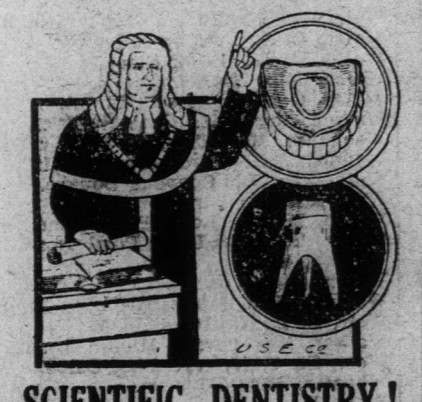

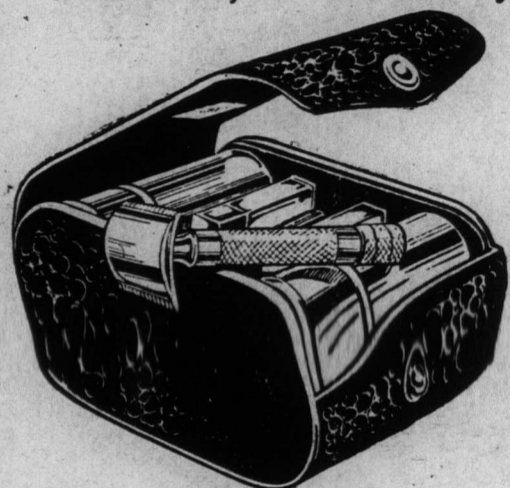



LONDON, To-Day. The Times correspondent at Dieppe sends the following: "I have just returned from Amiens District to send this despatch. A great battle has been fought at Croiselles and is probably still in progress. The French claims a success towards Guiz, but south of it all Saturday there was heavy fighting on the left. I know cannonading was still going on at noon on Sunday and that at 5 o'clock on Sunday afternoon there were German planes in Amiens. Whether, as some declare, the lines between Amiens and Boulogne have been cut, I do not know."

Circuit Court Back Again.

There arrived by last evening's express the Circuit Court, comprising Chief Justice Horwood, Sub-Sheriff Carroll, Clerks Kent and Byrne, Crier Alsopp, and Lawyers Higgins, Hunt, Summers and Emerson. The Court opened at Penticton which was left four weeks ago on the revenue cruiser Fions and toured the Southwest Coast to Bonnet Bay, holding many busy sessions as they went along, concluding at St. George's where a number of cases were heard. The Court joined the incoming express at Bay of Islands and came back to town.

Fight Better Barefooted

Paris, Aug. 27.—The Matin relates that on the arrival of a train bringing wounded Senegalese riflemen nearly all were found smoking furiously from long porcelain pipes taken from the enemy and seemingly indifferent to their wounds. One silly told of the capture of a machine gun by the Senegalese. The rifleman, the Matin it seems, was brought up by a detachment of German dragoons and the Senegalese bravely charged them. Through their arms and bodies are heaped by sabre thrusts, the Senegalese complain of nothing but the obligation to fight with shoes on. Before going into battle at Charleville they slyly rid themselves of these impediments and came back shod in German footwear to avoid punishment for losing equipment.


Stole Table Worth \$5,000

During the Period They are at War With British Empire. Toronto, Aug. 27.—We are at war with Germany, and by the law, as long as this state of war exists, no German firm has any status in a Canadian Court, said Judge Morson today, in refusing to give judgment in a case where a German firm sued a Canadian firm for payment for dress-goods. This is the first law action by a German firm in Canada since the war began.

Germans Have No Status in a Canadian Court.



Wheat.

By GEORGE FITCH, Author of "At Good Old St. John's." Wheat is the oak from which the staff of life is cut. If we did not have wheat we would have to make bread from corn, oats, rye, barley, sawdust or bran, and blonde bread would be unknown. Wheat is a tall, thin plant which grows a beard at an early age and produces a head full of small, brown kernels worth \$1.00 a bushel whenever times are prosperous and crops are reasonably short. This year the United States will produce 900,000,000 bushels of wheat worth \$750,000,000. This sounds like a good deal of money until we reflect that the American automobile bill for this year will be about \$500,000,000. Many a farmer who has raised more wheat this year than ever before is going to be able thereby to pay for his last year's automobile and order a new one. Most of our wheat is planted in the fall. Then the farmer spends the winter praying for snow, rain, cold, warmth, thaw and frosts in the proper proportion. In the spring the wheat comes up without help and all the farmer has to do is to sit on the fence and watch for rain clouds. Raising wheat requires less labor than almost any other department of farming. But it takes a strong constitution to do the proper amount of worrying. Wheat is greatly beloved by all Canadian nations because of the fine white flour which it produces. It is also highly esteemed by the chinpanzee, the Hessian fly, the army worm, the grasshopper, the seventeen-year locust and other hungry bugs. When a few billion such bugs get into a wheat field for a few hours they make it look like the democratic administration after the office seekers have done their worst.

Be Strong and of Good Cheer.

We have good reason to feel proud of the response for volunteers made by the men of Newfoundland, and not less reason to be proud of the ladies who answered to the call of Lady Davidson to the women of Newfoundland to work for those who are at the front or who will be going to the front. Newfoundland can feel that she is taking her place in the Empire in doing her part in the general work which is being done in the homeland. In very truth we are fighting to preserve the sanctity and independence of the home. Fortunate are we British that our homelands, both in the Old Country and the colonies, are defended by the sea and our brave men who are on its bosom. How much more fortunate are we than our friends and allies in Europe with but a land frontier and hordes of modern Hunns over-running their land, trampling down their crops, destroying their granaries, burning their homesteads, and devastating their cities. Think of the hundreds of thousands of men, women and children, non-combatants, homeless and hungry, and but one short month of the war has passed over their heads, and yet to-day probably one hundred thousand combatants and non-combatants are now lying in their graves to feed the maw of the modern Meloch with a lust for world domination. In the past that streak of blue has proved the salvation of the world from military despotism. It is our proud privilege and opportunity to attempt again what our forefathers did. It is not the first time that Europe has been ground down under the wheels of a military juggernaut. But Britain held the seas. British gold financed the struggle. British people are still paying the cost of the Freedom they won for Europe a century ago. British contingents heartened up their allies, and a day came after long years of peril, privation and perseverance, when the final words came: "Up Guards and at them," and the military ocre was brought to his knees and never rose again.

Had as the conditions are now, and they are bad enough in all conscience, they have been worse, and the British bull-dog has held on and pulled down his prey eventually. The vast military prowess of Germany is being used to the full. Germany has over-run almost the whole of Belgium. Antwerp is the only fortified part which is not under the sway of the Kaiser, the main struggle is going on in the north of France, a big flanking movement on the left of our allies is being executed with success, and the centre is being vigorously and pitilessly assailed. With the successful turning movement of Germany in the northwest departments of France, the fighting in the centre in all probability means that the centre is fighting.

TO ENCOURAGE RECRUITING.

LONDON, To-day.
Asquith and Balfour are to speak in the Guild Hall, London, this week in an effort to encourage recruiting. The Guild Hall will be used as a recruiting station.

BULGARIA'S GRAND OFFER.

ROME, To-day.
A message says the Bulgarian Government has informed Serbia that if Roumania will abandon her neutrality in favor of Russia, Bulgaria will do likewise, so all the Balkan states with the exception of Turkey will side with the Triple Entente.

\$50 MILLION DOLLARS OF GERMAN SHIPPING SEIZED.

LONDON, To-day.
An analysis of the attack on the enemy's shipping since the war began shows 190 German and 13 Austrian ships have been captured and taken to British ports, while 34 German ships were seized by the Belgians at Antwerp. The largest German ships captured by the British have a combined net tonnage of nearly half a million. The captures comprise several very valuable cargoes. The value of ships captured by the British is estimated at \$50,000,000. Of 8,256 replies received in answer to the Government enquiries to the proposed extension of the Moratorium, 3,663 were for extension and 4,653 against. These most strong for the extension are 180,000 men are not strong enough to keep them back. There is no need to despair, Russia is still to be counted on, and it must be remembered, every day will see immense additions to the myriads of men Russia is putting against Prussia and Austria. It should however be remembered that Russia has a Herculean task before her. Between her armies and Berlin there are two long lines of fortified towns which will need reduction before she can threaten Berlin. But the more pressure she can put on Germany the less pressure Germany can put on France. She may soon exhaust herself, and even if she exhausts France, she cannot exhaust the British Empire or Russia. As long as our brave tars hold the sea and control seaways, as they are doing now, Britain can pour more and more troops into France against her. Kitchener has had no chance yet. He has been only a month in charge of the British Army, and it takes time to build up armies which can work like machines and use armaments of precision and destruction. But he is at work, and with the sea open, a time will surely come when there will be another cry for a final charge, which shall bring down the Frankenstein that is threatening the liberties of the world.

20,000,000 TONS OF BRITISH SHIPPING AS BAIT FOR GERMAN.

LONDON, To-day.
Continental connections are giving the city the hardest hit by the recent dislocation of credit. Lloyd George announced in the Commons that German men of war on all the seas have captured 20,000 tons of British shipping. There remains 200,000 tons to be taken, said the Chancellor, amid derisive laughter.

BEAR DID NOT EFFECT RESCUE.

NOME, To-day.
The cutter Bear which left Nome on July 24th, to rescue 18 white men and 3 Eskimoes who found shelter on Wrangle Island, after Stefansson's exploring ship Karluk had been wrecked last January, returned to Nome without the castaways. Bear sent word ahead that she ran short of coal. After coaling at Nome she will again set out for Wrangle Island. It is not known how near the Bear approached the castaways.

CANADIAN TROOPS FOR BERMUDA.

HALIFAX, To-day.
The Duke of Cornwallis, who arrived on Sunday night spent a busy day in Halifax and left at midnight for Ottawa. He inspected the Royal Canadian Regiment which is about to sail for Bermuda and also the harbor forts.

PAPAL CONCLAVE IN SESSION.

ROME, To-day.
At 7.30 o'clock last evening Cardinal Della Chiesa, Cardinal Advocato, closed the inside door to the Conclave Hall in which the College of Cardinals gathered to elect a successor to the late Pope. The enemy's supply arrangements are reported to have broken down. Their men in some cases are subsiding on the flesh of horses. LONDON, To-day.

Importer's Suggestion.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—The Legislature is going to meet to-morrow to devise Ways and Means, a stray suggestion may not be out of place. We all know the revenue is going to be short, and as it cannot be helped, we must all do our share by paying the duty put on certain goods. My suggestion is why not put an export tariff on fish, cod oil, lobsters, salmon, berries, etc., say 3 cents a quintal on fish, 2c. a gallon on cod oil, 50c. a case on lobsters, 20c. a case on salmon, etc. This would bring in a large revenue. Also a stamp tax, say on all accounts of \$10.00 and over to have a 2c. stamp affixed and no receipt to be legal without it. As an importer I can well afford to put a 2c. stamp on a \$10.00 account and over.

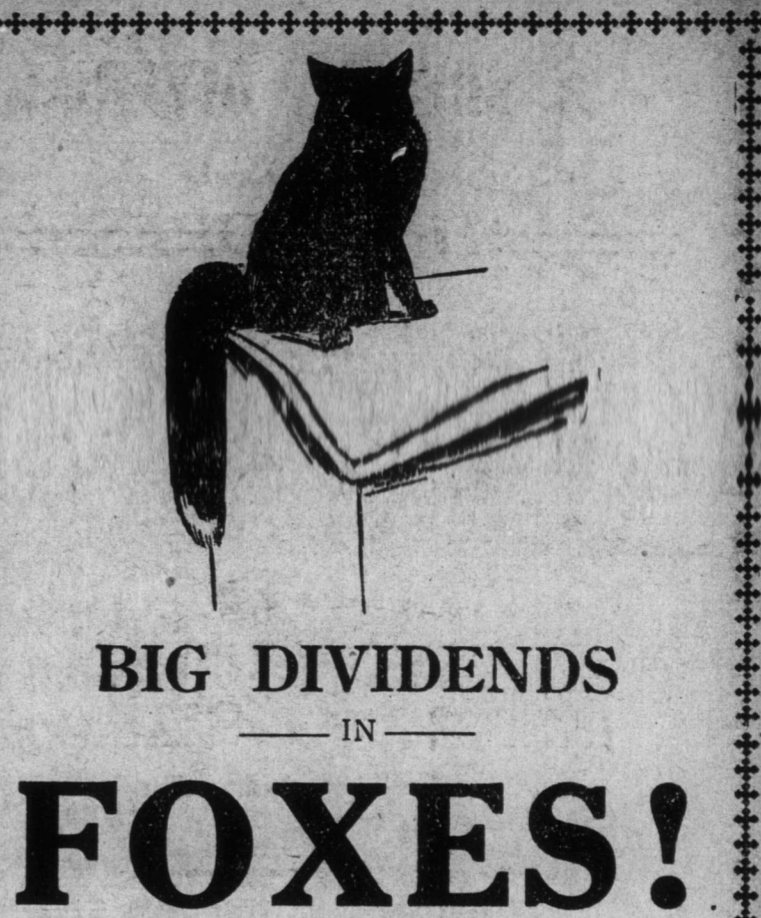

Foreign Legion

Formed in Paris of all Nations.

Paris, Aug. 21.—The great square fronting the Invalides in Paris to-day presented a striking spectacle when 18,000 foreign volunteers assembled in orderly formation under the flags of the various nations to be mustered in.

There were 4,500 Jews from all countries who desired to serve as a separate command; there were also 3,000 Belgians, 4,500 Italians, 2,500 Russians, 2,000 Swiss, 1,000 Spaniards, 300 Roumanians, 330 Luxemburgians and 125 Americans.

Clock to Run 30,000 Years.

An English scientist claims that a clock he has invented could run for 30,000 years, if not touched. It contains a tube of radium, to the lower end of which two long strips of silver are attached. The natural action of the radium sends an electric charge into the strips, and causes them to touch the sides of a glass vessel in which they are suspended. Every two minutes his operation is repeated automatically, so that each beat of this wonderful clock lasts two minutes.

A Thought for the Times

THE WAR!
L. C. MORRIS.

Who that has jostled with the crowd, or followed in the throng, or has heard the tumult of some great disaster, and has not felt a common interest?

At all times we are open to such impressions; but perhaps on no occasion are we more prone to these feelings, than in times of war, and such a time as this; wars and rumors of wars fill the air and everybody is alert to catch the latest news.

To date Europe has had a month of war but the news from the front of what has actually occurred, has been extremely meagre; therefore we can only conjecture what really has taken place. Strict censorship on the one side, and excitement on the other side have, no doubt, tended to withhold from the public the true state of affairs; but there is the stern fact that war exists! Some of us had almost begun to think that warfare was a thing of the past, and that in name only would its horrors be known. But our ideals were premature, and after a half century of European peace we now behold the continent ablaze, and nine great powers set in battle array. How long this will continue will rest with Russia, or rather with the honour of Russia. That Germany has made a mistake is certain, and by this mistake she has frustrated her purposes, and defeated her own interests. Notwithstanding the fact that she is largely a fruit-raising and agricultural country and is rich in mineral resources, and that during the last forty years she has grown rich and independent, she nevertheless owes much of her success to the other nations who traded with her, and who purchased her manufactures. By her mad act of war she has cut herself off from all this trade, and it is the effect of this feature of the war that will tell most upon her. Whatever chance Germany had of gaining the victory in the direction of Belgium and France at the outbreak of the war, she has not any such chance now. Her death blow will suddenly be given by Russia; and unless things take a most unusual turn—and they sometimes do—than there is but one course open for Germany and that will be to call for terms. This may end the present conflict but it does precaution be not taken and firm treaties be made in time there may develop such complications as would indeed alter the entire map of Europe. When Germany is reckoned with the question that arises is: "Can Russia be trusted?" and will she be satisfied to continue as she has been since the battle of Sebastopol? That battle crippled her power as a sea-force, because it limited her fleets to the Dardanelles, and confined them to the Hellespont. But she has not ceased to seek an outlet for her ships. Her war with Japan was somewhat on these lines, and every student of events is aware that Russia, as the "Bear of the North" has growled savagely because of her confinement within the Dardanelles. Russia may act with honour, but if she desires to reclaim her long-lost sea power, then she may break faith with her allies and either claim as her privilege, or demand as her right, the

Canadian Premier Warns Dealers Against Unfair Prices.

Ottawa, Aug. 25.—Unjustifiable increases in the cost of the necessities of life will be met by Governmental action.

With the grave conditions which confront us," runs a statement issued by the Prime Minister last night, "any course which would be oppressive or unfair toward the laboring and artisan classes is most strongly to be condemned and will demand the exercise by the Government of all the power at its command."

The Prime Minister's statement reads:—

"While the action of the majority of dealers throughout the country during the present crisis has been characterized by a sense of fairness and justice, nevertheless several complaints have reached the Government that arbitrary and burdensome increases in the cost of certain necessities of life have been made in some localities without any sufficient or substantial cause or reason.

"Under the circumstances it is desirable to have it generally known that under the wide powers which have been conferred by parliament the Government has the right to investigate and to deal promptly with any case or cases of unjustifiable increase or any oppressive combination or tendency on the part of dealers."

"Under the grave conditions which confront us by reason of the outbreak of war any course which would be oppressive or unfair toward the laboring and artisan classes and generally those possessed of small fixed incomes is most strongly to be condemned and will demand the exercise by the Government of all the powers at its command."

While the question is not discussed in the official statement reports received here indicate that unscrupulous dealers are taking advantage of the war taxes to increase their prices out of all proportion.

Shackleton in Training

According to a London despatch, Sir Ernest Shackleton and the men who are to accompany him on his south polar trip have undergone a regular course of training to prepare them for the long and hard walk across the Antarctic continent. Sir Ernest says: "One's only chance is to be hard and springy. I begin every day by boxing with one of the members of the expedition. We go at each other hard, and a shower bath after this exercise sends me to my office feeling full of energy. The most important thing, I believe, is to eat and drink wisely. I have been on the 'water wagon' for months, and I shall not touch alcohol again until I come back from the Antarctic. When I go out to lunch or dinner I have to sit half the time watching other people eat. Of course, I avoid rich foods which tax the digestive powers, but otherwise I eat whatever comes along, my only rule being to eat very little. On the way out, and I hope we start in the early days of August, we shall do a few Swedish exercises, as marching in polar regions we must live on oneself as a camel lives on his hump."

Ladies' Patriotic Movement.

Women's Association Formed-- Address of Lady Davidson.

The meeting convened by Lady Davidson and held at the British Hall yesterday afternoon, was attended by about seven hundred ladies, who expressed their willingness to assist in aiding the Empire in the present crisis by providing for soldiers at the front. The object of the meeting was to form a Women's Patriotic Association to arrange for the providing of necessary articles for the sick and wounded, and also for those who are going to the front to uphold the honor of Newfoundland in defense of the Empire.

In opening the meeting, Lady Davidson delivered the following address:

Let me first say how very glad I am to welcome you all here to-day, and to see how many have responded to my appeal—an appeal, which I verily believe was not necessary—for I am convinced that it was only a call that was required—and you were all waiting ready to respond. I felt sure that there were many wishing to work or do something for our brave soldiers and sailors, who are risking their very lives for us, and who yet did not know the best ways of helping or what the needs of those at the front might be.

That this is a unique time, when we are required to make personal sacrifices, such as we have never thought or dreamt of before, there can be no doubt. It is the best we can do for those who are enduring daily hardships, and giving their health and their strength for our beloved Empire.

To the Mother Country, the Queen and Queen Alexandra have sent out urgent appeals that all women should help to their utmost and in every way that is possible. The Queen herself is the organizer of a large working guild, she started it when she was Princess of Wales, and in November of each year, when all the Presidents throughout England have to collect and send in their country contributions to St. James' Palace, where the Queen has her collecting and distributing centre, she goes there daily herself and inspects the articles sent in, supervising their unpacking and arranging and organizing their distribution. I have been told by one of her ladies in waiting, that the Queen knows quite well and remembers which districts send in good and which bad contributions and occasionally she requests that such and such President should be told that the contribution from her district is not up to the mark. My mother is a President of a Surrey district, and when I was at home, we all had to help, when her contributions came in to arrange and repack them—generally about 1,000 articles—and she would get fussed, and worried as to whether her contribution to Q. M. N. G. was up to the mark—I am glad to say she never had any adverse criticism.

Now the Queen has asked the Presidents of this Guild to send in double the quantity and to bear in mind that a large quantity of articles are now required for the sick and wounded.

We have received an appeal from the St. John Ambulance Association, asking for things for the sick and wounded, and they send a list of the things required, which comprise shirts, cotton and flannel, not flannel-lette, bed jackets, pyjama sleeping gowns, pillows, pillow slips and old linen, not old clothes.

Now I feel sure we women in Newfoundland can help in this way with our work, as well as in other ways, and we shall do so best and most effectively if we join together and co-operate. To do this, I consider that we shall do best to organize ourselves into an Association. If all those who are here this afternoon will join this Association and will enter their names and addresses, and the class of work they will do—either sewing or knitting or both, in the book that will be handed round at the close of this meeting, it will help matters very considerably, and it will thus enable us to judge to a certain degree how much work we shall be able to undertake and arrange to provide material accordingly. Later on, there will be our own Newfoundland Regiment to think of and to provide for—the least they can do with will be 2 pairs of socks apiece per quarter—that is 2 pairs of socks apiece a year and about 6 shirts. This means 3,000 pairs of socks alone. I read a letter from Mrs. Harcourt, wife of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, in which she says that arrangements have been made between the Colonial Office, the Victoria League and the War Office that contributions of necessary articles sent from the Colonies for their own contingents will be received by the Victoria League and forwarded by them through

I will not keep you any longer now. I know perfectly well that every woman in Newfoundland is going to help and we will all do our best. We in Newfoundland are all true Britabers through and through, dogged and resolute—and if we start a job, we see it through so let us to work.

I will now ask the Governor to give us a short address on the cause of the war and how it may affect Newfoundland.

ADDRESS BY THE GOVERNOR.

His Excellency, before dealing with the war situation, read a letter from a young woman now residing in the States who offered her services in place of those of her aged father, who lives at Clarke's Beach. She stated that she had had experience in nursing and could do many things, which the father could not in defense of the Flag. She was young, strong and healthy, and would take his place.

His Excellency then went on to explain the situation, stating that the one idea of the Germans in this war was to subjugate Britain, and take away the wealth of her Empire. He showed that the Kaiser was aiming at the supremacy of the world, and at the same time his Chancellor was trying to convey the idea that they had been forced into the conflict, whereas they had long been awaiting an opportunity to strike. He spoke of the claim made by the Germans that they can outdo France, but that remains to be proven as the Russians will have to be dealt with also. The naval war, said His Excellency, goes well enough and we will win, as this will be mainly in the hands of the British. He stated that the North Atlantic waters were safely guarded by six British warships, any one of which is more than a match for two German ships. The seizure of Paris may not be impossible, he felt that the first class would be given our Regiment for its relief, and the second for the capture of Berlin. He then spoke of the support received from India, Ireland and Canada, Australia and South Africa. Canada, he believed, would put forward 200,000 men while Australia and South Africa would also send large contingents.

His Excellency then went on to show the terrible consequences should the Germans win, the officialdom, conscription and degradations that would be forced upon us.

At the close of His Excellency's remarks the following resolution was moved by Lady Morris, seconded by Lady Horwood, supported by Mrs. Gosling and adopted:—

RESOLVED, that we do hereby form ourselves into the "Patriotic Association of the Women of Newfoundland" whose object shall be by our work and by all means in our power to help our men in the defence of the British Empire, and that all women here present shall subscribe their names as Members of the Patriotic Association of the Women of Newfoundland.

Mrs. Cliff then moved, Mrs. V. P. Burke seconded, and Mrs. C. P. Ayre supported the accompanying resolution which was also adopted:—

RESOLVED, that the Patriotic Association of the Women of Newfoundland does hereby consent to the nomination of the following persons to be on the General Committee, with power to add to their number and to form Sub-Committees for various purposes.

Lady Davidson then announced the meetings of the Association would be held at Government House, every Tuesday, and that the co-operation of the outports is expected. The following ladies are the members of the General Committee of the Association:—



I have been told by one of her ladies in waiting, that the Queen knows quite well and remembers which districts send in good and which bad contributions and occasionally she requests that such and such President should be told that the contribution from her district is not up to the mark. My mother is a President of a Surrey district, and when I was at home, we all had to help, when her contributions came in to arrange and repack them—generally about 1,000 articles—and she would get fussed, and worried as to whether her contribution to Q. M. N. G. was up to the mark—I am glad to say she never had any adverse criticism.

smart,—well—I feel sure that our friends and neighbours will not think any the worse of us, if we go on wearing last year's garments, and thus we have a small sum to donate to swell the Fund to provide necessities for our brave Men at the Front. Indeed there are many little 5 and 10 cent pieces which could be saved here and there, if we look out for them, and it is astonishing how these small sums swell up when carefully collected. Then, as the St. John Ambulance Association points out, there is other work for women to do. Those qualified as Nurses should volunteer and their places be filled during their absence—gratis, by either married Nurses, who have husbands and families whom they cannot leave, but who could give half a day's work every day in the week or by retired Nurses who have ties here which prevent them from going themselves.

Then all those who can should take advantage of the St. John Ambulance Association classes and train and fit themselves to be of use. They have only to send in their names, and classes would soon be arranged. My sister started training by attending the St. John Ambulance Association 1st Aid Classes—she continued through the whole course as required, and when I was at home last April, she was finishing her training in residence at the Charing Cross Hospital—she had to attend on duty 6 operations before she got her qualification. I heard from her last mail that she was leaving the very next morning—viz., Aug. 12th with 19 other Nurses for the front—their first destination being Brussels, from which place they would be dispatched to where they were required. All the best kind of men either have volunteered, or, if they only realized how desperate the situation was, would volunteer and I feel sure will still do so—and it is the duty of us women to cheer them on and encourage them to go. I do feel this so very strongly. I am a soldier's daughter, a soldier's sister, besides having many other relations and very great friends in the army, and have spent the greater part of my life among soldiers, and I do feel the call to arms very strongly—and the call comes to us women just as much to do our duty, and there are many ways in which we can and should answer it.

War News.

Messages Received During the Night.

AN ALLEGED VICTORY.

LONDON, this a.m. An Antwerp despatch to Reuter's Telegram Co. says: "It is reported here that General Pau has won a brilliant victory over 50,000 Germans near Peronne, in the Department of Somme."

MARINE INSURANCE DROPS.

LONDON, this a.m. The War Risks Insurance Committee announced yesterday the reduction of ship and cargo insurance to two guineas per cent. from the present rate of three guineas per cent. beginning to-morrow.

MOHAMMEDAN SUBJECTS LOYAL.

WASHINGTON, this a.m. At the British Embassy yesterday it was said that no attention is being paid to reports emanating from the German official sources of attempts to rouse disaffection among the Mohammedan subjects of Britain in India, Egypt and elsewhere, where the embassy officials said Germany had long been seeking to enlist the friendship of the Musselman communities. Their efforts have not produced any noticeable evidence of disaffection.

THE LEIPSIG CAPTURE.

OTTAWA, Aug. 31. Militia headquarters here have no information of the reported capture of the German cruiser Leipzig.

PARIS TAKES PRECAUTIONS.

PARIS, Aug. 31. The decision of the military authorities to clear the zone of forts around Paris, does not affect the zone immediately surrounding the old fortifications of the city. It only applies to detached posts. Under this decision all the buildings and small structures, of no great value surrounding these forts will be pulled down.

TROOPS POURING INTO PARIS.

PARIS, Aug. 31. All night long troops from the South and West of France have been arriving here, and passing by rail around the city to locations in the encircling fortifications to which they have been assigned. There is great activity on the part of the municipal and military administrations in completing details of the plans for the defence of Paris.

GERMANS ADVANCE EAST.

LONDON, Aug. 31. An official telegram received here declares that fresh forces of Germans have made their appearance on the Prussian frontier, and that at some points they are taking the offensive against the Russians.

MINE LAYERS DISGUISED AS TRAWLERS.

LONDON, Aug. 31. In confirmation of the story that mines are being laid in the North Sea by vessels disguised as neutral fishing boats, a woman who arrived at London from Bergen, tells of the sinking of such a mine layer by a British cruiser. The ship on which she was travelling found herself one morning close to a number of British cruisers, one of which had caught a German trawler flying the Norwegian flag and engaged in laying mines. According to this woman the British commander gave the crew of the trawler three minutes in which to leave their vessel, and they came tumbling over the side of the passenger ship. Then first backing up a bit the cruiser rammed the offending trawler and at the second attempt cut her in two and she went down.

DETAINED IN GERMANY.

TOKIO, Aug. 31. The announcement is made here that over 50 Japanese are being unlawfully detained in Germany. The Japanese Government is protesting through the medium of another Power.

JAP DESTROYER ASHORE.

TSING TAU, Aug. 31. A Japanese destroyer went ashore in the fog out of range of the guns of the forts. A German cruiser is reported to have destroyed the boat after the Japanese had abandoned it.

FIRST DECORATIONS GO TO THE NAVY.

LONDON, Aug. 31. The first decorations from the Government for valor will go to the Navy. An announcement was made to-day that Rear-Admiral Beatty had sent a list of officers and sailors who distinguished themselves in the victory over the German warships off Heligoland.

COMMONS ADJOURNED.

LONDON, Aug. 31. The House of Commons adjourned to-day until September 9th. Premier Asquith said the Welsh Disestablishment Bill would be taken up upon resumption.

SITUATION IN FRANCE.

PARIS, Aug. 31. Declaring that the left wing of the army had been forced again to fall back before German pressure, the French War Office statement issued this afternoon confirmed the belief that the Germans are making another desperate attempt to clear the road to Paris. The official report says: "On our left circumstances have turned in favor of the Germans and the Anglo-French forces have been forced to give way. In the centre after alternate checks and successes a general engagement is now in progress. On our right, in Lorraine, we have taken the offensive and the enemy has been driven back. The morale of our force is excellent in spite of the losses which are being filled from mobilization centres."

THE HOME RULE QUESTION.

LONDON, Aug. 31. For a moment this afternoon, the Commons turning from its country's danger, reverted to the old controversy over Ireland. Asquith had announced that on re-assembling Sept. 9th, the Government would proceed with the Home Rule Bill and Welsh Disestablishment Bill. John Redmond, leader of the Nationalists expressed the hope that if the Government's proposals did not meet the approval of the whole House, the Government would not change its intention as regards Home Rule. Ex-Premier Balfour immediately rose and said that if the Government again introduced the Home Rule Bill its course would arouse a torrent of abuse. This pronouncement brought an angry roar from the Ministerialists during which Balfour stood unmoved. When order was restored he said that to introduce the bill while members were serving at the front could only arouse a most heated controversy. Again the Ministerialists roared "shame" which cry was met with angry counter cheers from the Opposition. There was another angry shout from Ministerialists and Nationalists, and the House proceeded with other business.

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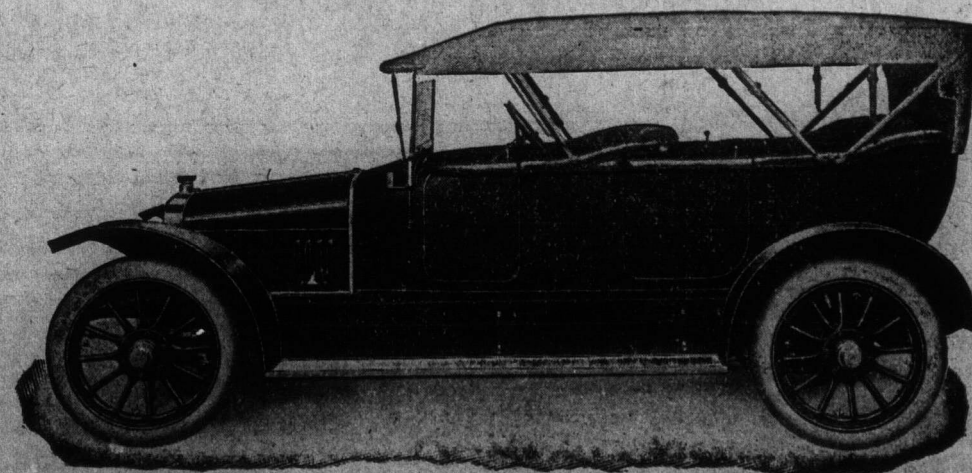
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
