It is believed the Germans had more men and more food than had been imagined in England. The Foreign Office, he said, had too much power over the navy to the detriment of the navy. The losses to British, allied and neutral ships for February, he said, amounted to 281 vessels with an aggregate tonnage of more than 500 .-

### THE ST. LOUIS ARRIVES. LONDON, March 27.

(Delayed by censor, from the staff correspondent of the Associated Press)-The St. Louis, the first passenger vessel carrying the American flag across the Atlantic since Germany's declaration of unrestricted submarine destruction, and the first armed American liner to enter any European port since war began arrived this morning. She carried a neagre number of passengers, 33 all old, but her holds were filled to capacity with non-contraband freight. The St. Louis came through without interruption. No submarines were sighted, nor were there at any time indications that German U-boats were after-the big liner. The journey virtually was without incident until the war zone was reached. Unusual precautions were taken as soon as the iner passed Ambrose Light, but as she neared the danger point even life rafts and collapsable boats were made ready for immediate use, and reflecors strung up fore and aft and carbide lights tied along the rails to use in the event that the St. Louis became victom of torpedo or gun fire.

High Speed and Powerful Guns.

The latest U-boats, as is well known are much larger than their predecesors. One sometimes sees them decribed as submersible cruisers. Wheher that description may be regarded as accurate or not depends upon what one understands by "submersible cruiser." There is no evidence that Germany has yet sent out U-boats to which a naval man would apply this name. But this must not be taken as implying that her under-water craft are to be lightly regarded. Quite the other way about. So much has their displacement been increased that they are capable of a wide radius of action, and by husbanding their fuel supplies can keep the sea for a

long time. Moreover, they possess high speed (high for a submarine, which, of course, must be judged by standards different from those applied to surface ships), and they can dive very quickly. ### Allied Troops Now Nearing

New Von Hindenburg Line-Believed That French and British Will Shortly Encounter Main German Army. New York, March 20.-French troops, pushing hard on the heels of

the retreating Germans, are to-day eir retiring foe. The milestones or this line are the historic towns of Lille, Cambrai, St. Quentin, Laon and La Fere.

The troops of General Nivelle were pushing towards St. Quentin yesterday at a rate almost unprecedented in the present world war, and had eached a point within five miles of the city. Unless some unheralded actor has entered into the situation he French have by this time either entered St. Quentin or the German retreat has halted.

In the meantime to the North the British are doggedly pushing forward toward Cambrai and are apparently within striking distance of that town, the heart of the Lille-La-Fere line and famous since the days of the Romans. The British are advancing more slowly than the French but nothing either in the official reports from Paris or London or in the unofficial stories of newspaper correspondents at the front, indicates that either army has yet come in contact with the main German forces. The theory that the Germans propose to halt their retreat on the Hindenburg line has been put forward by military critics in the Alied capitals, but there has been no ndication from Berlin of the plans of the German General Staff and the ourpose and meaning of the dramatic retreat of the invaders of France remains clothed in considerable mys-

French military observers estimate that the German retirement has already released 150,000 to 200,000 roops who are available for a long predicted counter-offensive to be launched against the Allies' lines at some speculative point. The Paris ewspapers regard some such move on the part of Hindenburg as almost certain and discuss the possibility of another tremendous effort to smash a

In the meantime the only indica tion of a German attempt to assume the initiative is in apparently sporadic fighting in the Champagne distric and on the Verdun front, Nothing has leveloped in either of these direction to indicate an offensive on a scale creat enough to offset the sensa vacuation of a thousand or mor




