3, of the 10th of January, requesting that you may be furnished with a copy of the Report of the Commissioners appointed to enquire into the Land Tenures of Prince Edward Island.

I have much pleasure in being able to comply with your request, and I forward to you a copy of the Report with this Despatch. I am desirous at the same time to express my appreciation of the painstaking, able and impartial Report which the Commissioners have furnished,—a Report which must derive additional weight from its unanimity, and which is the result of an investigation so complete that it has exhausted the materials for inquiry into the facts of the case. The difficulties that remain are those which are inherent in the subject, and which have for a long course of years, baffled every attempt at solution.

I fear that I cannot hold out to you the prospect of an Imperial guarantee to a loan of (£100,000) one hundred thousand pounds, in order to buy up the Estates of Prince Edward Island from their present owners; and on the other hand, there appear to me insuperable objections to that multiplicity of separate local arbitrations which would be the effect of the

alternative measure alluded to in the Commissioners' Report. I shall be very glad if I shall find it possible at a future opportunity to offer any fresh suggestions for meeting the difficulties of the case, but in the meanwhile I forward the Report accompanied by the foregoing general remarks which are all that it is at present in my power to make, in order that you may be able to lay the document before the Legislature as soon as possible after its meeting.

In April 1862, His Grace the Duke of Newcastle forwarded to Prince Edward Island the draft of a Bill prepared by the proprietors who were parties to the reference, offering to the tenantry certain terms in lieu of the Award.

The proposed terms so offered, were rejected by the Legislature, and Bills were passed in the Session of 1862, one “An Act to give effect to the Report of the Commissioners on the Land Question;” and the other, “An Act to facilitate the operation in certain particulars, of the Award or Report made by certain Commissioners to settle and adjust differences respecting some of the “Township Lands in this Colony.”

The first of these Acts enacted—That the Report or Award of the said Commissioners should be, and the same was thereby declared to be final and conclusive, and the rights, interests, franchises, uses, trusts and estates of her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, of, in and to the aforesaid Township Lands severally owned by the respective Proprietors thereof, who by themselves or Agents severally submitted to the said Commission of inquiry, and subscribed to the hereinbefore recited Letter dated the 13th day of February in the year 1860, addressed to his said Grace the Duke of Newcastle, and also the said agreement or paper writing dated in the year 1860, in so far as her Majesty stands seized thereof, vested therein on behalf of the Government or Inhabitants of this Island, and so far as the said rights, interests, franchises, uses, trusts and estates have been submitted to the consideration and determination of the said Commissioners, and all and singular the rights, uses, trusts, estates, rents, issues and profits of such estates, liberties, franchises and interests of all

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and every the aforesaid Land Owners or Proprietors who by themselves or their Agents severally subscribed to the said recited Letter of the 13th of February, in the year last aforesaid, as well as of those Land Owners or Proprietors who subscribed the aforesaid Agreement or paper writing, dated in the year 1860, as aforesaid, of, in, to or out of the said Township Lands, tenements and hereditaments owned by them respectively, their heirs and assigns, shall be, and the same are hereby declared to be subject to charges, and chargeable with and bound by the said Report or Award of the said Commissioners, in such manner and to such extent and for such time as in and by the said Award is awarded, ordered, expressed or required. Every tenant of any land, part or parcel of the said Township lands mentioned in the preceding Clause of this Act, and every other person whomsoever, whose estate, property or interest shall in any manner be or become affected by or according to the meaning of the said Award or Report, be intended to be affected thereby, shall and may be at liberty to plead the same in any Court of Law or Equity in this Island, and every such Court shall admit and allow to every such person, as regards the estate, interest, claim or demand of such person, the full force and effect of the said Award or Report according to the true intent, meaning and operation thereof.

The before mentioned Acts were disallowed by the Duke of Newcastle for the reasons set forth in the following despatch from His Grace to the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island.

DOWNING STREET,
9th August, 1862.

SIR;—I have received your despatch, No. 45, of the 25th of June, enclosing two Bills passed with suspending clauses, by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, intituled Cap. 4, "An Act to give effect to the Report of the Commissioners on the Land Question," and Cap. XII., "An Act to facilitate the operation in certain particulars, of the Award or Report made by certain Commissioners to settle and adjust differences respecting some of the Township Lands in this Colony."

In forwarding these Acts, you informed me that you would shortly communicate to me a minute of your responsible advisers, explaining

the reason for framing these measures, and this you have since done in your despatch No. 52, of the 23rd of July. I am therefore now in a position to communicate to you the conclusion to which I have been led.

It appears from the Minute of your Ministers, that they consider the so-called Award of the Land Commission to be binding on the Proprietors and the Legislature, and on this ground they state that they are unable to entertain Sir Samuel Cunard's proposal for enabling the Tenants in Prince Edward Island to acquire freehold interest in their holdings, which was transmitted to you in my Despatch of the 5th of April last, No. 103.

I very much regret that it is not in my power to concur in the views by which your Government have been led to prepare these Bills, or to advise Her Majesty to bring them into operation by giving Her assent to them.

Your Advisers appear to consider that Her Majesty's Government had proposed to the Proprietors of Land, and that those Proprietors had consented to place themselves and their interests absolutely in the hands of the Commissioners. This, however, was far from being the case.

The Proprietors consented that Commissioners should be appointed to enter into all the enquiries that might be necessary, and to decide upon the different questions which might be brought before them, giving of course to the parties interested an opportunity of being heard. The main questions thus to be decided upon, were, 1st, at what rate Tenants ought to be allowed to acquire freehold interests in their property, and next, what amount of arrears of rent should be remitted by the Landlords.

On the first and most important of these questions, the Commissioners professed themselves unable to come to any conclusion, and instead of deciding it, they recommended virtually, that it should be decided by other Arbitrators to be hereafter nominated. This, however, is not what they were charged to do; they were authorised by the Proprietors to make an Award themselves, but they were not authorised to transfer the duty of making that Award to others. The trust confided to them, was evidently a personal one. The Proprietors relied on the skill, knowledge and fairness of the three gentlemen appointed in 1860, but

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they could not therefore, be called upon in deference to these gentlemen's opinion, to confide their interests even to Arbitrators specially designated in the Award, much less to persons whose very mode of appointment is undetermined by it.

This objection might of course be waived by the Proprietors, but it is not waived; and being insisted upon, I am obliged to admit that it is conclusive, and I am bound further to say that it is in my opinion an objection founded, not on any technical rule of law, but on a sound and indisputable principle of justice. The principle, namely, that a person who has voluntarily submitted his case to the decision of one man, cannot therefore be compelled without his consent, to transfer it to the decision of another.

It is therefore impossible for me to advise Her Majesty to sanction the two acts which you have forwarded, and which of course are intended to render the Award obligatory on all who consented to the reference.

I must instruct you, therefore, however unwillingly, to treat the Commissioners' Award only as an expression of opinion which however valuable as such, cannot be made legally binding on the parties concerned, and which therefore ought not to be allowed to stand in the way of any other proposal which promises an amicable settlement of the question.

It was under these circumstances and with these impressions, that I forwarded to you the proposal made by Sir Samuel Cunard, in hopes that it might be found to furnish a basis of agreement in lieu of the recommendations of the Commissioners.

Your Government refuse to consider this proposal, not as I understand, because they think it in itself inadmissible, but because they consider themselves as bound to give effect to the Commissioners' Award.

This Award being now out of the way, I have to request that you will bring Sir Samuel Cunard's proposal under their reconsideration. I do not think it desirable that I should myself express any opinion upon its merits. I will only observe that it is in some respects more favorable to the Tenants than the Commissioners' Award; and that it will give me great pleasure to learn that it is likely to furnish a

solution of these difficulties which so long as they are unsolved, must continue to obstruct the progress of the Colony.

This conclusion which I have adopted respecting these Acts, renders it unnecessary that I should do more than acknowledge your Despatch No. 46, of the 25th of June, enclosing a memorial from Mr. Haythorne, against the Act (Cap. XII.) to facilitate the operation of the Award.

The Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in the Session of 1863, forwarded to the Colonial Minister a Petition to Her Majesty the Queen, in which after reciting at length the history of the Award or Report, they submit:—

That the Award of the said Commissioners who were appointed by Warrant under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, was made under a reference solemnly agreed to by your Majesty, by the Proprietors and by the House of Assembly of this Island, and that therefore according to the well-known legal maxim "*Omnia præsumuntur rite et solemniter esse acta donec probetur in contrarium,*" the said Award should be considered to be good and valid in law.

That we do not seek by the passing of a law, to compel compliance on the part of the Proprietors, to an Award which is in itself liable to an objection founded on any principle of justice or equity, but we most humbly submit that the question as to whether the Award of the Commissioners can or cannot be made legally binding on the parties concerned, is one proper for the consideration of your Majesty's Judicial Tribunals.

We therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will cause it to be notified to the Proprietors to be affected by the said Award, that unless cause to the contrary be shewn before a judicial tribunal to be provided by your Majesty, your Majesty's allowance will be given to a Bill passed to give effect to the said Award of your Majesty's Royal Commissioners.

This petition was not laid before the Queen. The Duke of Newcastle submitted a case to the Law Officers of the Crown, on which they gave the following opinion:—

LAW OFFICERS TO THE DUKE OF
NEWCASTLE.

TEMPLE, June 9, 1863.

MY LORD DUKE;

We are honoured with your Grace's commands, signified in Sir Frederick Rogers' Letter of the 9th May, ultimo, stating that he was directed by your Grace to request that we would take into consideration the enclosed copy of an Address to the Queen, from the Council and Assembly of Prince Edward Island.

Sir Frederick Rogers was also pleased to state that that Island was granted during the last century, to certain persons by whom a large portion of it was let to the present occupiers. The Tenants are very anxious to obtain a fee simple interest in their lands and to escape payment of rent, and this desire has produced a series of disputes of various kinds.

That in 1860, a proposal was made to appoint a Commission to investigate the matter, and the Proprietors suggested as a preferable method, that three Commissioners or referees be appointed, one to be named by Her Majesty, one by the House of Assembly, and one by the Proprietors of Land, and that these Commissioners should have power to enter into all the enquiries that may be necessary, and to decide upon the different questions which may be brought before them, giving of course to the parties interested, an opportunity of being heard.

This proposal was accepted by the Assembly of Prince Edward Island, who agreed on the part of the Tenantry to abide by the decision of the Commissioners, or the majority of them, and to pledge themselves to concur in whatever measures may be required to give validity to that decision.

That three Commissioners were appointed for enquiring into the said differences, and for adjusting the same on fair and equitable principles. And in a report (of which a copy was enclosed) awarded inter alia "that the Tenants should receive a certain remission of arrears; that they should be entitled to purchase their holdings at 20 years purchase of the reserved rent, and that any Tenant who thought this rate of commutation too high, might tender what he chose, and that on the refusal of the Landlord to accept that tender, the value should be adjusted by Arbitration."

That to this the Landlords objected, through Sir Samuel Cunard, in a letter, (of which a copy was annexed,) that they were ready to be bound by the decision of the three Commissioners, but that they were not prepared to hand over their interests to the proposed Arbitrators, and to embark in the expense and dispute consequent on a multitude of petty Arbitrations. On this ground, they refuse to accept the Award, and your Grace on the same ground, refuse to advise that Her Majesty should concur in the legislation which was necessary for enforcing it.

That the Landlords, however, offered terms not including an arbitration, but giving to the Tenants the remission of Rent proposed by the Commissioners and the right to purchase the fee-simple of their land at fifteen years purchase of the reserved rent.

That the Council and Assembly of Prince Edward Island, state that they do not seek by the passing of a law to compel compliance with an Award liable to an objection founded on any principle of Justice or equity, but submit that the question as to whether that Award can or cannot be made legally binding on the parties concerned, is one proper for the consideration of Her Majesty's Judicial Tribunals.

That they therefore pray that unless cause to the contrary be shewn before a Judicial Tribunal, Her Majesty's allowance may be given to a Bill to give effect to the said Award of Her Majesty's Royal Commissioners.

Sir Frederick Rogers was further pleased to state that there is in Prince Edward Island a Supreme Court invested with the usual powers appertaining to the English Supreme Courts of Equity and Common Law, and that under these circumstances, he was directed to request our opinion on the following questions:—

- 1st. Whether the Award is in itself liable to any objection founded on any principle of law or equity.
- 2nd. Whether there is any proceeding in law or equity by which it would be possible that the Proprietors or Tenants in Prince Edward Island could shew cause why Her Majesty's assent should or should not be given to a Bill to be passed by the Prince Edward Island Legislature, for giving effect to the Award of the Commissioners.

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3rd. Whether there is any proceeding at law or in equity by which that Award can be enforced upon the recusant Proprietors.

4th. Whether in case there is no such proceeding, the Legislature of Prince Edward Island could, with justice and propriety, pass a law giving effect to that Award.

In obedience to your Grace's commands, we have taken this matter into consideration, and have the honor to report:—

1. That we do not think the term "Award" applicable with any propriety to the Report of the Commissioners of inquiry appointed by Her Majesty's Commission of the 25th of June, 1860, for there was no reference or submission properly so called. The gentleman who signed the Letter to your Grace, dated the 13th February, 1860, having been incompetent to bind the general body of Proprietors of land in Prince Edward Island, and not having professed or attempted to do so, while on the other hand it is clear that they did not propose or intend by that letter, to bind themselves individually, unless the general body of Proprietors would be also bound.

Passing however by this point, which is nevertheless of the greatest importance with reference to the two following questions, we are of opinion, upon the substance of the case, that the Commission have not executed the authority which alone was proposed to be conferred upon them on the part of the Land Owners who signed the Letter of the 13th February, 1860, so far as the proprietary interest of those or other Land Owners are concerned, viz: "To negotiate with the Proprietors of Township lands for fixing a certain rate of price at which every Tenant might have the option of purchasing his lands, and also to negotiate with the Proprietors for a remission of the arrears of rent in such cases as the Commissioners might deem reasonable." And we think that a recommendation that the price to be paid by a Tenant for the purchase of his land should be settled in each particular instance in which the Landlord might differ about the same by arbitration, as not either literally or substantially within the scope of that authority.

We are confirmed in this view by the perusal of the Act of Assembly passed on the 2nd of May, 1860, which although not assented to by

Her Majesty for the reasons stated in your Grace's Despatch of the 2nd January, 1861, appears to us to show both by its preamble and by its second and third enacting clauses, that an Award by the Commissioners which without any delegation to other Arbitrators should itself settle all matters in difference between each particular Landlord and Tenant, and should therefore determine and govern the title to the Land in each Township, was what the Assembly as well as the Land Owners really had in contemplation.

2 and 3. Our answer to both these questions is in the negative.

4. This is a question of public policy. Such an act if passed by the Colonial Legislature and assented to by Her Majesty, must be founded and justified, not upon any supposition of an "Award" legally or morally binding, having been made in this case, but solely for reasons of public advantage such as those which have at various times induced the Imperial Legislature to pass Statutes for the enfranchisements of copyholds, at the option of the Tenant, for the enfranchisement of perpetually renewable leaseholds in Ireland, for the commutation of Tithes for the compulsory acquisition of lands for Railway and other Public Works, at prices to be fixed by a jury or by arbitration, and for other similar purposes involving for the general good, more or less interference with the tenure of private property.

From the above statement, it will appear that the objects of the Commission were to enquire into the differences existing between Landlords and Tenants in the Island, with a view to the settlement of the same, on just and equitable principles.

The Assembly originally indicated in detail, the measures which, in their opinion, should form the basis of that settlement. The Duke of Newcastle objected to fettering the Commissioners with these conditions sought to be imposed on them by the Assembly, and stated his inability to advise Her Majesty to entertain the question unless the Commission should be

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left free to propose any measure which they might themselves deem desirable.

The Assent of the Proprietors being deemed requisite to the appointment of a Commission, the Duke sent the address of the Assembly to Sir Samuel Cunard the principal Proprietor of Lands in the Colony, with a request that he would call a private meeting of such Proprietors as might be in England, and ascertain whether there were any concessions which were ready to make with a view of bringing the differences between Landlord and Tenant to an amicable issue.

Sir Samuel Cunard and others the chief Proprietors of the Island replied to the Duke that they "as large Proprietors of land would readily acquiesce in any arrangement that might be practicable for the purpose of settling the various questions alluded to in the memorial of the House of Assembly, but objected to the appointment of Commissioners in the matter proposed by the Assembly, on the ground that the labors of such Commission would only terminate in a report which could not be binding on any of the parties interested, and suggested that three Commissioners should be appointed, one by the Crown, one by the Assembly representing the Tenantry, and one by the Proprietors, and that these Commissioners should have power to enter into all the enquiries that might be necessary, and to decide on the different questions that might be brought before them, giving of course to the parties interested an opportunity of being heard.

The Duke of Newcastle on receipt of this communication from Sir Samuel Cunard and his Associates, intimated to the Government of Prince Edward Island that it was necessary before going further into the matter, to be assured that the Tenants would accept as binding, the decisions of the Commissioners or the majority of them, and as far as possible that the Legislature would concur in any measure that might be required to give validity to that decision, and requested to be informed whether the Tenants of Prince Edward Island or the House of Assembly on their behalf were prepared to agree to the proposed reference on these terms.

The House of Assembly, by resolution, acquiesced in the proposal that the Tenants should be bound by the decision of the Commissioners or the majority of them, and agreed

to pass any measure that might be required to give validity to such decision.

The Duke of Newcastle on receiving the resolutions of the Assembly, expressed his sense of the promptitude and completeness with which the Assembly had given its support to the plan devised, in the hope of putting an end to the difference which had prevailed in Prince Edward Island, and after indicating the names of the Commissioners appointed by the respective parties, (the Queen the Assembly and the Proprietors) he expressed the hope that the Commissioners "would devote their efforts to framing such recommendations as should be demanded by the equity of the case," thus shewing that the Commissioners were appointed to indicate a mode of adjustment of the differences between Landlord and Tenant.

The Royal Warrant appointing the Commissioners, after reciting that the Crown had been moved by the Assembly of Prince Edward Island to appoint Commissioners to inquire into the difficulties prevailing in the said Island relating to the rights of Landowners and Tenants, with a view to the settlement of the same on just and equitable principles, and that the Assembly had agreed to abide by the decision of the Commissioners and to concur in whatever measures might be necessary to give validity to that decision, named certain persons Commissioners "for enquiring into the said difficulties and adjusting the same on fair and equitable terms."

The Assembly, in addition to the resolutions referred to, passed an act prospectively declaring that the Award to be made by such Commissioners should be binding on the Tenantry.

Certain proprietors who had not agreed to the appointment of the Commission and who feared that the act so passed, if it became law, might affect their lands, petitioned the Colonial Minister that it might not be submitted for Her Majesty's confirmation. This Act was not submitted for Her Majesty's confirmation. The Duke of Newcastle in a despatch of the 2nd January, 1861, addressed to the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, pointed out that any prospective act might in the event prove too sweeping or too limited, and particularly that it would be too sweeping if the referees promulgated decisions respecting lands belonging to persons who had not consented to the reference.

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The Commissioners opened their Court in Prince Edward Island, and the Proprietors whose names were subjoined to the letter of 13th February, 1860, to the Duke, appeared before them by Counsel. They were aware that several of their body refused to consent to, or recognise the appointment of the Commission, and would refuse to submit to the Award.

The Commissioners made their report in July, 1861, which they forwarded in August, 1861, to the Colonial Minister. In their Award or Report they "Report and Award" that all arrears of rent due by Tenants to their Landlords previously to May, 1858, should be remitted, and that Tenants should have the right of purchasing the freehold of their respective Farms on payment of Twenty years of the reserved rent, and that in the event of any Tenant considering that Twenty years purchase was more than the value of his land, he should be at liberty to tender what he might consider the value of the land, and in the event of the Landlord declining to accept the sum so offered by the Tenant, the value should be determined by Arbitration.

In January, 1861, the Government of Prince Edward Island applied to the Duke of Newcastle for a copy of the Award. It was sent with a despatch in which the Duke of Newcastle expressed his appreciation of the painstaking, able and impartial report "which the Commissioners had furnished,"—a Report which must derive additional weight from its unanimity, and which was the result of an investigation so complete, that it had exhausted the materials for enquiry into the facts of the case. His Grace however, expressed an opinion, that there appeared to him to be insuperable objections to that multiplicity of separate local arbitrations, which would be the result of the mode of settlement recommended by the Report.

The Legislature of the Colony, in April, 1862, "in the hope of putting an end to the differences between Landlord and Tenant passed two acts, the one declaring in general terms that the Award should be binding on the Proprietors who had agreed to the appointment of the Commission and upon their Tenants. The other act laid down a mode for the appointment of an Umpire in the event of the Landlord

and Tenant restoring to Arbitration in order to determine the value of the Land."

Previously to the passing of these acts, at the request of Sir Samuel Cunard, his Grace the Duke of Newcastle forwarded to the Governor of Prince Edward Island the draft of a Bill prepared by Sir Samuel Cunard, and intended to confer upon the Tenants of the Proprietors who had consented to the issuing of the Commission, certain rights and privileges to be accepted by them in lieu of the terms proposed in the Report of the Commissioners.

In this Bill are recited the names of those Proprietors who did agree to the issuing of such Commission.

The Government of Prince Edward Island refused to accept the Bill so transmitted.

The Duke of Newcastle refused to submit for Her Majesty's confirmation, the two Acts of the Legislature last mentioned, on the alleged grounds that the Arbitrators had exceeded their authority, and instead of making an Award themselves, had transferred the duty of making that Award to others. This objection his Grace observed might be waived by the Proprietors, but being insisted upon by them, he was bound to admit that it was conclusive.

The Legislature of Prince Edward Island believing this objection of the Proprietors to be unreasonable, petitioned that the question as to whether the Commissioners had exceeded their authority or not, should be determined by a Judicial tribunal.

On receipt of this petition, the Duke of Newcastle submitted a case to the Crown Officers, the opinion in that case is above set forth.

It will be observed that the letter of the Duke of Newcastle, of 2nd January, 1862, clearly contemplates binding the proprietors who had consented to the Commission, while he does not profess to bind those who had not consented to refer their claims to Arbitration; on the other hand the Crown advisers hazard the opinion unsupported by any facts, that it was clear that those who did sign did not intend to bind themselves individually unless the general body of proprietors would be also bound, and to which the learned Counsel appear to attach the "greatest importance," and on this erroneous supposition they seek to set aside the effect of the whole report.

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They further object that the Commissioners have not executed the office entrusted to them of fixing a certain rate of price at which every Tenant might have the option of purchasing his land and for remission of arrears of rent, and they allege that the proposed submission to Arbitration is *ultra vires*, whereas the Duke in his own letter of 6th September, 1859, clearly requires it to be a condition that the Commissioners should have power to propose any measure which they may themselves deem desirable, and the Law Officers appear to make the Award wholly inoperative, but they do not seem to deny that an Act of the Legislative Assembly giving effect to the Award on the ground of public policy, could be enforced.

The Duke's letter of February 1862, praises the Commissioners' Report as being able and impartial, and the result of an investigation so complete, that it has exhausted the materials for enquiry into the facts of the case, and therefore we have a right to presume that the recommendation was based on "public policy." The act of the Local Legislature remedies the defect or rather fills up the detail for giving effect to the recommendation of the Commissioners.

The Government of Prince Edward Island contend that the Commissioners were appointed to enquire into the differences between Landlord and Tenant with a view to the settlement of the same on just and equitable principles, and seeing that the Duke of Newcastle on the receipt of their address peremptorily objected to the Assembly's indicating in detail, the measures which in their opinion should form the basis of that adjustment or settlement between Landlord and Tenant which they should endeavour to bring about, and required as a condition of issuing the commission that the Commissioners should be at liberty to propose any measure which they themselves might deem desirable, it cannot be properly urged that the Commissioners exceeded the authority vested in them, or failed to execute their commission, unless it be shewn that the mode of arrangement indicated by them would not effect an adjustment upon fair and equitable terms. The Government submit that it is evident from the dispatch of the Duke of Newcastle of the 16th June, 1860, announcing the appointment of the Commissioners, that latitude was given them in the framing of their Report by including

therein recommendations such as should be demanded by the equity of the case and be conducive to the general good of all classes of the community, and that recommending a mode of settlement was within the scope of their duty and consideration, and on which they acted by the very simple remedy that contested claims should be settled by arbitration.

Again in reference to the statement of the Law Officers, that the Proprietors who signed the letter of the 13th February, 1860, did not intend by that letter to bind themselves individually, unless the general body of the Proprietors would be also bound, is negatived by the fact that when the Proprietors who signed such letter appeared before the Commissioners, they were aware that members of the general body of Proprietors had refused to sign such letter; and several months previously to the signing the Report of the Commissioners, such Proprietors were aware that the Duke of Newcastle had expressly directed the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island to intimate to the non-consenting Proprietors that the Award or Report to be made by the Commissioners should effect only such as should consent to the Commission, and also from a like admission contained in the Draft Bill submitted in a letter signed by the gentlemen whose names appear to the letter of the 13th February, 1860.

Sir Hugh Cairns' opinion is requested.

- 1st. Whether by virtue of the Commission from the Queen, the Commissioners therein named were vested with authority to enquire into all differences existing between Landowners and their Tenants, and to propose as a remedy for the settlement of such differences, any measure which they might themselves deem desirable.
- 2nd. Whether by awarding that every Tenant should have the right to convert his Leasehold lands into Freehold on payment to his Landlord of twenty years purchase of the reserved rent thereof, and that in the event of difference as to the value of land considered by Tenant not to be worth twenty years purchase, that the value of such land should be determined by Arbitration as mentioned in the Award, the Commissioners exceeded their authority.

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3rd Whether having especial regard to the third and fourth paragraphs of the letter of Proprietors to the Duke of Newcastle, dated 13th February, 1860, and to the concluding paragraph of the Duke's despatch of the 2nd January, 1861, there is anything in the case from which it can be justly inferred that the consent of those Proprietors to the appointment of the Commission or their agreement to abide by the Award of the Commissioners was contingent upon the consent of the general body of the Proprietors being obtained, or are the Proprietors who signed the letter of the 13th February, 1860, bound by the Award of the Commissioners.

4th. And to advise generally on the case.

We are of opinion that great confusion and difficulty have been introduced into this case in consequence of the very irregular and unconstitutional course which was adopted by the Colonial Office in reference to the Commission of the 25th of June, 1860. The avowed object was to produce by means of that Commission an Award which would decide in a manner binding on all parties the questions then agitated as to the tenure of Lands in Prince Edward Island. The parties interested in these questions, were the Tenants of the Lands, the Proprietors and the Crown.

It is obvious that the Crown could not be bound prospectively to abide by and confirm an Award or decision of Commissioners on a matter of public policy. The Commission indeed did not affect to bind the Crown in this manner, and when an Act of the Colonial Legislature having this object was sent home for approval, the approval of the Crown was withheld.

As to the Tenants, the House of Assembly was assumed to represent them, and no doubt the House of Assembly does represent the Tenants and all other inhabitants of Prince Edward Island, for all the regular purposes of Legislation and Taxation.

But the House of Assembly does not represent the Tenants so as to enable it to submit their private rights and property to the Arbitration and decision of third parties; and to

take from the House of Assembly, a resolution, *a priori*, to abide by, and confirm by legislation, such decision before it was known and before the Arbitrators were even nominated, was in our opinion entirely unconstitutional. Then as to the Proprietors, the Commission is entirely silent as to them, and does not suggest that they or any of them had agreed to be bound. We do not indeed find that the Colonial Office took the precaution of obtaining from the Proprietors any document whatever which would constitute a legal obligation on their part to abide by the Award of the Commissioners. Moreover we must observe that the matters over which jurisdiction is by the Commission proposed to be given to the Commissioners, are mentioned in a very loose and indefinite manner, as, "differences now prevailing in the Island relating to the rights of Landowners and Tenants." Words of this kind might indeed, if inquiry and suggestion were alone intended, warrant a suggestion of purchase by Tenants of their Landlord's interests on certain terms. But if an Award binding all parties was contemplated, it may well be doubted, whether these words would warrant an Award dealing with the question of a purchase and sale compulsory on the Proprietors.

We answer the first question, by saying that we think the Commissioners were vested by the Commission with authority to enquire into all differences existing between Landlords and their Tenants, and to propose as a remedy for the settlement of such differences, any measure which they might think desirable. This was the object of the Commission originally requested by the House of Assembly, and to a commission with this object there could be no possible objection. In answer to the third question, we should say that although in our opinion it is impossible, for the reasons already stated, to hold that there is any legal validity in any of the proceedings which have taken place, yet we think that were the Report of the Commissioners sustainable as an Award in other respects, the Proprietors who proposed the Commission and who attended by Counsel, in the execution of the Commission, would not now be morally justified in repudiating the finding of the Commission, merely because there were certain other Proprietors who did not become parties to the proceeding.

As to the second question, we are clearly of opinion that even assuming no other objection to the proceedings of the Commissioners existed, the objection indicated in this question is a fatal one. If the Commissioners were authorised to award a fixed rate of price on the payment of which a Tenant might purchase out his holding, it is not a proper execution of that authority to award that the amount of the purchase money shall be adjusted by other Arbitration, in case a Tenant thinks twenty years purchase too high a price.

Upon the general question it may be remarked, that the mode of negotiation originally

proposed by the House of Assembly has, for the reasons we have stated, miscarried, yet the Report of the Commission may afford the basis of mutual agreements, and that the policy of the Home Government towards the Proprietors and the Tenants ought in our opinion to be influenced by the prompt acquiescence of the Assembly in the proposal made by the Proprietors for a settlement that should be final as well as equitable.

SIR; I have the honor to inform you, that the Duke of Newcastle received and considered the Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, in April, 1863, entitled Cap. XVI., No. 1145, "An Act to incorporate sundry persons by the name of the President, Directors and Company of the Farmers' Bank of Rustico," which was transmitted in your Despatch, No. 65, of the 5th August, 1863.

His Grace reported to Her Majesty in Council, his opinion, that the said Act should be especially confirmed, and I have the honor to transmit herewith, an order of Her Majesty in Council, dated the 7th instant, approving that report.

Whereas the Lieutenant Governor of Her Majesty's Island of Prince Edward, with the Council and Assembly of the said Island, did in the month of April, 1863, pass an Act which has been transmitted, entitled as follows, viz: No. 1145, "An Act to incorporate sundry persons by the name of the President, Directors and Company of the Farmers' Bank of Rustico.

And whereas the said Act has been laid before Her Majesty in Council, together with a letter to the Lord President of the Council, from the Most Noble the Duke of Newcastle, late one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, recommending that the said Act should receive Her Majesty's special confirmation, Her Majesty was thereupon this day pleased, by and with the advice of Privy Council, to declare Her special confirmation of the said Act, and the same is hereby specially confirmed, ratified and finally enacted accordingly. Whereof the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander-in-Chief for the time being, of Her Majesty's Island of Prince Edward, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.
