Light comes next to air and warmth, in its influence on the vigor and health of both animal and vegetable life. It is true we could live in the dark, but it is not be thy to keep shady, even in a physical point of

view. The rays of the sun have a remarkable influence on the growth as well as the health of animals and vegetables. It is a fact that the men who work in the coal mines of Europe, are subject to peculiar forms of diseases. This can only be accounted for by their living far down in the depths of the earth, away from the vivifying light of day. It has been found that the domestic animals will not thrive and grow when kept in a dark place, though ever so well fed and

cared for in other respects.

It is a fact well known to medical men, that in crowded cities, the inhabitants of houses on the north side of a street, where all the principal rooms are well lighted, suffer much less from sickness than families living on the other side, circumstances being as far as can be ascertained, exactly

the same. the same.

The custom of excluding light from houses by heavy thick window curtains, now so common, may preserve the furniture, but does not always preserve the health of the inmates. This is especially the case with regard to sleeping-rooms, which should not only be well aired, but during every fair day should have the benefit of all the sunlight which the windows can admit. Who that has ever been a sufferer from dyspensia, rheumatism, or sufferer from dyspepsia, rheumatism, or any other of the lingering diseases of our climate, has not noticed the difference in

this feelings on a dark cloudy day, and in the bright, cheering, smiling sunshine?

The effect of sunlight are still more apparent upon the vegetable than upon the animal. What a difference there is in the quality of the "pasture ash," so called, and that which grew in the deep shade of the forest, not only in the form of the tree, but in the strength and texture of the wood. This difference must no doubt be owing mostly to the exposure to the winds, difference of soil, &c., but in a great measure to the

influence of light.
We often see vegetables stretch upward in order to get at the light, seeming to have a sort of intelligence in regard to its necessity in the process of maturing its flower and fruit The scrape or the stalk of the and trut. The scrape or the stark of the dandelion, for instance, which supports its flowers, if it grows where there is nothing to shade it, is seldom more than three or four inches long, but among all tall weeds, or grass, where shaded, it will sometimes grow to the height of two feet in its endeayours to avoid the over shadowing influence of its neighbors, and gain free access to the light. Gardeners sometimes take advantage of this fact, and obtain long stalks of rhubarb early, by placing a barrel with each end knocked out over the spreading leaves.
The leaves stretch up towards the light at
the top, and thus they get long and tender stalks for early use.
Plants kept in the house always lean

towards the nearest window, and we have this summer seen a cornfield adjoining a thick grove of tall trees, where the plants, for some distance from the trees, leaned away from the shade, the plants in the rows accrest to the trees standing at an angle of fifteen degrees from perpendicular. One reason why light is so essential to healthy vegetation, is undoubtedly this, viz: the decomposition of the carbonic acid in the air, or in other words, the absorption of carbon from the air, one of the most impor-tant sources of nourishment to vegetables, takes place only through the agency of light.—Maine Farmer.

GUNPOWDER.

GUNPOWDER.

The source of power in guspowder lies with the saltpetre. This substance, termed nitrate of potash, consists of nitric acid and pprash. Now, the nitric acid is, as it were, an immense volume of atmospheric sir, condensed into a solid, re dy on demand to assume the air form by the touch of a spark of fire. When sulphur and charcoal are mixed with nitre (saltpetre) and a spark is applied, the sulphur (brinatone) ignites, setting fire to the charcoal. Air is supplied to these substances by the decomposition of the nitre; the atmosphere condensed therein instantly unites with the combustibles, and the result is an intensely hot gascous compound, two thousand times the bulk of the original solid. The English government guspowder is composed of 75 parts of nitre, 15 of charcoal, and 10 of sulphur. The nent garpowder is composed of 75 parts of nitre, 15 of charcoal, and 10 of sulphur. The Russian government pouder consists of 732 parts of nitre, 131 of charcoal, and 123 of sulphur.—

Three sides of it are mashed by the Black Sea, and the north-east side The Crimea is a peninsula of about 8000 square miles, possessing a greater variety of natural resources than perhaps any territory of equal extent in Europe. Three sides of it are washed by the Black Sea, and the north-east side by the Sea of Azw. It forms part of the Russian government of Taurida; and its present condition, as a country neglected, depressed, and debased, is a standing festimony to the evil influence of Russian rule. So far from keeping pace with the progress of the age, the Crimea has sadly retrograded. Her products are shipped off in considerable quantities to Russia, much of them extorted from her in return for the crar's protection. The fertility of some parts of the Crimea is so great; that several of the most valuable of the fruits of the earth can be cultivated, with but slight labour, in the greatest perfection, and to an astonishing extent of increase. This was known to the ancient Greeks, and was taken advantage of by Greece under her system of colonisation. Six centuries before the Crimitian ers. they had begun to form colonies on the northers shores of Asia Minor; and we learn from Strabo, and other writers of antiquity, that they preferred this peninsula, from its containing so many inducements to industrial enterprise, particularly in the rich case of its soil, which, it is affirmed, was found to yield a return of fifty times the seed. At one time, indeed, it was considered the granary of Greece, especially of Athens, whose territory, being of small extent, and of indifferent fertility, was unable to maintain its large population by its own produce. There is a deep classical interest in this subject. Demosthenes has, more than once, had his cluqueue excited by it.
