The halfbreeds are fairly well armed with rifles and shot guns, but the Indians have every kind of weapon, including rifles, shot guns, bows and arrows, clubs, words, tomahawks and axes. Rifle pits have been dug at every place, and the insurgents believe they can at least hold out for several days, if indeed they cannot maintain their position for a week to come Their only difficulty is a scarcity of ammunition, and they are doing their beet to remedy that deficiency by melting down everything available. Riel, Gabriel Dumont and the other rebel captains awear over and over again that they will never be taken align. never be taken alive. Riel has a daily seance, at which he professes to perform miracles and cleverly succeeds in deceiving
