Three instantly killed and fourth seri-

ously injured is the appalling record of an accident which occurred on the Toronto Hamilton and Buffalo Railway, near Mineral Springs, the other day, when a freight train crashed through a wooden bridge and 0.24 to 0.25 fell a distance of twenty feet. The dead 0.00 to 0.00 are: Robert McFadyen, engineer; Syd-0.09 to 0.10 ney Brown, fireman; and William Maloney, the fireman's brother-in-law. The locomotive had passed over when there was a crash. The wooden structure collapsed 0 80 to 0.75 and the tender and five freight cars went 0.60 to 0.70 down in a heap. The tender turned a 0.75 to 1 00 complete somersault and landed square on 0.05 to 0.06 the engine cab, pinning the three unfortunate men in the debris and instantly 0.06 to 0.08 snuffing out their lives.




