mont is now the only example in the Church of a class of monasteries which were once numerous and powerful, especially in England, namely, cathedral priories-monacteries attached to certain great cathedral churches, where the chapter was monastic, the provost a cathedral prior and the Bishop generally a monk. The titles of twelve of these cathedrals are still held among the English Benedictines, and at the restoration of the hierarchy one of the new bishoprics. that of Newport, was assigned to them by the Holy See at the unanimous request of the English hierarchy, in order to perpetuate this feature of the ancient Church and the Benedictines in England. Some years ago Leo XIII. granted a petition of Bishop Hedley that the Cathedral priors of his chapter abbatial insignia, mitre and crozier, etc., which had been possessed by their predecessors before the "Reformation." Belmont enjoys another distinction. Besides being the only Cathedral priory in the world-perhaps in consequence of that fact-it further holds a unique position as the one cathedral in English-speaking lands-America and Australia included, as well as Ireland and Great Britain-in which the proper services of a cathedral are fully performed, the Divine Office being daily chanted by the canons in residence, assisted by a numerous choir of monks. In all other cathedrals, as there exists either communities nor endowments, these arduous but essential duties of the chapter have hitherto been found too difficult to discharge. If certain projects are carried out, the distinction which the chapter of Newport has long possessed may shortly be shared in by the new Metropolitan Cathedral at Westminuter; meanwhile, it is timely to notice with what fidelity the English Benedictines at Belmont have performed the task laid upon them

The Waldeck Rousseau Cabinet and their War Minister, General Andre, have been so much criticized and even roundly abused-not without reason, as my readers knowthat they should be given credit for what they do sometimes in the interest of the clergy, says the Paris correspondent of the "Lindon Mon-itor and New Era." It is a wellknown fact that some years ago compulsory military service for clergymen was ordered, and the dergy had to "do" their three years in the army like other French sitizens. General Andre has decided that, although he had not the power to exempt elergymen from this obligation-which could be done only by a law-be had the power of regulating its application so as to make it less irksome to those who come under it. Clergymen, together with medical and pharmaceutical students, will in future have to perform only one year's service and will not be incorporated into regiments, but placed on hospital duty. Each county is divided into road districts about the same as at present, and the districts to be included in each of the road divisions will be determined by the Government.
