The Duke of Connaught.

I heard a story the other night which goes a long way to explain the Duke of Connaught's popularity in the army. One of the Prince's fellow-officers, was about to leave his regiment. Calling to bid him farewell, His Royal Highness was induced to promise him his carte. It was also to arrive on the night before the officer took leave, but it did not come. Early next morning the officer was riding out of barracks, when, just as he reached the gates, he heard his name shouted by a breathless runner. Turning round he saw Prince Arthur, flushed and panting, rushing along at full speed, and holding up, in explanation of his unprincipally haste, the promised photograph. Something had happened to prevent its presentation on the previous night, and the Prince had turned out early in order that with his own lips he might make apology for the apparent breach of promise. Very few men, I imagine, would have taken that trouble about a portrait which could be sent by post, and I doubt if there is another prince of our own or any other reigning family who would have done so. Nobody except a prince, too, could have done it without appearing fussy and undignified. But his thoughtfulness and delicacy made his comradely arms all the prouder. It is no wonder that he is spoken of as not only kindly but most enthusiastically.—*London Correspondent.*

There is a proverb current in northern India which says of any one who meets with unexpected good fortune, that "he was struck with the axe of Mahmood the Ghaznevide." This curious saying, takes its origin from an historical episode of the first conquest of India. When Mahmood, of Ghazni (Ghizni), descended upon the Punjab from Afghanistan, entered the city of Somnath, in which stood the most sacred of all the Hindoo temples, the Brahmin priests met him at the gate of the shrine, offering an enormous ransom if he would but spare their temple and its idol. The eyes of the rapacious Afghans sparkled at sight of the treasures thus spread before them, and murmurs of approval were heard here and there; but Mahmood sternly bade them be silent, and pointing to the idol that stood in the midst, shouted "God has raised me up not to traffic in idols but to sweep them from the face of the earth. Behold my answer!" One downright blow of his battle axe sent the heinous image crashing on the pavement, and as it broke asunder out poured heaps of gold and jewels worth fifty-fold the offered ransom—this strange incident place being, in fact, the treasury of the cunning Brahmins, who were thus sacrificing a part in order to save the whole.

ROMANCE OF THE YELLOW FEVER.
—One of the thousand and one tragic incidents of the great plague happened at Holly Springs a few days since. A beautiful young lady of New Orleans was forced by her father to marry an old man she could not love. Preferring death to slavery, the young lady ran away and gave her services as nurse to the fever-stricken of Holly Springs. After a few days of devoted attention to the sick she was herself stricken down. There was a male nurse for her, but no female hand to soothe with its gentle touch the fevered brow. But the noble Ridley was there to perform the last sad offices to the dying girl. Towards the last she said to him: "Kiss me." As Ridley kissed her on the cheek she exclaimed: "Kiss my lips," which he did. She then said: "You are the only man I ever kissed; kiss me again." While he was in the act of kissing her, she threw her arms around his neck and then instantly expired.—*Memphis Avalanche.*

The Marquis of Lorne.

One of the oldest and noblest houses in Scottish history is that of Argyll, one of the grandest names in story is that of Campbell. To this illustrious name and race belong the Marquis of Lorne, successor of Earl Dufferin. Far back in the ages when clans crossed over the border and the shrill pibroch sounded across the hills, when "plaided and plumed in their tartan array," they followed their chief to battle, the name of MacCallum-more or Campbell the great, was known and revered from the Orkney Islands to the Frith of Forth.

As early as the year 1445, one of the family attained peerage, and his son, the second Lord Campbell, was made the Earl of Argyll. A higher honor was in store for him, for a few years after he was appointed Master of the King's Household, by James III. of Scotland. He subsequently served as Ambassador to England, then to France, and became Lord High Chancellor of Scotland. During his lifetime the title Lorne fell to his family by marriage. The second Earl led a body of brave Scots against Surry, in the bloody battle of Flodden Field. After the fight the noble earl, side by side with the brave Scottish king, lay dead upon the field.

In the troublous sea of politics that saw the fairest and best of Queens imprisoned on a solitary rock; that saw afterwards her head struck off upon the block, and her heartless half-brother Murray fall under the assassin's hand, a third Earl of the name is in one of the heads that rule the state, and restore calm o'er the troubled sea.

We skip till we come to the seventh Earl. He was a statesman of a broad mind, and well beloved by prince and people; but in one short day he became the scapegoat by embracing the Roman Catholic faith. For this he was obliged to make over all his possessions to his son, Lord Lorne. The latter Earl leaned towards the Scottish Church, and with might and main fought against Charles I and Laud in the establishment of the Episcopal Church, and their endeavor to force this form upon the people of the North. But the King was bound to coax into compliance the unbending noble, and he created him Marquis. But this was without avail. When the civil war broke out he took up arms against Charles. He it was that led the gallant troops against Montrose "the Loyal," but was vanquished. He afterwards became repentant and joined the King; indeed he it was that placed the Crown upon the head of Charles II. at Scone. It subsequently appeared that he had been mixed up with Cromwell, and, being tried for high treason, he was executed.

Hard were the fortunes of the son. Through the revolution never was his loyalty shaken, and he received his father's estate and an Earldom. The Marquisate had now expired. He refused to take the "test oath" as a Privy Councillor, except with some modifications. For this he too was charged with high treason, tried before fifteen Scotch noblemen, and three Judges pronounced sentence of death upon him. In the dark hours of night, and while thunders shook his prison to the foundation, he escaped and fled to Holland. He returned shortly afterwards at the head of an army against James, was taken prisoner and beheaded. The tenth Earl offered the Crown of England to the Prince of Orange and took an active part in the wars of 1688-9. For his services he received the title of Duke, in 1701. His son, the second Duke of Argyll, was instrumental in bringing about the union of the Thistle and the Rose, in Anne's reign. High honors were conferred on the third Duke, and at the same time he had at

most full control of the Scottish Government.
 The eighth Duke, George John Douglas, born in 1823, still holds the title. He is a strong Presbyterian, an able politician and a rather powerful orator. At the downfall of Palmerston's Administration he retired, but the year following he resumed the office of Lord of the Privy Seal. In '68 he became Secretary for India, and in this office his eldest son, the Marquis of Lorne, acted as Secretary.

The Marquis, (our Governor), is 33 years old. He has been a representative in the Commons, for Argyllshire, and on March 21st, '71, at St. George's Chapel, Windsor, married the Princess Louise Carolina Alberta, fourth daughter of Queen Victoria. The Princess was voted a marriage dowry of \$30,000, and an annual allowance of \$6,000. She is thirty years old.

University Appointment

The Senate met on Monday last for the appointment of a Professor to the Chair of Classics and History. There were four applicants for the position—Rev. Mr. Mulvaney, Episcopalian, of Ontario, Mr. Dunlop, now in Prince Edward Island, Mr. Brydges, so widely known, and Mr. Dole of St. John. The Senate concluded to make no permanent appointment till the end of the session, but Mr. Dole fills the chair in the interim. We believe Mr. Dole will accept the position.

There are two or three objectionable features in the act of the Senate. Let it be granted that the object that body has in view is to secure a man of the proper qualifications; that personal likes or dislikes are not at all thrown in the scale. Now, if at the end of June next, Mr. Dole step out, it is a fair conclusion that he does not possess the required ability for the position. And on the other hand, in view of this fact the Senate out of good nature may be induced to see sight of the former object and retain Mr. Dole even though he does not come up to the standard. The present arrangement is unfair to Mr. Dole, unfair to the institution itself.

No doubt the majority of the Senate were in favor of Mr. Brydges' appointment, and it is much to be regretted that that gentleman is not available for the position just now. The Senate as well as himself is a little blameable for this. We had fondly hoped to see the University make a sudden bound onward in the intellectual road in the appointment of Mr. Brydges.

We are glad, at any rate, that a brighter day has dawned for the highest seat of learning in the Province; and let us hope that the new Professor will ever keep in mind that to God and to man he is responsible for the right discharge of his duty, that much is expected of him to whom much hath been entrusted—that a man cannot serve two masters.

The War.

The roar of cannon and the clash of steel announce that the God of War is loose in the land of the Afghans. The first shot was fired from the Dingy fort of Ali Musjid. The shell burst harmlessly on the air before it had nigh reached the British force. The English halted, and waiting their inevitable forty-pounders' arrival, opened a heavy fire on the fort. All the while the Afghans were banging away with their seven-pounders, doing little or no execution. After firing a few shots, two forty-pounder shells went crashing into the central bastion, ripping up the defences and dismounting some of the guns. Shortly after this the Infantry made a brisk advance, the 4th brigade going at the "double" up the valley to the left, clambering over rocks and on towards the fort. The 3rd brigade pushed up on the right, firing occasional volleys at the enemy perched on the ledges of rock at the foot of Ali Musjid. They returned a sharp fire, but in the very teeth of it the disciplined and courageous soldiers pushed up close to the fort. Night fell on the belligerents, and operations offensive and defensive ceased. The bright sun on Friday morning breaking on the fort revealed it deserted. The Afghans had fled, leaving their arms and war material in the hands of the enemy.

The appointments recently made at Ottawa, by Mr. Anglin, is the subject of much newspaper talk.

"Water Works" seem to be a kind of Shibboleth for some of the aldermen. For pity sake get the city clear of debt, then get the supply. This object, however, should be kept steadily in view.

The Marquis and Princess seem much pleased at their reception, an exchange says. Who wouldn't?

One beautiful morning recently I started to shoot some partridges in the wood near the head-waters of Miramichi. I had not been long out when an Indian overtook me and said: "Ho! my friend, there are big moose and little moose feeding in the birch on the other side of the stream." I asked him where his gun was. He told me other Indians had it away down the river. I accordingly started off with him and we had no small difficulty in crossing the stream. We soon arrived at the opening, where the Indian said the moose were feeding, and looking around we saw them about a quarter of a mile from us quietly browsing on some small trees. I went carefully around to leeward, and directed the Indian to go and give them his wind by approaching on the other side, as soon as he thought I had reached my intended post, whither I knew they would make, in order to pass through the opening. So accurately had the Indian calculated time and distance, that I was hardly at my place when the smaller one came galloping along and received a shot low and close behind the shoulder as he passed. He stumbled on for about ten paces, gave a rear upward and then fell. I waited to reload; and on going up found him stone dead. The Indian then joined me and informed me that other moose had not gone down the river in an opposite direction. We soon came in sight of him, it was standing a little way off in another opening beside the stream. The small bushes and brushwood afforded me cover within eighty yards of him, profiting by which I crept up and taking aim, fired. The animal gave a convulsive start, moved off a little way and turned and faced me. I fired again, a distance of over a hundred yards but he did not stir. I re-loaded and fired a third time whereupon to my utter surprise he turned and made at me. Thinking the moose was not capable of doing much fighting I loaded again, and walked to within twenty paces of him. I fired for the fourth time directly at the region of his heart as I thought; but to my amazement he went his tail and down went his head and with mad speed he was near me in a twinkling. I ran hard for it, but the moose rapidly overtook me. My situation was becoming anything but pleasant. Thinking it might like the cow, shut its eyes in making a charge I swerved suddenly to one side to evade the shock, and, with such effect that the infuriated animal pitched forward upon its knees. I ran up and gave him a smart rap on the nose with my rifle stock which closed his mortal career. After a few minutes the Indian joined me laughing, having been a quiet watcher of the whole proceedings. That night tired and hungry I sat in the camp beside the blazing logs with the Red Man and enjoyed a juicy venison-steak and a quiet and refreshing sleep. CENTREVILLE, Nov. 26th. C.

They often accompany a hurricane at the equinoctial or monsoon, and sweeping inland with a fury that knows no control, overwhelm houses and forests, founder fleets or lift them from their anchors and leave them high and dry on the shore, and snatch hundreds and thousands of human beings to the remorseless deep. Such a tidal wave which burst over Holland five centuries ago and formed the great gulf called the Zuyder Zee, not only destroying the population but actually annihilating the land on which they dwelt. Such a wave, or eagre, which overwhelmed the lowlands of Lincolnshire, so well described in Jean Ingelow's famous poem. Such a tidal wave, it was eighty-nine feet in height, which destroyed Callao. But the most awful event of this sort of our century was the hurricane and tidal wave which but a little over a year devastated the alluvial shores of Bengal, and completely submerging an island on the coast, obliterated a population of two hundred and fifteen thousand souls in one night. The captain of an American bark, which was anchored in the roads of Chittagong on that fearful night, told me that when the cyclone set in at evening he was surrounded by a fleet of over one hundred and fifty sail. Although the barometer was low, the signs did not indicate what a catastrophe was at hand. But, as the night wore on, the wind arose to a degree absolutely appalling. They could not stand on deck; they watched in the wheel house, every moment expecting the vessel to founder or part her cables and drag on shore. She buried her bowsprit under, and, as they found the next day, the spray, loaded with mud, was blown up to the top-gallant yards. When day broke at last over the raging scene, he discovered that of all the large fleet anchored there at evening every ship but his own had foundered or drifted ashore, while the town was prostrate, and the cocoanut groves which surrounded it had disappeared. 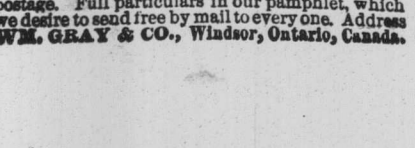
