We are curious to see what the Mail will say in its own defence. It must either withdraw its accusation against Mr. Mowat, or place Lieut. Governor Morris in the same category with him as a now degraded Judge; or having once approved for the latter's appointment, and condemmed that of the former, it lays itself open to the charge, proved from its own columns, of gross hypocrisy, stone-blind partizanship, and shameful inconsistency. It must take either horn of the dilemma, and stand charged withan unreasoning defence of every act of the Dominion Gov, ernment, and an equally unreasoning condemnation of everything done in connection with the Ontario Administration.


