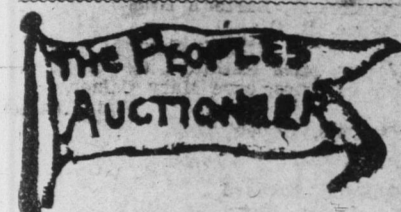

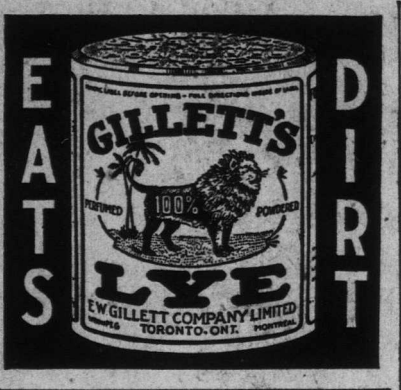

DEPENDABILITY.

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Dec. 13. The Governor, Newfoundland:

General French reports sixteen of our aeroplanes raided the store depot at Miramont aerodrome heavily. Considerable damage is believed to have been done. Bombardment of the enemy lines continues with good results. A small successful bombing attack near Neuve Chapelle destroyed an enemy machine gun, and inflicted numerous casualties. Our casualties are one officer and four men wounded.

In the Black Sea Russian torpedo boats sank two Turkish gunboats. Italians have captured the strong point of Guidicasse and the Concel valleys.

The press bureau announce that in Serbia a tenth division, after sustaining violent attacks by overwhelming numbers have retired with our allies from Lake Doiran westward to Vardar. The successful withdrawal was due to the gallant conduct of the troops, especially the Munster and Dublin Fusiliers, and the Connaught Rangers. We lost fifteen hundred men and eight field guns.

BONAR LAW.

THE WAY OPEN TO ALLIES.

LONDON, Dec. 13. The actual withdrawal of the Greek army from the path of the Allied forces which are retreating on Salonika is said to have been effected. A Reuters despatch filed at Athens yesterday says: As a result of an agreement between the Greek General Staff and the Allied Generals, a division of the Greek army which have been stationed at Langana has been withdrawn to Serres, about fifty miles northeast of Salonika. The zone between Salonika and Dolran has been left free for the movements of the Allied troops. Allied military authorities to-day took over portion of the Customs House at Salonika.

CANNONADING REPORTED IN DIRECTION OF YPRES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13. A News Agency despatch from London says: Uninterrupted cannonading has been going on with great violence for 24 hours in the direction of Ypres.

GERMAN PLANS.

PETROGRAD, Dec. 13. Germans in Persia are seeking to divert the attention of the Russian army of the Caucasus, according to the Russian Invalid, and cause it to scatter its forces over a large front in order to allow the Turks to throw part of their troops into the Mesopotamia campaign to save Bagdad. The Retch expresses the belief that the plan of the Germans to force the Dvinsk River, while it is frozen over, is not practicable, as the winter is extremely rigorous, with heavy snow which hampers the movement of motor vehicles, and prevents the transport of sufficient munitions.

GERMANS EXPLODE MINE.

PARIS, Dec. 13. (Official.) In Champagne to the south of the knoll at Le Mesnil, the Germans exploded a mine before one of our trenches. We occupied the crater. There were no important developments on the rest of the front.

BRITISH STEAMER SUNK.

LONDON, Dec. 13. The British steamer Pinegrove has been sunk. The crew was saved. She was 2,847 tons.

BULGARIAN TROOPS PREPARING TO CROSS GREEK FRONTIER.

SALONIKA, Dec. 13. The newspaper L'Opinion asserts that Bulgarian troops are preparing

to cross the Greek frontier and that Greek troops are moving towards the threatened point, apparently with the object of disputing the Bulgarian invasion.

EARL GLASGOW DEAD.

LONDON, Dec. 13. David Boyle Glasgow, seventh Earl of Glasgow, died to-day.

Domestic Loan for the Colony

THREE MILLION DOLLARS. Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—If the Minister of Finance were to place a prospectus before the people of the country asking for \$3,000,000 how would it be received?

Are the different political parties of the Island united at the present time, to use their influence and support the Government to carry a proposal of this kind out, if the loan were made a popular one. Whether you call it a war loan or a general loan, the purpose of the Government cleaning up outstanding liabilities that must have been undertaken before the war is a matter of name.

My only object, Mr. Editor, in writing this letter is to show our people how a loan of this kind works out, and the special financial benefit they would get taking up a loan in their own country.

What a Three Million Dollar Loan floated in this Colony would mean to the people of this Country, based on the same lines as laid down by the Dominion Government's Loan.

One Hundred Million Dollars—\$100,000,000—97½ per cent. Security—The Dominion of Canada. Newfoundland Loan—\$5,000,000—raised in the Colony. Security—The Colony of Newfoundland.

The question is not one of Patriotic Loyalty to your Country, but a proposal based on purely a sound financial investment.

Trouble on Board Ford Peace "Ark."

Malcontents Have Doubts About the Success of the Trip

On Board the Peace Ship Qscar II, by wireless to Cape Race, N.F., Dec. 9.—The peace ship is threatening already to baffle its name. Internal strife has broken out and bids fair to become serious.

The Rev. Chas. F. Aked of San Francisco, formerly pastor of John D. Rockefeller's church in New York, has taken the leadership of a band of insurrectionists who are beginning to entertain doubts for the success of the trip. These malcontents demand to be shown, in plain terms, what the peace party expects to accomplish and what grounds it has for so thinking. They insist on seeing the documents which Mme. Rosika Schimmmer asserts she has with her to show

that belligerents on both sides are willing to hear peace proposals and that unofficial representatives of the warring nations will attend the Ford pacifist conference on the other side. Mme Schwimmer, for her part, is defying the malcontents. She claims that the documents which she has are of a confidential nature and refuses to allow them to be read. Mr. Ford now declares that he will not content himself with ending the war in Europe. He is planning to end industrial warfare as well. As yet he has not told what his plans for this accomplishment are.

Message From Capt. Timewell.

The following message was received last night by His Excellency the Governor from Capt. Timewell of the London Record Office:

Your telegrams Dec. 7th, 8th, 10th, 12th: There has been forwarded to Battalion early in October (1) a supply of tobacco, (2) 999 parcels each containing a shirt, socks, mufflers and sundries, (3) in bulk, 1,142 mufflers and 1,182 mittens.

In middle of November (1) 1,000 parcels each containing vest, pants, socks, and sundries, (2) 204 puddings, (3) 172 cases of provisions, also (4) various personal parcels.

Association sending full report by next mail. War Office states that ample supplies of warm clothing are available and should be issued.

YOUR BOYS AND GIRLS

Feeding a baby under six months of age concerns many mothers who have not the mother's milk in quantity and quality sufficient for the needs of the little one. There is some difference of opinion as to whether a baby should have any food during the first twenty-four hours of life. The majority of experts are of the opinion that it should not. Plain water, unsweetened, is better than sugar water.

During the remainder of the first week the baby should have three ounces of a mixture half milk and half water. To a seven days old baby weighing eight pounds give eighteen ounces of milk and water, half and half, in six feedings. At fourteen days old a baby weighing eight pounds gets the same mixture with the addition of a quarter of an ounce of malt food. A two months old baby weighing ten pounds, gets milk twelve ounces, water ten and a half ounces, malt food three quarters of an ounce, in five feedings of four and a half ounces each.

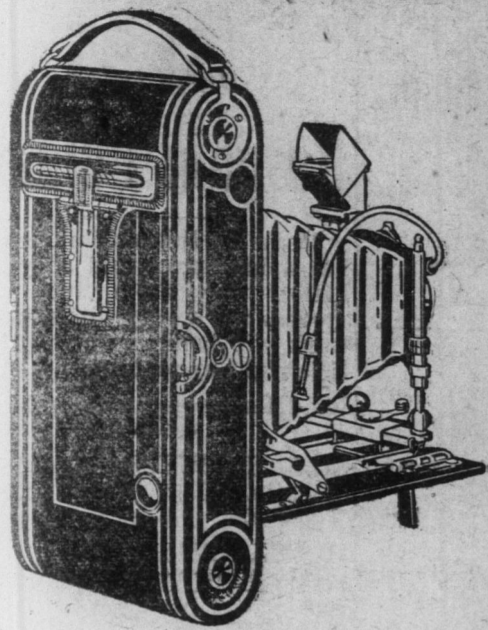

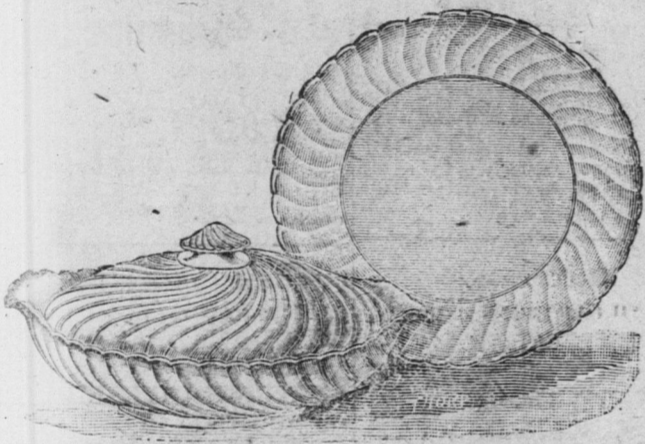

Obituary.

THOMAS LONG, I. S. O.

An estimable citizen, in the person of Mr. Thomas Long, has entered into his rest and we record with regret his passing, which occurred last evening at his late home on Prescott St. The deceased, who was in his eighty-ninth year, was a native of Shelborn, Bedfordshire, England, but seventy years of his life was spent in Newfoundland. Many years ago he managed the business of C. F. Bennett & Co. at Riverhead. In the seventies he took the position of clerk in the Agriculture and Mines Department where he soon won the position of First Clerk by his industry and ability. In 1898 he was appointed Deputy Minister, which responsible position he occupied with efficiency up to a few years ago when he retired. He was known to have a remarkable memory, and searching the records was scarcely ever resorted to by Mr. Long when asked for information about land grants, mining claims or other office details. After 40 years of active and faithful service he received from the King the Imperial Service Order. Of late years he was a sufferer from gout. He had his faculties, up to the last. His wife predeceased him a quarter of a century ago. He is survived by two sons, Mr. Alan Long, Surveyor, and Mr. William Long, and six daughters including Mrs. Pope, Mrs. P. F. LeMessurier and Mrs. E. LeMessurier and 16 grandchildren. Thus closes a life of usefulness and one which was well spent. The funeral takes place to-morrow afternoon.

Hr. Grace Notes.

It is to be held at the Court House and will begin at 10 a.m. on that day. It is generally understood that a Board elected by the people will work well. Let us all attend.

S. S. Senlac Destroyed by Fire

To-day Mr. A. J. Harvey received a message from Mr. W. N. McDonald, of Sydney, intimating that the s.s. Senlac and entire cargo was burnt to the water's edge in Sydney Harbor this morning. No particulars of the fire are to hand. The Senlac was formerly used as a river boat for which she was especially built. Last season and this she ran here from Prince Edward Island and the Sydneys, bringing cargoes of produce and live stock. The Senlac figured in the big gale that raged over the Newfoundland coasts on Nov. 16th last. It will be remembered that a few hours after leaving here she was caught in the height of the storm and was for over 24 hours holed to during which time she had in tow the Annie, a Piacentia Bay craft and which was disabled. The Senlac took the Annie in tow and attempted to reach the land with her, but without success, as the hawser parted three times, though the craft turned up safely a few days afterwards.

News Still Better.

The most re-assuring item of news about the Greek imbroglio is the statement that the Greek War Staff has withdrawn a division of the Greek army from Langasa to Seres. Langasa is a town about 10 miles north east of Saloniki, on a direct line between that port and Seres, which is a town on the railway between Doiran, occupied by the British and Dedegatch, the Bulgarian seaport. This movement takes this Greek division forty miles from the zone where the British are operating west of Lake Doiran, and puts them in a position to block a Bulgarian advance from the north east. The British have behind them two railways leading to Saloniki, which are connected by a branch railway. The withdrawal of this division is said to be the result of an agreement between the Greek General Staff and the Generals of the Entente Allies. It may be that King Constantine and his staff consider they have gone far enough to help the Kaiser and embarrass the Entente. The Greeks hate the Bulgars and the Bulgars hate the Greeks. The bone of contention is that portion of Macedonia of which Saloniki is the port. Saloniki and the surrounding region was seized by Greek troops in the war with Turkey and the refusal of the Greeks to vacate it after peace was restored with Turkey was one of the causes of the second Balkan war. This difficulty may be surmounted by the Bulgars refraining from crossing the frontier. But even that does not do away with another difficulty. The Austrians, for a generation have had their eyes on Saloniki. They have been desirous of annexing Serbia and pushing their way to Saloniki, to obtain a seaport on the Aegean. King Constantine's policy of refusing aid to Serbia has raised apprehension in the minds of the Greeks that if once the

Austrians reach Saloniki, they will refuse to vacate it. That is the dilemma in which the influence of his wife and his German training has put him. Serbia was a buffer state which protected him from Austria. The Greeks have now lost that protection, which they might have kept by aiding the Allies and the Serbians with a quarter of a million men. If he turns on the Entente now and cuts their line of communication he may lose what the Greeks won in 1912, for the Central Powers declare that while they may give up Belgium as a term of peace, they will not give up Serbia. That means Austria intends to keep Serbia, and Serbia is only a step towards the possession of Greek Macedonia and the sea, and particularly Salonika, which they have long coveted. Should the Huns and Bulgars follow up the Entente troops over the frontier Constantine will have to make his election. If he turns on the Entente, or even if he refuses to join them, he may lose Salonika and Greek Macedonia. The next few days will be days of anxiety, of peril to our troops should Constantine turn on us; of safety should Constantine throw in his lot with us. By doing so, he can make certain of saving his country from the ultimate aims of the Central Powers. The pity of it all is that he was not wise enough to keep Venizelos, respect the Greek constitution, and disregard the influence of his wife, the sister of the Kaiser.

The Transfer of the S. S. Ethie.

Mr. R. G. Reid, of the Reid-Neufundland Company, interviewed the Government on Saturday with regard to the freight congestion in Green Bay and intimated that it would be in the public interests if the s.s. Ethie, plying on Trinity Bay, could be transferred to Green Bay, while the s.s. Petrel, now on Green Bay, would take up the work on Trinity Bay. There is very little freight carried on the Trinity Bay steamer and the Petrel would be quite large enough for all passengers and freight offering on Trinity Bay. The s.s. Ethie being larger than the Petrel could, with the s.s. Clyde, easily relieve the congestion of freight in Green Bay. It was important that the matter be dealt with early, as the ports in Green Bay will shortly be closed by ice and the Christmas freight is now going forward. Under the above circumstances, the Government agreed to the transfer of the Ethie until the freight congestion could be relieved, the Petrel doing her work in the meantime.

RAMBLING NOTES for 1915.

(L. C. MORRIS.)

CHAPTER XII.

At St. George's my attention was attracted by an unoccupied building which impressed me as being either a hall or a school-house, but on enquiry I learned that it had been used as a hotel. But it was its rather swampy location that aroused my curiosity, so on further enquiry I learned a little more of its story, and which may be recorded as follows. The building is a two storey flat-roofed one, and is about sixty feet by thirty. At first it was erected at Sandy Point on the other side of the harbour, and was used in connection with church purposes, but when the railway was built, owing to so many people leaving Sandy Point, several buildings were taken down and reconstructed on the south side of the harbour, now known as St. George's proper. This particular building was used in connection with the chaser decided to shift it over as it stood intact, not even the chimneys were removed. To make a success of the undertaking, he had to consider two propositions: first, he had to wait until the harbour would be frozen over, and secondly, he had to procure the right man to accomplish the task. With the winter season came the frost and ice, and in the meantime the right man turned up. Not many men would attempt such a task, and only one of indomitable will would take such a task. But the emergency usually finds the man, and so it came about that in the person of the late Captain Nathaniel Butt, the right person was found.

At first the building was raised by the use of jack screws, and then it was properly blocked and secured. The next step was to place slides, runners and rollers under it, and then attach the ropes for hauling. With these preliminaries completed, a fine day was awaited, and then there was a scene witnessed that not often occurs. With the dawn, assembled the men and boys, some eighty or a hundred in number. To the ropes were harnessed horses and oxen, and at the

head stood the brave Captain. With all ready, and every man in his place, the order was given to pull, and lo! as if by magic, the huge building moved, and the procession led the way. The men shouted and cheered, the oxen strained, and the horses pulled, and in a few minutes the structure was clear of the main land and out upon the smooth ice of the harbour. The scene equaled Mark Twain's ascent of the Alps.

For a little while a halt was called, and then a fresh start was made. The ice was in good condition, but it would not do to risk a halt upon it, as the weight of the building and men and oxen was too great. With possibility of the ice's collapsing in mind, the procession kept on the move and every man pulled his best, and every trace of the harness was kept tight, and every pair of oxen was goaded on. Soon the middle of the harbour was gained, and ere the sun had gained its zenith the procession halted and the building was secure on dry land.

Not much of a feat in a sense, but there are lessons in it worth learning. Unfortunately some of us get so wonderfully big, and so extremely self-important, both in matters of Church and State, that we imagine we really know it all, and therefore need not learn. The poet Cowper speaks of this class of people where he says:—"From such apostles, O ye mitred heads, presently near of Church. And lay not hands on heads that cannot teach, and will not learn." The shifting of the building taught us a good lesson in perseverance, in united effort, in early rising, in good planning, and in the value of every class of labour. The good captain did his work; the men under him did their work, the boys did theirs, the horses had a place and the humbler oxen increased the power; thus all united and made "a long pull and a strong pull, and a pull together," and success crowned the effort and the seemingly impossible was accomplished.

Boom After War, Economist Says.

(Associated Press Correspondence) Paris, Nov. 26.—The answer of Paul Teroy Beaulieu, the French economist to the question "Will Europe be plunged into bankruptcy because of the war?" is "no, not even Germany."
 Concerning the result of the present enormous spending of money by all the nations, and the conditions following the war he forecasts the end of the war a year hence, and after its end a remarkable industrial activity, with an international commerce rivalry leading to high tariffs in all the nations now at war, including free trade England, and yet higher tariffs in the United States.
 He said: "While such a situation has never before presented itself in history and while, therefore, all opinions must be given with some reserve, I am confident that no fear need be felt for a universal collapse of world finance. The destruction in this war, save possibly in the lives lost has been exaggerated in the public mind. Not a single nation involved will be irretrievably ruined. The enduring power of accumulated wealth has been underestimated. It will take not more

than ten or twelve years for the world to recover from its losses.

"I estimate that the war will have come to a close by next Autumn. Then there will set in a period of manufacturing activity, the like of which we have never known. This period has been made necessary by the physical damage done, by the diversion toward supplies of factories engaged in making cloth, and what not.
 "During this reconstruction period we will work harder than formerly. There will not be the stagnation which paralyzed the southern states after the civil war.
 "Another result of the war will be the increased taxes by each nation involved, and the raising of tariffs to collect revenues England will do the rest, free trade country though she is, and despite her comparatively less war loss. The United States, while it will not have to, will increase her tariffs."

NEW CHINESE AMBASSADOR.

WASHINGTON, To-day. Dr. Koo New, the Chinese Minister, presented his credentials to Secretary Lansing yesterday. No official notification of the Chinese change of the monarchical form of Government reached the State Department or the Chinese Legation.

RESCUED FROM CLIFFS.

ST. PIERRE, Miq. To-day. The officers and crew of the British steamer St. Kilda, which foundered off the west coast of Miquelon in a storm last week, were brought here to-day in a tug which went to their assistance after they escaped from the vessel and landed on the cliffs.

MORE HYPHENATED DESIGNS.

WASHINGTON, To-day. A Bill to prevent the carrying of passengers by ships with war munitions, and a resolution to put the Senate on record for raising revenues for national defence by taxing munition manufacturers, were introduced to-day. No action was taken on either.

A MATTER FOR CONDOLENCE.

PEKING, To-day. The Chinese Cabinet went to the Palace in a body to-day to congratulate President Yuan Shi Kai on his forthcoming accession to the throne. The President said condolences would be more in order, as he had assumed the gravest responsibilities for himself and family. The President discouraged any idea of holding entertainments or celebrating in other ways the re-establishment of a monarchy. He urged his ministers to redouble their efforts to better the conditions of China.

NOT TORPEDOED.

NEW YORK, To-day. The steamer Dante Alighieri, a trans-Atlantic Italian, has not been torpedoed. She is safe in an Italian port.

NO ALL ROUND REDUCTIONS.

LONDON, To-day. The Government does not intend to propose an all round reduction of ministerial and Parliamentary salaries, Premier Asquith announced in the Commons this afternoon.

LOOKING AFTER SERBIAN REFUGEES.

LONDON, To-day. The Allies' Governments have taken steps to provide for the needs of Serbian refugees as far as possible. Ample supplies of food and clothing and shelter are being provided, said Lord Robert Cecil in the Commons yesterday. There are great difficulties to be surmounted. In certain areas it is not known what the extent of the influx of refugees will be. I believe the numbers to be provided for will not be so large as at first supposed.

REDUCING GERMAN TRADE.

LONDON, To-day. The object of all these agreements with neutral countries is the reduction of all German trade, while preserving to neutrals their legitimate rights, said Asquith. He contended the agreements involved no change of policy and did not indicate the failure of the British blockade.

ADEQUATELY CONTRADICTED.

LONDON, To-day. Are you aware Sir Arthur Markham asked Grey, in the Commons yesterday, that the neutral press has stated repeatedly the Allies by sending troops through Greece have violated Greek neutrality the same way that Germany has violated Belgium neutrality? Will the Government take steps to make it known to neutral countries that Greece requested Allies to send troops? Lord Robert Cecil replied for the Foreign Secretary saying: "I am aware such statements have been made but they have been adequately ridiculed and contradicted."

NO NEED OF COMPULSORY LOANS.

LONDON, To-day. Mr. McKenna, Chancellor of the Exchequer, told the Commons yesterday he anticipated no difficulty in raising on voluntary terms such loans as the State may require. This was the Chancellor's reply to the request that he take steps to put an end to rumors that a compulsory loan might be necessary.

AIR DEFENCE UNDER ONE CONTROL.

LONDON, To-day. The anti-air craft corps of London is under the sole control of the

War Office, and Rear-Admiral Scott is no longer in charge. This announcement was made in the Commons to-day by Harold Tennant, Parliamentary Under-Secretary of War. Tennant explained the defence of London from aerial attacks heretofore had been responsibility divided between the Admiralty and War Office. This, he said, had been the basis of many criticisms.

FRIENDLY ARABS NOT TREACHEROUS.

LONDON, To-day. Asked regarding the German wireless reports of the treacherous attitude toward British of supposedly friendly Arab tribes in the recent fighting in Mesopotamia, Austin Chamberlain, Secretary for India declared in the Commons yesterday: "I have every reason to believe the reports are quite untrue."

TURKISH ATTACKS HAVE BEEN REPULSED.

LONDON, To-day. Turkish attacks on the British Mesopotamia army at Kutelamara have been repulsed, was announced in an official statement last night. British re-inforcements are being pushed forward.

RUSSIANS DESTROY ZEP.

PETROGRAD, To-day. Russian artillery destroyed a Zeppelin air ship on December 5, near Statira Kalka, on the Libau-Romir railway.

DEFEAT ARABS NEAR SINAI.

LONDON, To-day. A band of three hundred Arabs were routed on Saturday by a British reconnoitering force in the vicinity of Marrah, Sinai Peninsula. The Arabs, 35 of whom were killed and 7 captured, were driven eastward. British casualties were slight.

12 45 P.M.

IRISH GALLANTRY SAVES A DESPERATE SITUATION.

LONDON, To-day. How two companies of Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers and another Irish Regiment, forming a British division, which are making a fighting retirement from Serbia, sacrificed themselves to cover the retreat of the wounded, who had reached the British headquarters in Macedonia. The British, according to a correspondent of Reuters in a despatch from the British headquarters, were out-numbered ten to one by the Bulgars, who were supplied with guns and machine guns. Last Monday morning they were awakened by heavy bombardment by Bulgarians, who poured hail, shot and shell on them, the splintering rocks intensified the effect of their fire. The Bulgars infantry then advanced to the attack in massed formation and were punished severely, but the scarcity of British guns did not permit them to take proper toll of the advancing Bulgarians. The British emptied their rifles rapidly into the enemy and tried to stem the tide with bayonet, but were overborne by the sheer weight of numbers and the position was lost. Similarly a second line was lost and the British fell back on their third line of defence. Two Companies of Inniskillings, however, held on to the Ridge known as Kevils Crest and kept back the Bulgarians a whole morning, although they were supported only by rifle fire. Hardly a man escaped, but their stand impressed the delayed Bulgarians, thus giving the British the much needed time to complete defensive positions on the third line, where the Bulgars were finally held up for four days. The Bulgars, the correspondent adds, having suffered heavily, have since then attempted no strong offensive up to Sunday.

CONSTANTINE GIVES SATISFACTORY ASSURANCES.

LONDON, To-day. The King of Greece in the course of an audience accorded to members of the diplomatic body at Athens on Saturday, gave personal assurances which are regarded satisfactory. This information was conveyed in a despatch from Athens. (War messages continued on next page.)

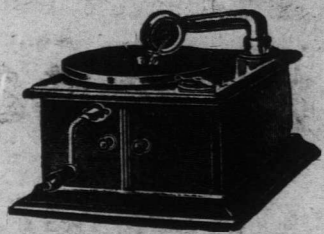

War News.

(Continued from 10th page.)
MOBILIZING AMERICAN SECURITIES.

LONDON, To-day. After an explanation by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Reginald McKenna, and a short debate in the Commons last evening, passed the second reading of a bill empowering the Government to mobilize American and Canadian securities by purchase or by borrowing them, to be used primarily as collateral for loans or in case of necessity to be sold to meet Britain's liabilities in the United States. The scheme is an entirely voluntary one, and the Chancellor made it clear the Government had no intention of swamping the American market with securities, which would be unfair to holders here as they were to be paid for at market price. McKenna explained the usual trade balance in favor of Britain had been exhausted by huge demands made upon America for goods for England and her Allies, and amounts paid in interest on foreign securities held here or earned by British shipping were not sufficient to set this right. Consequently in order to meet liabilities in the United States, they were obliged to go outside the ordinary course of trade and had to borrow or sell securities. He estimated the securities held here were valued anywhere from \$300,000,000 to \$800,000,000. He expressed the hope that this would be sufficient to meet our liabilities and maintain exchange in the United States for the period of the war.

BRITISH AND FRENCH RETIRE TO GREECE.

LONDON, To-day. British and French troops have successfully carried out the retirement from Serbia across Greek frontier, and by arrangement with the Greek Government, a clear road has been left them to fall back to Saloniki, which is being organized as a base. German official report to-day claims, approximately two English divisions annihilated during the retirement, but this is considered here as exaggeration. The question now arises whether the Bulgars and Austro-Germans intend to follow the British and French troops into Greece, and what action the Greek Government will take should they do so. The impression gained from a despatch as emanating in Athens is that neither Bulgars or Turks, who also are reported to have arrived near the frontier, would be welcomed in Greece, that therefore if it has been decided to follow the Entente Allies, task will be undertaken by Austrians and Germans. However, with the railway destroyed it may be some days before Greece is called upon to take action, and by that time the Anglo-French force should be in safe defences of Saloniki under the guns of their ships. Remnants of the Serb's army are still resisting the Austrians and Bulgarians in Albania, while Austrians are making very slow progress in their efforts to overwhelm Montenegro, where heavy fighting continues. Only small actions have taken place on the eastern and western fronts; on Gallipoli Peninsula a fall of snow is impeding operations, although the Entente Allies ships keep things lively for the Turks whose attempt at offensive last week seems to have failed.

F. M. FRENCH'S REPORT.

LONDON, To-day. Field-Marshal French sends the following report from the British front in France last night: Blew up a mine in front of Givenchy, occupied the crater to-day. There was considerable activity at various points on the front. We bombarded enemy's positions east of Ypres and neighbourhood of Frelinghen shelled with heavy howitzers enemy mine shaft north Lebassee Canal, in neighbourhood of Somme there was some fighting with trench mortars, rifle, grenades; weather to-day bright and cold.

SUFFICIENTLY RECOVERED TO TAKE UP STATE AFFAIRS.

LONDON, To-day. King George who suffered severe injuries by being thrown from his horse at the British front in France, October 28th, has recovered sufficiently to take up affairs of State under certain restrictions.

received here, says that Shekh Said, east of Kutlamara, was occupied up on the enemy's retreat by Turkish troops. The Turkish Artillery near Kutlamara sank several enemy positions.

CONCENTRATING BETWEEN MONASTIR AND GREEK FRONT.

LONDON, To-day. Forty thousand Bulgars and an equal number of Austro-Germans are being concentrated between Monastir and the Greek front, according to a despatch to the Times from its Salonika correspondent. This force is said to include a considerable number of cavalry troops. Heavy fighting, the despatch says, was still in progress Sunday in the neighborhood of Lake Doiran.

PROBABLE DIPLOMATIC RUPTURE.

LONDON, To-day. A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. from Amsterdam says that reports from Vienna say the American note concerning the sinking of the Italian steamer Ancona caused intense anger in the Austrian Government. A diplomatic rupture is considered probable. The question before Baron Burian, Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, is only whether rupture with the U. S. would not force Berlin to take steps. Count Tisza, the Hungarian Premier, has been summoned to Vienna to discuss the situation with the Government.

"BLACKLIST" ENEMY TRADERS.

LONDON, To-day. The Government proposes to "blacklist" enemy traders in neutral countries with whom British firms will be prohibited from trading, says Lord Cecil, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, in moving in the Commons the second reading of the bill which he presented to the House Dec. 8, designed to restrict trading with possible hostile interests. The lists he continued would not necessarily be confined to persons of German nationality, but would include such as were by nature their business substantially. Enemy firms could safely be cut off from British intercourse without serious injury to British trade. In South America, said the Under Secretary, there were a number of German firms at present assisting Britain's enemies. Trade with these firms by British firms would be rendered illegal by this bill. The Solicitor General explained the purpose of the bill was to force another weapon with which to cripple the enemy. The bill was read twice.

Dreadnought List is Growing.

LONDON, Nov. 20 (Correspondence).—According to announcements recently made in Parliament, it is expected that before the end of the year fourteen new super-dreadnoughts will have been added to the British navy since the outbreak of the war. The names of thirteen of these new battleships follow:

Queen Elizabeth, Agincourt, Canada, Barham, Royal Sovereign, Revenge, Ramillies, Warspite, Riger, Erin, Valiant, Malaya, Resolution.

A fifteenth super-dreadnought, which will probably bear the name of Repulse, will be ready early in the new year. The Queen Elizabeth, Tiger, Warspite, Agincourt, Erin and Canada were commissioned soon after the declaration of war and there is reason to believe that the Barham and the Valiant joined the fleet during last spring, that the Malaya was ready by August and that the Resolution and the Ramillies will be able to proceed on "their lawful occasions" some time this month.

On the Down Grade.

New York Tribune.—The decisive part of the war, so far as the battlefield is concerned, is now over for Germany. She has won much, but missed the decision. Bernhardt, writing long before the war, foretold with inexorable logic that if Germany failed to get the decision against one of several foes before all were ready she would lose, and she has failed, she has failed utterly, despite magnificent local successes. Her generals have failed as Napoleon failed from Leipzig to Fontenoy. His problem was to dispose of separate armies before their collective strength doomed him. In the end he lost. But he lost primarily because his opponents agreed to make no separate peace and clung to the agreement despite temporary reverses. Germany is now approaching what will be her last great bid for victory, but it will not be made on the battlefield—that is over. It will be made in conference, in peace-negotiations, in operations through neutral nations. If these fail, we shall presently see the whole character of the conflict change and an utterly new spirit flow from the Rhine to the Pyrenees. What Americans can not know is whether the spirit that ruled in Washington in 1864 dominates in London, Paris and Petrograd in 1915.

Grecians Sore Over the Embargo.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—Reuter's Athens' correspondent telegraphs that on account of restrictions placed by Great Britain on the foreign commerce of Greece, several steamship lines, including those above mentioned by the government for the postal service, contemplate suspension of business. A coal famine is feared, and the correspondent says Greece has called the attention of Great Britain to the grave consequences entailed by prohibition of importation of coal from England, notwithstanding the orders placed in America.

St. Catharines, Ont. Dec. 10.—The German troops turned their own guns on a disabled Teuton airship and killed men in it in order to destroy cameras and other information which was falling toward the Canadian lines, it is told by a staff non-commissioned officer of the Second Canadian contingent in a letter to his parents here. The aircraft had been bested by British airmen several thousand feet above the earth.

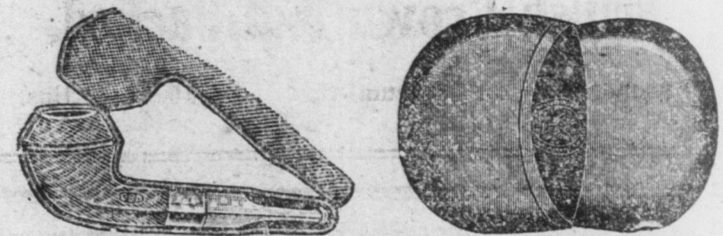
