the attention of our readers to former articles written on the subject dislishing in full the article referred to, which is taken from a Sydney paper. Attention is directed to the paragraph in black type, and instant action should be taken on the part of our Government and Military authorities to obviate any recurrence of the treatment which, it is alleged, is being awarded Newfoundlanders in Nova Scotia. It is not good enough that our young men in the Maritime Provinces are being arrested as deserters and defaulters and placed in barbed wire enclosures, as this article charges, and the time is now ripe to put into effect an arrangement, already suggested by the Telegram, whereby eligible men belonging to this Dominion be transferred home from Canada, (if they desire) to serve with the colors of our own Regiment. Something must be done speedily to prevent any of our men.in the Maritime Provinces from being subjected to the harsh measures of arrest and internment by the Canadian Military Authorities.

"The Military Service Act may have been a necessary enactment-although we have our grave doubts even about that statement, but there ought to be some decent and yet efficient methods that statement, but there ought to be some decent and yet efficient methods of carrying out its provisions.
