#### General Summary.

There were more quotations from the TRADE REVIEW last year in Canadian, American and English papers than from all the other journals of its class combined, that are issued in the Dominion.

A dividend of 20 cents on the dollar has been declared by the referee of the Outario Forge and Bolt Company. The stock, plant, etc., was disposed of for \$110,000.

The Bank of St. Johns has established a branch at St. Remi, under the management of Mr. C. A. Bedard, ex-manager of La Banque du Peuple in the same locality.

It is stated that glanders are rife in the Liverpool quarantine for inported horses, and that out of one hundred Cauadian horses in one depot forty are suffering from the discase.

A shipment of \$50,000 shingles was made last week to Barbadoes, by C. Powell, St. John. A Cushing & Co. shipped to Hamilton, Bernuda, 41,000 onion shooks and 500 lily boxes.

At Wyemouth, N. S., Burrill & Co. will ship about 5.000.000 feet of lumber this season, while Campbell & Co. will cut 3, 000,000 feet in their own mills, and buy 1,000,000 from other parties.

For the half-year ending April 1 the Grand Trunk railway report has been issued in London. The gross receipts for the period named have increased £24,881, and the working expenses have increased £40,689. There is an aggregate debit balance of £224,707.

Saven new canneries will operate in the rivers of British Columbia this year. Among them is a Chinese cannery and cooperative fisherman's cannery on the Fraser. This is the fourth year for salmon and the run is expected to be poor. The last of the fry from New Westminster fish hatchery have been liberated, including 6,400,000 sockeyes and 4,000,000 whitefish.

Last month, the Supreme Lodge of Sons of England met in Peterborough. The Supreme officers retorted a present membership of over 12,000. Amount paid for 200, cash on hand \$60,000 and in funeral benefit department \$2,500 was received and \$11,100 paid out, cash on hand \$13,000. The beneficiary department has 2,400 members carrying insurance amounting to \$2,703,000. \$29,000 of claims were paid during the year.

A swindle which evidently is new is being worked with great success in many towns. A woman book agent appears in town and goes from house to house leaving books for examination. Next day a man calls to see if the books are wanted, and if they are not he takes them away with him. Usually they are not wanted. A few days later the woman agent appears again, and on being told that the man has taken away the book weeps copiously says the villain has been collecting her books all over town, pleads poverty and so on, and accepts the proffered compensation.

Reports from Recounter, Hermitage Bay, N. F., announce that the fishery has been almost a total failure the last winter. Great poverty is being experienced by the inhabitants, and it is difficult to predict the outcome.

The failures in the Dominion of Canada, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., for the quarter ending March 31, 1896, were 738 as against 556 for the same quarter last year, and the liabilities were \$5,745,540, as against \$4,220,195 last year.

Owing to the fact that few of the sailing vessels employed in the whale fishery last year paid expenses, many of them are being turned into codfish boats. The introduction of steam as a motive power, combined with the growing scarcity of whales, are two reasons why the "wind jammera' of by gone days are being turned to other uses.

Owing to the lateness of the season, the time for oyster planting will be much shorter than usual. It is reported that a number of boats laden with oysters were laid up at East Rockaway during the foul weather in the early part of the week. Old planters say it is never safe to handle seed oysters after the lst of June, and that this year the planting will have to be done in about one month.


Mr. R. F. Stopart, director of the Meteorological Observatory. Toronto, reports that in Ontaric generally the total snowfall of the winter has been greater than the average, the more northern counties and the central counties on the higher portion of the Province showing the greatest excess, which in some districts was as much as three feet. In Muskoka and Parry Sound the excess was about a foot, and at most points near Lakes Erie and Ontarto but a few inches. The snowfall has also heen excessive in the southwestern portion of Quebec, particularly during the latter half of the winter.

The North German Lloyd Co. has decided to build six new steamers, in addition to the four now under construction in German ship-yards. The vessels are to have a dead-weight capacity of 10,000 tons. It is understood that one or more of these new vessels will be placed on the Baltimore-Bremen Line.

A Psalter printed on vellum in 1459, for the Benedictine monastery of Sankt Jakob, at Maiuz, the third book from the Mainz press and the second printed book with a date, is offered for sale in Mr. Quaritch's Liturgical catalogue for \$26,250. When last sold, in 1884, this copy brought \$24,750. No other copy has appeared in the market for almost a hundred years. It is far rarer than the Mazarine Bible, the first book over printed.

In London Consols have touched 1103, the highest price on record, and were hard to procure at that price. Indian three per cents were quoted at over 111, which was also a record price. These values would have been held incredible a year ago. The rise in consols is largely attributable to the buoyancy of trade as shown in the Board of Trade returns and the increase in the imports and exports. The strength of the Indian securities leads to the expectation of a conversion operation.

The consolidation of the great steel companies of America, a deal successfully put through in New York last week, will be followed at once by an international combination to control the steel markets of the world. A meeting to that end has already been arranged for next month in Paris. The American trust represents a combined capital of not less than \$200,000,000. If the internasional deal is made, about \$450,000,000 capital will be involved, or five times as much as is invested in the Standard Oil Co., the greatest commercial combination of the age.

Contracts are being made in St. John, N.B., for deals at \$9.75 a thousand. Last year the price averaged about \$3.50 per thousand.

The sale is reported, in New York, of 250,000 pounds of Texas wool, for expert to Europe. The price paid was 7½ cents a pound, and it is announced that the stuff could not be sold at home, on account of the depression in the woollen trade.

Frank E. Beckett, who has for some months been in charge of the Bell Telephone Co.'s local office, has left Stratford under a cloud. The company's auditor came there last week and found the accounts in bad shape, and as a consequence of this Beckett has taken his departure. The discrepancy was small—in fact it was less than a hundred dollars—but the company is very strict in these matters.

The supply of cod-liver oil from Norway is becoming more scarce every day. That the Scandinavian supply is diminishing rapidly is made evident by the following figures, which represent the yield for the last three years: In 1893 it amounted to 26,813 barrels, in the following year it dropped to 18,500; and last year it declined to 12,680, with every prospect of smaller harvests in the future.

Out of a total of 12,690,152 families in Out of a total of 12,590,152 families in the United States, over 4 000,000 families live on incomes of less than \$400 a year. More than half the nation's families get \$600. Only one family in twenty gets more than \$3,000, and this class absorbs one third the total annual product of the total annual increase in the nation's wealth While the rich are getting richer, however, it is not true that the poor are growing poorer.

Mr. F. A. Mann, accountant of the Merchants Bank, St. Johns, for seven years past, has been promoted to the management of the bank at Hespeler, Ont., the branch from which Mr. Wurtele was recently transferred to St. Johns.

An immense log boom, claimed to be the largest single boom in the world, was finished on the Menominee River, Mich., a few days ago. It is ten miles long and is stretched along the main channel of the river to prevent logs from going adrift into the flats this spring, when the big annual drive, which will this year comprise several hundred million feet of logs, comes down the river.

Freight Agent A. McDonald, of the Manitoba and North-Western railway, says that this season rould probably be the busiest in the history of the railways of the Canadian North-West. All the elevators along their lines are filled with grain, and when navigation opens there will be a great rush to the lakes. In Mr. McDonald's opinion there will be more money in circulation thus summer in the money in circulation this summer in the province than in any previous year.

It has developed that Minchell, the Pentewater, Mich., murderer, was short in bis accounts with insarance companies and had nothing with which to make the deficiency good.

For the ten months of 1e95-96, ending Murch 30, Canada's revenue has increased over the same period of the last fiscal year, \$2,281,308. The revenue for March increased some \$200,000 over March, 1895.

They have some \$2,000 on the buildings. Mr. Hartley had \$1,000 insurance.

Of the big fleet which wintered in Chicago about seventy per cent have been chartered and are now laden with grain, waiting for news that the Straits of Mackinac are open. Many of the boats which are still unchartered will go straight to Duluth at the opening of navigation, and others will go to Escanaba to load iron ore. 8,000,000 bushels of wheat have been placed for shipment from the head of Lake Superior, some vessels being chartered for three and four trips. Nearly 8,000,000 bushels of grain have been loaded into boats during the winter.

The French shore question is evidently going to play an important part in the relations between France and Newfound-land this summer. A reliable authority existes that a French squadron is now fitting out under the title of the Newfoundland division. It will consist of three ships the La Clocheteric, Manche, and Fulton, and will be detached from the usual Atlantic division. The ships will be employed exclusively in watching French interests in connection with the Newfoundland fisheries. The La Clocheterie has been in these waters before, but the others are entirely new ships for the Newfoundland coast, and the colonisis anticipate considerable trouble Maximum the colonists anticipate considerable trouble during the fishing season.

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

The new General Manager, Mr. Hays, is making Herculean efforts to restore equilibrium between receipts and expenses, and no doubt he will succeed in time. The total amount chargeable to capital for the last half year was \$1,314,000. The net profit of the Chicago & Grand Trunk was \$102,090, against \$16,425. On the other hand the working of the Detroit, Grand Haven & Milwaukee left a balance of \$104,430, compared with \$155,075 in 1894. The report says: "The working of the Grand Trunk proper resulted for the half year in a net profit of \$298,850, after paying fixed charges, and the absorption of that profit, -sether with the net revenue deficiency of \$165,000 is attributable entirely to the unsuccessful working of the Chicago & Grand Trunk, and the Detroit, Grand Haven & Milwaukee. It is, therefore, satisfactory to note that there is every indication since the begin ring of the present year of a substantial improvement in the operation of the Chicago & Grand Trunk, which is the more important of those lines."

Having contributed such invaluable services to Canada in developing this country, our people generally cannot but entertain the best wishes for the Grand Trunk which we trust has seen the last of deficits, and is now on the road to a series of annual profits.

After making such an excellent showing in 1891, the managers of the Alliance Assurance Company might have been forgiven if they had rested on their oars for a while. But they evidently did not; for in all their departments there is again a marked advance as gratifying as it was unexpected.

In the life department the new policies issued have again topped the million mark, reaching £1,117,148, although the year 1895 was the first under the new arrangement whereby commission and management charges are limited to ten per cent of the premiums. At this very moderate ratio of expense, with the sound and profitable character of the company's investments to help it, the showing of the department should be of an excellent character, and that it was so is proved by the fact that during the year the life funds were increased by £140,184 and at its close stood at £2,556,817.

In its fire department the Alliance makes an equally good showing. During the past year its loss ratio was only 49.96 per cent, and its expenses also show a contracting tendency. During the year just past, it had a Canadian premium income of \$199,218, and its policies in this country, new and renewed, amounted to \$16,601,877, while the net amount at risk was \$12,088,725. Under new and energetic management these figures are likely to be largely increased, and the Canadian department thus brought more prominently under the notice of the Board of Directors.

#### THE WESTERN BANK.

The report presented at the fourteenth annual meeting of the Western Bank of Canada is a model of conciseness and brevity, and yet it con which existed in trade generally during the past year, the net profits of managed. the bank amounted to \$39,699 or 10\$ per cent upon the paid-up capital, which is an increase of \$3,754 over last year's figures. McMillan can justly be proud.

#### THE LONDON MUTUAL FIRE.

The report presented at the thirty. sixth annual general meeting of the London Mutual Fire Insurance Co., shows that the company stands on a sound basis and is enjoying continued success. In fact, had it not been for the disastrous fires in Toronto at the opening of last year, its ratio of losses would have fallen under the average, thanks to the care and skill displayed in selecting its risks. During the year the total number of policies issued was 7,456 on the cash system, 7,743 on the premium note system, and 1,357 in the general branch, making in all 16,646 policies, covering the enormous sum of \$21,521,415, and bringing up the total of insurance in force to \$50,210,039. This is a larger sum than is carried by any four other companies in Ontario, and nearly as great as that carried by its largest rivals in Canada.

In the report the directors take pains to refute the statement put forward by some of their competitors that the expense ratio of the company was excessive. They prove that the total of expense of management (including agents' commission) is only \$2.46 per policy, and for salaries 64 cents. #### THE ONTARIO BANK.

At the annual general meeting of the shareholders of the Ontario Bank to be hold in June, a by-law will be submitted for the reduction of the capital stock from \$1,500,000 to \$1,000,000. This is in accordauce with the courageous policy pursued by Mr. Charles McGill since he became general manager in July last.

After a thorough and careful examination of the bank's assets and business, he has reported to the Board of Directors that a reduction in the capital liability is necessary to put the stock on a proper basis. There is now \$40,000 to the credit of the rest account and \$12,000 to the credit of the profit and loss account, to which will be added the earnings for the current half year. It is proposed to pay a dividend of 24 per cent for the half year ending May 31, 1896, the dividend to be estimated on the reduced capital. A portion of the earnings will be used for that purpose.

The Bank Act makes provision for the reduction of capital stock by by-law passed at an annual general meeting and approved by the treasury board. The bylaw to be submitted to the Ontario Bank stockholders is intended to effect the needed reduction by dividing the required \$1,000,000 capital into 10,000 shares of \$100 each.

Stockholders will be given two shares of the new stock for every three shares of the old held by them. It will greatly facilitate this arrangement if each shareholder holding a number of shares not divisible by three without a remainder, should sell or purchase sufficient to make the even division possible. If any odd shares remain unconverted by August 1, it is proposed to convert them by reducing their par value by one-third; dividends to be paid on the reduced valuation.

Before deciding on the change, the directors consulted the leading stockholders in Toronto and Montreal, and the opinion was unanimous that it would be in the interests of the institution. The adoption of this course reflects credit on the straightforward methods of the general manager, and at the same time shows commendable readiness on the; part of the board to maintain the proper ratio between assets and capitalization.

#### THE OLD DUTCH FEVER.

The Old Dutch Estates' tever is prevailing in the United States and Canada. For the past three months inquiries on this subject at the consulate are so numerous as to almost bafile replies and threaten to interfere seriously with the regular business of the office. The "Anneke Jans" estate, the "Cronkhit," or "Cronckheit" or "Kronkheit" estate, the "Van Cot" estate, the "Van Dussen" estate and the "Webber" estate, the "Brandt" catate, the "Mezzer" estate-these are some of the fancy titles supposed to represent millions-actually representing nothing. These estates do not exist. They are myths. The "Bank of Holland," in which the "unclaimed millions" are alleged to be deposited, does not exist. Careful investigation

indues the belief that these estates originated in the brain of some rescally speculator, who, imposing on human credulity, found many victims and fleeced them most profitably. If these estates ever had a bona fide existence, then they came clearly within the purview of the statute of limits passed by the Dutch Parliament in 1852. by which all unclaimed inheritances irrevocably escheated after a lapse of five years to the state. Every dollar spent in references to these estates is so much money wasted.





#### FINANCIAL.

Money continues tight in this market, although in the other large centres it is developing a tendency towards greater ease. Here, however, call money is firm at 5 to 51 per cent, and mercantile discounts run from 6 per cent upwards. In New York money on call is 31 per cent, and time money is offered at 4 per cent for sixty days to four months, and 41 per cent for six and seven months on mixed Stock Exchange collateral. Commercial paper is quoted at 51@ 6 per cent for first-class endorsed bills receivable and four to six months' commission paper, and six per cent and upward for choice single names. In London call money has again fallen to 1/2 per cent, and the discount rate in the open market is 9-16 per cent.

One of the favorable features in the situation is the decline in the rates for sterling exchange under free offerings of bankers' bills and only a limited demand from remitters. Continental exchange was dull, with a lower market for reichsmarks. Posted asking rates for sterling, \$4.88@ \$4.881 for long bills and \$4.89@\$4.891 for demand. Actual rates are: Long bllls, \$1.871@1.874; sight drafts, \$4.881 @\$4.88}, and cable transfers, \$4.88}@ \$1.89. Francs are quoted at 5.171@ 5.16% for long and 5.15 for short; reichsmarks, 95% @95% for long and 95§ for short; guilders, 40½@40 3-16 for long and 40 5-16@403 for short. The stiffness of money and the scarcity of stocks for speculative purposes have rendered transactions on the Stock Exchange dull and uninteresting, and until call money eases a little it is useless to look for any marked revival. The undertone is certainly firm, and there is a steady demand for investment whenever prices come buyers' way, but until lenders relax their grip upon funds, any general activity in stocks is out of the question.

#### REAL ESTATE.

In comment on the movement in properties during the month of March, the Real Estate Record says: The real estate market during the month of March may be characterized as quiet, although judging from the recorded transfers a fair volume of business was transacted. St. Antoine, St. Mary's and St. Jean Baptiste wards contributed the largest amounts, and the sales in each ward were mostly of built properties; some residences of the better class, varying in price from \$12,500 to \$28,000, helping to make up the large amount for St. Antoine ward. In Westmount the sales of vacant properties largely predominated, there being only five sales of houses, and fourteen transfers of building land. Altogether, the business done does not compare so very unfavorably with that of previous years as one might imagine from the opinions so often expressed this spring as to the prevailing dulness in real estate.

In March, 1894, the sales recorded amounted to \$876 237; in March, 1895, to \$879.970, and in March, 1896 to \$758,461.

The selling of houses, which ought to be at its best, has been retarded by the linger ing winter, but with the advent of real spring weather an improvement may be expected in this branch of the business. There is no good reason why more house



likely will ) at any time, and with returning prosperity in general mercantile bus. ness, there will be a better demand for real estate. Rents generally have weakened. In every kind of property the competition has had a tendency to reduce rents in new buildings, and as to the old ones it is hard to get tenants for them. As regards warehouses the demand is poor. Instead of carrying large stocks of goods requiring a good deal of space for display and storage, the merchants of to-day carry sample lines only, the orders in most instances being shipped directly from the place of manufacture to the buyer.

The real estate mortgage loans recorded during the month of March in registration division of Montreal East, amount to \$135,014. Of this amount \$10,000 was placed at 4½ p.c.; \$37 000 at 5 p.c.; \$23,950 at 5½ p.c.; \$46,508 at 6 p.c.; \$2,700 at 63 p.c.; \$5,700 at 7 p.c.; \$1,200 at 7½ p.c.; \$1,696 at 8 p.c., and \$6,260 at a nominal rate. The real estate mortgage loans recorded during the month of March in registration division of Montreal West, amount to \$101,211. Of this amount \$27,-100 was placed at 5 p. c.; \$25,000 at 5} p.c.; \$32,878 at 6 p. c.; \$2,100 at 6½ p. c.; \$800 at 7 p. c.; \$4,775 at 8 p. c., and \$8,558 at a nominal rate.

#### WHEAT AND SILVER.

A significant contribution to the literature of the silver controvery is to be found in the report of the chief of the Minnesota Bureau of Statistics of Labor. The salient feature of the tables prepared by this official is the fact that the gold value of a bushel of wheat from 1891 to 1894, inclusive, was 62.1 in Minnesota, against 56.5 for the period from 1862 to 1866. In New York, from 1862 to 1866, the gold value of wheat per bushel was \$1.15. From 1891 to 1894 it was 83.5. The difference between the price in Minnesota and New York city from 1862 to 1866 was 58.5, but from 1891 to 1894 the difference was only 21.4. The Philadelphia Ledger, in commenting on ground.

ims report, says that the cheapened cost of transportation across the country, owing to the tremendous competition of the railvays, accounts for the lessening margin between the wheat price in Minnesota and the seaboard. The same remark applies to ocean transportation. From 1867 to 1870 wheat was \$1.10 higher in London than it was in Minnesota, and for the period from 1887 to 1890 it was only thirty-two cents higher in London. The price of wheat has thus sensibly declined in New York and in London, but decline is not traceable to silver legislation. It is attributable rather to lower freights and to the opening of new wheatfields in various portions of the world. The increase in the carrying power of the nation generally is a mighty factor in determining the causes of the fall in the prices of commodities In an article prepared by Michael G. Mulhall, the eminent statistician, for the Contemporary Review, it is stated that the combined carrying power of the railways and shipping of the world was in 1892 more than three times what it was in 1860, and "lessened the prices of all things and extended the markets of the world." 



The churches in England are feeling the hard times. The stipend of the Dean of Ely has been cut down from \$8,000 to \$6,-100, and that of the canons from \$4,550 to \$2,870 each. The Dean of Canterbury has \$3,900 instead of \$5,000. The canons of York have been reduced from \$3,000 to \$4,500 and those of Winchester from \$4,550 to \$2,500, while the Dean receives \$4,500 mstead of \$8,000. At Chichester the cut has been for the Dean from \$5,000 to \$3,500, and for the canons from \$2,500 to \$1,750. At Norwich there has been a general reduction of 20 per cent., and at Rochester of 25 per cent., and similar reductions at Sallsbury and Peterbo.ough.

A new regulation regarding the admission of tourists' bicycles into Canada has been adopted by the Customs Department, which will facilitate the visits of touring bicyclists to this country from the United States. By an order passed in March it was arranged the visiting bicyclists might, by depositing the amount of duty on entering the country, together with a statement that the wheel was to be exported, obtain a refund on leaving the country. It has been represented that this arrangement would debar from Canada many who would etherwise tour through the country. It has been represented that the tourists who are members of the League of American Wheelmen are known, regitsered and numbered, and that a simple form could be filled out with name and number of bicycle, the League number of the tourist to be left with the collector of the port of ontry.
