NATURE MOST KIND.

Brantford, June 7.—(Special)—It is expected that the hay crop in this district this year will be considerably above the average. Things did not look very promising at the beginning of the season, but nature has been most kind since the cold weather left in the matter of beneficial showers. The growth in the clover and timothy during the past few weeks has been immense. The farmers confidently expect that they will show more than ordinary growth.

LIGHT IN ESSEX.

Windsor, June 7.—(Special)—The hay crop for Essex this year promises to be very light. The winter's frost—due to some extent to the condition here in many years—worked as much havoc with the hay as with the fruit. The clover is entirely killed out, so that the hay is practically made of timothy for clover hay this year. Timothy, the most hardy, is looking well in some localities, but nature has not been so kind in the matter of beneficial showers. The loss will be seriously felt, but it will not doubt be offset by the hay crop, cornstalks and ensilage being used largely in the feeding of cattle.

EASTERN ONTARIO HAY CROP.

Cornwall, June 7.—(Special)—This section of Ontario, being dairy country, is also a hay producing district, and large quantities of timothy and clover are grown both for fodder and for export. Farmers who have low flat lands have found by experience that hay is always a safe crop, and that it is particularly true of the surplus at a good figure, a large quantity of pressed hay being exported each year from Lanarkshire to the east side of the province. The recent heavy rains, while they have threatened cereals and roots, have sustained an enormous crop of hay on the high lands as well as the flats. Timothy in many meadows is now over two feet tall; the clover is usually not so difficult in disposing of the surplus at a good figure, a large quantity of pressed hay being exported each year from Lanarkshire to the east side of the province.

LUXURIANT GRASS.

Bellefonte, June 7.—(Special)—A good deal of hay has been marketed in this city during the past week and the price, \$8 per ton, is considered only fair. The prospects for the new hay crop are excellent. In fact, could hardly be better. Meadow and pasture lands are loaded with luxuriant grass, and should nothing unforeseen happen there is good reason to look for a crop which will exceed that of even last year. The cheese board on Saturday was well attended, and the offerings, over 400 boxes, show that milk is going into the factories in large quantities. The ruling price, 8 1/2c, while slightly lower than that of last Saturday, is a change considered, fairly satisfactory.

FAILURE ON LOW GROUND.

Sarnia, June 7.—(Special)—Hay will be a fair average crop in Lambton in spite of the fact that the rains of the past few days have made a wonderful improvement in grass pasture and hay, as well as spring crops. The best of the hay was shipped this week and the farmers have turned their cattle to grass. In Moore Township and Sombra clover is a failure and is being plowed under, but on the higher land in Sarnia it is better and will average well. There has been a good trading market.

THE FRUIT OUTLOOK.

Departmental Cleanings of Crop Prospects Thruout the Dominion. A large number of fruit-crop reports from all parts of Canada have been received at the fruit division, Ottawa, during the past two weeks. The estimates given therein are based chiefly upon the appearance of the fruit buds, and the general condition of the trees and plants, as at the time of writing there was in most cases little else by which to judge. In Prince Edward Island the season was not far enough advanced to report intelligently. The season was winter caused extensive damage, especially in Ontario. Another report will be issued in about ten days, when the amount of bloom will be known.

Apple. Ontario—in the southwestern counties, or so-called "fruit belt," the fall and winter apples all promise a full crop. Western Ontario, generally, also promises a full crop. In the Georgian Bay and Ben Davis, in the Georgian Bay district, Ontario, Baldwins and Spies varieties are mostly killed. In Central Ontario, early varieties will probably yield a full crop; fall varieties a medium crop except Baldwins, which are very promising; winter sorts, a medium full crop.

Quince and Eastern Ontario.—The varieties grown promise medium to good crops, largely Fameuse. Nova Scotia.—Trees are reported in good condition. The season was not so good as last year. The amount of bloom will be known in about ten days.

Plums. Plum trees also suffered from winter killing, and even when the trees survived, the fruit buds were largely killed. There are prospects of a medium crop in Western Ontario, but in the Georgian Bay and Ben Davis, in the Georgian Bay district, Ontario, Baldwins and Spies varieties are mostly killed. In Central Ontario, early varieties will probably yield a full crop; fall varieties a medium crop except Baldwins, which are very promising; winter sorts, a medium full crop.

Cherries. Cherries are promising in Western Ontario but poor in Eastern Ontario and Quebec. In Nova Scotia and British Columbia, medium crops are expected.

Strawberries and Raspberries. Strawberries killed out badly, especially in the Niagara and Essex districts. Raspberries also suffered, but in some parts of Ontario the berries were saved. In the Georgian Bay and Ben Davis, in the Georgian Bay district, Ontario, Baldwins and Spies varieties are mostly killed. In Central Ontario, early varieties will probably yield a full crop; fall varieties a medium crop except Baldwins, which are very promising; winter sorts, a medium full crop.

Red currants are reported good everywhere. The black varieties are nearly a failure in Southwestern Ontario and in the Georgian Bay and Ben Davis, in the Georgian Bay district, Ontario, Baldwins and Spies varieties are mostly killed. In Central Ontario, early varieties will probably yield a full crop; fall varieties a medium crop except Baldwins, which are very promising; winter sorts, a medium full crop.

There are few complaints of insects or fungi so far, especially where spraying has been done regularly for several years. The tent caterpillar, oystercatcher, and the blackberry borer are reported to be present in some parts of Ontario where spraying is not done. The bark beetle, the borer and the pear-blossom weevil are reported to be present in British Columbia, the bark louse, apple, black spot and canker. The first appearance of apple scab in the latter province is also reported, but further observation may not confirm this.
