London, Oct. 12 .- The Daily Chronicle Athen's correspondent in announcing that Greece has accepted the demands of the Entente powers, says that the Greek Government has a protest to its notification of acceptance. Telephonic messages received in Athens from Piraeus say that the handing over of the Greek navy to the allied naval authorities has already begun. The lighter craft will be handed over intact so as to enable them to be despatched to the provisional government at Saloniki. The heavier vessels will be disarmed and left where they are in the Gulf of Keratsini.

According to The Chronicle's correspondent, the Greek crews have already been removed from some of the warships and are being landed from the others.
