



Yesterday morning about 2 o'clock a burglar effected an entrance through a cellar window to the residence of Mr. John Stibbard, councillor, Sheldrake-avenue, North Toronto. He had secured \$100 in bills and a gold watch from the room of Mr. Stibbard's son, a young man of about 23 years, and had gone down-stairs, with young Mr. Stibbard awoke at hearing the kitchen door open. Mr. Stibbard put his head out of the upstairs window when the burglar commenced to run through the back yard. Stibbard lost no time in getting hold of his revolver, and shooting directly at the thief. He must have wounded him for he immediately threw up his hands, but had disappeared before Mr. Stibbard rould get downstairs.

The chief's hat was found in the yard with a bullet hole through the crown, and the stolen articles and money beside it. The thief also left behind a pair of shoes. Mr. Stibbard thinks he was followed from the bank on Monday when he drew the money he had in his possession. 
Seiling Cigars on Sunday.
