THE C.P.R. SUEV DIRECT

All its wires in every direction rendered useless. The Canadian Pacific Telegraph Company officials report that the storm has been more disastrous to their system than any they have ever experienced in Ontario.

Early in the morning the demoralization of the railroad wires commenced, and although the telegraphers were busy on the tracks to cause any appreciable delay, traffic on all lines was greatly retarded.

There is little prospect of a general blockade, unless a pronounced cold wave should set in, which would hamper by their contact with the wires of other concerns carrying currents that may prove deadly to the men handling them.

The Canadian Pacific officials are hopeful that they will have communication established this morning. They learned last night that the alternative line to the west by way of the Valley and North Toronto, had been damaged, but that the men they could command at work repairing it.

Between Leaside Junction and Myrtle, on the C.P.R., a distance of 30 miles, 132 poles are broken down. One C.P.R. lineman, whose name was not given, fell from poles twice yesterday. The first time he broke his nose.

The company's main lines withstood the storm. The officials of the Great North-western Telegraph Co. declined to attempt to estimate the damage to their service by the storm.

The break in the Hamilton line was discovered early in the day. It was caused by falling telephone poles. At 10 o'clock the company had an open line to Hamilton, Buffalo and New York.

The wires on the line of the Northern Railway are all down, but the company is not yet worrying about them, as they can be replaced through northern points by way of its lines on the Midland road.

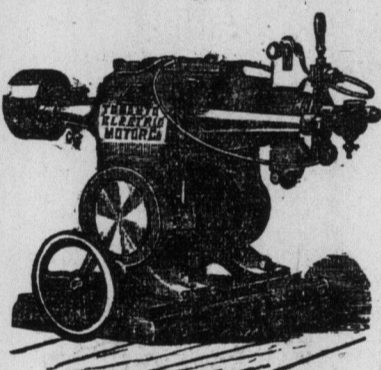

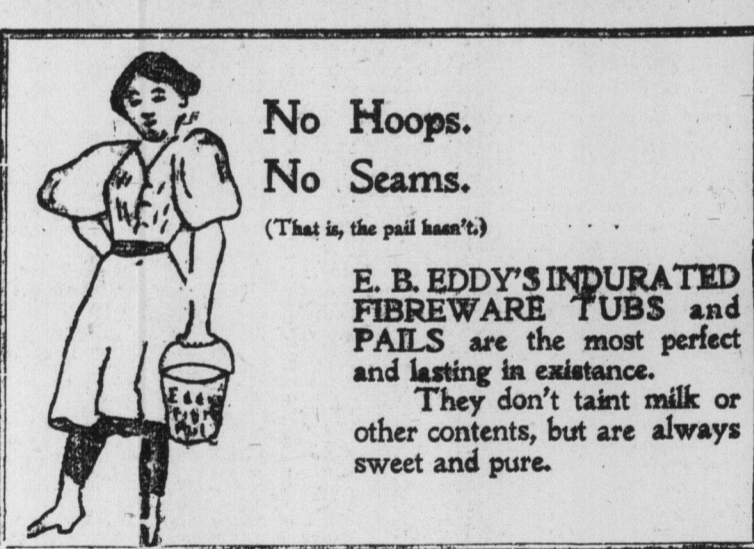

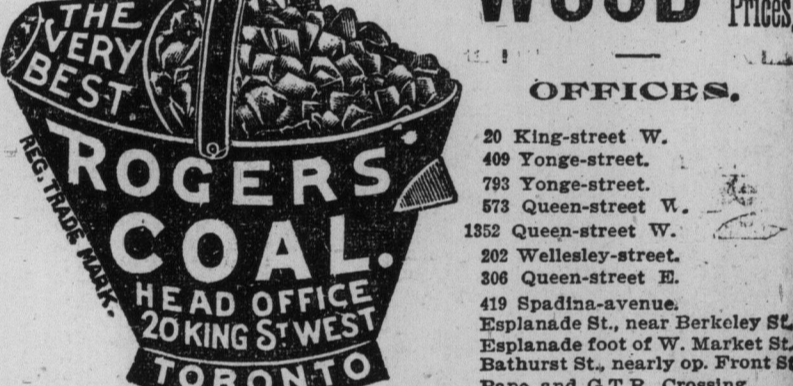
