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





GREAT BATTLE ON LEFT WING OF

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The Times correspondent at Dieppe sends the following: I have just returned from Amiens District to send this despatch. A great battle has been fought at Croiseles and is probably still in progress. The French claims a success towards Guiz, but south of it all Saturday there was heavy fighting on the left. 

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


