The fact that so great a sum of money might be obtained by the death of the plaintiffs, they assert, would afford a motive for bringing about the termina-tion of their lives, and an injunction is asked.



A meeting took place last nighte be-tween canners and fishermen to decide on the number of licenses that should be allowed to each cannery.
