Mr. Mackenzie King (Prince Albert), by leave of the House, introduced a Bill No. 1, An Act respecting the Administration of Oaths of Office, which was read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported, That when the House did attend His Excellency the Governor General this day in the Senate Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of Parliament, and to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy which he read to the House as follows:—

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

In opening the Third Session of the Sixteenth Parliament of Canada I desire to join with you in profound thankfulness for the recovery of our beloved Sovereign, King George the Fifth. I share your fervent hope that His Majesty may be completely restored in health, and that he may be spared to continue that devoted service to the Empire which has won for him an abiding place in the hearts of the people.

The unprecedented prosperity which is apparent throughout the Dominion affords cause for the deepest satisfaction. Never in the history of Canada has there been such industrial and commercial expansion as that which has taken place during the past twelve months. The industry and enterprise of our people have been rewarded under Providence with an abundant harvest. In the production of agricultural and other basic industries all previous records have been surpassed. New records have also been established in the volume of construction and in the volume of foreign trade. Employment has been maintained at a high level and all indications point to a continuance throughout the country of the present favourable conditions.

A notable feature of industrial development has been the continued advance and prosperity of the mining industry in almost every part of the Dominion

The production of the fishing industry during the past year has shown a substantial increase over that of 1927. In accordance with the recommendations of the Royal Commission on Fisheries, the Fisheries Branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries has been separated from the Marine Branch, and a Deputy Minister of Fisheries has been appointed. A reorganization of the Fisheries Service along lines recommended by the Commission is being effected. Certain other matters covered in the report will, during the present session, be dealt with by legislation.

Plans are in progress of completion for the construction of the National Research Laboratories to provide scientific and technical knowledge for the various branches of production.

The past year witnessed the inauguration of the Canadian National Steamships service between Canada and Bermuda and the West Indies. The many advantages of this service are already apparent. In view of the importance of our ever increasing export trade it is intended to augment and extend the existing facilities for furnishing Canadian exporters with commercial information in respect to foreign markets. It is also proposed to establish additional Trade Commissioner offices at strategic points in different parts of the world.

Communication within the Dominion has been facilitated and improved by an extensive development of air mail services, and communication to all parts of the British Empire by the restoration of penny postage.

The expansion in trade and commerce which the country has experienced has been strikingly reflected in our transportation returns. The net earnings of the railways have exceeded those of any previous year.

Satisfactory progress continues to be made in the construction of the Hudson Bay Railway. The laying of steel is now within thirty-seven miles of the terminus of the line at Churchill, where a substantial commencement has been made in the provision of port facilities. The rapid development of Western and Northern Canada imposes on the railways the necessity of providing increased transportation facilities in the immediate future. A further branch line program by the Canadian National management will be submitted for your consideration. You will also be asked to authorize the acquisition of certain railways in both Eastern and Western Canada, which will constitute potentially important feeders of the Canadian National System.

Amendment of the Railway Act will be sought, granting to the Board of Railway Commissioners wider powers of investigation of affairs in relation to subsidiary concerns, and with respect to the issue of capital stock.

Legislation will be introduced to give effect to a general pension scheme for the benefit of the employees of the Canadian National Railways.

Pursuant to the recommendations of the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization, agreements have been consummated with several of the Provinces for the promotion of juvenile settlement from the United Kingdom. Negotiations have also been concluded for the application of a £10 ocean rate to all British immigrants ordinarily resident in Great Britain or Northern Ireland, except agricultural families, house workers, and juvenile immigrants who receive a more favourable rate under the Empire Settlement Passage Agreement. A flow of immigrants commensurate with Canadian requirements and selected strictly for their ability to promote the general prosperity of the country is being satisfactorily maintained.

A royal commission has been appointed to inquire and report as to what financial readjustments are necessary in order that the Province of Manitoba may be placed in a position of equality with the other Provinces of Confederation with respect to the administration and control of its natural resources, as from its entrance into Confederation in 1870.

Negotiations have also been resumed with the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan with a view to the transfer to these Provinces of their natural resources, and with the Province of British Columbia with respect to the restoration to that Province of the lands of the railway belt and the Peace River Block.

A royal commission has been appointed to inquire into the existing situation respecting radio broadcasting in Canada, and to make recommendations to the Government as to its future administration, management, control, and financing.

Since the close of the last Session, there has been a marked development of the provision for direct personal contact in the discussion of inter-imperial and foreign affairs. The High Commissioner for His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland took up his duties at Ottawa in September. The Japanese Legation was established at Ottawa in July under a Chargé d'Affaires, and the French Legation at Ottawa in November on the arrival of the Minister of France. The Canadian Legation in Paris was opened at the end of September, and steps are being taken for the early establishment of the Canadian Legation at Tokyo. The more effective consultation provided by the personal contacts thus established will, it is believed, serve materially to advance the common interests concerned, and to promote understanding and good-will in our inter-imperial and international relations.

The Multi-lateral Treaty for the Renunciation of War, which was signed on behalf of Canada on August 27, will be submitted for your approval; also a convention between the United States and Canada providing for the preservation of the scenic values of Niagara Falls.

Among other measures to which your consideration will be invited, will be certain amendments to the Dominion Elections Act, the Companies Act, the Fisheries Act, the Narcotic Drug Act, and the Act Respecting Technical Education.

with so great patience and fortitude. We have watched the course of Your Majesty's illness with anxious solicitude and with profound sympathy for Your Majesty, Her Majesty the Queen, and for all the members of the Royal Family. It is with sentiments of the deepest sincerity and loyalty that, as representatives of the Canadian people, we join our prayers to those from all parts of the British Empire for the early restoration of Your Majesty to the fulness of health and strength.

On motion of Mr. Mackenzie King (Prince Albert), it was ordered,—That the said Address be engrossed.

On motion of Mr. Mackenzie King (Prince Albert), it was resolved,—That a Message be sent to the Senate informing their Honours that this House hath passed an Address to His Most Excellent Majesty the King, expressing the thankfulness and rejoicing of the people of Canada on the promise of complete recovery of His Majesty and requesting their Honours to unite with this House in the said Address, hereto attached;

And that the Clerk of the House do carry the said Message to the Senate.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIANS FOR 1928

To the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons.

The Joint Librarians of Parliament have the honour to submit their Report for the year 1928.

The Supplementary Catalogue of books purchased during the year will shortly be available to users of the Library. The list of those books donated to the Library of Parliament is now in the hands of the printers.

The donation list contains many interesting publications. His Excellency the Governor General has graciously presented to the Library two large volumes, entitled respectively, "Ballads and Broad-sides of the Elizabethan Period," and "The Benedictional of St. Aethelwold." The latter volume contains a facsimile of a famous manuscript, dated 963-984, which preserves the remains of English art of the tenth century. The original manuscript is in the library of the Duke of Devonshire, formerly Governor General of Canada.

To the courtesy of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace the Library is indebted for many volumes concerned with economics and international affairs.

From the Justice Department, through Mr. C. P. Plaxton, there has been received a set of twelve volumes of official documents, including the Privy Council Decision, relating to the Newfoundland-Canada-Labrador Boundary Case.

An interesting volume has been presented to the Library by Mr. L. M. Wilson, son of Mr. L. A. Wilson, late member for Vaudreuil-Soulanges. It is a facsimile of a manuscript of the seventeenth century, entitled, "Raretés des Indes." The volume consists of a series of sketches and designs relating to the people, and to the fauna and flora of New France.

Further attention has been paid to the arrangement of material in the vaults, and with the assistance of the Department of Public Works some new shelving is now being constructed. This will slightly relieve the congestion which has existed for some time, to which attention has been frequently directed, and which will increase with accessions to the Library by the annual purchases and donations of new books.

Occasional complaints have been received by the Librarians that material concerning the legislative and administrative affairs of the various Provinces lacks something of completeness. Correspondence with Provincial officials has been carried on, and the Librarians desire to acknowledge the courteous assurances which have been received in regard to the regular supplying of this Library with all annual Provincial documents, and current bills and papers.

The Bill No. 5, An Act to amend the Root Vegetables Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. 9, An Act to amend the Post Office Act (Newspaper Ownership), was read the third time and passed.

The hour devoted to Private and Public Bills having expired;

The House resumed the consideration in Committee of the Whole of the proposed Resolution to amend the Technical Education Act.

There be it resolved—(1) That persons born in Canada (or otherwise defined as Canadian Nationals) shall be described as being of Canadian Nationality in all legislation and official and other documents.

(2) That persons of the white race, born of parents whose family residence in Canada is of three or more generations, shall be described as being of the “Canadian Race” in all legislation and official and other documents.

And a Debate arising thereon;

Mr. Woodsworth, seconded by Mr. Adshead, moved,—That the said Resolution be amended by striking out clause (2).

After further Debate thereon, the said proposed amendment and main motion were, by leave of the House, respectively withdrawn.

Therefore be it resolved that, in the opinion of this House, the Government should consider the advisability that a further Federal grant be made to cover the next five years' development of highway construction.

2. For a return showing the names of the several foremen and all persons employed thereon, the number of days of employment, the rate of pay and the total amount paid each;

3. For a return showing materials used in such repairs or renewals, particularly the kinds and quantities of timber, lumber, iron and steel, and fastenings, and the prices paid therefor;

4. For a return showing other materials, their quantities and the prices paid therefor, the total cost of same in each case and the names of the parties from whom purchased and the amounts paid to each;

5. For a statement showing the date when the work on each of these repair operations begun, when operations ceased, whether repairs are completed in each case, and if not, what proportion of the work has been done, when the work will be resumed and when completed.

The House resumed the Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Church,—That, in the opinion of this House, immediate action should be taken, without further and unnecessary delays, to enter into a treaty with the Government of the United States for the immediate development and generation of water-power on the St. Lawrence River and its deepening and development in the interests of navigation, and that a Great St. Lawrence waterway is an immediate and economic necessity for the welfare and best interests of Canada.

And that this House is further of the opinion that the Government should undertake the construction and operation of this canal as a public undertaking itself and the power incident herein should be developed and generated at cost by the Government for the people under public ownership and not alienated to private interests for gain or exported for use outside Canada.

And the Debate continuing;

Mr. Speaker having arrived in the House, took the Chair.

After further Debate thereon, the said motion was, by leave of the House, withdrawn.

Mr. Smith (Cumberland), seconded by Mr. MacLaren, moved,—Whereas in the year 1870 the Federal Government appointed a canal commission to report on proposed canal works in Canada;

And whereas said commission reported in 1871, dividing the proposed works into four classes and set forth “that all the works under the head of First Class are really of so great importance and so essential to the welfare and prosperity of the whole country that they should be undertaken and proceeded with”;

And whereas the proposed canal across the Isthmus of Chignecto was placed in category of one of the first class projects;

And whereas the said proposed canal across the Isthmus of Chignecto is the only proposed canal undertaking of the first class that has not been proceeded with;

And whereas said undertaking is of great importance and essential to the welfare and prosperity of the whole of Canada;

Resolved, that in the opinion of this House, it is advisable that the Government of Canada take immediate steps to further investigate said project as to feasibility, cost of construction, economic and national advantages to be gained by the construction of a ship canal across the Isthmus of Chignecto to connect the waters of the Bay of Fundy with the waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and further that the Government be urged to make these surveys and investigations with the least possible delay;

And that when the surveys, estimates as to cost of construction and economic and national advantages are satisfactorily established the Government should take the necessary steps to proceed with the construction of said canal at the earliest possible date.

And a Debate arising thereon;

Mr. Barber, seconded by Mr. Brady, moved in amendment thereto:—That the last paragraph of the said Resolution be deleted.

And the question being put on the amendment; it was agreed to;

And the question being put on the main motion as amended; it was agreed to.

Mr. Woodsworth, seconded by Mr. Heaps, moved,—That, in the opinion of this House, no disposition of the natural resources, under the control of the Federal Government, shall be effective until ratified by Parliament.

And a Debate arising thereon, and continuing;

At eleven o'clock, p.m., Mr. Speaker adjourned the House without question put, pursuant to Standing Order 7, until to-morrow, at three o'clock, p.m.

Mr. Rinfret, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 15th February, 1929, for a copy of all letters, telegrams, papers and other documents, with reference to the dismissal of William S. Assifat, postmaster at Sifton, Manitoba, and the appointment of a successor to said position.

Mr. Euler, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 20th February, 1929, for a return showing the quantity of book paper imported into Canada since Tariff Item 1060 became effective, and the proportion of such paper upon which the drawback of 80% of the duty has been claimed.

The following Order of the House was issued to the proper officer under subsection 4 of Standing Order 44:—

By Mr. Kennedy:—Order of the House for a Return showing:—

1. What Customs Offices have been closed within the last year in each of the provinces of Canada.
2. What Customs Offices remain in each of the provinces.

The House resumed the Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Woodsworth,—That, in the opinion of this House, no disposition of the natural resources, under the control of the Federal Government, shall be effective until ratified by Parliament.

And the Debate continuing;

Mr. Church, seconded by Mr. Gott, moved in amendment thereto:—

That all the words after the word "That" in the motion be struck out and the following substituted therefor:

"it be referred to the Standing Committee of this House on Mines, Forests and Water-Powers, to consider and investigate all leases, grants or permits issued during the past year in respect of natural resources under the jurisdiction of the Dominion of Canada, known as "water powers"; with power to send for all papers and documents, to summon and examine witnesses, regarding any such leases, grants and permits.

"And further, with power to the said Committee to report whether such leases, grants or permits are in the public interest, and whether the interests of the Federal authorities are amply protected.

"And also, to report whether, in the opinion of the Committee, the said lease or permit in respect of the Seven Sisters Falls in the Province of Manitoba should be revoked and cancelled, and if so, upon what terms and conditions.

"And to report all matter and findings to this House."

Mr. SPEAKER: In my humble opinion the amendment is out of order for the following reasons. Beauchesne, section 397, states:

"An amendment must not raise any question which by the rules of the house, can only be raised by a distinct motion after notice."

The honourable gentleman will notice that the question before the house is an abstract one. It reads:

"That in the opinion of this house, no disposition of the natural resources, under the control of the federal parliament, shall be effective until ratified by parliament."

By his amendment the honourable gentleman asks, *inter alia*, that the lease of a specific water power called the Seven Sisters Falls, be investigated by the Committee on Mines, Forests and Water Powers. What is the procedure in this matter? I read this from Bourinot, fourth edition, page 321:

"It is an imperative rule that every amendment must be relevant to the question on which the amendment has been proposed, and this rule has been invariably insisted upon by Canadian speakers."

Further:

"If such a practice were tolerated, all the benefits of giving due notice of a motion, and allowing the house a full opportunity of considering a question, would be practically lost. A member would then be in a position to surprise the house at any moment with a motion of importance"—

This is undoubtedly a question of importance.

—"and the necessity of giving notice would be superseded to all intents and purposes. It is not, therefore, surprising that the latest English decisions are in accord with those of the Canadian speakers. Sir Erskine May, in later editions however, lays it down as 'an imperative rule that every amendment must be relevant to the question on which the amendment is proposed'."

I have, on many occasions, looked over precedents on the vexed question of amendments and subamendments, and the ruling is uniform on the subject that no new question must be introduced on an amendment; it must be relevant to the main question. In the present instance the resolution is an abstract one while the amendment refers to a specific subject different from the main one. I therefore rule the amendment out of order.

And the Debate still continuing;

Mr. Geary, seconded by Mr. Senn, moved in amendment thereto:—That all the words in the motion after the word “House” be struck out and the following substituted therefor: “the present method of disposing of the water powers which form part of the natural resources under the control of the Federal Government is unsatisfactory, and that the whole question of the disposal of such water powers should be referred to a Committee of this House for inquiry and report.”

Mr. Ralston raised a Point of Order on the ground that the so-called amendment is not in fact an amendment at all; it is a new motion which the honourable member is endeavouring to get before this house, and of which he has given this House no notice whatever and in connection with which honourable members have had no time to form an opinion. The resolution to which this is alleged to be an amendment is one which has to do with all natural resources; this amendment is confined to water powers. It is not an amendment within the terms of the rules of the house. If the resolution now before this House should be defeated there would still be an opportunity to move the resolution which is now the subject of the amendment. The very object of having matters come up by way of an amendment is that the whole matter may be disposed of and there will not be two debates on the same thing. This is a new motion and does not come within the relevancy of the rules and, therefore, it should not be put to the House.

Mr. Speaker ruled the Point of Order well taken.

From this ruling Mr. Guthrie appealed to the House.

And the question being put by Mr. Speaker: Shall the ruling of the Chair be sustained; it was decided in the affirmative on the following division:—

Mr. Dunning then, by leave of the House, presented a Bill, No. 72, An Act respecting Canadian National Railways and to authorize the acquisition of the Quebec, Montreal and Southern Railway, which was read the first time.

By leave of the House, the said Bill was read the second time, and referred to the *Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines*.

Mr. Young (Weyburn), from the Select Standing Committee appointed to supervise the Official Report of the Debates of the House during the present Session, presented the First Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have had under consideration the Report of the said Committee, presented to the House on June 30th, 1924, for the purpose of reconsidering some of the recommendations contained therein, which were presented to the House and concurred in at that time.

Your Committee have become impressed with the view that Senators should be supplied with a limited number of copies of House of Commons Hansard for distribution by the King's Printer in accordance with mailing lists provided by Senators. At the present time Honourable Members of the Senate are supplied with filing copies only, and frequent requests having been received from Senators for additional copies to send out, the advisability of considering the matter has become increasingly evident.

Your Committee therefore recommend that two copies of House of Commons Hansard, in addition to filing copies now delivered, be supplied for the mailing lists of Senators and sent out by the King's Printer to such names and addresses as shall be forwarded to the Editor of Debates, House of Commons.

Your Committee have also had under consideration the advisability of increasing the number of Hansards supplied to the Members of the House of Commons. After careful consideration of the matter your Committee beg leave to recommend that the present number of ten copies, four of which are delivered for the files and six for mailing purposes, be increased to twelve copies, two of which shall be for the files and ten copies and no more for distribution by the King's Printer in accordance with names and addresses supplied by Members of the House of Commons to the Editor of Debates, House of Commons.

Your Committee further recommend that the quorum of the said Committee be reduced from the present number of seven to five. The total membership of the Committee being but twelve it is found very difficult when other committees are functioning to secure a sufficient attendance to constitute a quorum at the number now fixed.

Your Committee have had under consideration Bill No. 84, An Act to incorporate The Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada, and have agreed to report the same with an amendment.

Mr. Hay, from the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented the Fifth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have had under consideration Bill No. 74, An Act respecting The Premier Guarantee and Accident Insurance Company of Canada, and have agreed to report the same without amendment.

A Message was received from the Senate informing this House that the Senate had passed the Bill No. 32, An Act to incorporate The Wapiti Insurance Company, with an amendment, which is as follows:—

1. Page 3,—Between clauses 9 and 10, insert the following as clause "A":—

Clause "A"

"This Act shall come into force on a date to be specified by the Superintendent of Insurance in a notice in the Canada Gazette, and such notice shall not be given until this Act has been approved by a resolution adopted by at least two-thirds of the votes of the members of the Company present or represented by proxy at a meeting duly called for that purpose, nor until the Superintendent of Insurance has been satisfied by such evidence as he may require that such approval has been given and that the Provincial Company has ceased to do business, or will cease to do business forthwith upon a license being issued to the Company."

Mr. Speaker informed the House,—That the Clerk had laid on the Table the Twenty-seventh Report of the Examiner of Petitions for Private Bills, which was read as follows:—

Pursuant to Standing Order 99, Section 2, the Examiner of Petitions for Private Bills has the honour to present the following as his Twenty-seventh Report:—

Your Examiner has duly examined the following Petitions for Private Bills, and finds that all the requirements of the 95th Standing Order have been complied with in each case, viz:—

Of Cobb Connector Company of Los Angeles, California, United States of America, to authorize the Commissioner of Patents to restore Patent No. 157,331 for the improvement in couplers for train pipes.

Of Central Finance Corporation of Toronto, Ontario, to amend their Act of incorporation.

Mr. Morin (St. Hyacinthe-Rouville), from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee, as ordered by the House on the 22nd of March, 1929, have considered the twenty-fourth report of the Clerk of Petitions together with the Petition of Mr. Charles Duquette and others, of Montreal, praying for the passing of an Act respecting "Alliance Nationale."

The evidence adduced before your Committee was sufficient to indicate that the said petition would have been presented within the date of expiry of the time for receiving petitions had the Bill corresponding thereto been approved by the Superintendent of Insurance as at first submitted to him. The changes made in the Bill necessitated corresponding changes in the petition; hence the late presentation, by only one day, of the petition.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the said petition be received, and that the penalty charge of \$100 be refunded.

Your Committee have also considered the thirty-sixth report of the Clerk of Petitions as ordered by the House on the 10th of April, 1929, together with the petition of Christina Adams Bourne, praying for the passing of an Act to declare her marriage with John Bourne to be dissolved, and that she be divorced from him.

The evidence adduced before your Committee regarding the presentation of the said petition, shortly after expiry of the time for receiving petitions, was sufficiently indicated to enable your Committee to recommend that the petition be received.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the petition be received, and also that the penalty charge thereon be not imposed.

TELEGRAM

FROM THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR DOMINION AFFAIRS TO THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR EXTERNAL AFFAIRS, CANADA

London, 22nd April, 1929.

In looking back on my long illness and recovery my heart is full of thankfulness of far deeper origin than any mere sense of relief.

I have been brought back from danger and weariness of the past months by the wonderful skill and devotion of my doctors, surgeons and nurses. And help has come from another source of strength: as month after month went by I learned of the widespread and loving solicitude with which the Queen and I were surrounded. I was able to picture to myself the crowds of friends waiting and watching at my gate and to think of still greater numbers of those who in every part of the empire were remembering me with prayers and good wishes. The realization of this has been among the most vivid experiences of my life.

It was an encouragement beyond description to feel that my constant and earnest desire had been granted—the desire to gain the confidence and affection of my people. My thoughts have carried me even further than this. I cannot dwell upon the generous sympathy shown to me by unknown friends in many

other countries without a new and moving hope. I long to believe it possible that experiences such as mine may soon appear no longer exceptional: when the national anxiety of all the peoples of the world shall be felt as a common source of human sympathy and a common claim on human friendship.

I am not yet able to bear the strain of a public ceremony but I look forward on some appointed day to joining with my people at home and overseas in thanking Almighty God not merely for my own recovery but for the new evidence of a growing kindly significance of the true nature of men and nations.

In the meantime I hope this message may reach all those even in the remotest corners of the world from whom I have received words of sympathy and goodwill.

Of The Great Lakes and Atlantic Canal and Power Company, Limited, to authorize the construction of a canal from below Sorel, Quebec, to at or near Cornwall, Ontario.

The Clerk of the House laid on the Table the following Private Bill:—

Bill No. 169, An Act respecting the Great Lakes and Atlantic Canal and Power Company, Limited.—*Mr. Smith (Stormont)*.

The said Bill was read the first time and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House, pursuant to Standing Order 102.

Mr. Morin (St. Hyacinthe-Rouville), from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Mr. Morin (St. Hyacinthe-Rouville), from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee, as ordered by the House on the 10th of April instant, have considered the Thirty-third Report of the Clerk of Petitions together with the petitions of Dean William Moncrieff, Albert Nott and Patrizio Nardini, severally praying for the passing of an Act to grant a divorce, and to dissolve the marriage of the petitioners.

Mr. Ward, seconded by Mr. MacLean (Prince), moved,—That the said Bill be now read the second time.

After Debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

The said Bill was accordingly read the second time.

The hour devoted to Private and Public Bills having expired;

The Committee of Supply then resumed, and further progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

And it being 11 o'clock, p.m.;

By leave of the House, Mr. Speaker read the following decision:—

On Wednesday, April 17th, Mr. Robb moved that Mr. Speaker leave the Chair for the House to go into Committee of Supply.

Mr. Stewart (Leeds) moved in amendment that all the words after "That" be struck out and the following substituted therefor: "in the opinion of this House, the Postmaster General has acted in a most arbitrary manner and in utter disregard of the letter and the spirit of the Civil Service Act in connection with the recent appointment of a postmaster at the town of Simcoe."

Debate thereon was interrupted on Wednesday at six o'clock by the adjournment of the House under Standing Order 6; and on Thursday, the 18th, when the Order was called for the House to resolve itself into Committee of

Supply, I had to leave the Chair without question put, under Standing Order 28. This rule which does away with a motion for the House to go in Supply on Thursday and Friday was passed in 1913. The revision of 1927 did not deal with this matter.

The Leader of the House having agreed that debate continue on Mr. Stewart's amendment, there was no necessity to give a ruling, but the House requested that I render a decision in order to settle the practice which should be followed in the future under the same circumstances.

I have listened with great interest to the able argument set forth by several prominent members and I have carefully compared our Standing Orders with those of Great Britain.

Standing Orders 6, 7 and 28 must be construed together in accordance with the broad statement laid down by Lord Mansfield, namely:—

"Where there are different statutes *in pari materia*, though made at different times, or even expired and not referring to each other, they shall be taken and construed together, as one system and as explanatory of each other."

I have come to the conclusion that if debate on the amendment to the motion for leaving the Chair is interrupted by the eleven o'clock adjournment as was the case last year, the procedure is not annihilated but suspended by the operation of Standing Order 28, because Standing Order 7 provides that "All business not disposed of at the termination of the sitting shall stand over until the next sitting day when it will be taken up at the same stage where its progress was interrupted."

It is well established under our practice that the expressions "next sitting", "next sitting day" and "next sitting of the House" when used to state the time until which a question is ordered to stand over, do not mean the following calendar day but rather the next day on which it will be convenient to resume the proceedings on that question. It seems therefore that if debate is interrupted at eleven o'clock under Standing Order 7, the question is not superseded or lapsed but it can be resumed without a motion to that effect on the first occasion that motion is made for the Speaker to leave the Chair for Supply, which may be on any of the three first sitting days of the following week. Sir Erskine May's comments on this point do not entirely apply to our House of Commons because the eleven o'clock rule at Westminster is not the same as ours. I am of the opinion that no motion is necessary for the resumption of this debate when it is interrupted at eleven o'clock.

But the situation is different if the interruption is caused by adjournment of the debate at any time or by the adjournment of the House at six o'clock on Wednesday. Standing Order 27 provides that the question then under consideration shall stand in a certain precedence on the Order Paper but no order is therein given to proceed with it. In that case, I am of the opinion that May's comments as found at page 527 of the 13th Edition will apply. The procedure on the amendment lapses. But can it be revived?

The answer must be given from the broadest point of view possible. It must not be forgotten that when the House passed Standing Order 7 compelling adjournment at eleven o'clock, it very materially curtailed the length of debate in such cases as the one under consideration.

Formerly an amendment involving want of confidence could be discussed from Monday until Wednesday at six o'clock in the afternoon without interruption and the question could be exhausted in that time, but now with only six hours' sittings on Monday and Tuesday and three hours on Wednesday, it seems that the minority or, as it is called, the Opposition, is at a great disadvantage, as Thursday may be reached before all the members who wish to speak have had an opportunity to do so.

If the question lapses, an expression of opinion cannot be given by the House on what may be a most important grievance. The Government's policy can neither be vindicated nor challenged. I do not think such a situation was ever contemplated by the authors of Standing Order 28 or by the Committee which recommended Standing Order 7 in 1927. It is a well known principle in parliamentary law that the House of Commons can rescind its own decisions, suspend its own orders or revive any superseded motion.

No notice is necessary in Great Britain for a motion to revive an order of the day which has been dropped or set aside by abrupt adjournments or any other procedure. But our Standing Order 45 leaves no room for doubt. Every resolution of the House, and that means every decision, must be preceded by a notice.

I think I am on safe ground in ruling that when an amendment like Mr. Stewart's is removed from the Order Paper by the operation of Standing Order 28, the question itself does not lapse, but the procedure thereon is suspended over Thursday and Friday and a motion to resume (I say advisedly resume and not revive) may be made after notice, but this resumption must take place the first time that the Ministry moves the House into Supply, and by neglecting to do so on that occasion, the mover waives his right to bring up his amendment at a later date.

In giving a decision which will settle our parliamentary jurisprudence for the future, I must not lose sight of the principle that the right of the Commons to challenge the administration of public affairs should be fully preserved.

"This House," as Lord Palmerston said, "is the mouthpiece of the nation, the organ by which all opinions, all complaints, all notions of grievances, all hopes and expectations, all wishes and suggestions which may arise among the people at large, may be brought to an expression, may be discussed, examined, answered, rejected or redressed."

In the present case Mr. Stewart (Leeds) should have moved after due notice that the debate be resumed on his amendment as soon as the government made the motion that I leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself into Committee of Supply.

Last year, debate could have been resumed automatically and without a special motion on Dr. Tolmie's amendment which had been interrupted at eleven o'clock by the operation of standing order 7.

Two different situations arise in the premises because the application of Standing Order 28 depends upon the interpretation of Standing Orders 7 and 27.

It being after eleven o'clock, p.m., Mr. Speaker adjourned the House without question put, pursuant to Standing Order 7, it being then nine minutes past eleven o'clock, p.m., until to-morrow, at three o'clock, p.m.

The Clerk of the House also laid upon the Table the Fifty-fourth Report of the Clerk of Petitions, stating that he had examined the following petition presented on the 29th instant, and finds that the time for receiving petitions for Private Bills having expired, it should not be received:—

Of Lewis Coit Dargavel, of Brockville, Ontario; praying for the passing of an Act to declare his marriage with Grace Ethel Dargavel (née Harte), of Fulton, New York, United States of America, or Flint, Michigan, United States of America, to be dissolved, and that he be divorced from her.—*Mr. Casselman*.

Mr. Morin (St. Hyacinthe-Rouville), from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Fifth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee, as ordered by the House on the 23rd of April, 1929, have considered the Forty-fourth Report of the Clerk of Petitions together with the petition of Llewlyn John Chubb, praying for the passing of an Act to grant a divorce, and to dissolve the marriage of the petitioner.

The evidence adduced before your Committee indicated that said petitions had been received at the Senate within expiry of the time for receiving petitions under Senate Rules. On the same day, namely, the 12th of April, the Private Bills Branch of this House filed the application of the petitioner which was after expiry of the time for receiving petitions under our Standing Orders. Other facts were elicited, however, indicating that the petitioner is a man of good behaviour in the community; is twenty-five years of age; and has been separated by no fault of his own for three or four years. He is earning a monthly salary considered to be below the average, and has no other income.

Your Committee have agreed to recommend and do recommend that the petition be received, and also that no penalty charge be imposed.

Your Committee, as ordered by the House on the 23rd of April, 1929, have also considered the Forty-fourth Report of the Clerk of Petitions together with the petitions of Vera Maud Gendron, and of Edith Spencley, severally praying for the passing of an Act to grant a divorce, and to dissolve the marriage of the petitioners.

The evidence adduced before your Committee in both of these cases indicated that the petitioners' solicitor was ill at the time he received the applications; also, that as soon as he was able to return to his office, he had proceeded expeditiously to have the said petitions filed at the Private Bills Branch with the least possible delay. This was effected on the 16th of April, which was several days after expiry of the time for receiving petitions. Considering that the late receiving of said petitions was occasioned by no fault of the said petitioners, your Committee have agreed to recommend and do recommend that the said petitions be received, and also that no penalty charge be imposed.

15. Whether the Canadian National Railways purchased coal from the West Virginia coal fields and elsewhere in the United States during the periods of idleness in the Rail and River Coal Mines. If so, what quantities, where purchased, and at what price per ton.

16. Whether the Canadian National Railways transferred their orders for coal from the Rail and River Coal Company at certain periods in the past four years when union labour was engaged by said company, to non-unionist fields in the United States. If so, when and for what quantities.

17. Cost per year in 1928, 1927, 1926 and 1925 to the Canadian National Railways to keep the Rail and River Coal Company operating. State particulars.

18. What the policy of the Canadian National Railways is with regard to its coal areas in the United States.

19. How much coal was used in 1928 on Canadian National lines owned in the United States, where said coal was mined, from whom said coal was purchased, what price per ton was paid for it.

20. Total amount of coal purchased in the United States for use on the Canadian National Railway lines in Canada and the United States during the year 1928.

21. Total quantity of coal used on all lines of the Canadian National Railways in 1928.

22. How much was used in Canada on the Canadian National Railway lines in 1928.

23. Where said coal was purchased, by provinces and States of the Union of the United States of America, and what price per ton was paid for same in every instance.

Mr. McIntosh, from the Select Standing Committee on Industrial and International Relations, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee has had under consideration a resolution adopted by the House on February 14th, 1929, as follows:—

That the Committee on Industrial and International Relations be authorized to investigate and report on insurance against unemployment, sickness and invalidity.

The following witnesses appeared before your Committee to give evidence on the subject matter of investigation:—

A. Grant Fleming, M.D., Professor of Public Health and Preventive Medicine, Montreal; J. G. Fitzgerald, Professor of Hygiene and Preventive Medicine, University of Toronto; Gerald H. Brown, Assistant Deputy Minister of Labour, Ottawa; R. A. Rigg, Director of Employment Service of Canada, Ottawa; Andrew D. Watson, Dominion Department of Insurance, Ottawa; W. Stewart Edwards, Deputy Minister of Justice, Ottawa; Robert H. Coats, Dominion Statistician, Ottawa.

Dr. Grant Fleming and Dr. Fitzgerald gave evidence dealing specially with sickness insurance.

1. Your Committee would reaffirm the position taken in the final report adopted on June 6th of last session, namely:—

That your Committee accept and endorse the principle of unemployment insurance, based on compulsory contributions derived from the State, employer and employees.

2. Your Committee recognizes that, while it is highly desirable that such legislation should be uniform in all the provinces, and while social insurance has a federal aspect, nevertheless, according to the Department of Justice, under our constitution legislative jurisdiction in relation to the establishment of a compulsory system of unemployment insurance is vested exclusively in the provincial legislatures.

3. Your Committee finds that the provinces, on being consulted by the Department of Labour with regard to their attitude towards the establishment of a general scheme, do not appear to be prepared to take immediate action.

4. Under these circumstances, your Committee submits the following recommendations:—

(a) That with regard to sickness insurance, the Department of Pensions and National Health be requested to initiate a comprehensive survey of the field of public health, with special reference to a national health program. In this, it is believed that it would be possible to secure the co-operation of the provincial and municipal health departments, as well as the organized medical profession.

(b) That in the forthcoming census, provision should be made for the securing of the fullest possible data regarding the extent of unemployment and sickness, and that this should be compiled and published at as early a date as possible.

(c) That the Federal Government be requested to bring the subject matter of this reference before the next Federal-Provincial conference; and your Committee suggests, when the agenda for such a conference is being arranged that the provincial governments be invited to send representatives of the Employer and Employee to discuss the subject matter of this report.

Your Committee further recommends that 750 copies in English and 200 copies in French of this report, and the evidence upon which it is based, be printed in blue book form, and that Standing Order No. 64 be suspended in relation thereto.

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Resolution to be reported.

Report to be received and Committee of Supply to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

The Bill No. 4, An Act to amend and consolidate the Opium and Narcotic Drug Act, was considered in Committee of the Whole, and progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to consider it again at the next sitting of the House.

The Order being read for the House in Committee of the Whole on Bill No. 167, An Act to amend An Act respecting the Construction of a Canadian National Railway Line between Pilkington and Niagara Junction, in the province of Ontario;

On motion of Mr. Dunning, the said Order was discharged and the Bill withdrawn.

And it being eleven o'clock, p.m.;

By leave of the House,—

Mr. Speaker gave his ruling on the Point of Order raised in respect to Standing Order 37, as follows:—

On Wednesday, the 8th of May, Mr. Robb, on the Orders of the Day being called, moved:—

“That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself into Committee of Ways and Means.”

Thereupon Mr. Woodsworth rose from his seat and said: “Before you leave the Chair, Mr. Speaker, I wish to bring before the House a matter that affects a considerable section of this country.”

He then recited his grievances having reference to freedom of speech, freedom of the press and freedom of assembly.

Having spoken forty minutes, I told him his time was up. The hon. member claimed that he was entitled under Standing Order 37 to speak beyond forty minutes. He was supported in this contention by other hon. members.

I have been requested to consider more deeply the objection raised. Accordingly, I have gone very carefully into the study of Standing Order 37, adopted by this House two years ago. If one reads carefully the new rule, it will be found that in order to limit the length of speeches which were unduly protracted, Parliament came to the conclusion that a forty-minutes rule should henceforward apply to the debates in the House.

Exceptions were, however, made to that rule and they are set forth in Standing Order 37, which reads as follows:—

STANDING ORDER 37

Speeches Limited to 40 Minutes

(22nd March, 1927)

No member, except the Prime Minister and the Leader of the Opposition, or a Minister moving a Government Order and the member speaking in reply immediately after such Minister, or a member making a motion of "No Confidence" in the Government and a Minister replying thereto, shall speak for more than forty minutes at a time in any debate.

271a. The following Resolution was adopted by the House on April 19, 1886:—

"That the growing practice, in the Canadian House of Commons, of delivering speeches of great length, having the character of carefully and elaborately prepared written essays, and indulging in voluminous and often irrelevant extracts, is destructive of legitimate and pertinent debate upon public questions, is a waste of valuable time, unreasonably lengthens the sessions of parliament, threatens by increased bulk and cost to lead to the abolition of the Official Report of the Debates, encourages a discursive and diffuse, rather than an incisive and concise style of public speaking, is a marked contrast to the practice in regard to debate that prevails in the British House of Commons, and tends to repel the public from a careful and intelligent consideration of the proceedings of Parliament."

It is argued that the Honourable Member, by addressing the House as he did on Wednesday, came under the exception "or a Minister moving a Government Order and the member speaking in reply immediately after such Minister."

My ruling hinges on the interpretation to be given to the words: "speaking in reply."

Was the Honourable Gentleman speaking "in reply" to the motion: "That I do now leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself into Committee of Ways and Means"?

He was, as a matter of fact, airing grievances which had no relevancy whatsoever with the subject matter, namely: resolutions to amend the Special War Revenue Act by the Minister of Finance in the Committee of Ways and Means.

It is a fundamental principle of parliamentary government that the redress of grievances is to be considered before the granting of supplies. (Vide Bourinot p. 419.) This principle applies with equal force when the motion is made for the Speaker to leave the Chair to go into Ways and Means. Members may

address the House on any subject of public importance or move amendments under the same rules as governed on going into Committee of Supply. (Vide Bourinot p. 423.)

Therefore the Honourable Member for Winnipeg North Centre had unquestionably the right to speak as he did, on the motion made by the Minister of Finance—but could he speak more than forty minutes? Did he come under the exception provided for under S.O. 37? In other words, was he speaking in reply immediately after the Minister?

I have since given the most serious consideration to the interpretation of this Standing Order and as I said the whole question hinges on the meaning of the words “in reply” as they appear therein. What is a reply? According to the King’s English Dictionary, it is:—

“That which is said or written in answer to what is said or written by another; rejoinder; response.”

Therefore, Mr. Woodsworth, in order to speak longer than forty minutes, was bound to argue against Mr. Robb’s motion.

His speech, in this as in any other instance, had to be relevant to the issue. Was it relevant?

He actually objected to the Speaker leaving the Chair until a certain grievance be aired before the House. He gave a reason for his objection, namely, that unless the House heard what he wished to ask the Government on the question of freedom of speech, the Ways and Means for collecting revenue could not be considered.

As I have said, under an ancient constitutional doctrine, the redress of grievances is considered before the granting of supplies or the consideration of Ways and Means; and Members may then discuss various questions without moving any amendment. As Bourinot says, 4th Edition, page 421, a great latitude is allowed on such occasions.

I have come to the conclusion that the expression of any reasonable grievance on the motion for the Speaker to leave the Chair is a sufficient reply to bring a Member’s speech under the provision of Standing Order 37. I cannot conceive a case where he could then be irrelevant. It is not necessary that his observations should deal with the subject matter of the resolutions to be considered in Committee. The Member objects to anything being considered at all until he has had a hearing. Of course, if an amendment or a second reading of a bill, were moved, discussion should be properly confined to its subject matter. But there was no amendment in Mr. Woodsworth’s case.

Standing Order 37 being a restrictive regulation as such it must be given the broadest construction possible. In cases of uncertainty the benefit of the doubt must be given to freedom of speech in Parliament.

I have considered the arguments from every angle and I have reached the conclusion that it is advisable to abide by the letter of this Standing Order. The ruling is that Mr. Woodsworth had the right to speak for more than forty minutes.

And it being after eleven o’clock, p.m., Mr. Speaker adjourned the House without question put, pursuant to Standing Order 7, it being then seven minutes past eleven o’clock, p.m., until Monday next, at three o’clock, p.m.

1. That Part III of the said Act be amended by repealing the following sections and subsections: Paragraphs (b) and (c) of subsection one, and sub-

section two, of section thirteen; section fourteen; section fifteen; section seventeen; section eighteen; and section nineteen, thereby repealing the tax on the net premiums received by every company licensed or registered or otherwise authorized to transact in Canada or any province thereof, the business of insurance.

2. That Part IV of the said Act, which imposes a tax on cable and telegraphic messages, be repealed.

3. That Part V of the said Act, which imposes a tax on railway and other tickets, be repealed.

4. That Part VII of the said Act be amended by striking out section fifty-eight and substituting therefor the following:—

58. No person shall sell or transfer the stock or shares of any association, company or corporation, or any bond other than a bond of the Dominion of Canada or of any province of Canada by

(a) agreement for sale;

(b) entry on the books of the association, company or corporation;

(c) delivery of share certificates or share warrants or bond endorsed in blank or payable to bearer; or

(d) any other method whatsoever;

unless in respect of such sale or transfer there is affixed to or impressed upon the document evidencing the ownership of such stock or shares or bond, or a document showing the transfer or agreement for the transfer thereof, an adhesive stamp or a stamp impressed thereon by means of a die of the value of

(a) three cents for every one hundred dollars or fraction thereof of the par value of the bond sold or transferred;

(b) four cents for every share of stock sold or transferred at a price over one hundred dollars per share;

(c) three cents for every share of stock sold or transferred at a price over twenty dollars per share, but not more than one hundred dollars per share;

(d) two cents for every share of stock sold or transferred at a price over three dollars per share, but not more than twenty dollars per share;

(e) one cent for every share of stock sold or transferred at a price over one dollar per share, but not more than three dollars per share;

(f) one-fourth of one cent for every share of stock sold or transferred at a price over fifty cents per share, but not more than one dollar per share;

(g) one-tenth of one cent for every share of stock sold or transferred at a price of fifty cents or less per share.

5. That section eighty-six of the said Act be amended by providing that the rate of the consumption or sales tax be reduced to two per cent.

6. That any enactment founded on paragraph one of this resolution shall be deemed to have come into force on the first day of March, 1929.

7. That any enactment founded on paragraphs two or three of this resolution shall be deemed to have come into force on the first day of May, 1929, and that any enactment founded on paragraph four of this resolution shall come into force on the first day of July, 1929.

8. That any enactment founded on paragraph five of this resolution shall be deemed to have come into force on the second day of March, 1929, and to have applied to all goods imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption on and after that day, and to have applied to goods previously imported for which no entry for consumption was made before that date.

Also a copy of all letters, reports or other documents or memoranda leading up to the said investigation, or during the course thereof; and also a copy of all letters, reports, documents or memoranda subsequent to the said investigation, including all correspondence passing between the Minister of Justice and the said Cooper.

The Order being read for the second reading of the Resolutions adopted in Committee of Ways and Means on May 13th, instant, to amend the Special War Revenue Act;

Mr. Robb moved,—That the said Resolutions be now read the second time and concurred in.

Mr. Bennett, seconded by Mr. Lawson, moved in amendment thereto: That all the words after the word "That" in the motion be struck out and the following added thereto "the said Resolutions be resubmitted to the Committee of Ways and Means with instructions to amend the same by striking out section 4 thereof."

Two petitions were laid on the Table.

Mr. Parent, from the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, presented the Tenth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have also considered the Fifty-fourth, Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth Reports of the Clerk of Petitions, together with the petitions,

Your Committee have considered Bill No. 254, An Act respecting the construction by the Canadian National Railway Company of certain terminal facilities with grade separation and other works at and in the vicinity of the City of Montreal, and have agreed to report the Bill with amendments.

Your Committee have had under consideration the Forty-fourth and Sixty-eighth Reports of the Clerk of Petitions, together with the petitions, respectively, of Gladys May Carter, Nellie Farrell, Cecilia Leta Rice, and Henry Feldman, severally praying for the passing of an Act to grant a divorce, and to dissolve the marriage of the petitioner.

After having considered the evidence given in each of the said cases, your Committee have agreed to recommend, and do recommend, that the said petitions be received; and also that, in respect to the petitions of Gladys May Carter, Nellie Farrell, and Henry Feldman, the penalty charge be not imposed; and also that in respect to the petition of Cecilia Leta Rice, the penalty charge be imposed.

On motion of Mr. Bouchard, for Mr. Marzil, The Joint Select Standing Committee on the Printing of Parliament was given leave to sit while the House is in session.

Mr. Rinfret, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 6th May, 1929, for a Return showing what the total number of enlistments was during the Great War of 1914-1918: (a) voluntary; (b) compulsory, in each of the provinces of Canada.

Also,—Return to an Order of the House of the 15th May, 1929, for a copy of all correspondence, telegrams, petitions and other communications between the Postmaster General, the Post Office Department, the Postal Superintendent's Office at Saint John, New Brunswick, and any person or persons, with reference to the proposed appointment of a Postmaster at Cocagne, in the County of Kent, Province of New Brunswick.

He also laid before the House, by command of His Excellency the Governor General,—Twentieth Annual Report of the Civil Service Commission of Canada, for the year 1928.

By leave of the House, on motion of Mr. Duff, the Select Standing Committee on Marine and Fisheries was given leave to sit while the House is in session.

Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Howard, moved,—That the recommendations contained in the Second Report of the Select Standing Committee on Industrial and International Relations presented to the House on Wednesday, May 1, be concurred in.

And a Debate arising thereon;

Mr. Heaps, seconded by Mr. Neill, moved in amendment thereto: That the said Report of the Select Standing Committee on Industrial and International Relations be not now concurred in but that it be referred back to the Select Standing Committee on Industrial and International Relations with instructions that they have power to amend the same by adding thereto a clause recommending that all the Provinces of the Dominion be requested to pass legislation under which the jurisdiction in relation to legislation providing for unemployment, sickness and invalidity insurance based on compulsory contribution and which is now claimed to be within or subject to the exclusive jurisdiction of the Provinces be vested in the Dominion Government.

After further Debate thereon, the question being put on the main motion; it was agreed to, on division.

The following Bill from the Senate was read the first time, on division, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House, viz:—

Bill No. 301 (Letter T7 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act for the relief of Bertha Jane Phelan."—*Mr. McQuarrie*.

The following Order of the House was issued to the proper officer under subsection 4 of Standing Order 44:—

By Sir George Perley:—Order of the House for a Return showing:—

1. When orders are issued by the House for the original files, or copies of the same, regarding appointments under the Civil Service Commission, as has been the case in several instances lately in connection with the Post Office Department; whether all the papers on the files of the Civil Service Commission are brought down, including the reports or recommendations of the senior officials, any observations or opinions of the Commissioners, and generally, everything on the files that appertains to the appointment in question.

2. If not: (a) what is the practice, by whom and on what basis is the selection made of the papers that are brought down; (b) why is not everything brought down in accordance with the Order of the House.

By leave of the House, Mr. Power, from the Special Committee appointed to study the Dominion Elections Act, 1920, and the amendments thereto and the Corrupt Practices Enquiries Act, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

The amendments contained in the attached draft bill are unanimously recommended for immediate adoption. They are amendments which cannot come into force without preparations which will necessarily cover a very considerable period (not less than six months) and, in order to allow these preparations to be adequately made during the present Parliament, it is essential that the amendments be made at the present session.

Other amendments of a less urgent character are still under the consideration of the Committee which, however, has already held protracted sittings and has fully studied the situation. The amendments remaining for consideration are rather on points of detail and will be dealt with in the Committee's final report.

The attached draft bill contains only amendments designed (1) to transfer the appointment and the responsibility for the conduct of returning officers from the government of the day to the Chief Electoral Officer and (2) to substitute for the present system of preparing lists a system which will avoid the grave objections which the present system presents. In order to attain these objects a number of ancillary amendments have been necessary, but the amendments proposed have been confined to those sections of the Act which it seemed advisable to amend in order that the two objects specified should be successfully attained.

The gravest and the fundamental objection to the present system of preparing lists is that practically invariably in urban areas and not infrequently in rural areas, the procedure laid down results in the preparation of lists containing not only many inaccuracies in the particulars given of voters whose names appear thereon, but including the names of an unduly large and often enormous number of persons who are not qualified to vote in the polling division to which the list relates, or indeed, in the electoral district of which the polling division forms a part. These inaccuracies are due chiefly to the provision by which in urban areas names appearing on the existing provincial voters' lists are transferred automatically to the Dominion lists. The value and accuracy of provincial lists varies from province to province, and within

any province from time to time, but speaking generally there is such a considerable interval between the date of their preparation and the date of the Dominion election, that by the time they are used for such an election deaths and removals have very seriously reduced the value they had when prepared, even if at that time they constituted an accurate representation of the situation as it then existed. Unless lists have a very high degree of accuracy, they have little value, and any adequate attempt to make corrections under the present procedure involves candidates in an unnecessary and often very large expense. The Committee proposes to abandon resort to provincial lists and to substitute in urban areas a preliminary enumeration, the remaining steps in the procedure remaining much as they now are.

The proposed amendment with regard to the appointment of returning officers is calculated to remove, and will in the Committee's opinion have the effect of removing almost all the administrative difficulties which now arise in the course of an election. It appears that these difficulties are almost exclusively due to the fact that many returning officers who quite correctly regard themselves as owing a duty to the public and not to the political party which appointed them, are suspected by supporters of opposite parties to be guided rather by party than public interests. In the Committee's opinion to impose the duty of selecting returning officers on the Chief Electoral Officer will prevent any misconception on the part of returning officers as to the nature of their duties, will eliminate any reason or excuse for anyone suspecting an impartial returning officer of acting from improper motives, and will make the returning officers entirely independent.

The Committee therefore recommends that there be passed at the present session of Parliament an Act to amend the Dominion Elections Act, as follows:—

BILL No.

An Act to Amend the Dominion Elections Act

His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. *The Dominion Elections Act* is amended by repealing clause (l) of section two thereof and substituting the following:—

(l) "judicial district" means a territory, county or judicial district in respect of which a judge has been appointed to exercise judicial functions.

(11) "the judge" when used to define the judicial officer upon whom is conferred specific powers means

(i) in relation to any place within the judicial districts of Quebec or Montreal in the Province of Quebec, the judge from time to time performing the duties of Chief Justice of the Superior Court, or the Acting Chief Justice, as the case may be, or such other judge appointed by the Governor in Council as may be assigned by the said Chief Justice or Acting Chief Justice to perform the duties in this Act required to be performed by the judge.

(ii) in relation to any other place in the Province of Quebec, the judge indicated by the Chief Justice or Acting Chief Justice as being the judge exercising from time to time the jurisdiction of the Superior Court Judge of the judicial district within which such places lies, and if there is more than one judge exercising such jurisdiction, the senior of them.

(iii) in relation to any place in the Yukon Territory, the judge exercising from time to time the jurisdiction of the judge of the Territorial Court of the said Territory, and

(iv) in relation to any other place in Canada, the judge exercising from time to time the jurisdiction of the judge of the county court of the county, or the judge of the district court of the district, as the case may be, within which such place lies, and if there is more than one such judge, the senior of them.

2. The said Act is amended by repealing clause (o) of section two thereof and substituting the following:—

(o) "Nomination day" or "the day for nominations" means the day upon which nominations close as in this Act provided.

3. The said Act is amended by repealing clauses (y) and (z) of section two thereof and substituting the following:—

(y) "urban polling division" means a polling division which is wholly contained within a place having a population of more than *ten* thousand persons and being, under the provincial law, a city, town or incorporated village, or within any other area directed by the Chief Electoral Officer to be treated as urban;

(z) "rural polling division" means a polling division whereof no part is contained either within a place having a population of more than *ten* thousand persons and being under the provincial law a city, town or incorporated village; or *whereof no part is contained within any other area directed by the Chief Electoral Officer to be treated as urban.*

4. The said Act is amended by repealing subsection one of section fourteen thereof and substituting the following:—

14. The afternoon of polling day shall be a general public holiday in Canada.

5. The said Act is amended by repealing Clause (a) of subsection two of section eighteen thereof and substituting the following:—

(a) issue to election officers from time to time such instructions as he deems necessary in order to ensure the effective carrying out of the provisions of this Act.

6. The said Act is amended by inserting the following subsections in section eighteen thereof as subsections two A, two B and two C:—

(2A) When it is made to appear to the Chief Electoral Officer that any election officer has been guilty of any offence against this Act, it shall be his duty to make such inquiry as appears to be called for in the circumstances, and if it appears to him that proceedings for the punishment of the offence have been properly taken or should be taken and that his intervention would be in the public interest, to assist in carrying on such proceedings or to cause them to be taken and carried on and to incur such expense as it may be necessary to incur for such purposes.

(2B) The Chief Electoral Officer shall have the like powers in the case of any offence which it is made to appear to him to have been committed by any person under section five, section forty-three, section fifty-one, subsections two and six of section sixty-six, subsection ten of section sixty-seven or subsection seven of section sixty-nine of the said Act.

(2C) For the purpose of any inquiry under the provisions of this section, the Chief Electoral Officer or any person nominated by him for the purpose of conducting any such inquiry, shall have the powers of a

commissioner under Part II of the *Public Inquiries Act*, and any expense required to be incurred for the purpose of any inquiry under this section and of any proceedings assisted or caused to be taken by the Chief Electoral Officer by virtue thereof shall be payable by the Auditor General on the certificate of the Chief Electoral Officer out of moneys appropriated by Parliament and available for such purpose.

7. The said Act is amended by repealing section twenty-one thereof and substituting the following:

21. It shall be the duty of the Chief Electoral Officer to appoint a returning officer for every electoral district and thereafter to appoint from time to time a new returning officer for any electoral district:—

(a) in any case in which a vacancy occurs in the office of returning officer for such electoral district; or

(b) in any case in which the returning officer for such electoral district notifies the Chief Electoral Officer that he desires to resign his office, and, in the opinion of the Chief Electoral Officer, it is not contrary to the public interest to permit such returning officer to resign; or

(c) in any case in which, without having received any such notification, the Chief Electoral Officer is of opinion that the returning officer for such electoral district has failed competently to discharge the duties of his office or is incapable of discharging the same satisfactorily by reason of illness or otherwise.

(2) Any appointment made by the Chief Electoral Officer may be made by reference to the title of office of the appointee, and any person appointed to be returning officer for any electoral district by his title of office, and the successor from time to time of any such person in such office, shall be returning officer in the electoral district for which the appointment is made.

(3) A list of the returning officers for every electoral district in Canada shall be published in the *Canada Gazette* between the first and twentieth days of January in each year.

8. The said Act is amended by repealing section twenty-three thereof and substituting the following:

23. Subject as aforesaid, every election clerk shall hold office during the pleasure of the returning officer by whom he has been selected and, after the death of such returning officer or the expiry of his term of office, *until his successor has appointed a new election clerk.*

9. The said Act is amended by inserting the following section as section twenty-three A:

23A. It shall be the duty of the returning officer and of the election clerk forthwith to notify the Chief Electoral Officer if the returning officer at any time becomes unable to act by reason of illness, absence from the electoral district or otherwise, and it shall be the duty of the election clerk forthwith to notify the Chief Electoral Officer of the death of the returning officer.

10. The said Act is amended by inserting the following section as section twenty-four A:—

24A. If the returning officer dies or becomes unable to act, the election clerk shall, until the appointment of a new returning officer or until the returning officer again becomes able to act, be responsible for the administration of the election as if he himself had been appointed to

be returning officer for the electoral district, and subject as aforesaid, a writ of election may, in any case in which the returning officer has died or become unable to act before the issue of such writ and before his successor has been appointed, be addressed either to the returning officer or to the election clerk.

- (2) Every election clerk, who is required to act as returning officer at an election in the place of the returning officer by whom he was appointed, shall himself in his turn appoint an election clerk.
- (3) Every election clerk shall, as such, have authority to issue, on behalf and in the name of the returning officer, any transfer certificate or advance poll certificate which the latter has power to issue under the provisions of this Act.

11. The said Act is amended by inserting the following section therein as section 24B:—

24B. Each returning officer shall forthwith upon the receipt of notice that a writ has been issued for an election in his electoral district, open, and shall throughout the election maintain an office in some convenient place in the electoral district where the electors can have recourse to him, and shall give public notice of the location of such office in such manner as the Chief Electoral Officer may direct.

12. The said Act is amended by repealing section twenty-seven thereof and substituting the following:—

27. Every election officer who omits to comply with the provision of this Act shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of not less than fifty dollars or more than two hundred dollars, and every election officer who refuses to comply with any of the provisions thereof, shall on summary conviction, be liable to a penalty of not less than two hundred dollars or more than five hundred dollars, unless, in either case, such election officer establishes that, in so omitting or refusing compliance, he was acting in good faith, that his omission or refusal was reasonable, and that he had no intention to affect the result of the election or to permit any person to vote whom he did not *bona fide* believe was qualified to vote, or to prevent any person from voting whom he did not *bona fide* believe was not qualified to vote.

- (2) It shall be deemed to be a non-compliance with the provisions of this Act to do or omit to do any act which results in the reception of a vote which should not have been cast, or in the non-reception of a vote which should have been so.
- (3) The person instituting any proceeding leading to the conviction of any election officer under this section shall be entitled to receive one-half of the penalty recovered, and it shall be paid to him accordingly, unless such proceeding was instituted at the direction of the Chief Electoral Officer or unless the Chief Electoral Officer, at the request of the person by whom the proceeding was instituted has intervened in such proceeding and has met the whole or any part of the expense thereby incurred.

13. The said Act is amended by repealing section twenty-eight thereof and substituting the following:—

28. It shall be the duty of every returning officer forthwith after his appointment to divide his electoral district into polling divisions, each designed to contain as nearly as possible three hundred electors,

regard being had, however, to geographical and all other relevant consideration to the end that facilities may be provided for all the electors in each polling division to cast their votes at one or more polling stations established at a convenient place within the boundaries of the polling division.

- (2) Where, by reason of a practice locally established, or other special circumstance, it is more convenient to constitute a polling division including substantially more than three hundred electors and to divide the list of voters for such polling division alphabetically between adjacent polling stations, the returning officer may, with the approval of the Chief Electoral Officer and notwithstanding anything in the last preceding section, constitute a polling division including as nearly as possible some multiple of three hundred electors.
- (3) In any case in which a large polling division has been constituted as aforesaid, such division may, for the purpose of enumeration and registration under this Act, be counted as if it contained a number of polling divisions equal to the multiple of three hundred electors intended to be included therein.

14. The said Act is amended by repealing section twenty-nine and subsection one of thirty thereof, and substituting the following:—

29. Subject as hereinafter provided, every person, male or female, shall be qualified to vote and entitled to be included in the list of voters for the polling division in which he or she resides at the time of the preparation of the list of voters therefor, if he or she
- (a) is of the full age of twenty-one years, and
 - (b) is a British subject by birth or naturalization, and
 - (c) has been ordinarily resident in Canada for at least twelve months, and
 - (d) was ordinarily resident in the electoral district at the date of the issue of the writ of election and, at a by-election, has continued to be ordinarily resident therein until polling day, and unless he or she
 - (e) is the Chief Electoral Officer or the Assistant Chief Electoral Officer,
 - (f) is a judge appointed by the Governor in Council,
 - (g) is an Indian ordinarily resident on an Indian reservation who did not serve with the naval, military or air forces of Canada in the war 1914-1918,
 - (h) is a prisoner undergoing punishment for an offence,
 - (i) is restrained of his liberty of movement or deprived of the management of his property by reason of mental disease,
 - (j) is disqualified by reason of his race from voting for a member of the Legislative Assembly of the Province in which he resides, and did not serve in the naval, military or air forces of Canada in the war 1914-1918,
 - (k) is disqualified from voting by reason of his employment for pay or reward in connection with the election or under any law relating to the disqualification of voters for corrupt or illegal practices.

29A. The following rules shall apply to the interpretation of the words "resident" and "resided" in any section of the Act in which the said words or either of them are used with respect to the right of a voter to vote:

- (1) Subject as provided in the succeeding clauses of this section, the question where a person is or was resident at any material time or during any material period shall be determined by a reference to all the facts of the case.
- (2) Any person on active service with the naval, military or air forces of Canada shall be deemed to continue to reside in the polling division in which he was resident at the time of enrolment for such active service, unless he has thereafter elected to establish some other residence in Canada.
- (3) For the purpose of a general election, every person shall be deemed to continue until polling day to reside in the electoral district in which he was resident at the date of the issue of the writs of election, and no actual change of residence during this intervening period shall deprive him of his right to vote in such electoral district or entitle him to vote in any other electoral district, unless he is one of the persons described in the next following subsection and exercises his rights thereunder, in which event he shall not be entitled to vote in the electoral district in which he was resident at the date of the issue of the writs of election.
- (4) Any of the following persons who, in the interval between the issue of the writ of election and polling day, changes his place of residence from one electoral district to another, shall nevertheless be entitled, if he so elects, to be included in the list of voters for the polling division in which he is resident at the time of his application to be so included, provided that,
 - (a) being a minister, priest or ecclesiastic of any religious faith or denomination, he is in charge of or permanently attached to an established place of worship or recognized mission of his church situate in the electoral district to which he has removed;
 - (b) being a teacher, he is employed, under a contract with the appropriate educational authority, in teaching at a school situate in the electoral district to which he has removed;
 - (c) being a pupil he is, and has for at least seven of the preceding twelve months, been registered as a pupil and has been in actual and regular attendance at an educational institution situate in the electoral district to which he has removed.
- (5) Except persons who, at the date of the issue of the writ of election, have no other quarters to which they might at will remove, no person shall be deemed to be resident at the said date in quarters or premises which, notwithstanding that they may be sometimes or ordinarily occupied during some or all the months of May to October inclusive ordinarily remain unoccupied during some or all the months of November to April inclusive.

15. The said Act is amended by repealing section thirty-two of the said Act and the schedules to the said section, and substituting the following:—

32. In each urban polling division a list of voters shall be prepared in accordance with the rules set forth in Schedule A to this section, and in each rural polling division a list of voters shall be prepared in accordance with the rules set forth in Schedule B thereto.

- (2) The Chief Electoral Officer shall have power to decide upon the best available evidence, for all the purposes of this Act, whether any place is a city, town or incorporated village and whether it has a population of over ten thousand persons.
- (3) Each returning officer shall keep a record of the names and addresses of the enumerators and registrars whom he appoints and of the polling division for which each is to act, and shall permit any person to inspect such record during business hours.
- (4) Every person who applies under this Act to be included in any list of voters in the name of some other person, whether such name be that of a person living or dead, or of a fictitious person, or who, having been once to his knowledge included in any list of voters under this Act as a voter entitled to vote at a pending election, applies to be included a second time in any other list of voters in the same electoral district as a voter entitled to vote at the same election, shall be guilty of the offence of personation, and liable to the penalties imposed in this Act upon persons guilty of that offence.
- (5) In addition to any other penalty for which he may be liable under this Act, any enumerator or registrar who wilfully and without reasonable excuse includes in any list of voters prepared by him the name of any person whose name he has not good reason to suppose should be included, or who omits to include in such list the name of any person whom he has good reason to believe has the right to have his name included, shall be guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction as in this Act provided, and shall be liable to a penalty of not less than one dollar or more than five dollars in respect of each name improperly included or omitted as aforesaid.

SCHEDULE A

Preparation of Lists of Voters in Urban Polling Divisions

ENUMERATION

Rule (1) Forthwith after receipt by him of notice from the Chief Electoral Officer that a writ of election has been issued for his electoral district, the returning officer shall appoint in writing a person to enumerate the voters in each polling division or part thereof, and shall require each of such persons to take an oath that he will act faithfully in the capacity of enumerator without partiality, fear, favour or affection and in every respect according to law.

Rule (2) Every enumerator shall forthwith after taking his oath as such, proceed to ascertain the names, addresses and occupations of every person qualified to vote in the polling division or part thereof for which he has been appointed, obtaining the information he requires by a house to house visitation, and from such other sources as may be available to him, and leaving at the residence of every voter who appears to be qualified a memorandum indicating that such voter will be included in the list to be prepared by him.

Rule (3) On a day to be fixed by the Chief Electoral Officer and notified by the returning officer to the enumerators, each of the latter shall from the information then secured by him, prepare and certify, in such form as the Chief Electoral Officer may direct, a complete list in exact alphabetical order of all the persons who are resident in the polling division or part thereof for which he has been appointed and are qualified to vote at the election, and shall also prepare and certify in like form at least three copies of such list.

Rule (4) In such list the enumerator shall, after the name of every female voter whose name appears therein, write the letter W in brackets thus (W), and the name of a married woman or widow shall be entered in such list in the alphabetical order determined by the first letter of the name of her husband or deceased husband, as the case may be.

Rule (5) Such list and the copies thereof, together with the original field or other notes upon which the same has been based, shall forthwith be delivered or transmitted by the enumerator to the returning officer, who shall thereupon deliver one copy of such list to the representative of each candidate or prospective candidate as hereinafter defined. The returning officer shall retain the original list in his office, where it shall be available for public inspection, and shall furnish one copy thereof to the registrars within whose registration district, as hereafter provided, the polling division lies.

REGISTRATION

Rule (6) The returning officer shall, as soon as convenient after receiving notice of the issue of a writ for an election in the electoral district, group together the polling divisions into registration districts each containing ten to twelve polling divisions or such other number as circumstances require or as the Chief Electoral Officer may direct, and shall prepare descriptions of the boundaries of such registration districts.

Rule (7) The returning officer shall, for each of the registration districts, appoint in writing in Form 5 in Schedule One of this Act, two persons to be registrars of voters for such district, and shall require each of such persons, before acting as registrars, to take the oath in Form 6 in the said schedule.

Rule (8) The returning officer shall also appoint in each registration district a convenient place properly furnished, lighted and heated, in which the registrars shall sit for the registration of voters.

Rule (9) The returning officer shall cause to be printed a notice describing the boundaries of each of the registration districts, giving the names of the registrars for each thereof, setting out the registration office at which such registrars will attend for the registration of voters, and stating the days and hours during which such offices will be open. A sufficient supply of copies of such notice shall be furnished by the returning officer to the registrars, who, at least three days before the commencement of the registration, shall cause six copies for each thousand of the population to be posted up in conspicuous places throughout the registration district, and, before nine o'clock on the morning of the day the registration commences, shall cause an additional five copies to be posted up outside of and near to the place where they sit for the registration of voters; they shall see that these latter copies are replaced as circumstances require in order that the specified number of copies may remain duly posted up throughout the whole period of registration.

Rule (10) Every registration office shall be open for the registration of voters from nine o'clock in the forenoon until nine o'clock in the afternoon on three week days to be fixed by the Chief Electoral Officer and notified to the returning officer, and both registrars shall remain continuously in attendance at such office while the same is open, except that each shall be entitled to be absent at different times for not more than three hours in any day and not more than one and a half hours on any one occasion. Subject to the instructions of the returning officer the registrars appointed to act at any registration office may arrange for the division of the work between them during the time they are both in attendance.

Rule (11) If at any time the number of applications for registration at any registration office is such that the registrars cannot promptly dispose of them, the returning officer may, with the approval of the Chief Electoral Officer, appoint an additional registrar or additional registrars for such office or may provide clerical assistance for the registrars acting thereat.

Rule (12) The registrars shall permit to be present in the place of registration two representatives of each recognized and opposed political interest in the electoral district, but no such representative shall, except with the permission of a registrar, have any right to take part or intervene in the proceedings.

Rule (13) Any person resident in any polling division included in the registration district, whose name has not been included or has been incorrectly included by the enumerator in the list of voters for such polling division, may apply at the registry office for the registration district to have his name included in the list, or to cause the entry in the list relating to him to be corrected.

Rule (14) Every person so applying shall sign a form of application in which all the information required by the said form shall be sufficiently filled in either by the applicant personally or by a registrar at the applicant's request, and before entering the name of any such person in the list of voters or before correcting such list, as the case may require, the registrar shall satisfy himself that the applicant understands the effect of the statements in the application, and that he is entitled to have his name included in the list or to have the list corrected pursuant to his request.

Rule (15) Wherever the language of the applicant is not understood by the registrar an interpreter may be sworn and may act; in the event of inability to secure an interpreter the application shall, for the time being, be refused.

Rule (16) If it appears to the registrar that the applicant understands the effect of the statements in the form of application and that the applicant's name should be included in the list, or that the amendment thereof which he requests should be made, he shall certify accordingly by signing the appropriate certificate on the stub of the application, which he shall forthwith detach and deliver to the applicant.

Rule (17) If, in the opinion of the registrar, the statements made by the applicant in his application do not show that the applicant is entitled to have his name included in the list, or to have the list amended as requested, he shall notify the applicant that his application is refused, stating the reasons for such refusal, which reasons he shall endorse on the application form. He shall also certify the fact of the refusal of such application by signing the appropriate certificate on the stub of the form of application, and shall detach and deliver such stub forthwith to the applicant.

Rule (18) If any person who claims to be entitled to have his name included in the list of voters or to have the entry relating to him therein corrected, is unable personally to attend the registration sittings by reason of sickness, disability, or necessary, temporary, unavoidable and *bona fide* absence from the municipality in which the registration area is included, then a relative of such person by blood or marriage or his employer may, if he has a sufficient knowledge of the facts, appear before the registrar and complete the form of application to have such person's name included in the list of voters, or to have the list corrected, as the case may be.

Rule (19) If the relative by blood or marriage or the employer so appearing substantiates (a) the cause for the non-appearance of the person immediately concerned to be as hereinbefore set forth, (b) the existence of a relationship

by blood or marriage or the relationship of employer and employee and (c) the facts relevant to the qualification, name, address or identity of the person immediately concerned so far as such facts are requisite to cause the name of such person to be included in the list, or to cause the list to be corrected, as the case may be, the registrar may act upon such application as if the person immediately concerned had appeared in person before him.

Rule (20) Any voter qualified to vote in any polling division in the district allotted to any registrar, and duly entered in the list of voters for such polling division, may make oath before such registrar alleging the death, disqualification, or real residence and appearance in another list, of any person on the list for any of such polling divisions, and the registrar, upon such oath being made before him, shall transmit by registered mail addressed to the person objected to, at the address, mentioned in the list of voters, if any, and also at such other address, if any, as may be mentioned in the oath aforesaid, a notice requiring the person objected to to appear in person or by representative before the revising officer on a day to be named in such notice, to establish his qualification as a voter, and the registrar shall transmit with each copy of such notice a copy of the oath of the voter making the objection. Such oath may be in the Form No. 18 and such notice in Form No. 19.

Rule (21) During his sittings each registrar shall copy, into an index book in Form 17 in Schedule one, the list of voters prepared by the enumerator for each polling division and shall from time to time add or correct in such index book the names, addresses and occupations of such qualified voters as are added by him to the list, or in respect of which any correction is made, and shall certify each amendment of the list so made by appending thereto his initials and a note of the date of the amendment.

Rule (22) The registrars, immediately after the conclusion of the sittings for registration, shall number consecutively all the names in such index book, which shall thereupon be certified on oath by the registrars concerned in its preparation.

Rule (23) Within forty-eight hours after the close of the sittings for registration, the registrars for each registration district shall prepare statements of the additions and corrections made by them in the enumerators' lists, and shall transmit to the returning officer the index book, the said statements, together with at least two copies of each of the latter which copies, forthwith upon their receipt by him, the returning officer shall distribute to the representatives of the candidates as hereinafter defined.

Rule (24) The returning officer shall keep in his office available for public inspection the original statements of additions and corrections furnished him by the registrars.

Rule (25) Every registrar shall, while sitting as such, be a conservator of the peace and have and possess the same powers as a justice of the peace in his province. He may appoint, if necessary, constables for the maintenance of order and for the arrest of and detention of persons who are guilty of the personation of others, or of attempting to personate others, or who impede or improperly interrupt his proceedings or create a disturbance.

Rule (26) The returning officer may at any time relieve any enumerator or registrar of his duties and appoint another to perform the same, and any enumerator or registrar so relieved shall forthwith upon receiving written notice from the returning officer of the appointment of a substitute for him, deliver

up to the returning officer or to such other person as the returning officer may appoint, all lists, notices and other papers in his possession as such enumerator or registrar; on default he shall be guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction as in this Act provided.

Rule (27) For every urban polling division the judge as in section two of this Act defined shall be *ex officio* revising officer, and in the event of there being or arising a vacancy in the office of revising officer, another judge for the same district, if any, shall thereupon become or be named *ex officio* revising officer, and if there is none or none is named, the Governor in Council may nominate a person to be *ex officio* revising officer pending the appointment or nomination of a new judge.

REVISION

Rule (28) The returning officer shall, as soon as he conveniently may after the receipt by him of notice of the issue of a writ for an election in his electoral district, communicate with the *ex officio* revising officer and ascertain from him whether he will himself revise the lists of voters for any, and if any, what polling divisions, and such revising officer shall thereupon notify the returning officer of the polling divisions for which he will himself revise the lists, and of the names of such other persons, if any, as are or will be appointed by him to revise the lists for any other polling divisions, indicating the polling divisions for which such other persons, if any, will act.

Rule (29) Forthwith on receipt of such notification, the returning officer shall with the concurrence of the *ex officio* revising officer and for other revising officers appointed by the *ex officio* revising officer, and not later than the fortieth day before polling day, cause to be printed and posted in adequate numbers throughout the areas affected, a notice of the sittings for revision in such form as may be prescribed by the Chief Electoral Officer.

Rule (30) The returning officer shall furnish to the revising officer for each polling division the index book prepared by the registrar or registrars thereof.

Rule (31) Every revising officer shall, unless he be a judge, be sworn to the faithful and impartial performance of his duties.

Rule (32) Every revising officer shall, for the purpose of the performance of his duties, have the same powers as would be exercisable by the *ex officio* revising officer when sitting in Court, and, subject as in this Act provided and to such instructions as may be given by the Chief Electoral Officer, shall regulate the procedure in all matters coming before him in such manner as he shall see fit.

Rule (33) The sittings of the revising officers for the revision of the lists shall commence at ten o'clock in the morning of the thirty-fifth day before polling day, and shall continue during such hours as may be necessary on that and the two following days, provided that if any of the said days is a holiday, the day for the commencement or continuation of the sittings shall be postponed one day accordingly.

Rule (34) At the sittings for revision, the revising officer shall have jurisdiction to dispose and shall dispose—

- (a) of applications made by persons who might have applied to registrars to have their names included in the lists, or to have the lists corrected, and
- (b) of applications by relatives or employers which might have been made to the registrars by them or the persons immediately concerned, and

- (c) of objections on oath made before a registrar under Rule (19), of which the registrar has given notice as in the said rule provided, and
- (d) of objections to the inclusion of any names in the list of voters of which at least two days' notice has been given in writing sent by mail, registered and prepaid, addressed to the person whose name is objected to at the address given for such person in the list of voters.

Rule (35) In the case of any objection made on oath before a registrar under Rule (19), of which notice has been properly given by the registrar under the said rule, the onus of establishing his right to have his name included in the list of voters shall be upon the person objected to, and if such person does not, during the sittings on the day for which notice of the hearing of such objection has been given, appear before the revising officer personally or by representative, or, being present or represented, fails to satisfy the revising officer of his right to have his name retained on the list, the revising officer shall strike his name therefrom, whether or not the voter by whom the objection was made has appeared before him.

Rule (36) In the case of any objection to the inclusion of a name in the list of voters of which notice has been given by the objecting person otherwise than through a registrar, the onus of establishing the validity of such objection shall rest upon the objecting person, and shall be discharged either by proper evidence that the name of the person objected to should not be included in the list of voters or by the production of a post office certificate of the registration of the package containing the notice of objection, and of the package itself having upon it a record by the post office indicating that the same could not be delivered.

Rule (37) During the sittings for the revision of the lists each revising officer shall correct, and forthwith after their conclusion shall certify, the index book containing the list for such polling division as finally revised by him, and shall prepare or cause to be prepared a statement of the changes and additions made by him in each list in the course of the revision. He shall thereupon, not later than the twenty-ninth day before polling day, transmit to the returning officer the index book as finally corrected by him and the statement of changes and additions which shall be duly certified by him.

Rule (38) The returning officer shall forthwith cause to be made a sufficient number of copies of the statements of changes and additions and shall forthwith distribute one copy of each of such statements to the representatives of the candidates as hereinafter defined.

PRINTING AND DISTRIBUTION OF LISTS

Rule (39) The returning officer shall also forthwith cause the lists as finally revised to be printed, and shall have the printing thereof completed not later than the eighteenth day before polling day. Each printed copy of each list shall have appended thereto a printed certificate by the returning officer that such print accurately sets out all the names, addresses and occupations of the persons referred to in the list as finally revised by the revising officer for the polling division to which the printed list relates. The returning officer shall furnish twenty printed copies of the list for each polling division to the representatives of each of the candidates as hereinafter defined.

Rule (40) The printed list as so certified by the returning officer shall be the official list for the polling division to which it relates, but if any material difference between its contents and the contents of the list as finally revised by the revising officer is discovered after the completion of the printing, the

returning officer shall furnish a certificate of such error to the deputy returning officer and to the representative of each of the candidates, and the printed list shall for all purposes be taken to have been amended in accordance with such certificate.

Rule (41) Any copies of lists, or of statements of changes or additions in any list, required by these rules to be distributed to candidates, shall be distributable as follows:—

- (a) To the representative of candidates who have been formally nominated as such at the pending election, if any, or
- (b) To the representative of the member of the House of Commons who last represented the electoral district therein, and
- (c) To the representatives of defeated candidates at the next preceding election in the electoral district.

Rule (42) Unless there are more than three candidates formally in nomination, and except in electoral districts from which more than one member is to be elected, the returning officer shall not in any case be required to provide for representatives of candidates more than three copies in all of any lists of voters or statements of changes and additions not required by this Act to be printed, and representatives of candidates formally in nomination shall be entitled to copies in preference to all other persons. If in any case there are competing claimants for the copies aforesaid, or if there is no person representing any recognized political interest possessing the qualifications entitling him to name a representative to receive a copy, the returning officer, subject to the instructions of the Chief Electoral Officer, may exercise his discretion as to the person or persons to whom the distribution should properly be made.

Rule (43) The returning officer shall forthwith after the lists have been printed transmit to the Chief Electoral Officer by registered mail fifteen copies of every list of voters printed by him.

SCHEDULE B

Preparation of Lists of Voters in Rural Polling Divisions

Rule (1) As soon as possible after he has been notified of the issue of the writ of election in his electoral district, the returning officer shall, by writing in Form No. 5, appoint a person to be registrar of voters for each rural polling division in the electoral district.

Rule (2) Every registrar shall be resident in the polling division for which he is appointed unless it is impossible promptly to secure the services of a resident person who is qualified to act.

Rule (3) Every registrar shall forthwith on his appointment take an oath as such in Form No. 6 and shall immediately thereafter post up in public places in the polling division at least six copies of a notice that he is about to prepare a list of qualified voters resident in the division, which said list will be revised by him and corrected by him at a stated place where he will be found between the hours of two and six o'clock in the afternoon of the Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in the fourth week before the week of the poll, or if any of the said days is a public holiday in the province and the returning officer so directs, then on such of the said days as are not public holidays and on Thursday of the said week.

Rule (4) Each registrar shall forthwith after posting the said notice proceed to prepare a list of all the persons resident in his polling division who are qualified as voters. Such list shall be prepared in an index book in Form No. 17

in which the names of the voters shall be grouped according to the initial letter of their respective surnames, the occupation and residence of each being fully stated.

Rule (5) After the name of every female voter whose name is included in the lists, the registrar shall write the letter W in brackets thus (W), and the name of a married woman or widow shall be entered in the index book in the alphabetical group determined by the first letter of the name of her husband or deceased husband, as the case may be.

Rule (6) The said lists shall be prepared by the registrar by personal inquiry in the polling division or from such other sources of information as may be available and as may be conveniently made use of.

Rule (7) As soon as possible after nine o'clock in the afternoon of the Saturday in the seventh week preceding the week of the poll, each registrar shall complete his list and on or before the Tuesday in the sixth week before the week of polling day shall prepare at least four plainly written copies of the list of voters as contained in the index book and shall append to each of such copies a certificate in Form No. 11.

Rule (8) Each registrar shall on the said Tuesday post up one such copy at the place within the polling division at which he will be found to correct the list between two and six o'clock in the afternoon of three days in the fourth week before the week of polling day as hereinbefore provided. He shall attach to such copy a copy of the notice published under Rule (4).

Rule (9) Each registrar shall also on or before Tuesday in the sixth week before polling day transmit or deliver to the returning officer at least two copies of the lists as contained in the index book for distribution to the representatives of candidates, and in addition one copy of the said list to be retained by the returning officer. To each of the said copies there shall be attached a copy of the notice given by the registrar under Rule (4).

Rule (10) At any time after the posting up of a copy of the voters' lists, and not later than six o'clock on the last of the days specified for the correction thereof in the notices posted by him, on being fully satisfied from representations made to him by any credible person under oath or otherwise that the list as prepared by him in the index book requires amendment as hereinafter mentioned, the registrar may

- (a) add to such list the name of any person who is qualified to vote at the election then pending and is resident within the polling division, but whose name has been omitted from the preliminary list, or
- (b) strike out such list by drawing erasing lines therethrough the name of any person who is not qualified as a voter or who is not resident in the polling division, or
- (c) correct any inaccurate statement as to the name, address or occupation of any person whose name properly appears in the said list.

Rule (11) Every correction made by the registrar as aforesaid in the list in the index book, by the addition, erasure or correction of any entry therein, shall be verified by there being appended to such correction the initials of the registrar and the date upon which the same was made.

Rule (12) In order that he may be readily found by any person who desires to make representations with regard to any entry in the list, the registrar shall attend at the place of which he has given notice as aforesaid between the hours of two and six o'clock in the afternoon of the three days in the fourth week before the week of the poll hereinbefore specified.

Rule (13) Immediately after six o'clock on the afternoon of the last of the said days, each registrar shall prepare at least three copies of a statement of the changes and additions made by him in the index book subsequent to the posting by him of the copies of the preliminary list, and shall, not later than the Saturday in the fourth week before the week of the poll, transmit or deliver to the returning officer the index book, one complete copy of the corrected list of voters as therein contained, and at least two copies of the statement of changes and additions for distribution by the returning officer to candidates.

Rule (14) Each registrar shall retain in his possession the copy of the preliminary list posted up by him and one copy of the statement of changes and additions therein, which said copies he shall permit to be inspected at any reasonable time by any voter who asks to be permitted to inspect the same.

Rule (15) The returning officer may at any time replace any registrar appointed by him by appointing another registrar to act in the place and stead of the person already appointed, and any registrar so replaced shall upon request by the subsequent appointee or to any other person authorized by the returning officer to receive the same, any index book or other papers and information which he has obtained for the purpose of the performance of his duties; on default he shall be guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction as in this Act provided.

Rule (16) The returning officer shall, forthwith upon the receipt by him from any registrar of copies of any preliminary lists of voters or of any statements of changes and additions made in any such preliminary list, furnish to the representative of each candidate, as hereinafter defined, one copy of such preliminary list or statement of changes and additions.

Rule (17) The distribution to the representatives of candidates of copies of lists and statements of changes and additions shall be governed by the provisions of Rules (40) and (41) of Schedule A to section thirty-two of this Act.

16. The said Act is amended by repealing subsections one to five inclusive of section forty thereof and substituting the following:

40. The Governor in Council shall fix the day upon which the poll shall be held at any election, and such day shall be named in the writ of election; at a general election the writs for all the electoral districts shall be dated on the same day.

(2) The day fixed for the poll shall at any election be a Monday, unless the Monday of the week in which it is desired to hold the poll

(a) is a holiday as defined by the *Interpretation Act*; or

(b) at a general election, is a day which is generally observed by the residents of any province as a day for religious exercises and is declared to be a holiday by the law of such province; or

(c) at a by-election, is a day so generally observed in and so declared by the law of the province within which the electoral district lies;

and in any such case the day fixed for the poll shall be Tuesday of the same week.

(3) The day for the close of nominations (in this Act referred to as nomination day) shall in the electoral districts specified in Schedule Three of this Act be the Monday of the second week next preceding the week of the poll, and in all other electoral districts shall be the Monday of the week preceding the week of the poll.

(4) If the Monday on which nomination day would otherwise fall is such a day that, if the poll had been directed to be held in that week, it would have been held on Tuesday, the day for the close of nominations shall be the Tuesday following the Monday upon which the nominations would otherwise have closed.

(5) Any ten or more electors of an electoral district for which an election is to be held may nominate a candidate, or as many candidates as are required to be elected for such electoral district, by signing a nomination paper in Form 22 stating therein *such particulars* of the name, residence and addition or description of each person proposed as sufficiently to identify such candidate, and by causing such nomination paper to be produced to the returning officer at any time between the date of the proclamation and the *close of nominations as hereinafter specified and by complying in all other respects with the provisions of this section.*

17. The said Act is amended by repealing subsections ten and eleven of section forty thereof and substituting the following:

(10) The returning officer shall not accept any deposit until after all the other steps necessary to complete the nomination of the candidate have been taken, and upon his accepting any deposit he shall give to the person by whom it is paid to him a receipt therefor which shall be conclusive evidence that the candidate has been duly and regularly nominated.

(11) The full amount of every deposit shall forthwith after its receipt be transmitted by the returning officer to the Auditor General.

(11A) At noon on nomination day the returning officer and the election clerk shall both attend at a court house, a city or town hall, or some other public or private building in the most central or most convenient place for the majority of the electors in the electoral district (of which place notice has been given by the returning officer in his proclamation as hereinbefore provided) and shall there remain until two o'clock in the afternoon of the same day for the purpose of receiving the nominations of such candidates as the electors desire to nominate and as have not already been nominated. After two o'clock on nomination day no further nominations shall be receivable or be received.

18. The said Act is amended by repealing subsections one to five inclusive of section fifty-three thereof and substituting the following:

53. Upon the production to the returning officer at any time after the close of nominations of a writing, signed by any candidate who has been duly nominated, whereby such candidate appoints a person whose name appears upon the list of voters for any polling division in the electoral district to act as his agent at a polling station established for some other polling division, the returning officer shall issue to such agent a transfer certificate in Form 30 in Schedule One to this Act.

(2) Any candidate whose name appears upon the list of voters for any polling division shall be entitled at his request to receive a like transfer certificate entitling him to vote in any specified polling division instead of that upon the list for which his name appears.

(3) The returning officer may also issue a like transfer certificate to any person whose name appears on the list of voters for any polling division and who has been appointed to act as deputy returning officer or poll clerk at any other polling station in the electoral district than that at which such person is entitled to vote.

(4) The registrar of any rural polling division may also at any time after the close of nominations issue a transfer certificate in Form 30 in Schedule One to this Act to any candidate, deputy returning officer, agent or poll clerk who

is on the list for the polling division for which such registrar has been appointed and who, being a candidate, requests the registrar so to do, or being a deputy returning officer, agent or poll clerk, satisfies the registrar by the production of his appointment in writing that he has been appointed to act as such deputy returning officer, agent or poll clerk at the polling station established for some other polling division at which he desires to vote.

(5) The returning officer or any registrar by whom any transfer certificate is issued (a) shall sign such certificate and mention thereon the date of its issue, (b) shall consecutively number every such certificate in the order of its issue, and (c) shall not issue any such certificate in blank.

(5A) No certificate issued to any election officer or agent for a candidate under this section shall entitle such election officer or agent to vote pursuant thereto unless, on polling day, he is actually engaged in the performance of the duty specified in the certificate at the polling station therein mentioned.

(5B) No returning officer or registrar shall issue certificates under this section purporting to entitle more than two agents for any one candidate to vote at any given polling station and no deputy returning officer shall permit more than two agents for any one candidate to vote at his polling station on certificates under this section.

19. The said Act is amended by repealing subsection one of section fifty-seven thereof and substituting the following:

57. Subject to his taking any oath authorized by this Act to be required of him, every person whose name appears on the list of voters for a polling division shall be entitled to vote at the appropriate polling station established for such polling division.

20. The said Act is amended by repealing subsections one and two of section sixty-four thereof and substituting the following:

64. Subject as herein provided, any person who is qualified to vote in the electoral district and is, on polling day, resident in a rural polling division may, notwithstanding that his name does not appear on the list of voters for such polling division, vote at the appropriate polling station established therefor if, so far as he is aware, his name does not appear on the list of voters prepared for any other polling division in the electoral district.

(2) Any such person as is in the last preceding subsection described shall be entitled to vote only

(a) upon his being vouched for by some other voter whose name appears on the list for such rural polling division and who is resident therein, personally attends with him at the polling station and takes an oath in Form No. 36 in Schedule One to this Act, and

(b) upon himself taking an oath in Form 35.

21. The said Act is amended by repealing subsections one and two of section one hundred and two and substituting the following therefor:

102. Subject as hereinafter provided, one or more advance polls shall be established in each of the places mentioned in Schedule Two of this Act for the purpose of receiving the votes of such persons as are hereinafter described and whose names appear in the list of voters for one of the polling divisions included in such place or any other place mentioned in Schedule Two and situate in the same electoral district.

(2) When a single advance polling station would conveniently serve the voters resident in two or more of the places mentioned in the said schedule which are situate in the same electoral district, it shall not be necessary to establish a separate polling station for each of such places.

(2A) When it is made to appear to the Chief Electoral Officer that, in an area adjoining a place mentioned in the said schedule and included in the same electoral district as such place, there reside a substantial number of electors who may be entitled to the privilege of voting at an advance poll, the Chief Electoral Officer may direct that such area shall, for the purpose of this section, be deemed and be treated as part of the place which is mentioned in the said schedule and which it adjoins.

(2B) The privilege of voting at an advance poll shall extend only to such persons as are employed by a railway company or on a vessel, or as commercial travellers and to any such person only if, by reason of the nature of his said employment and in the course thereof, he is obliged to be absent from time to time from his ordinary place of residence, and if he has reason to believe that he is likely to be unable to vote on polling day in the polling division on the list for which his name appears by reason of necessary absence on that day from his ordinary place of residence in pursuit of his employment.

22. The said Act is amended by repealing subsection eight of section one hundred and two thereof and substituting the following therefor:

(8) Advance polls shall be open and shall only be open between the hours of seven and ten o'clock in the afternoons of the Thursday and the Friday immediately preceding polling day and between the hours of two and ten o'clock in the afternoon of the Saturday immediately preceding polling day.

23. The said Act is amended by repealing subsections ten to fifteen inclusive of section one hundred and two and substituting the following:

(10) No person otherwise entitled to vote at an advance poll shall be permitted to do so unless

(a) being resident in an urban polling division, he produces to the deputy returning officer at the advance poll an advance poll certificate from the returning officer in Form No. 54 that he is a person to whom the privilege of voting at an advance poll extends, or being resident in a rural polling division, produces such a certificate from the registrar of such polling division, and

(b) signs in the presence of the deputy returning officer a statement of identification and declaration in Form No. 55.

(11) Such advance poll certificates shall be issued by the returning officer or the rural registrar, as the case may be, only on the personal application to him of the voter concerned and after satisfying himself that the applicant is a person to whom the privilege of voting at an advance poll extends.

(12) Every such advance poll certificate shall be numbered consecutively by the returning officer or by the registrar by whom the same is issued, as the case may be, and it shall be the duty of the returning officer or registrar, before the hour of the opening of the ordinary polls on polling day, to cause notice to be given of the issue of any advance poll certificate issued by him to the deputy returning officer at the ordinary polling station at which the person to whom such certificate has issued would in the ordinary course be entitled to vote. Such notice shall be effectively given by the delivery to the deputy returning officer

of a copy of the list of voters ordinarily entitled to vote at the polling station in question upon which, against the names of the persons to whom advance poll certificates have been issued, a note "Advance Poll Certificate" or "A.P.C." has been made, followed by the consecutive number of the certificate issued to such person and the initials of the returning officer or registrar.

(13) No person who has obtained an advance poll certificate shall be entitled to vote on polling day except upon his producing such certificate and delivering the same up to the deputy returning officer at the polling station established for the polling division on the list for which his name appears.

(14) Each registrar for a rural polling division who is authorized to issue advance poll certificates shall attend for the purpose of receiving applications for such certificates at such times and places as may be directed by the Chief Electoral Officer who may specify what public notice, if any, is to be given by such registrar as to the places where and the times at which he will attend as aforesaid.

24. The said Act is amended by repealing Form No. 35 in Schedule one and substituting the following therefor:—

FORM No. 35

OATH OF PERSON NOT ON LIST FOR A RURAL POLLING DIVISION

(At a general election)

2. You swear that you are a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, that you have been ordinarily resident in Canada during the last twelve months, that you were ordinarily resident in this electoral district on the day of _____, 19 _____ (*naming the date of the issue of the writs of election*), that you now reside in this polling division and that, so far as you are aware, you are not on the list of voters for any other polling division in this electoral district.

And you further swear that you are not within any of the classes of persons who lack qualification or are disqualified by reason of appointment to judicial office, employment for pay or reward in reference to the election, race, crime, mental incapacity or disfranchisement for corrupt or illegal practices and that you have not already voted at this election or been guilty of any corrupt or illegal practice in relation thereto. So help you God.

(At a by-election)

You swear that you are a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, that you have ordinarily resided in Canada during the last twelve months, that you were ordinarily resident in this electoral district on the day of _____ '19 _____ (*naming the date of the issue of the writs of election*), that you have since continued to be resident in this electoral district since the said date, that you now reside in this polling division, and that, so far as you are aware, you are not on the list of voters for any other polling division in this electoral district.

And you further swear that you are not within any of the classes of persons who lack qualification or are disqualified by reason of appointment to judicial office, employment for pay or reward in reference to the election, race, crime, mental incapacity or disfranchisement for corrupt or illegal practices, and that you have not already voted at this election or been guilty of any corrupt or illegal practice in relation thereto. So help you God.

25. The said Act is amended by repealing Form No. 36 in Schedule One and substituting the following therefor:

FORM No. 36

OATH OF PERSON VOUCHING

You swear that you are (*name as on list of voters*), whose occupation is (*occupation as on list of voters*), and whose address is (*address as on list of voters*), and that you now reside in this polling division;

That you knew (*naming the applicant and stating his address and occupation*) who has applied to have his name added to the voters' list for the said polling division.

That the said applicant now resides in this polling division.

That you verily believe that the said applicant is a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, that he has been ordinarily resident in Canada for the last twelve months, that he was ordinarily resident in this electoral district on the _____ day of _____, 19____ (*naming the date of the issue of the writ of election, and at a by-election add: and that he has continued to be so resident in this electoral district since the said date*).

26. The said Act is amended by cancelling Forms Nos. 54 and 55 and substituting the following therefor:

FORM No. 54

ADVANCE POLL CERTIFICATE (Sec. 102)

I hereby certify that (*insert full name, address and occupation of applicant voter*), whose signature appears above mine, has personally appeared before me and satisfied me.

(1) that he is now employed by the.....Railway Company (*or on the vessel known as the.....*), in the capacity of.....(*or by..... as a commercial traveller*) and

(2) that by reason of the nature of his said employment and in the course thereof he is obliged to be absent from time to time from his ordinary place of residence, and

27. The said Act is amended by adding to Schedule Three thereof the following electoral districts:

- Province of Ontario.
- Province of Quebec.
- Province of Nova Scotia.
- Province of New Brunswick.
- Province of Manitoba.
- Province of British Columbia.
- Province of Prince Edward Island.
- Province of Saskatchewan.
- Province of Alberta.

28. The Chief Electoral Officer is authorized to make, in such other of the forms in Schedule One of the said Act as are not hereinbefore mentioned, such amendments as may be necessary in order that the said forms shall comply with the provisions in this Act contained.

29. This Act shall not apply to the election of any member to the present Parliament.

On the Orders of the Day being called;

Mr. Neill, seconded by Mr. Sinclair (Queens, P.E.I.), moved,—That a certain article published in the Toronto Mail and Empire, of Tuesday, 21st May, instant, be read.

And the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

The said article was accordingly read by the Clerk Assistant, as follows:—

“UNITED STATES PARTNERSHIP IN CANADIAN TERRITORY

From T. H. Blacklock, Mail and Empire Staff Writer

“Ottawa, May 20. By the Pacific fisheries treaty negotiated by the King government with the United States and now before parliament for approval, it is proposed to give the United States equal control with Canada in the immense territory in British Columbia outlined in the map above.

“This treaty is to preserve the sockeye salmon industry, almost ruined by the United States, and would place the watershed of the Fraser river under the control of a joint international commission—three from the United States and three from Canada.

“This immense area, over which the King government proposed to give the United States equal control with Canada regarding lakes, rivers and improvements thereon, is about 100,000 square miles, equal in area to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island combined, and also equal in area to that part of Ontario between Ottawa on the east, Windsor on the west, Niagara

Falls on the south and Sudbury on the north. In the territory is included Canada's great Pacific port of Vancouver, which may be subjected to certain control by this international commission.

"The treaty is viewed with grave suspicion by British Columbia members, as giving the United States an economic partnership in half of that province. International joint commissions have been disastrous to Canada. The St. Lawrence power diversion was secured by a Canadian commissioner joining with the American members of the international joint commission. Fortunately that Canadian representative has been retired, but not before he did irretrievable harm. The international joint engineering board on the St. Lawrence development recommended the power plant on the international section be placed in the American territory. This was done by a member of the Canadian section joining with the American section.

"It is felt the proposed treaty in giving the United States equal authority in Canadian territory is creating a precedent that may strike a deadly blow at Canadian independence. It is argued if this is done in British Columbia, United States partnership and control may be extended to areas in every province."

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider a proposed Resolution to extend the time for receiving applications for insurance under the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act.

(In the Committee)

The following Resolution was adopted:—

Resolved,—That the time for receiving applications for insurance under the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act be extended for one year from the 31st August, 1929.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was reported, read the second time and concurred in. Mr. Robb then, by leave of the House, presented a Bill, No. 310, An Act to amend The Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act, which was read a first and a second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed.

The Order being read for the second reading of Bill No. 285, An Act to provide for the payment of Claims for Compensation for loss sustained by the civil population of Canada during the late War;

Mr. Rinfret moved,—That the said Bill be now read the second time.

And the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

The said Bill was accordingly read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time and passed.

The House resolved itself again into Committee of Supply, and progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

At eleven o'clock, p.m., Mr. Speaker adjourned the House without question put, pursuant to Standing Order 7, until Monday next, at eleven o'clock, a.m.

Mr. Speaker informed the House that the Clerk had laid on the Table the Thirty-sixth Report of the Examiner of Petitions for Private Bills, which was read as follows:—

Pursuant to Standing Order 99, Section 3, the Examiner of Petitions for Private Bills has the honour to present the following as his Thirty-sixth Report:—

Your Examiner has duly examined the following Private Bill from the Senate and finds that all the requirements of the 95th Standing Order have been complied with, viz:—

Bill No. 282 (Letter M5 of the Senate), An Act respecting The New Brunswick Railway Company, which received first reading on the 20th of May, and for which no petition has been received by this House.

Your Examiner, pursuant to Standing Order 32, has searched the Journals of the Honourable The Senate of Canada and has found that a petition from the said Railway Company, praying for the passing of an Act of the Legislature of New Brunswick respecting the sale of the property and assets of the Company, was presented thereto on the 12th of April, 1929, and read and reported on the 17th of April, and on the 1st of May, respectively.

Your Examiner further examined the said petition, and also examined the advertising notices thereto relating, and has found such to be consistent and regular in every respect with the Senate Rule as practised in such applications.

A certified copy of the said petition is hereto annexed.

To the Honourable the Senate of Canada in Parliament assembled:

The petition of the New Brunswick Railway Company, a body corporate under the jurisdiction of the Parliament of Canada having its head office in the city of Saint John in the province of New Brunswick,

HUMBLY SHEWETH:

That the New Brunswick Railway Company will apply to the Parliament of Canada at the present or next session thereof for an Act to adopt, ratify and confirm and re-enact in so far as the Parliament of Canada has jurisdic-

tion so to do, the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the Province of New Brunswick passed at the present session thereof respecting the sale of all the property and assets of the New Brunswick Railway Company other than those under lease to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company and for such further and other legislation by the Parliament of Canada as will be proper or necessary to supplement or carry out the purpose and intent of the above Act of the Legislature of the Province of New Brunswick.

Wherefore your petitioner humbly prays that your Honourable House may be pleased to pass an Act for the purposes above mentioned.

And as in duty bound your petitioner will ever pray.

On motion of Mr. Bennett, it was ordered,—That the Debate on Mr. McRae's Amendment to the motion for Mr. Speaker to leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself again into Committee of Supply be resumed whenever the said motion is made by a Member of the Government.

Of the Official Board of the Farnham Congregation, Quebec-Sherbrooke Presbytery of the United Church of Canada, Farnham, Quebec.—*Mr. Kay.*

Of the Executive of the Missionary Auxiliary of the Emmanuel United Church, Cowansville, Quebec.—*Mr. Kay.*

Of the Women's Missionary Society, Sutton, Quebec.—*Mr. Kay.*

A Message was received from the Senate informing this House that the Senate had passed the Bill No. 170, An Act respecting Juvenile Delinquents, with amendments, which are as follows:—

1. Page 7, line 10.—At the beginning of subsection (3) insert the following words "Save as provided in subsection five of this section,".

2. Page 7, line 32.—Immediately after subsection four insert the following as subsection five:—

"(5) If a child who has been before a juvenile court and is still under the surveillance of such court has been caused by the court to be placed in a foster home outside the jurisdiction of such court or has been committed by the court to the care or custody of a probation officer or other suitable person or to

an industrial school, outside of the jurisdiction of such court, the court may take any action with respect to such child that it could take were the child within the jurisdiction of such court, and for any such purpose any warrant or other process issued with respect to such child may be executed or served in any place in Canada outside of the jurisdiction of such court without the necessity of complying with the provisions of subsection (3) of this section."

3. Page 10, line 8.—For subsection three substitute the following:—

"(3) Where, under the provisions of this section or of section twenty, a sum of money is ordered to be paid, the court may adjudge, either by the order respecting the payment of such sum or by an order made subsequently, that the same shall be recoverable by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the party and in default of such distress by imprisonment, and the amount shall be so recoverable or shall be recoverable in the same manner as a fine imposed under any provision of the Criminal Code is recoverable, or shall be recoverable as provided in any Act of the legislature of the province making provision for the recovery of fines."

4. Page 14, line 17.—For clause thirty-six substitute the following:—

"36. (1) Every juvenile court shall have such and like powers and authority to preserve order in court during the sittings thereof and by the like ways and means as now by law are or may be exercised and used in like cases and for the like purposes by any court in Canada and by the judges thereof, during the sittings thereof,

(2) Every judge of a juvenile court, whenever any resistance is offered to the execution of any summons, warrant of execution or other process issued by him, may enforce the due execution of the same by the means provided by the law for enforcing the execution of the process of other courts in like cases."

"41. Subsection four of section twelve and subsections three and five of section seventeen, and section thirty-four shall be in force in all parts of Canada, whether this Act is otherwise in force or not."

Your Committee, to which was referred for consideration and for report to the House the estimates on the Canadian National Railways, the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, the Canadian National West Indies Services, and the Maritime Freight Rates Act requirements, held ten meetings in the course of which it examined sundry witnesses including:—

CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS

Your Committee has had under consideration Item 336 of the estimates, which provides for loans or guarantees of \$53,750,000 to the Canadian National Railway Company for the year ending December 31st, 1929, these estimates having now for the second time been prepared on the basis of the full calendar year. This coincides with the railway fiscal year and avoids overlapping and the tendency to confusion which existed when the annual report of the railway was on the basis of the calendar year and the estimates on the basis of the federal fiscal year.

Your Committee desires to point out that the annual statements this year are presented in a modified form, designed to meet suggestions by members of the Committee during its deliberations last year.

These modifications consist of the inclusion under one cover of the operating results on the Canadian National Railways exclusive of Eastern Lines, and of the Eastern Lines as defined under the Maritime Freight Rates Act, instead of the presentation of separate reports under separate covers as was done last year.

The annual report itself was divided into three sections as follows:—

1. That containing the result of operations of the Canadian National Railways exclusive of the Eastern Lines.

2. That containing the result of operations of the Eastern Lines as defined by the Maritime Freight Rates Act.

3. A summary showing the income account of the system as a whole including Eastern Lines.

Your Committee notes that the operating results for the year 1928 were much more favourable than those of the previous year, due to the larger crop and earlier harvest which permitted a large proportion of the 1928 crop to be moved during that year; the late harvest and inclement weather conditions in the fall of 1927, which threw a larger percentage of the 1927 crop movement into 1928; and to increase in freight tonnage generally, and increase in the average haul, and an improvement in operating conditions made effective during the year.

Your Committee called as a witness Mr. C. A. Matthews of the firm of George A. Touche and Company, Chartered Accountants, who, for some years, have been engaged in making a continuous audit of the accounts of the company in order to enable them to certify as to the correctness of the consolidated balance sheet and income accounts as presented in the annual report. From Mr. Matthews' evidence it appears that Messrs. George A. Touche and Company are entirely satisfied that the accounts as presented are in accordance with recognized practice in railway accounting, and that they reflect accurately the revenues received and expenditures made during the year, as well as additions to capital account.

Your Committee gave some consideration to the question of temporary financing. Officers of the Railway explained that this temporary financing was strictly in accordance with the provisions of the Appropriation Act, and had been undertaken because market conditions were not favourable to a bond issue. Such temporary financing had been arranged through the chartered banks of Canada at very favourable rates, and, in the opinion of the railway management, gave no cause for concern.

Your Committee notes that the estimates for the present year, exclusive of Eastern Lines, amount to \$53,750,000 as compared with \$39,000,000 for 1928. The additional requirements are due to an increase in the amount of capital retirements of Canadian National Railways, Central Vermont Receivership Cer-

tificate Retirements, and an increase in general additions and betterments due to expanding business. In view of the explanations given, your Committee is of the opinion that this amount is necessary for the purpose of the Company for the coming year and should be voted by this House.

CANADIAN NATIONAL WEST INDIES SERVICES

Your Committee also had under consideration Item 338, loan to the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, whose steamships provide the services called for by the West Indies Trade Agreement. Your Committee is informed that there has been considerable competition for this business and a tendency to lower rates, and that the first year's operations may therefore not be quite as satisfactory as anticipated. Your Committee is of the opinion that the amount asked—\$945,000—is necessary for the requirements of this service in accordance with treaty obligations and should be voted.

CANADIAN GOVERNMENT MERCHANT MARINE

Your Committee also had under consideration Item 337 of the estimates—loan to the Canadian National Steamships (Canadian Government Merchant Marine, Limited)—to be applied in payment of deficits in operation of the Company and of the vessels under the Company's control during the year ending December 31, 1929, and capital requirements, amounting in all to \$969,000. Your Committee examined the report of operations for the year ending December 31, 1928, and notes that the results have not been quite as favourable as those of the previous year, due to the highly competitive situation which resulted in the reduction of freight rates in certain directions with a resultant reduction in gross revenues. Your Committee also reviewed the balance sheet of the Company and notes that the capital structure includes vessels at their original cost, whereas the present day value of this type of vessel is much below that at which the existing vessels are carried in the balance sheet. In view of this, your Committee is of the opinion that the Government should give early consideration to the writing down of the capital structure of the Merchant Marine to a point more in keeping with the present actual value of the vessels. Your Committee is of the opinion, on the evidence adduced, that the amount of \$969,000, included under Item 337 of the estimates, is required for the purposes of the Company and should be granted by this House.

MARITIME FREIGHT RATES ACT

Your Committee has had under consideration Item 340 of the estimates, to provide for the payment to the Canadian National Railway Company, as required by the Maritime Freight Rates Act, of the deficit in receipts and revenues, incurred during 1929, on Eastern Lines, the amount of the estimated deficit being \$4,526,645, and in addition a sum of \$2,060,000, representing the estimated amount by which the revenues of the Eastern Lines will be lessened during the coming year by the reduced rates granted under the Maritime Freight Rates Act in accordance with the recommendations of the Duncan Commission. By reason of the special considerations involved in the Maritime Railway situation, with which the House is familiar, your Committee is of the opinion that these amounts are necessary to give effect to the Maritime Freight Rates Act in the operation of the Eastern Lines, and should be granted by this House.

Your Committee has also had under consideration Item 339, to provide the sum of \$1,050,000 from which privately owned railways operating in territory covered by the Maritime Freight Rates Act shall be reimbursed the differ-

ence between normal tolls and the special tolls provided by that Act. Your Committee is of the opinion that this amount is necessary to implement the provisions of the Act in that regard and should be granted by this House.

A copy of the evidence taken by your Committee is appended.

Your Committee, to whom was referred for their consideration, the Convention for the Protection, Preservation and Extension of the Sockeye Salmon Fisheries in the Fraser River System, which was signed at Washington on the Twenty-seventh day of March, nineteen hundred and twenty-nine, on behalf of His Majesty for the Dominion of Canada, by the Plenipotentiary named therein, have taken the said Convention under consideration and beg leave to recommend that the House do approve of the same.

Mr. Duff, from the Select Standing Committee on Marine and Fisheries, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have had under consideration Bill No. 26, An Act to amend the Fisheries Act, and have agreed to report the said Bill with amendments.

That the Lobster fishing seasons as now established by Order in Council be as follows:—

1. Charlotte County, N.B.—November 15-June 8.
2. St. John County, N.B.—November 15-May 23.
3. Remainder of Bay of Fundy to Burns Point, Digby County—January 15-June 29.
4. Burns Point to Herring Point, Lunenburg County—March 1-May 31.
- 4 (a) Herring Point to Cole Harbour, Halifax County—December 1-30, March 1-May 15.
5. Cole Harbour to Red Point, Richmond County, including Strait of Canso—May 1-June 30.
6. Red Point to Cape St. Lawrence, Inverness County—May 16-July 15.
7. Cape St. Lawrence to south side river St. Lawrence, except Magdalen Islands and a portion of Northumberland Strait—May 1-June 30.
8. Portion of Northumberland Strait from River Philip, N.S., to Chockfish River, N.B. and Victoria Harbour to West Point, P.E.I.—August 16-October 15.
9. Magdalen Islands—May 10-July 20.
10. North shore Gulf of St. Lawrence—May 20-July 31.

That the Smelt fishing seasons as now established by Order in Council be as follows:—

In Nova Scotia:

For gill-nets—October 15-last day of February following except in a portion of Richmond County where it is October 1-January 31.

For bag-nets—November 25-last day of February following except in Northport and Tidnish rivers where it is November 1-January 15.

In Prince Edward Island:

For gill-nets—October 15-February 15.

For bag-nets—November 25-February 15.

In New Brunswick:

For gill-nets—October 15-February 15.

For bag-nets—November 25-February 15, except in Baie Verte and Port Elgin rivers, where it is November 1-January 15.

In Quebec:

For gill-nets—September 1-February 15.

For bag-nets—November 25-February 15.

For drag-seines—September 1 to close of navigation.

Your Committee also recommend the adoption of the recommendations of the sub-committee appointed to report on Clause 5 of Bill No. 26, as amended:—

That, in place of Section 5 of the said Bill, which was stricken out as amended in Committee, the Minister be asked to regulate the number and use of Trawlers under Chapter 73, Clause 46, R.S.C., by issuing to said beam trawlers a license to operate, and that regulations may be made by the Governor in Council prescribing the form of license, the evidence to be furnished on the application for the license, the number of licenses at any one time, the conditions under which same will be issued and any other provision respecting same.

That all said trawlers so licensed be owned and registered in Canada.

That no beam or otter trawler be permitted to fish within twelve (12) miles of the headlands of the Canadian coast; and

That the Department use every effort to encourage line fishermen, both in-shore and off-shore, to increase the production of fish to meet any increased demand.

Mr. McIntosh, from the Select Standing Committee on Industrial and International Relations, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

(b) That before the next session of Parliament the question of jurisdiction in matters of this nature as between the Dominion and the Provinces be considered by the Government;

(c) that 500 copies in English and 500 copies in French of this Report and Evidence be printed in blue book form, and that Standing Order No. 64 be suspended in relation thereto.

DEAR SIR,—The Joint Parliamentary Committee on the Restaurant has under consideration a change in the management of the Restaurant of Parliament, and has appointed a Special Committee to deal with the matter and to report.

The Special Committee has had the opportunity of discussing the situation with you to-day and desire to make a proposal to the Canadian National Railways, which if entertained, will be submitted to the full Committee for final action.

The suggestion is—

1. That the Canadian National Railways take over for one year commencing with the next Session of Parliament the management of the Restaurant, including Cafeteria, and to continue in the management if found satisfactory to both parties.

2. That the table d'hote charges (breakfast, luncheon and dinner) be maintained at present prices with special dishes at special prices—the general price charges not to exceed those charged now, including those for special functions and Afternoon Teas.

3. That the standard and quality of the food and the service to patrons to be at least equal to that now offered.

4. That the Railway Company have, of course, free premises, light, heat and caretaking, and the use of all present restaurant equipment—renewals to equipment to be furnished by the Railway Company.

5. That the Railway Company supply all foods, beverages, services, etc., and to receive as its remuneration all the receipts of the Restaurant and Cafeteria and ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for each ordinary Session of Parliament—any special Session to be specially arranged for as nearly as may be on the above basis.

It is felt that the conduct of the Parliamentary Restaurant by the Canadian National Railways will have an important advertising value to the company, and as the Railway Company is regarded as a branch of Government, this offer is first informally submitted to them, and if discussion is sought we shall be glad to consider any further details of the subject.

I understand you are agreeable to a subsidy of fifteen thousand dollars. If we find we can do it with less, after one year's trial, we will of course re-adjust it. It is not our desire to make money out of the proposition, but rather to do a good job as economically as possible and with as little cost to Parliament as we can.

Mr. Van Wyck, Manager of the Chateau Laurier, will have general direction of the Restaurant in the House of Commons, and I am sure that you will agree with me that he will have to run it on a business like basis and with freedom of politics which will be essential for efficient operation. Mr. Van Wyck will be instructed to get in touch with you immediately and get on with the job.

Your petitioner therefore humbly prays that your Honourable House will be pleased to pass an Act dissolving the said marriage between your petitioner and the said George McRae and enabling your petitioner to marry again, and granting your petitioner such further and other relief in the premises as to your Honourable House may seem meet.

If by way of loans from His Majesty, the amount or amounts advanced to any one or more of the said Companies shall be repayable on demand, with interest payable half-yearly at the rate fixed from time to time by the Governor in Council, secured if and when directed by the Governor in Council by mortgage or mortgages upon such properties, in such form and containing such terms and conditions, not inconsistent herewith, as the Governor in Council may approve.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Power, from the Special Committee appointed to study the Dominion Elections Act, 1920, and the amendments thereto, and the Corrupt Practices Inquiries Act, presented the Fifth and Final Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee met on February 27th, 1929, for organization, and during the course of its sittings have examined ten witnesses, as follows:—

Louis L. Pelletier and Byron Baker, representing the Railway Transportation Brotherhoods;

Dr. T. E. Kaiser, M.P.;

H. J. Barber, M.P.;

A. W. Neill, M.P.;

John D. Hunt, Chief Electoral Officer, Province of Alberta;

Tom Moore, President Trades and Labour Congress of Canada;

O. M. Biggar, K.C.;

E. E. Stockton, of the office of the Auditor General of Canada;

Jules Castonguay, Chief Electoral Officer for Canada.

Messrs. Jules Castonguay and E. E. Stockton were in attendance at all sittings of the Committee and your Committee desires to thank these gentlemen for information, advice and assistance which they were at all times willing to render, and also wishes to express its appreciation of the services rendered by the Committee's secretaries, Messrs. A. A. Fraser and J. T. Dun.

Mr. O. M. Biggar, K.C., in his capacity of legal adviser and counsel to the Committee was constantly in attendance and rendered invaluable service.

Proposed amendments to the Dominion Elections Act were filed by Mr. E. E. Pelletier on behalf of the Legislative Committee of Railway Brotherhoods; by Mr. Neill, M.P.; Mr. H. B. Adshead, M.P., on behalf of the Labour Members of the House of Commons; Mr. Jules Castonguay, Chief Electoral Officer; Mr. D. M. Kennedy, M.P.; Dr. T. E. Kaiser, M.P., and by Mr. O. M. Biggar, K.C.

Suggestions were also received and filed by Mr. D. M. Kennedy, M.P., Mr. Tom Moore, Mr. John D. Hunt, Mr. Albert McCaughan and Mr. Francis King on behalf of the Dominion Marine Association, and to the Corrupt Practices Act by Mr. D. F. Kellner, M.P. All these proposed amendments and suggestions were considered. In respect to some, such as compulsory voting and registration and vote by proxy, it was deemed inadvisable to take action at present. In others, suggestions were given effect wholly or in part, as the recommendations contained herein and in the Fourth Report will show.

Your Committee also studied the Dominion Elections Act and the Corrupt Practices Act section by section.

In its Fourth Report the Committee recommended that Parliament take action at this session on certain recommendations which could not come into force without preparations which would necessarily cover a considerable period. In this, its Fifth and Final Report, your Committee submits amendments of an important character, the passage of which may without any very great inconvenience, be delayed until the next session of Parliament.

The Committee therefore recommends for the consideration of Parliament at its next session an Act to amend the Dominion Elections Act, 1920, and an Act to amend the Corrupt Practices Inquiries Act, appended hereto.

BILL No.

An Act to Amend the Corrupt Practices Inquiries Act

His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons, enacts as follows:—

1. *The Corrupt Practices Inquiries Act* is amended by repealing section eight thereof and substituting the following:—

8. The person or persons presenting a petition to the House of Commons under this Act, shall deposit with the accountant of the House the sum of *five hundred dollars*.

2. There shall be attached to the said petition, on its presentation, a certificate given under the hand of the said accountant, certifying that the said deposit of *five hundred dollars* has been duly made.

2. The said Act is amended by repealing section twelve thereof and substituting the following:—

12. The commissioners shall, *as soon as possible after their appointment and within not more than sixty days thereafter*, commence to hold meetings for the purposes of the inquiry at some convenient place within the district or within ten miles thereof, and may adjourn such meetings from time to time, and from place to place, within the district or within ten miles thereof, as to them seem expedient, *and shall continue to hold such meetings as circumstances require*.

3. The said Act is amended by repealing section thirty-seven thereof and substituting the following:—

37. Any expenses authorized by this Act to be incurred shall be paid out of any unappropriated moneys forming part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada.

BILL No.

An Act to Amend the Dominion Elections Act

His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons enacts as follows:—

1. The said Act is amended by inserting, after section three thereof, the following section as section three A:—

3A. Any notices, voters' lists, or other documents required by this Act to be posted up may, notwithstanding the provisions of any Dominion or provincial law or any municipal by-law, be affixed by means of tacks or pins to any wooden fence situate on or immediately adjoining any highway or by means of gum or paste on any post or pole so situate, but nothing in this section shall be deemed to justify the affixing of any notice otherwise than hereinbefore specified.

2. The said Act is amended by repealing section four thereof and substituting the following:—

4. Every printed pamphlet, advertisement, handbill, placard, poster or dodger having reference to any election shall bear upon its face the name and address of its printer and publisher, and any person printing, publishing, distributing or posting up, or causing to be printed, published, distributed or posted up, any such document unless it bears upon its face such name and address is guilty of an offence against this Act punishable on summary conviction as in this Act provided.

3. The said Act is amended by repealing section eight thereof and substituting the following:—

8. Every executory contract, agreement, promise or undertaking, in any way referring to, arising out of or depending upon any election under this Act, even for the payment of lawful expenses or the doing of some lawful act, shall be void in law, *but nothing in this section shall extend to or affect any executory contract, agreement, promise or undertaking by a candidate or the official agent of a candidate of which there is a memorandum or note in writing signed by such candidate or his official agent.*

4. The said Act is amended by repealing section nine thereof.

5. The said Act is amended by repealing section sixteen thereof and substituting the following:—

16. No election shall be declared invalid by reason of non-compliance with any of the provisions of this Act if nominations have been received and a poll has been held substantially in accordance with the said provisions, or, if, in any case in which no poll was required to be held, nominations have been so received, unless, in either case, it appears to the tribunal having cognizance of the matter that such non-compliance is likely to have affected the return to the writ of election.

6. The said Act is amended by repealing subsections three and four of section thirty-three and substituting the following:—

(3) Such certified copies shall be dealt with in all respects in the same way as if the same were preliminary lists prepared as hereinbefore provided by the rural registrars or by enumerators and urban registrars as hereinbefore specified and shall be distributed, corrected and revised accordingly.

7. The said Act is amended by repealing section thirty-four thereof and substituting the following:—

34. Where it appears to the returning officer that there are in any polling division more than about three hundred voters qualified to vote, and in the opinion of the returning officer the number of voters likely to vote is such that they will not be able conveniently to vote at a single polling station, the returning officer may, with the approval of the Chief Electoral Officer, provide within the polling division two or more adjacent polling stations which shall if possible be in the same building.

(2) If for any polling division it is proposed to establish two or more polling stations, the returning officer shall direct the enumerator or registrar to divide his list for such polling division into two or more parts, each containing groups of names with different initial letters, as for example from A to K and from L to Z, or as the case may be, and each polling station shall be designated by reference to the initial letters of the groups of names assigned to it.

(3) A deputy returning officer shall be appointed for each polling station and there shall be required to be furnished to him only such portion of the list of voters for the polling division as contains the names of the voters the initial letters of whose surnames fall within the group of letters designating such polling division, and the voters in such polling division shall be entitled to vote accordingly.

8. The said Act is amended by repealing subsections two and three of section thirty-five and substituting the following:—

(2) No person shall be appointed election clerk, *enumerator*, registrar, deputy returning officer or poll clerk unless he is a resident of the electoral district within which he is to act.

9. The said Act is amended by repealing subsection three of section thirty-nine thereof.

10. The said Act is amended by repealing subsections one and two of section forty-three thereof and substituting the following:—

43. Any candidate nominated may withdraw at any time after his nomination and before the close of nominations at two o'clock on nomination day by filing with the returning officer a declaration in writing to that effect signed by himself. The deposit of any candidate so withdrawing shall be forfeited.

11. The said Act is amended by adding to section forty-five the following clause as clause (f) thereof:—

(f) A copy of the list of voters entitled to vote at the polling station at which the deputy returning officer is to act.

12. The said Act is amended by repealing subsection one of section fifty thereof and substituting the following:—

(50) The ballot of each voter shall be a printed paper, in this Act called a ballot paper, on which the names, *addresses and occupations* of the candidates, alphabetically arranged in the order of their surnames, shall, subject as hereinafter provided, be printed exactly as they are set out in the nomination paper; the ballot paper shall have a counterfoil and a stub, and there shall be a line of perforations between the ballot and the counterfoil and between the counterfoil and the stub, the whole as in Form No. 28.

13. Section fifty of the said Act is amended by inserting the following as subsection two A thereof:—

(2A) Any candidate may, within one hour after the close of nominations, in writing furnish to the returning officer any particulars of his address or occupation which he considers to have been insufficiently or inaccurately given in his nomination paper, or may in writing direct the returning officer to omit any of his given names from the ballot paper or to indicate the same by initial only, and the returning officer shall comply with any such direction and include in the ballot paper any such additional or corrected particulars.

14. Section fifty-one of the said Act is amended by inserting the following clause as clause (bb) thereof:—

(bb) Not being a person entitled under this Act to be in possession of official ballot paper or of any ballot paper, has any such official ballot paper or any ballot paper in his possession.

15. Section fifty-one of the said Act is amended by repealing clause (f) thereof and substituting the following:—

(f) Forges or counterfeits any official, legal or authorized stamp for the stamping of ballot papers, or uses any such stamp for any purpose other than the stamping of ballot paper;

(ff) Has in his possession any counterfeit or imitation of any such stamp or has any such stamp in his possession without the authority of the returning officer;

16. Section fifty-one of the said Act is amended by repealing clause (i) thereof and substituting the following:—

(i) Being authorized by the returning officer to print any ballot papers for an election, without authority prints more ballot papers than the returning officer authorizes to be printed.

17. The said Act is amended by repealing subsections four, five and six of section sixty-three thereof.

18. The said Act is amended by repealing clause (b) of section sixty-five of the said Act and substituting the following:—

(b) Appoint in writing and swear in a special constable if he deems it necessary to do so in order to insure the regular and orderly conduct of the poll, and in the event of any disturbance to appoint, for the purpose of quelling the same, such additional special constables as the circumstances require, provided that not more than one special constable at any poll shall be entitled to remuneration for his services.

19. The said Act is amended by repealing subsection seven of section sixty-five and substituting the following:—

(7) Every poll clerk shall have the authority of a constable for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Act.

20. The said Act is amended by inserting the following subsection in section sixty-seven as subsection two A thereof:—

(2A) If in the course of counting the votes, any ballot paper is found to which counterfoil still remains attached, the deputy returning officer shall then remove and destroy the same without himself examining it, being careful that the number thereon is not seen by any person present. No ballot paper shall be rejected on account of the failure of the deputy returning officer to remove the counterfoil at the time the vote

was cast, but nothing herein contained shall relieve the deputy returning officer from any penalty to which he may have become liable by reason of such failure.

21. Section sixty-nine of the said Act is amended by inserting therein the following subsection as subsection five A thereof:—

(5A) If any ballot box does not appear to contain a statement of the poll either loose or in its separate envelope as hereinbefore provided, the returning officer may, for the purpose of finding a statement of the poll, open any large envelope found in the ballot box and appearing to contain miscellaneous papers. If the power hereby conferred is exercised, all the papers, other than the statement of the poll if found, shall be placed by the returning officer in a special large envelope which shall be sealed and duly endorsed by him. Nothing in this subsection shall authorize the opening of any envelope appearing to contain only ballot papers, but in the absence of other information the endorsements on such envelopes may be adopted as indicating the result of the poll at the polling station in question.

22. The said Act is amended by repealing subsection two of section seventy-one and substituting the following therefor:—

(2) The judge to whom applications under this section may be made shall be the judge as defined by section two of this Act within whose judicial district is situate the place at which the declaration of the election was made, and any judge entitled to act under this section may act either within or without the judicial district in question.

23. The said Act is amended by inserting the following subsection in section seventy-one as subsection eight A thereof:—

(8A) If in the course of the recount any ballot paper is found with the counterfoil still attached, the judge shall remove the same, and no ballot shall be rejected by reason of the deputy returning officer's failure to remove the counterfoil thereof.

24. The said Act is amended by striking out subsection one of section seventy-two and substituting the following:—

72. In case of any omission, neglect or refusal of the judge to comply with the foregoing provisions in respect to the recount or final addition, or to proceed therewith, any party aggrieved may, within eight days thereafter, make application *to the tribunal before which would be heard an appeal from the judgment of such judge in a civil action within his jurisdiction, provided that if such tribunal is not sitting, the application may be made within the said eight days to any judge who might, if the tribunal were then sitting, be a member thereof, and shall be referred by him to the tribunal at the earliest possible sitting thereof, before which the application can be heard.*

25. The said Act is amended by adding the following subsection to section seventy-two as subsection eight thereof:—

(8) In the event of a return to the writ of election having, at the time of issue of an order under this section, been made by the returning officer to the Chief Electoral Officer under the provisions of the next following section, the Chief Electoral Officer shall, upon being furnished with a certified copy of such order, send back to the returning officer all election papers required for use on the recount. Upon receiving the judge's certificate of the result of the recount, the returning officer shall as hereinbefore provided make and give due notice of a fresh declaration

of the election which shall replace any previous declaration, and if the result of the recount is that some person other than the person named in the original return is certified to be returned, a second return to the writ shall be made by the returning officer and shall be dealt with in all respects in the same way as, and shall have the effect of cancelling the original return; if, however, the result of the recount is to confirm the original return, the returning officer shall forthwith send back the papers to the Chief Electoral Officer, but shall not make any second or substitute return to the writ of election.

26. The said Act is amended by repealing clause (d) of subsection one of section seventy-three and substituting the following:—

(d) All copies of lists of voters and statements of changes and additions retained by him in his possession during the election as in this act provided.

(e) All such other papers and supplies as may be directed by the Chief Electoral Officer.

27. The said Act is amended by repealing subsection four of section seventy-three and substituting the following therefor:—

(4) No premature return shall be deemed to have reached the Chief Electoral Officer until the same should have reached him in due course, and he shall, if circumstances so require, send back such return and any or all election documents connected therewith to the returning officer for completion or correction. The Chief Electoral Officer may, moreover, send back to the returning officer any return which does not comply in any respect with the provisions of this Act.

28. The said Act is amended by repealing section seventy-four thereof and substituting the following therefor:—

74. If any returning officer wilfully delays, neglects or refuses duly to return any person who ought to be returned to serve in the House of Commons for any electoral district, and if it is determined by any competent court that such person was entitled to have been returned, the returning officer who has so wilfully delayed, neglected or refused duly to make such return of his election, shall be liable to the person aggrieved in the sum of *fifteen hundred* dollars and costs in addition to all damages sustained in a civil action instituted in any court of competent jurisdiction.

29. The said Act is amended by repealing section seventy-five thereof and substituting the following:—

75. The Chief Electoral Officer shall before or within ten days after the commencement of any session of Parliament make a report to the Speaker of the House of Commons as to any matter or event which has arisen or occurred in connection with the administration of his office in the interval since the date of his next preceding report and which he considers should be brought to the attention of the House, and he shall in such report suggest what, if any, amendments are, in his opinion, desirable for the more convenient administration of the law.

(2) Every candidate at any election and every official agent of any candidate shall have the right to send to the Chief Electoral Officer in writing any complaint he may have to make with respect to the conduct of the election or of any election officer, and to suggest any such changes or improvements in the law as he may consider desirable; every such complaint or statement shall be included by the Chief Electoral

Officer in his next following report to the Speaker of the House of Commons, with such recommendation, if any, as he may see fit to make thereon.

(3) Any report received from the Chief Electoral Officer by the Speaker shall be forthwith submitted by him to the House of Commons.

30. The said Act is amended by repealing subsection three of section seventy-seven thereof and substituting the following:—

(3) Such fees, allowances and disbursements shall be paid out of any unappropriated moneys forming part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada and shall be distributed in accordance with this Act.

31. The said Act is amended by repealing clause (a) of subsection four of section seventy-nine and substituting the following:—

(a) by a candidate, out of his own money for his personal expenses to an aggregate amount not exceeding *one thousand* dollars; or

32. The said Act is amended by inserting the following subsection in section seventy-nine as subsection four A thereof:—

(4A) Nothing in the last preceding subsection shall prevent a candidate himself paying such reasonable sums as may require to be paid for the rental of premises or furniture required for the purposes of a meeting of electors, or for the lighting or heating of any premises during the time they are so required, but if any payments are made by a candidate under the provisions of this subsection, a separate return thereof shall be made by him under oath similar to and subject to the same provisions and conditions in all respects as would apply to the return of like expenses by his official agent as hereinafter provided.

33. The said Act is amended by repealing section eighty-five thereof.

34. The said Act is amended by cancelling the printed matter in the form of ballot in Forms Nos. 26 and 28 in Schedule One and substituting therefor the following:—

Your Committee have also given consideration to the penalty assessable under Standing Order 93 (8), upon Bill No. 307 (X7 of the Senate), An Act for the relief of George King, as set out in the 13th Report of the Committee, presented on Friday, 31st of May, and do recommend that the said penalty charge be not imposed.

By leave of the House, Mr. Kay, from the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Pursuant to Orders of Reference dated Wednesday, March 6, and Thursday, March 21, 1929, your Committee took into consideration the subject of protein as a factor in the statutory definitions applying to all contract grades of wheat in the Western inspection division, together with its effect on existing methods of inspecting and grading wheat, and the subject of the storage, shipping, mixing, inspection and grading of grain, generally, under the provisions of the Canada Grain Act, as well as the whole administration of the said Canada Grain Act.

The evidence submitted by the aforementioned witnesses covers some 900 pages of printing.

Your Committee begs leave to report its conclusions and recommendations as follows, namely:—

1. That the following recommendations submitted by the Board of Grain Commissioners by way of amendments to the Canada Grain Act, be adopted namely:—

That,

Section 5 be amended by deleting the word "monthly" and substituting therefor the word "semi-monthly".

Section 6 be repealed and the following section substituted therefor:—

"The head office of the Board shall be located at such place as the Board may decide, and the Board may from time to time establish offices of the Board at other places."

Section 20 be amended by adding thereto the following words:—

"and may make rules and regulations for the handling of grain in any manner whatever."

Section 29 be amended by adding thereto the following words:—

"The premiums assessed for such security shall be paid by the Board."

Section 34 be amended by striking out the words "Chief Inspector" in the fourth line thereof and substituting the following words "inspector in charge".

Section 55 be amended by adding thereto the following words:—

"and the premiums assessed for such guarantee bond shall be paid by the Board."

Paragraph 6 of Section 116 be amended by striking out the words, "the opening of navigation," and substituting therefor, "granting a license".

Complaints

2.

That,

Subsection (1) of Section 108—Subsection (1) of Section 109—Subsection (4) of Section 114 be severally amended by striking out the words "under oath" where such words appear therein.

That,

Subsection (1) of Section 203 be amended by striking out the words "verified by affidavit or statutory declaration" in the sixth and seventh lines thereof.

That,

A new Section 108A be added:—

108A. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Act contained, the Board may require that any complaint in writing shall be verified by the complainant by affidavit.

Powers of Board to Assess Loss and Damage

3. Your Committee recommend that the Act be amended by adding thereto the following section:—

18A. (1) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Act contained, the Board may either upon complaint made or without complaint, investigate under oath, any matter which the Act provides shall or may be investigated by the Board, with power to assess loss and damage and the finding of the

Board certified by the Seal of the Board and by the Chairman and the Secretary thereof shall be final and shall be enforceable in any court of competent jurisdiction, unless an appeal from such finding shall be taken as in the next subsection provided.

(2) The person awarded damages or the person against whom damages are assessed may within thirty days of the date of the finding of the Board enter an appeal in the District or County Court of the judicial district in which the person entering such appeal resides.

(3) The Governor in Council may make such rules of practice and procedure for the proper conduct of such investigation as to him seems advisable.

Standards—Standards Boards

4. Your Committee recommends the Constitution of the Standards Boards on a different basis from that heretofore prevailing and that such Boards be empowered to finally fix the Standard Samples for all Grades and not for Commercial Grades only.

That,

The Act be amended in the following respects to provide for such recommendations,

That,

Section 32 of the Act be repealed and the following substituted therefor:—

32. The Chief Inspector shall direct the inspectors of the several divisions and districts to collect as early as may be possible and advisable, samples of grain of the current year's crop and from such samples the Chief Inspector shall select samples as and for the Statutory Grades of grain which, when approved by the Standards Board shall be, and be known as Statutory Grades Standards.

That,

Sections 40, 41 and 42 of the Act be repealed and the following substituted therefor:—

40. (1) There shall be for the Western Inspection Division a Board to be known as the Western Grain Standards Board or Standards Board appointed by the Board of Grain Commissioners, which shall consist of the Commissioners, the Chairman of the Boards of Grain Appeal, the Chief Inspector, the Chief Chemist of the Board and the Dominion Cerealists as ex-officio members, together with 1 representative of the millers, 4 representatives of the producers of Alberta, 5 representatives of the producers of Saskatchewan, 3 representatives of the producers of Manitoba and 1 representative of the producers of British Columbia.

Provided that in the event of the said aforementioned persons or any of them being unable or refusing to act as members or attend any meeting of the Standards Board, the Board shall appoint a sufficient number of other persons within the class of persons by this subsection named to be members in the place and stead of said persons. Provided, however, that the representation on the Standards Board of the several classes hereinbefore named shall always be maintained.

(2) Every member other than the ex-officio members, before acting as such, shall take an oath of office in such form as may be prescribed by the Board.

(3) The members shall be appointed each year not later than the first day of July and shall hold office until the thirtieth day of June of the year next following.

(4) At any meeting of the Standards Board two-thirds of the members of the said Board shall constitute a quorum.

(5) The Standards Board shall meet at such times and places as the Board shall direct.

(6) Notice of the meetings of the Standards Board shall be given by the Board to the members by registered post or by telegram.

(7) Members shall be paid their actual transportation expenses to and from the meetings of the Standards Board and a per diem allowance of twenty dollars while so travelling and while in attendance at Board meetings. Provided, however, that the per diem allowance shall not be paid members who may be officers or employees of the Dominion Government.

41. Official Standards shall not be finally established by the Standards Board until the Chief Chemist of the Board or his assistant has reported on their milling and baking value.

42. (1) The Standards Board shall establish standards which, when made to apply to grades other than the Statutory Grades, shall be and be known as Commercial Grades Standards.

(2) The Board may at any time authorize and direct the Standards Board to establish standards of grain typical of the grain passing to Pacific ports to govern the inspection and grading of such grain.

42A. In the inspection of grain of commercial grades, inspection officers shall be governed by the Commercial Grades Standards.

42B. In the inspection of grain of statutory grades inspection officers shall be governed by the Standard samples except where there is a variation between such samples and the definitions of grades under the Act in which case grain carrying the statutory minimum weight per bushel and the statutory minimum percentages and in all other respects up to the said samples, shall be given a grade equal to the grade represented by the said Standard sample.

42C. The Chief Inspector shall distribute portions of all standard samples to such persons as the Board may direct and inspectors shall upon request, furnish standard samples certified in writing over their hands as being samples of the official standard of a specified grade. For all such samples, inspectors shall charge and collect such fee as may be fixed by the Board.

Warehouse Receipts

That Subsections (1) and (2) of Section 150 be struck out and the following substituted therefor:—

(1) The operator of any country elevator shall deliver to any person actually delivering grain for storage or shipment a warehouse receipt or receipts *in the name of the individual, or jointly in the name of two or more individuals, designated by the person actually delivering the grain.* Such receipt or receipts shall be dated the day the grain was received and specify,

- (a) the gross and net weight of such grain;
- (b) the dockage for dirt or other cause;
- (c) the grade of such grain when graded conformably to the grade fixed by law and in force at terminal points; and
- (d) that the grain mentioned in such receipt has been received into store.

(2) Such receipt shall also state upon its face that the grain mentioned therein has been received into store, and that upon the return of such receipt, and upon payment or tender of payment of all lawful charges for receiving, storing, insuring, delivering or otherwise handling such grain, which may

accrue up to the time of the return of the receipt, the grain is deliverable to the individual or individuals named in the said *warehouse receipt*, or to his or their order, from the country elevator where it was received for storage, or, if he so desires, in quantities not less than carload lots, on track at any terminal elevator in the Western Inspection Division or at a proper terminal elevator at or adjacent to Duluth, so soon as the transportation company delivers the same at such terminal, and the certificate of grade and weight is returned.

That section 2 be amended by adding thereto paragraph (ff) the following:—

(ff) "Owner," for the purpose of the provisions of this Act with respect to the issue of warehouse or storage receipts, means the person who is entitled to demand the issue of any such receipt to himself or his nominee or, after any such receipt has issued, means the person to whom the grain is deliverable in accordance with the terms thereof. (New.)

Appeals

6. Your Committee recommends a new section 31 to make clear that the definitions of the Statutory Grades shall be the final determining factor on Appeal.

That,

Section 31 of the Act be repealed and the following substituted therefor:—

31. Standard Samples of all grades of grain in use by the inspection department in grading grain shall be supplied by the Chief Inspector to the several Appeal Boards and the said Appeal Boards shall use the said Standard samples in deciding appeals. Provided however, that grain carrying the statutory minimum weight per bushel and the statutory minimum percentages and up to the standard sample in all other respects shall be given a grade equal to the grade represented by the said sample.

Explanatory note: This amendment is proposed for the purpose of bringing the Act into conformity with the prevailing practice in respect to grading grain. The Chief Inspector's evidence is that it is not always possible to prepare standard samples to the minimum of weight and percentage required in the definition of the Act.

Barley Grades

7. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the revised definitions of Barley Grades as submitted by sub-Committee on Grading of the National Barley Committee and that Section 96 of the Act be amended and the new definitions of Grades be substituted therefor.

That,

Section 96 of the Act be amended by striking out the definitions under the word "barley" and substituting the following therefor:—

Grades Nos. 1, 2 and 3 extra, C.W. Barley shall apply to barley that is of good utility value for malting purposes and for these grades "sound" shall mean free from frosted, sprouted, heated, musted, or artificially dried grain, and shall be practically free from broken, skinned or otherwise damaged grain.

Six-Row Barley

No. 1 Canada Western Six-Row Barley shall be composed of 95 per cent six-row barley of one variety or type, and equal in value for malting purposes to O.A.C. 21. It shall be sound, clean, practically free from other grain, plump, bright and weigh not less than 50 pounds to the bushel.

No. 2 Canada Western Six-Row Barley shall be composed of 95 per cent six-row barley of one variety or type and equal in value for malting purposes to O.A.C. 21. It shall be sound, reasonably clean, free from other grains but not plump or bright enough to be graded No. 1, and shall weigh not less than 49 pounds to the bushel.

No. 3 Extra Canada Western Six-Row Barley shall be composed of 90 per cent six-row barley equal in value for malting purposes to O.A.C. 21. It shall be sound, reasonably clean, reasonably free from other grains, but may include weather stained and slightly shrunken barley and shall weigh not less than 48 pounds to the bushel.

Two-Row Barley

No. 1 Canada Western Two-Row Barley shall be composed of 95 per cent two-row barley of one variety or type and equal in value for malting or pearling purposes to Canadian Thorpe. It shall be sound, clean, practically free from other grain, plump, bright and shall weigh not less than 52 pounds to the bushel.

No. 2 Canada Western Two-Row Barley shall be composed of 95 per cent two-row barley of one variety or type and equal in value for malting or pearling purposes to Canadian Thorpe. It shall be sound, reasonably clean, reasonably free from other grains, but not plump or bright enough to be graded No. 1, and shall weigh not less than 50 pounds to the bushel.

No. 3 Extra Canada Western Two-Row Barley shall be composed of 90 per cent two-row barley equal in value for malting or pearling purposes to Canadian Thorpe. It shall be sound, reasonably clean, reasonably free from other grains, but may include weather stained and slightly shrunken barley and shall weigh not less than 48 pounds to the bushel.

Trebi Grades

No. 1 Canada Western Trebi Barley shall be composed of 95 per cent Barley of Trebi type, shall be plump, bright, sound, practically free from other grain and weighing not less than 50 pounds per measured bushel.

No. 2 Canada Western Trebi Barley shall be composed of 95 per cent Barley of Trebi Type, shall be reasonably clean, sound, reasonably free from other grains, but not bright or plump enough to be graded No. 1 and weighing not less than 49 pounds per measured bushel.

No. 3 Extra Canada Western Trebi Barley shall be composed of 90 per cent Barley of Trebi type, shall be reasonably clean, sound, reasonably free from other grain, but may include weather stained barley and weigh not less than 48 pounds per measured bushel.

Feed Barleys

No. 3 Canada Western Barley shall be barley composed of any variety or type or combination of varieties or types, shall be sweet, reasonably clean and reasonably free from all other grains, may include weather-stained, immature, shrunken, slightly frosted and otherwise damaged barley and shall not weigh less than 47 pounds to the bushel.

No. 4 Canada Western Barley shall be barley composed of any variety or type or combination of varieties or types, shall be sweet, and may include damaged or strained barley and shall not weigh less than 46 pounds to the bushel.

No. 5 Canada Western Barley shall include damaged and badly weathered barley and shall not weigh less than 42 pounds to the bushel.

No. 6 Canada Western Barley shall include all barley excluded from the preceding grades on account of weight or admixtures.

Barley inspected as "No grade," "Tough," or "Damp," and artificially dried, shall not be graded higher than No. 3 Canada Western Barley.

Prohibition of Mixing

Your Committee recommends that legislation be enacted at the present Session prohibiting in any manner whatsoever, the mixing of the Statutory Grades of Red Spring Wheat, and that such legislation shall come into force and effect on the first day of August, 1930.

Your Committee also recommends that the Board be advised to pass such regulations and provide such staff as may be required for the enforcement of the said prohibition of mixing.

Outturn Standards

Your Committee recommends that the standard for the grading out of all elevators, except country elevators, of all Statutory and Commercial grades of Red Spring Wheat shall be a composite sample equal to 75 per cent of the average quality of the grade and 25 per cent of the minimum quality of such grade at the primary inspection point, and that the legislation enacting this provision shall become operative on the first day of August, 1929. Such outturn standards shall be set by the Standards Board.

In respect to the aforementioned recommendations on the prohibition of mixing of grades and in respect to Outturn Standards your Committee recommend that the Board be instructed to make a careful study of the effect of the carrying out of the said recommendations in the first year thereof, and report to the Minister their findings and recommendations as to the advisability of continuing, extending or modifying such provisions.

Protein Content

9. Your Committee submits the following recommendations on the subject of the protein content of Wheat:—

That pursuant to a request embodied in the Report of the 1928 Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization, the National Research Council made an exhaustive survey of the United States system of paying premiums for high protein wheat and reflecting the same back to the grower and reported thereon to the Minister.

That your Committee considers this report a very valuable contribution to available data on the protein question and recommends that the National Research Council be requested to adopt such measures as it seems best fitted to bring this report to the attention of, and make it available to interested persons.

That the said report of the National Research Council having suggested further investigation of the export demand for high protein wheat in the major importing countries and your Committee concurring in this view recommend that the National Research Council be requested to conduct a personal survey of the major European markets and report to the Minister before next session of Parliament.

Cars and Car Order Book

10. Your Committee recommends the adoption of the following car order book provisions, being the recommendations of the Brown Royal Commission as revised by your Committee.

Sections 179 to 191 (both inclusive) shall be struck out, and the following sections substituted therefor.

179. (1) At each station where there is a railway agent and where the grain is shipped under such agent, an order book for cars shall be kept for each shipping point under such agent in which every order for a car for the shipment of grain from such shipping point shall be entered, and which shall be kept open to the Public. (S. 178, ss. 1 Amended.)

(2) The car order shall be in the form D, in the first schedule to this Act. (No change.)

(3) In the case of a flag-station or siding from which grain is shipped, the Board may, in its discretion and for such period or periods as it deems necessary, require the railway company to provide at such flag-station or siding a suitable person whose duties shall be

(a) To keep open for the use of shippers at all times during the day a car order book, as provided under this Part, in which orders for cars may be entered in accordance with the provisions of this Part;

(b) when the loading of cars is completed, to seal such car or cars;

(c) to provide shippers with the regular form of grain shipping bill; and

(d) when such shipping bill is properly filled out by the shipper, to hand it to the conductor of the train that picks up such car or cars or place it where such conductor may get it. (No change.)

(4) This section shall not apply to a siding used exclusively for the passing of trains. (No change.)

(5) All of the aforesaid car order books shall be supplied by the railway company. (S. 179, ss. 6, Amended.)

(6) Every railway company which fails to supply or keep open for use, a car order book for any such station, flag-station, or siding at the proper place where the same is to be kept under this Part, or which fails to comply with any requirement made by the Board under subsection 3 of this section, is guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a penalty of not less than five hundred dollars nor more than one thousand dollars. (Old ss. 5, Amended.)

(7) Every railway agent or employee who refuses to use or fails to keep open for use, any car order book supplied to him for any such station, flag-station, or siding, is guilty of an offence, and liable on summary conviction to a penalty of not less than one hundred dollars, nor more than two hundred dollars. (New.)

180. (1) Every order for a car shall be made by the applicant in person or by his agent duly appointed in writing. (New.)

(2) The agent of the applicant shall be a resident in the vicinity of the shipping point for which the car is ordered, and if the car order is signed by the agent the appointment of such agent shall be forthwith deposited with the railway agent. (S. 181, ss. 2, Amended.)

(3) No person acting in the capacity of a duly authorized agent shall at any one time order a car for more than one applicant and no applicant or agent shall make an entry in the said book until any previous entry made by him or for him shall have been filled or cancelled as hereinafter provided.

(4) Notwithstanding any of the foregoing provisions of this section, an order for a car for a country elevator may be made on behalf of such elevator by the local operator or other person for the time being in charge thereof, and it shall not be necessary for such operator or other person to obtain or file any appointment in writing as aforesaid. (New.)

(5) Applicants or their agents shall be entitled to sign the car order book in the order of their arrival at the place where the said book is kept, without discrimination between producer, country elevator or otherwise. (New.)

181. (1) Every person who is a member of any of the organizations of grain producers known as grain pools, and incorporated by Act of the legislature of any of the provinces of Canada shall, for the purpose of ordering a car or cars for the shipment of grain under the provisions of this Part, be deemed to be the owner of the grain delivered by him to or on account of such organization. (New.)

(2) If a group of two or more producers of grain desire to load a car with grain, part of which belongs to each of them, without bulkheading and without putting such grain through a country elevator, then, notwithstanding any of the provisions of section 180, such group shall for the purpose of ordering a car or cars under the provisions of this Part, be considered as one person, and any member thereof may, upon obtaining from his fellow members and filing with the railway agent on authority in writing so to do, order a car on behalf of such group. (New.)

182 (1) An applicant may order a car according to his requirements of any of the standard sizes in use by the railway company, and may in his order therefor, designate the country elevator, loading platform, siding or other convenient place at which the car so ordered shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, be spotted or placed for him by the railway company. (S. 180, ss. 1 and part s. 186.)

(2) The applicant or his agent duly appointed in writing in the manner aforesaid, shall furnish to the railway agent, for insertion in the car order book, the name and post office address of the applicant, the place where the car is to be placed for loading, and the kind of grain to be loaded, and shall in the order for the car declare that the applicant is at the time of the making of such order the actual owner of a carlot of grain of the kind designated in the said order, and that in his belief the said grain will be in a position to load by the time the car can be furnished to him. (S. 181, ss. L, Amended.)

(3) Unless the car is for a country elevator, the applicant or his said agent shall also furnish to the railway agent, for insertion in the car order book, a description by section, township, range and meridian, of the land on which the said grain was grown, and shall also in the order for the car, declare that the applicant has not at the time of the making of such order, any unfilled order for a car for the shipment of grain grown on the said land or on any other car order book. (New.)

(4) Each order shall be made in triplicate and shall be consecutively numbered in the car order book by the railway agent at the time the car is ordered and the said railway agent shall also at the same time fill in all particulars of the application except the applicant's signature, which shall be signed by the applicant or his said agent. (S. 181, ss. 1, Amended.)

183. (1) Each order for a car shall also be personally signed by the railway agent, who shall remove both the duplicate and triplicate from the car order book, and keep the duplicate in a separate file under his own control and give the triplicate to the applicant or to the applicant's agent if the order is made by an agent. (New.)

(2) If any car order book is lost, destroyed or otherwise disappears, the railway agent shall forthwith prepare a new book, and enter therein all of the orders which have not been filled or cancelled, in the order of priority to which such orders are entitled as shown by the duplicate to orders on his separate file. (New.)

(3) The applicant shall carefully preserve the triplicate of the said order, and if neither the original order book, nor the said duplicate orders can be found or produced, the railway agent shall forthwith post up in a conspicuous place in the station or other place where the said book shall be kept and in the nearest post office, written notices that the said book and duplicate orders are missing and that he intends to prepare a new book.

(4) All applicants whose orders were entered in the missing book and have not been filled or cancelled, shall thereupon have forty-eight hours within which to produce the triplicates of their said orders to the railway agent who shall, at the expiration of the said period, forthwith prepare a new book and enter therein all orders which have not been filled or cancelled, so far as the same may then be known to him in the order of priority to which such orders are entitled as shown by the triplicate orders so produced to him and shall thereafter, but not before, permit other applicants to enter their orders for cars. (New.)

(5) Subject to the foregoing provisions of this section in the event of any dispute arising as the result of the loss or destruction of the car order book or of any entry therein or entry extracted therefrom or in the event of the neglect or refusal of a railway agent to open a book the Board shall thereupon make such order or take action such as will provide as speedily as possible for the opening of a proper book. (New-added in Committee.)

184. (1) No car shall be furnished to any applicant for the shipment of grain unless the said applicant has first ordered such car in accordance with the provisions of this Part. (New.)

(2) Cars so ordered shall be furnished to applicants according to the order in time in which their orders appear in the car order book, without discrimination as to place of loading between country elevator, loading platform or otherwise. (S. 182, Amended.)

(3) In case the applicant requires any special standard size of car, such size shall be stated by the railway agent in the car order book, and the railway company shall furnish a car of the size so ordered to such applicant in his turn, as soon as the same can be furnished to him by the railway company. (Part s. 180, ss. 1, Amended.)

(4) If any car or cars furnished by the railway company at any station are not of the size required by the applicant first entitled thereto, such applicant shall not lose his priority, but shall be entitled to the first car of the required size which can be furnished to him by the railway company. (Part s. 180, ss. 2, Amended.)

185. (1) Each applicant or agent upon being informed by the railway agent of the allotment to him of a car in good order and condition shall, within three hours, declare his intention and ability to load the said car within the time hereinafter prescribed. (S. 185, ss. 1.)

(2) In the event of such applicant or agent failing so to declare his intention and ability to load the car allotted to him, the railway agent shall thereupon cancel the order by writing in ink across the face thereof the word "Cancelled", and the date of such cancellation, and shall sign his name thereunder. (S. 183, ss. 2, Amended.)

(3) If the applicant, after declaring his intention and ability as aforesaid, shall not have commenced loading the car within twenty-four hours thereafter, the railway agent shall thereupon cancel the order in the manner aforesaid. (S. 183, ss. 3.)

(4) Upon the cancellation of an order under any of the provisions of this section, the railway agent shall award the car in accordance with the following provisions.

(a) If such car has been spotted or placed for loading at the place designated in the order of the applicant next entitled to a car, the said car shall be awarded to such applicant.

(b) If such car has been spotted or placed for loading at some other place, the said car shall, notwithstanding the provisions of section 184, be awarded to the next applicant who has ordered a car to be spotted or placed for loading at the place where such car has been spotted or placed: Provided always that in such cases, no applicant to whom the said car would otherwise have been awarded shall lose his priority, but shall be entitled to the next car of the size ordered by him which can be furnished to him at the place designated in his order. (New.)

186. (1) In the allotting of cars under the provisions of this Part, one car only shall be allotted in each case to the applicant, except in the case of a country elevator, which shall receive two cars on each allotment. (New.)

(2) The Board may in its discretion cancel or suspend the country elevator's privilege of obtaining two cars upon allotment and restrict the said allotment to one car, at any point where, owing to prevailing conditions, it is deemed expedient so to do. (New.)

(3) The Board may, in its discretion, during a car shortage, direct the railways to make an equitable distribution of empty grain cars to all stations or sidings in proportion to the amount of grain available for shipment from such stations or sidings. (S. 190.)

187. (1) Subject to the provisions of this Act, every car shall be spotted or placed for the applicant by the railway company at the country elevator, loading platform siding, or other place designated by the said applicant in his order for such car. (Part s. 186, Amended.)

(2) No car shall be deemed to be furnished to an applicant within the meaning of this Part, until it is spotted or placed for him for loading at the place designated in his order for such car, nor unless it is in a proper condition to receive and carry the kind of grain designated in the said order. (S. 188 and Part s. 182, Amended.)

(3) Each person to whom a car has been allotted under the foregoing provisions shall, before commencing to load it, notify the railway agent of its proposed destination. (S. 187.)

(4) The period of time which shall be allowed for loading a car secured under the provisions of this Part shall be forty-eight hours, except during the months of September, October and November when it shall be twenty-four hours. (S. 191.)

188. (1) When an applicant has loaded a car allotted to him or his order therefor has been cancelled, he shall, if he requires another car, be entitled to again order a car and sign the car order book in manner aforesaid, and when the second car has been allotted to him and he has loaded same, or his order therefor has been cancelled, he may again order another car and sign the car order book as aforesaid, and so on until his requirements have been filled. (Part s. 189, Amended.)

(2) No applicant shall have more than one unfilled order on the car order book at any one time. (S. 189, clause (c), Amended.)

189. When the car has been furnished the railway agent shall duly enter in ink in the car order book

(a) the date and time when the car was furnished;

(b) the car number; and

(c) when loaded, the date of such loading and the destination of the car. (S. 184, ss. 3, Amended.)

190. The Board may, with the approval of the Governor in Council, by regulation, modify any of the provisions of this Part in such manner as may be deemed advisable for the purpose of more fully protecting the interests of the producers of grain, and of facilitating the distribution of cars without discrimination as between producer, country elevator or otherwise. (New.)

191. (1) Everyone who

(a) not being entitled thereto, orders a car for shipping grain;

(b) orders for any fictitious person, or for any person who is not entitled thereto, a car for shipping grain;

(c) has at any time more than one unfilled order on a car order book, or has at any time an unfilled order for a car for the shipment of the same grain on more than one car order book

is guilty of an offence, and liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty of not less than twenty-five dollars, nor more than two hundred dollars, and in default of payment, to imprisonment for not less than one month, nor more than two months. (New.)

(2) The magistrate before whom such person is convicted, shall upon the application of the informant, or any producer of grain, issue and deliver to the applicant therefor, a certificate of such conviction, and the railway agent having the custody of the car order in respect of which the said conviction is made, shall upon such certificate being filed with him, forthwith cancel the said order. (New.)

(3) The Board may order that any entry in the car order book, found upon investigation to have been made contrary to the provisions of the act or regulations shall be stricken out of the said book and the railway agent in charge of the book shall forthwith execute such order of the Board. (New added in Committee.)

(4) No cancellation of a car order by a railway agent shall be lawful, unless such cancellation is made in the manner provided in section 185, or in this section. (S. 183, ss. 4, Amended.)

Provided however that the Board may order the restoration to the car order book of any order cancelled by the railway agent contrary to the provisions of the Act. Such restored order shall be given, as nearly as may be possible, the same order of precedence as it would have enjoyed if such cancellation had not been made. (New added by the Committee.)

Section 231 shall be struck out, and the following substituted therefor.

231. (1) Everyone who contravenes any provision of this Part or any regulation made thereunder, except with respect to the matters enumerated in section 191 of the Act is guilty of an offence and liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty of not less than twenty-five dollars for the first offence, a penalty of not less than two hundred and fifty dollars or two months in jail for a second offence, and to a penalty of not less than five hundred dollars or three months in jail for a third or subsequent offence. (S. 231, ss. 1, Amended by Committee.)

Order Points

That subsection 2 of section 193 be repealed and the following substituted therefor:

(2). To the extent to which any provisions of subsection one of this section are stated therein to apply to Winnipeg or St. Boniface, such provisions shall also, to the like extent, apply to Calgary, Edmonton, Fort William, Moose Jaw and Saskatoon, and in every such case, wherever the words “ Winnipeg,” “ Winnipeg-St. Boniface ” or “ Winnipeg or St. Boniface ” occur, the said subsection shall be read as if the words “ Calgary,” “ Edmonton,” “ Fort William,” “ Moose Jaw ” or “ Saskatoon ” severally, as the case may be, were inserted instead of the word “ Winnipeg ” or the words “ Winnipeg-St. Boniface ” or “ Winnipeg or St. Boniface.”

Commissioners—Assistant Commissioners

1. Section 2 of the Canada Grain Act is amended by inserting immediately after paragraph (d) thereof the following paragraph:—

“(d) 1. ‘Assistant Commissioner’ means an Assistant Commissioner appointed under this Act.”

2. Section 4 of the said Act be amended by striking out the word “ten” in the second line of subsection 8 thereof and substituting therefor the word “twelve”, and by striking out the word “eight” in the third line thereof and substituting therefor the word “ten”.

3. The said section 4 be further amended by inserting immediately after subsection 8 thereof the following subsection:—

(1) 8A. There shall be four Assistant Commissioners who shall be appointed by the Governor in Council and who shall be paid such annual salaries as are fixed by the Governor in Council. Such Assistant Commissioners shall hold office during the pleasure and shall be deemed to be officers of the Board.

(2) One Assistant Commissioner shall have headquarters in the Province of Alberta, one in Saskatchewan, one in Manitoba, and one at the head of the Lakes.

4. Section 7 of the said Act be amended by striking out the words “the secretary” wherever they appear therein, and by substituting the words “the Assistant Commissioners”.

5. Section 8 of the said Act be amended by inserting after the word “Commissioners” in the first line thereof the words “the Assistant Commissioners”, and the form of oath be amended accordingly.

6. Section 11 of the Act be amended by adding after the word “Commissioner” in the first line thereof the words, “or Assistant Commissioner”.

7. The said Act be further amended by inserting immediately after section 11 thereof the following section:—

11A. Subject to the provisions of subsection 3 of this section, each of the Assistant Commissioners shall have the like powers and duty to receive and investigate complaints and make findings thereon, as by the Act is given to and imposed upon the Board or any Commissioner, and in addition thereto shall exercise and perform such other powers and duties of the Board or of a Commissioner as the Board with the approval of the Governor in Council may authorize.

(2) The Board may with the approval of the Governor in Council vary or rescind any authority by the Board conferred on any of the said Assistant Commissioners.

(3) There shall be an appeal to the Board within fifteen days by any person dissatisfied with a decision of an Assistant Commissioner.

(4) The Board may make regulations governing such appeals.

Forms

Your Committee recommends that section 225 of the Act be amended by striking out the words “in case any such forms are applicable”, in the fourth line thereof.

Tickets and Receipts

1. Section 170 of the said Act is amended by adding thereto the following subsections:—

(4) The Board shall, upon payment therefor, supply or authorize any person or persons to supply tickets or receipts to the owners or operators of country elevators, and no such owner or operator shall issue or use any other ticket or receipt than that so supplied or authorized to be supplied.

2. Section 225 of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—

225. Any person who issues any ticket or receipt in any form other than that prescribed in the first schedule to this Act or that authorized by the Board with the approval of the Governor in Council, or who issues or uses any ticket or receipt not supplied or authorized to be supplied pursuant to section 170 of this Act shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable, upon summary conviction, to a fine of not less than two hundred dollars and not more than five hundred dollars or to forfeiture of his license, or to both fine and forfeiture.

3. Subsection 4 of Section 170 of the Act shall come into force on a day to be fixed by proclamation of the Governor in Council and no prosecution shall be instituted for the issue or use of any ticket or receipt not supplied or authorized to be supplied pursuant to the said subsection 4 until the said subsection has come into force.

Sampling Outgoing Cargoes at Montreal

Your Committee recommends that the inspection officers of the Board continue and extend the practice presently in force of drawing samples of all cargoes of grain moving out of the ports of Montreal, Quebec, Halifax and St. John, destined for overseas.

Handbook

Your Committee recommends that the Board compile, print and distribute a handbook of useful information to the public, the producer and the trade, containing a synopsis of the Act and the Regulations made thereunder, the statutory definitions of the grades, forms and such other matter as the Board may consider desirable.

Revision and Consolidation of the Act

Your Committee recommends that the Canada Grain Act be completely revised and consolidated at the next session of Parliament.

Grading of Oats

Your Committee recommends:—

That in the grading of oats grown in the Western Inspection Division the Inspecting Officers place a dockage for the removal of small weed seeds instead of reducing the grade on account of the inclusion of such seeds.

Licensing of Operators of Country Elevators

Your Committee recommends:—

That the Board take into consideration the Report of the Brown Royal Commission in respect to the licensing of operators of Country Elevators and recommends amending legislation or otherwise as may to the Board seem advisable.

Inspection at Transfer Elevators

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Grain Commissioners should carefully enquire into the advisability of placing inspectors at all transfer elevators between the head of the lakes and the seaboard to prevent any mixing of grain so that the quality and condition of grades as fixed by final inspection would be maintained.

And also enquire into the advisability of establishing inspection of all grain cargoes out of Canadian seaboard points and report their findings to the Minister before the next session of Parliament.

Bill

Your Committee recommends that a Bill incorporating all of the recommendations in this Report requiring legislative sanction be prepared and introduced in the House forthwith and be passed at the present Session.

Printing of Evidence

Your Committee recommends:—

That 10,000 copies in English and 1,000 in French of this Report and the evidence taken by the Committee be printed in Blue Book Form, and that Standing Order 64 be suspended in relation thereto.

A copy of the Minutes of Procedure and Evidence is appended hereto for the information of the House.

(For Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence, accompanying said Report, see Appendix to the Journals, No. 6)

One Petition was laid on the Table.

Mr. Jacobs, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented the Fourth and Final Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have examined witnesses and taken evidence respecting the following:—

A payment of \$72,138.39 to A. S. MacMillan, Halifax, in connection with construction work at Bedford Basin, Nova Scotia, as set out at page O-27, Vol. II, of the Auditor General's Report for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1927; and also,

A payment of \$88,989.72 to A. S. MacMillan, Halifax, in connection with the Hudson Bay Expedition, as set out at page O-27, Vol. II, of the Auditor General's Report for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1928; and also,

A payment of \$13,038.50 to S. Cunard & Company, Halifax, in connection with supplies to the Hudson Bay Expedition, as set out at page O-26, Vol. II, of the Auditor General's Report for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1928.

Eleven meetings of your Committee have been held at which meetings twelve witnesses were examined, and the proceedings and evidence adduced therefrom, printed.

Your Committee append herewith a copy of the said evidence for the information of the House.

(For Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence, accompanying said Report, see Appendix to the Journals, No. 7)

On motion of Mr. Brown, it was ordered,—That for the remainder of the session all private bills from the Senate, when received from that House, be read a first and second time, and referred forthwith, and that Standing Order 105 respecting the posting of bills be suspended in reference thereto.

Mr. Cardin, a Member of the King's Privy Council, laid before the House,—Copy of report, dated Vancouver, May 7, 1929, of Judge J. N. Ellis, a Commissioner appointed to inquire whether or not it is in the public interest that trap-nets for the capture of salmon should be authorized in the area in British Columbia that is adjacent to the northern boundary line between Canada and the United States.

“In His Majesty’s name, His Excellency the Governor General doth assent to these Bills.”

Then the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed His Excellency the Governor General as follows:—

“MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

“The Commons of Canada have voted Supplies required to enable the Government to defray certain expenses of the Public Service.

“In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency the following Bill:—

“An Act for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the public service for the financial year ending the 31st March, 1930.

“To which Bill I humbly request Your Excellency’s Assent.”

To this Bill the Clerk of the Senate, by command of His Excellency the Governor General, did thereupon say:—

“In His Majesty’s name His Excellency the Governor General thanks His Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill.”

After which His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to close the Third Session of the Sixteenth Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, with the following Speech:—

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

I desire to express my appreciation of the expedition with which you have conducted the proceedings of the session of parliament now concluded, and of the attention given by you to its exacting duties.

It is gratifying to observe that it has again been possible to effect a further reduction of taxation, and also a substantial reduction in the Public Debt.

The improvement in Canada's financial position has been paralleled by a continuous improvement in the financial position of the Canadian railways and by a steady growth in manufacturing and in domestic and foreign trade. The Acts making provision for another comprehensive program of branch line construction by the two railway systems, for the acquisition by the Canadian National System of certain lines of railway in different provinces, for the construction of adequate terminal facilities at Montreal, for the completion of the Hudson Bay railway and harbour facilities at Fort Churchill, and for further loans to the Harbour Commissioners of our national ports, are indications of your recognition of the urgent demand for more adequate transportation and trade facilities.

The policy of promoting the expansion of trade by assisting the establishment of steamship services abroad has been amply justified. The Canadian National service inaugurated last year to ports in South America has required the addition of more ships than was at first contemplated, and the West Indies service has attracted an increasing export trade. Provision has been made for an increased service to South Africa, also for establishing a new connection with Australia and New Zealand. Provision has also been made for an increase in the number of Trade Commissioners in foreign countries.

Resulting from an exhaustive inquiry and a unanimous report by the Standing Committee of the House of Commons on Agriculture and Colonization, amendments have been made to the Canada Grain Act respecting the storage, shipping, mixing, inspection and grading of grain, which it is believed will more adequately protect the standards of Canadian grain and prove of benefit to the producers.

With a view to the improvement of the existing electoral system, a Special Committee of the House of Commons was appointed to inquire into the Dominion Elections Act and the Corrupt Practices Inquiries Act. After devoting much time and study to the several subjects submitted for its consideration, this Committee also presented a unanimous report, in accordance with the recommendations of which important amendments to the Dominion Elections Act have been enacted. Among other changes introduced by this legislation, provision is made for the future appointment of returning officers by the Chief Electoral Officer, and for a more efficient method of preparing election lists in urban centres.

Among other important measures enacted were Bills respecting pensions to employees of the Canadian National Railways, also amendments to the Narcotic Drug Act, the Fisheries Act, the Insurance Act, and the Juvenile Delinquents Act.

The report of the Royal Commission appointed to inquire into the financial readjustments incidental to a transfer to the Province of Manitoba of its natural resources has been received. The report will be made the basis of negotiations between the governments of the Dominion and the Province with a view to effecting a final agreement.

A Postal Convention has recently been signed whereby the rate of postage between Canada and France has been reduced.

The approval of Parliament has been given to the General Treaty for the Renunciation of War; to the Protocol for the Prohibition of the Use in War of Asphyxiating, Poisonous or other Gases, and of Bacteriological Methods of Warfare, and to the Convention and Protocol between Canada and the United States regarding the Niagara Falls and the Niagara River.
