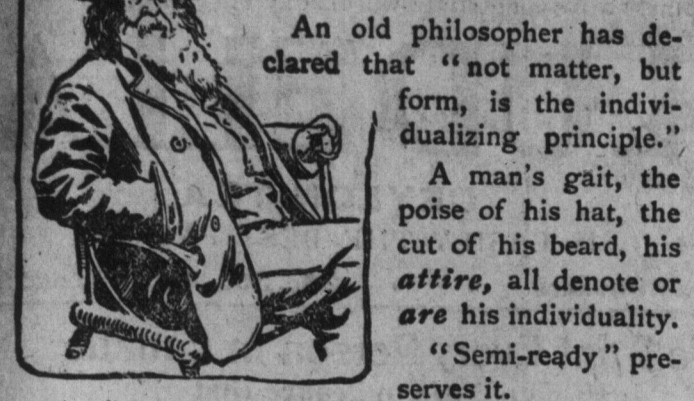

Argonauts v. Hamilton Sept. 29.

Home-and-Home Games for Intermediates and Juniors—New Clubs Admitted.

A meeting of the Ontario Rugby Football Union was held at the Ross House last night for the purpose of arranging the season's schedule, etc. President J. L. Conwell (Hamilton) was in the chair, and the other members present were: Vice-Presidents A. Morgan Shaw (Toronto), R. F. McWilliam (London), D. E. McGuire (Argonauts), W. Henderson (Varsity), F. Hobbs (Wooden), T. L. Church (Toronto), and Secretary J. D. MacArthur. The following resolutions were adopted: The Ontario Rugby Football Union is hereby organized for the season of 1900-1901, and the following clubs are admitted: Excelsior-Shamrocks (Toronto), Queen's Hill, St. John's (London), St. Mary's (Toronto), and Sarnia.

A sub-committee was appointed to look after some applications in reference to residence, as the rules now compel a player to be a resident of a city from July 1 to the end of the season. It was resolved that all clubs must agree to a referee's report, or notify the secretary of their failure.

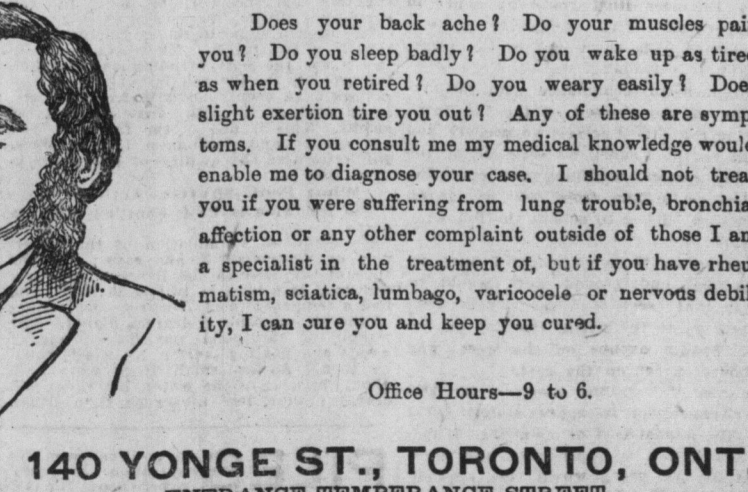

FOUR MONTHS FOR THIS LETTER TO REACH ITS DESTINATION

Ex-Warden Tyrrell Hears From His Son, Mr. James W. Tyrrell, Who is Exploring the District Between Great Slave Lake and Hudson Bay—Dog Food is Scarce.

Winnipeg, Sept. 12.—A letter from his son, Mr. James W. Tyrrell, who is now exploring the Great Slave Lake district for the Government, has just reached the warden's office. The letter, which is full of interest and which has been handed to The World for publication reads as follows:

In Camp, Great Slave Lake, April 30, '00. My Dear Father,—As two dog teams will be returning from my camp to Fort Resolution in a day or so, I must give you a few lines, the first of which will be a letter to the Government.

No Easy Task. Our exploratory work will begin again at Old Fort Reliance, and thence D.V., will extend seven or eight hundred miles some what north of east to Hudson's Bay.

Prospects of the Expedition. Concerning our prospects, I may say that we will probably have all our goods landed at Fort Reliance by the 15th of May, and this being so, we will have two months getting out by open water about the lake, which would of course have been much easier than tramping eleven hundred miles.

For our return trip, next autumn, I have made arrangements with the H. B. Company at Resolution, to meet us with a little steamer on the 15th of September at Reliance, and this will considerably facilitate our return, giving us a lift of over four hundred miles to Fort Smith on the Slave River.
