Troubled Government to Seek Refuge in a Tariff Commission

REFUGEE FOR WOOLLEN INDUSTRY PROTECTION AGAINST "DUMPING" REDUCTION IN COAL OIL DUTY

Features of Budget Speech Made
by Minister of Finance Field-
ing in the Commons.

CONCESSION TO CARRIAGE MAKERS.

Ottawa, June 7.—(Staff Special).—A measure of relief to the woolen industry, a reduction of the duty on coal oil, a concession to the carriage manufacturers and provisions for the protection of the Canadian market against "dumped" goods were the distinguishing features of the budget speech delivered by Hon. W. S. Fielding today.

In a few other particulars the tariff has been revised, but the revision is on the whole colorless, and is remarkable more for its attention to detail than for any change of principle or policy. The government still appears to be undecided on the tariff question. To remove the doubts, and uncertainties that for the moment tie its hands it will appoint a tariff commission. On this point the minister of finance was strangely indefinite, but his language justifies the inference that a tariff commission will be busy investigating the industrial situation in the near future.

Concessions Granted.

Reduced to plain fact the concessions granted during the budget are as follows: Woolen goods, which, under the preferential tariff are now subject to a duty of 23 1/2 per cent, will henceforth enjoy protection of 20 per cent. This increase of the tariff will not apply to blankets, flannels, bed comforters and counterpanes, which will continue to enter Canada under a duty of 23 1/2 per cent.
Twine and cordage (excepting binder twine), which is now subject to a duty of 23 1/2 per cent, is to be protected to the extent of 20 per cent.
The duty on coal oil is reduced from 5 cents to 2 1/2 cents a gallon. Crude petroleum will be reduced from 10 cents to 5 cents a gallon. The duty on 1 1/2 cents a gallon will be paid to producers of petroleum.
The carriage manufacturers are accorded a concession in a long-desired revision of the tariff fixing the minimum value of imported carriages under the preferential tariff. Scrub horses are excluded. The duty on silk for neckwear is reduced to 15 per cent, and on chinaware to 15 per cent, and on window glass to 7 1/2 per cent.
Printing presses not made in Canada, linen machinery, well-made machinery, artificial teeth, well-made machinery, artificial gold mine machinery and goats are placed on the free list.

That Special Duty.

To protect the Canadian market against "dumped" goods, the minister decided to impose a special duty equal to the difference between the price of the goods in the United States and the price charged in Canada. The case of iron this special duty is not to exceed 15 per cent, and in case of other goods shall not exceed 50 per cent.
By this special duty the government proposes to deprive United States manufacturers of the right of selling in the Canadian market of this country. It is an expedient which the government has employed in preference to raising the tariff all along the line. How it will work in actual operation is a matter of doubt. The main purpose is to work on the stump where it will be used as the answer to every charge that the government has not protected Canadian industries against unfair competition in the United States.
It was noticeable that Mr. Fielding had the question of "protection" very gingerly. As one Conservative member put it, the "minister of finance used the tongue in dealing with high tariff." He threw it in by way of pointing out that the first signs of serious industrial depression occurred in the United States, and that, in the United States, the tariff was the cause of the depression. Mr. Fielding's speech was on the whole free from any strong expression of opinion either in favor of raising or protection or of the glories of free trade. The fact seems to be that the government is still guessing for light on the tariff question, and has no intention of getting the light until it has gone through another general election.

Not a Principle.

Mr. Bell of Preston in dealing with Mr. Fielding's argument emphasized the fact that the government had no principle to declare on the tariff question. He did his best to draw the fire of the ministerial benches in this respect, but it is not likely that he will be accommodated.
The government will suspend any declaration of fixed principle on the tariff question until the tariff commission reports. And that will be some time after the government has risked a battle at the polls. It is an expression of the government's policy. Fielding advocated a maximum, minimum and preferential tariff. The maximum tariff would apply to countries like the United States with hostile tariffs, the minimum tariff to countries with friendly tariffs and the preferential tariff to Great Britain and such colonies as care to come in under its provisions.
Mr. Fielding spoke with his usual energy and clearness, and closed out his budget speech in exactly two hours and ten minutes. He had perfect control of himself throughout, and he executed the task of turning delicate corners with conspicuous tact and ability.

Mr. Bell reviewed the budget speech at considerable length. He brought out a number of facts highly damaging to the government's contention that it is responsible for all of Canada's prosperity and none of its ills.

Still We Are Prosperous.
Mr. Fielding began by congratulating the house on the continuance of the prosperity that Canada has enjoyed for years.

TARIFF RESOLUTION.

Ottawa, June 7.—(Staff Special).—The following are the tariff resolutions:
That it is expedient to amend "The Customs Tariff, 1897," to the following effect:

Notwithstanding anything contained in schedule D, the minimum duty on the undermentioned articles shall be as follows:
Manufacturers described in item 394 of schedule A (excepting blankets, flannels, bed comforters and counterpanes), composed wholly or in part of wool, worsted, the hair of the alpaca, goat or other like animal, 20 per cent, ad valorem.
Twine and cordage of all kinds, N.E.S., 20 per cent, ad valorem.
Notwithstanding anything contained in schedule D, the maximum duty on the undermentioned articles when imported under the British preferential tariff shall be as follows:
Tableware of china, porcelain or other clay, 15 per cent, ad valorem.
Common and colorless window glass, 7 1/2 per cent, ad valorem.
The words "pails and tubs of wood" shall be omitted from item 330 of schedule A.

Item 223 of schedule A shall be amended by adding the following:

"Provided that the minimum value of an open buggy shall be forty dollars and the minimum value of a covered buggy shall be fifty dollars."

Schedule C shall be amended by adding the following: "642, Stallions and mares of less value than fifty dollars each."

Item 203 of schedule A shall be repealed and the following substituted therefor: "203, plate glass not beveled, in sheets or panes not exceeding seven square feet each, N.O.P., 10 per cent, ad valorem. 203 A, plate glass not beveled, in sheets or panes exceeding seven square feet each, N.O.P., 25 per cent, ad valorem."

Duties on the undermentioned articles shall be reduced as follows:
Silk fabrics when imported by manufacturers of men's neckwear for use exclusively in their manufacture of such goods in their own factories under regular orders to be made by the minister of customs, 10 per cent, ad valorem.

Items 221, 170, 171, 172, 173, 175 and 178 of schedule A shall be repealed and the following substituted: 221, Paraffine wax candles, 25 per cent, ad valorem. 151, Paraffine wax, 25 per cent, ad valorem. 170, Illuminating oils composed wholly or in part of the products of petroleum, coal, shale or lignite, costing more than thirty cents per gallon, 20 per cent, ad valorem. 171, Lubricating oils, composed wholly or in part of petroleum, costing less than twenty-five cents per gallon, 2 1/2 cents per gallon. 172, Crude oil petroleum, gas oils (other than benzine and gasoline), 40 cents per gallon. 173, Oil, coal and kerosene distilled, purified or refined naphtha and petroleum and products of petroleum, N.E.S., 2 1/2 cents per gallon. 175, Lubricating oils, N.E.S., and axle grease, 20 per cent, ad valorem. 178, Vaseline and all similar preparations of petroleum for toilet, medicinal or other purposes, 25 per cent, ad valorem.

Molasses, the product of any British colony included in the benefits of the British preferential tariff, in the original package in which it was placed at the point of production and not afterwards subjected to any process of treating or mixing, shall be free of duty. The package also to be free. Provided, however, that this shall not apply to molasses to be used for the purpose of distillation.

The following articles now dutiable shall be transferred to the free list:

Goats, for the improvement of stock, under such regulations as may be made by the minister of customs.
Wet-rolled photographic plates, baryta coated for albumenizing or sensitizing.
Hydro-fluo-silic acid.
Glass cut for the manufacture of dry plates for photographic purposes, imported by the manufacturer of such dry plates for use exclusively in the manufacture thereof in their own factories.
Farming cultures to be used in butter making.
Printing press of a class or kind not made in Canada.

Machinery of a class or kind not made in Canada for the manufacture of brass goods, such as mentioned in item 422, schedule B.

Well-drilling machinery and apparatus of a class or kind not made in Canada for drilling for water and oil, not to include motive power.

Artificial teeth.
Quassia juice, crude petroleum, fuel and gas oils, 40 beaume gravity or less, at sixty degrees temperature (Dot 8233), specific gravity.
The free admission of machinery and appliances of a kind not made in Canada for use exclusively in alluvial gold mining, authorized by section 4 of chapter 15 of the acts of 1903, shall be continued until the first day of July, 1905.

The following proviso shall be added to sub-section A of item 7 of schedule A: Provided that bottles and flasks and packages of gum, resin, whiskey and brandy, of all kinds and imitations thereof, shall be held to contain the following quantities (subject to the provisions for addition or deduction in respect to the degree of strength): viz.: Bottles or flasks containing not more than one gallon per dozen, and packages containing not more than two gallons per dozen, and bottles, flasks and packages containing over two gallons per dozen and not more than 3 1/2 gallons per dozen, shall be 40 beaume gravity or less.

Item 422 of schedule B, the free list, shall be repealed and the following substituted: 422, Philosophical and scientific apparatus, utensils, instruments and preparations, including boxes and bottles containing the same, of a class or kind not manufactured in Canada, when specially imported for use by the government or by order of any college, academy, school or seminary of learning in Canada, and not for sale, subject to such regulations as the minister of customs shall prescribe.

The dumping clause. That whenever it shall appear to the satisfaction of the minister of customs or of any officer of customs authorized to collect customs duties, that the export price or the actual selling price of the imported goods in Canada is less than the fair market value of such goods, as determined according to the basis of value for duty provided in the customs act in respect of imported goods subject to ad valorem duty, such article shall in addition to the duty, otherwise established, be subject to a special duty of customs equal to the difference between the fair market value and the actual selling price. Provided, however, that the fair market value and the actual selling price shall be determined in respect of the article, except in regard to the articles mentioned in items 224, 225, 228 and 231 of schedule A, the special duty of customs on which shall not exceed 15 per cent, ad valorem. The expression "export price" or "selling price" for the goods, shall be held to mean and include the price for the shipment from the place whence exported directly to Canada.

The foregoing provisions respecting a special duty or customs shall apply to imported goods rolled wire rods not over three-eighths of an inch in diameter, notwithstanding that such rods are on the customs free list. Provided, however, that the special duty of customs on such wire rods shall not exceed 15 per cent, ad valorem.

If at any time it shall appear to the satisfaction of the government-in-council, on a report from the minister of customs, that the payment of the special duty herein provided for is being evaded by the shipment of goods on consignment without sale prior to such shipments, the government-in-council may in any case or class of cases authorize such action as is deemed necessary to collect on such goods or any of them the same special duty as if the goods had been sold to an importer in Canada prior to their shipment to Canada.

If the full amount of any special duty of customs be not paid on goods imported, the customs entry thereof shall be amended and the deficiency paid upon the demand of the collector of customs. The minister of customs may make such regulations as are deemed necessary for carrying out the provisions of the foregoing sections and for the enforcement thereof.

The special duty mentioned in the preceding sections shall not apply to goods of a class subject to exercise duty in Canada, nor to imported goods entered for consumption prior to the eighth day of June, 1904.

That it is expedient to provide that there shall be paid out of the consolidated revenue a bounty of one and a half cents per gallon on all crude petroleum produced from wells in Canada on and after the 8th day of June, 1904.

That the minister of trade and commerce may make such regulations as is necessary respecting the payment of the said bounty.

STANDARD OIL COMPANY MASTERS OF SITUATION THRU TARIFF CHANGES

Oil Business in Canada Threatened
With Annihilation—Imminence
of General Elections In-
dicated by Budget
Speech.

Ottawa, June 7.—(Special).—The woolen men are pleased with the budget speech, but they are not noticeably optimistic. They say that 30 per cent, is a negligible measure of protection, especially in view of the fact that, under the preferential tariff of 23 1/2 per cent, British woolen manufacturers have established themselves firmly in Canada, and do not propose to be driven out.

There is only one opinion in regard to the cut in the coal oil duties and the admission of crude petroleum free of duty. The effect of this interference with the oil duties will, in all probability, wipe out the oil business in Canada and make the Standard Oil Company absolute masters of the situation. The granting of 1 1/2 cents a gallon bounty on crude petroleum is regarded as a poor compensation for the loss of the oil business in Canada.

What Came It.
The revision of the oil duties is primarily due to the influence of Hon. C. Sifton, and incidentally to Lambton's glaring indiscretion in electing an opponent of the government in the bye-election last winter. Lambton's one great sin was the Standard Oil Company, to whom the Standard is now definitely and finally closed.

The carriage manufacturers are in a state of great excitement. They are on the side of the industry, members who felt that this industry had no special reason for complaint. It was, in fact, generally admitted, until within the past three or four days, that the carriage manufacturers would receive no concession.

What the tariff revision means politically is a great deal clearer than what it means to the industry. It indicates the imminence of the general elections. The budget speech indicated the imminence of the general elections. The budget speech indicated the imminence of the general elections.

It is significant that a tariff commission is to be appointed, thus giving encouragement to the manufacturers who demand further protection, and at the same time giving the government a means of curbing the discontent of some of the most violent complainants. It reconciles prominent Liberals engaged in the woolen industry and in the manufacture of carriages. It creates peace where there was the gravest danger of rebellion. A large number of fruit-crop reports from all parts of Canada have been received at the fruit division, Ottawa during the past two weeks. The estimates given therein are based chiefly upon the appearance of the fruit buds and the general condition of the trees.

and pints, as at the time of writing there was in most cases little else which to judge. In Prince Edward land the season was not far enough advanced to report intelligently. The severe winter caused extensive damage especially in Ontario. Another report will be issued in about ten days, when the season is further advanced.

Apples. Ontario.—In the southwestern counties, or so-called "fruit belt," early fall and winter apples all promise medium to full crop. Western Ontario generally is expected to give a medium to full crop of early varieties, a medium crop of the fall apples, and at least an average yield of Russets, Greens

and Ben Davis. In the Georgian Bay district Ontarios, Baldwins and Spencers all suffered badly from frost and tender varieties are mostly killed. In Central Ontario, early varieties will probably yield a full crop; fall varieties a medium crop, except Fameuse, which is very promising: winter sorts, a medium full crop.

Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick reports indicate severe injuries by frost. Early pears in these provinces are likely to be a fair crop, and the later varieties will probably be a failure.

Peaches.

Last winter was a disastrous one for peach growers in all parts of Canada.

Plums.

A fair crop of grapes seems to be expected in all sections where they are raised. In the north a medium crop in Western Ontario, but in the rest of the province only native plums and such hardy varieties as the Burbank and Abundance will yield a crop. Nova Scotia and British Columbia both report prospects fair for a medium crop.

grown to any extent. Tender varieties and in the more northerly latitude nearly all varieties, were badly winter killed.

Cherries.

Cherries are promising in Western Ontario, but poor in Eastern Ontario and Quebec. In Nova Scotia and British Columbia, medium crops are expected.

Strawberries and Raspberries.

Strawberries killed out badly, especially in the Niagara and Essex districts. Raspberries also suffered, both from frost and from heavy snow, which broke the canes. Both raspberries and strawberries are likely to be light in the Ontario fruit belt, and medium in the other provinces, except British Columbia, which promises nearly a full crop.

Currents.
Red currants are reported good everywhere. The black varieties are nearly a failure in Southwestern Ontario and only fair in the Annapolis Valley, N.S.; other reports indicate an average.

Spraying.
There are few complaints of insects or fungi so far, especially where spraying has been done.

ing has been done regularly for several years. The tent caterpillar, oyster shell bark louse and green aphids are reported bad in some parts of Ontario where spraying is not done. The bark louse, the borer and the pear-leaf blight are mentioned in New Brunswick and in British Columbia the bark louse, aphids, black spot and canker. The first appearance of apple scab in the latter

province is also reported, but further observation may not confirm this.

WEEK BEFORE MARRIAGE

His Father Lives in Hamilton—Law-suit Started Over the Gurney Estate.

ALL READY TO SERVE

ANGLICANS ASK \$100,000 FOR MISSIONS NEXT YEAR

First Day of Synod Sees Little Work Done—Bishop Would Bond Congregations.

Yesterday morning the incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Toronto met in the school house of All Saints' Church. The business of the day as scheduled was hardly begun when the session was closed. Before formal business began the delegates attended communion service. The bishop's charge began by an affecting reference to those of the diocesan clergy who had retired from their labors since last year's meeting of the synod, including the late primate. Resuming, the bishop noted the increases in the diocese during the last quarter of a century, the rise and progress of missionary activity and the advance in the church educational establishments. In regard to his own work Bishop Sweatman referred to his organization of the records of the bishop's office, his action in the committee on the consolidation of the church, and his duties as chairman of the board of examiners of Trinity College, and to the plan of the departments of church work which he was connected. The charge concluded by recommending the synod to endorse a proposal to bond congregations to pay their ministers.

Rev. Charles L. Ingles, Parkdale, was elected clerical secretary, C. Egerton Ryerson, lay secretary, and Edgar Kemp secretary-treasurer. Nominations of clerical and lay members to the executive committee were then taken. The election will take place to-day.

Money for Missions. Provo Macklin presented the report of the missionary society, which stated that of the sum of \$73,000 asked for last year \$72,646 had been subscribed, seven dioceses subscribing less than their allotted proportions and thirteen more. The funds had been distributed, \$48,223 for Canadian missions; \$23,718 for foreign missions, and \$751.39 towards expense account, leaving a small balance. The Canadian dioceses asked for the distribution were Algoma, Athabasca, Calgary, Columbia, Keewatin, Kootenay, Mackenzie River, Moosehide, New Westminster, Qu'Appelle, Rupert's Land, Saskatchewan and Selkirk, while the foreign fields were Japan, China, South America, Palestine, Persia, Africa, and India. At the autumn meeting of the board of management Rev. H. R. A. Haslam, B.A., was accepted as secretary, and Mr. T. J. Kelly as clerk, and will be sent out shortly.

For next year the sum of \$100,000 was asked, of which Toronto would be expected to supply \$22,000.

In seconding the adoption of the report Hon. S. R. Blake, referring to Toronto's failure last year to come up to expectations, said that the amount asked, \$17,000, was a large one, and that it was Toronto that had set the pace by undertaking to raise such a large amount. As Dr. Tucker has intimated a desire to address the synod on the subject of missions, the debate was deferred till to-day.

Cause for Discussion. A prolonged debate which occupied all the rest of the afternoon took place over a report of the executive on certain alterations in the business program of the synod. It was finally decided that there should be a service on Tuesday at 11 o'clock to consist of morning prayer, followed by holy communion, and the bishop's charge. The synod also passed an amendment moved by Principal Sheraton to the effect that the executive committee shall appoint such part of the session as they deem advisable for the consideration of such questions as are usually discussed at church congresses.

A motion made by F. E. Hodgins, K.C., dispensing with the necessity of confirmation in amending certain clauses of the constitutional canon, and making effectual the vote of a simple majority in all cases was carried, and the bishop's charge was deferred till to-day.
