



Notes and Comments.

The fishing industry of the United Kingdom has 25,000 boats engaged, with 100,000 men and boys on board as crews. There is of course a large number of people employed on shore, engaged in cleaning, curing, packing and selling fish. About \$53,532,000 worth of fish is landed from British beats annually half of which is exported. About \$19,466,000 worth of fish is imported.

Germany in 1911 took from Great Britain 1.319.220 barrels of herring and also large importations from the Netherlands, Norway and Sweden. The herring trade is dominated by the Scotch packer who have an advantage as the herring shoals frequent the British coast within the three mile

The American Consul-General at Hamburg describes the German demand for herring as follows:-

"The German trade demands three classes of salted herring, each of which has its season. During May and June there is an extensive sale in the North Sea coast region, as well as in the Netherlands, of Matjes herring-that is to say, drawn fish lightly salted and of the first quality. It is not considered possible to import herring of this class from remote fishing ity, on a visit to friends. countries. Maties herring of the first quality come in barrels containing 125 pieces, of a gross weight of 330 pounds. and they command as much as \$30 per number of boys in the West End are ingstone Street, where a service will barrel. 


