CITY FATHERS IN SESSION

A SPECIAL MEETING AT WHICH LITTLE WAS ACCOMPLISHED.

Ald. Macdonald's Motion to Bring About a Reduction of Street Railway Fares De- di feated-Information Wanted Concerning the Much-Talked-of Aqueduct Company-Mr. Johnston Petitions for Financial Assistance in His Suit Against the Gas Company.

A special meeting of the City Council was held yesterday afternoon for the pur-pose of dealing with the many notices of motion which the aldermen brought into existence last Monday. It is Mayor Fleming's intention to clear off these notices as far as possible at every meeting of the council. It is His Worship's wish that the aldermen should be pre-pared to deal with their resolutions with-out loss of time.

out loss of time. The meeting yesterday, it is to be hoped, is not a criterion of those that are to fol-low during the year. There was a lot of time wasted in useless talk for which one or two new members are somewhat to blame, although a couple of last year's aldermen had a great deal to say. The absent members were Ald. Spence, who has a severe cold, and Ald. Gowan-lock.

The Railway Agreement stands. The only discussion that amounted to mything was over Ald. Macdonald's mo-tion to authorize the commencement of for the purpose of securing lower fares in consideration of the abolition of the per-centage of the gross receipts which the city now receives. The aldermen were almost unanimous in deciding not to Mn-terfere with the agreement in any way. This is the vote: Mays: Ald Allen, Bell, Burns, Bous-tead, Crane, Davies, Dunn, J. J. Graham, H. Dunn's motion to histruct the City Solicitor to prepare an agreement between the city and the company for the supply of electricity to the citizens. Aid. Dunn explained that in 'moving the resolution, he did so for the purpose of giving the company, if there is one, an opportunity to show that it is in a position to do something. Ald. Scott objected to the city having anything to do with the company until something more was known about it. Aid. McMurrich wished to know if there was a company. He thought the chances of a aqueduct being built were very re-mote.

From the debate which followed it was very clear that the majority of the coun-cli are of the opinion that the aqueduct and its promoters will never amount to anything. STILL ANOTHER REMAND.

The Hyams Twins are Not Yet Out of the Law's Meshes—Ryan Sentenced to Two Years.
