RUSS SOVIET CONGRESS

Voted 430 to 30 in Favor of Quitting the War at Terms Dictated by Teutons-Resignation of Prominent Bolsheviki Theorist Follows-Decision of Congress Culmination of Long Negotiations

One year ago to-day, Emperor Nicholas abdicated as autocrat of Russia and yesterday the All-Russian Congress of Soviets by an overwhelming vote agreed to German peace terms.

German militarism takes from the present Russian Government thousands of square miles of land and millions of inhabitants contained in the former imperial territories of Finand, Courand, Lithuania, Esthonia, Livonia and the Ukaine in Europe and Batoum, Kars and Erivan in the Caucasus. The Russian army must demobilize, the Russian fleet is interned and favorabe trade agreements are to be given Germany and her allies.




