A Mother's Influence.

Every day is Mother's Day but recent custom directs, at this season of the year, particular attention to her influence. Using the term influence thought turns to Paul's second letter to Timothy, in which he writes: I call to remembrance the unfeigned faith that is in thee, which dwelt first in thy grandmother Lois, and thy mother Eunice, and I am persuaded that in thee also.

Was it nothing to Timothy that he had a believing, pious mother and grandmother?

We are always quite ready to accept the doctrine of hereditary sinfulness, but have been rather shy of any suggestion of inherited piety. Paul seems to hint that it was an heirloom in Timothy's family. It is pleasant to find faith transmitted through three generations and, without treading on any theological doctrines, it is certainly clear that there is a great advantage in a pious ancestry and education. It is notable that Paul mentions the mother and the grandmother, and not either the father or the grandfather. Without disparaging the influence of godly fathers, we are persuaded that the most potent influence of the home is the mother. As an old play has it:

A. and similar war work and other patriotic philanthropies are added up, there is one very important contribution that is not included and about which it is no harm that the public should fully understand. As a specific instance it may be stated that The Spectator alone has contributed to the Y. M. C. In proportion to his ability to serve the cause, in addition to the important contributions of the members of the staff, small though there may be in figures, but none the less hearty, it is because the publishers are conspicuously modest about such things that they get so credit, but at times like these when prices soar and every dollar counts, it is not right that readers should get any mistaken ideas about the platonistic ability of their local newspapers. Because a large advertisement of such philanthropic endeavor are printed, it does not follow that they are fairly paid for. The fact is that in the majority of cases they are not by an advertising agency at the last minute with a jump.

Some other, less well known agents, in commission, and even this practice is not possible for their monthly. The publisher could refuse it, and in any other case would, but never does, because he is just a good enough patriot to help the work of revellers of cost. If the papers refused to print such matter about at their own prices, what would happen? The movement would die from lack of interest and lack of publicity. But do the publishers get any credit for such contributions? Well, hardy ever.—The Annapolis Spectator.

Closing of Acacia Villa.

The Closing Exercises of Acacia Villa School, Hortonville, took place on the evening of May 21st. The Assembly hall of the School was well filled, considering the fact that Miss Burleigh was giving her popular and thrilling lecture in Wolfville at the same hour. Friends of the students from Amherst, Truro, Halifax and other places were present and were entertained at the School. They were delighted with the advanced Spelling conditions in the Valley, and pronounced it two weeks ahead of points farther east. The trees are in almost full leafage and the earlier varieties of fruit trees are in blossom.

The programme consisted of Piano solos and duets, recitations and essays, which the boys gave in a most creditable manner. The solo by the most advanced pupil had to be cancelled, as he had the misfortune to fall from an apple tree a short time ago and break his wrist. Four of the numbers were given by beginners who certainly have made great progress during their short term of study. The music teacher, Miss Laura Burton, played "Gusset List" number twenty effectively. The recitations were spoken distinctly and with expression, with one or two exceptions and were of a fine patriotic nature. Two essays were read. One on "Napoleon Bonaparte," by Mervale Vall of New Glasgow; the other, "Ship-building in Canada" by Ernest Ryan, of Truro. Both were interesting and were listened to very attentively.

The boys were assisted by Miss Minnie Miller, of Canisling, whose violin solos added most delightfully to the enjoyment of the evening. This is the second time that Miss Miller has favored the Acacia Villa boys and they are very grateful to her. Her first number was "Liebestraut," by Kreisler; her second, Concerto, (1st Movement) by D. Berlioz. Both were enthusiastically received. Miss Miller was accompanied very charmingly by her sister, Mrs. Stanett, who also sang "Stars Shining Brightly," by Scott Bronte, with expression and depth of feeling.

Miss Doris Estor of Grand Pre, sang "God Send You Back to Me," Miss Odette Kennedy, also of Grand Pre, sang the new "Robin Adair" and Miss Evelyn Caldwell, of Gasperus, sang "The Hour of Memory." These young ladies are all favorites as soloists. Their selections were each beautiful and were rendered very sweetly and suitably. They are in very frequent demand for church and patriotic affairs, and always respond most cheerfully.

After the somewhat lengthy programme had been completed, the Principal, A. H. Patterson, B. A. reported that the year just ended had been a very healthy and happy one. A mild epidemic of Chickenpox, to which most flesh is heir, was the most serious physical affliction that befel the School. The attendance had been up to the full capacity of accommodation. There were thirty resident pupils and nine day students. The progress in class work had been most gratifying, and the department of the boys very satisfactory. The work of the assistant master, W. E. Harris, B. A., had been marked by faithful energy. Seven of the day students were young ladies, two of whom, the Misses Brey and Wharf of Hantsport, Miss Patterson presented diplomas, as they had completed the Course in shorthand and Typewriting and had been particularly bright students.

The speaker then called on the Rev. Arthur Hocking, of Berwick, a recent pastor of Grand P. E., and also on the Rev. J. M. R. of N. S. B. A., the present pastor, both of whom gave interesting addresses, containing words of encouragement to the boys and appreciation of the standard of the school. Mr. P. C. Gray, an elderly resident of the community, was present and referred to the fact that he had been a student at the school the first year it was organized, now just sixty-five years ago. He believed him to be the only survivor of a member of that year's class of boys. He had been a very near neighbor of the school during most of the years since, and he could bear testimony to the far moral tone of the school during that long period of time. It was a benefit to have such boys in the neighborhood. We hope that Mr. Gray may be spared many more years to attend Acacia Villa closings and encourage the students by his words of commendation.

Well Done, Wolfville.

With great satisfaction we receive the news from the front that our brave young townsman Clyde West, son of Mr. James West, has distinguished himself on the battle field on March 26th and has received the Military Medal. It appears that he and a comrade, Carl M. Dickey of Kentville, rendered valiant and skillful service in repairing telephone wires and other necessary military work while exposed to terrible shell and gas fire during the engagement.
