That Special Duty.

To protect the Canadian market against "dumped" goods it has been decided to impose a special duty equal to the difference between the price charged in, say the United States the price charged in Canada. In the case of iron this special duty is not to exceed 15 per cent., and in case of all other goods shall not exceed 50 per

By this special duty the governme proposes to deprive United States manufacturers of the joy of making a slaughter market of this country. It is an expedient which the governmen has employed in preference to advanc-ing the tariff all along the line. How ing the tariff all along the line. How it will work in actual operation is a matter of doubt. Its main purpose is to work on the stump where it-will be used as the answer to every charge that the government has not protect-ed Canadian industries against un-fair competition in the United States. It was noticeable that Mr. Fielding handled the guestion of protection handled the question of protection very gingerly. As one Conservative member put it, the "minister of finance used the tongs in dealing with high tariff." He threw it down mildly by pointing out that the first signs of serious industrial depression occurred in the United States, the most highly protected country in the world. From this he drew the somewhat indefinite conclusion that protection is not a sure safeguard against adversity. Mr. Fielding's speech was on the whole free from any strong expression of opinion either in regard to the evil of protection or the glories of free trade. protection or the glories of free trade. The fact seems to be that the gov-ernment is still guessing for light on the tariff question, and has no inten-tion of getting the light until it has gone thru another general election. Not a Principle.

Mr. Bell of Pictou in dealing with Mr. Fielding's argument emphasized the fact that the government had no principle to declare on the tariff ques-tion. He did his best to draw the fire of the ministerial benches in this re-spect, but it is not likely that he will be accommodated.

be accommodated. The government will suspend any declaration of fixed principle on the tariff question until the tariff com-mission reports. 

# THE BUDGET SPEECH.

The leading feature of the financial statement is the announcement that the preferential tariff is to be abandoned, or at least entirely re-cast. The objection made to the present system is that it is not sufficiently elastic, and that it prevents the government from dealing with special cases. For instance, the preference brought the duty on tweeds, overcoatings and certain other manufactures of wool down to 231 per cent., that is, two-thirds of 35 per cent. This minimum tariff will be increased at present to 30 per cent. In the case of tableware, china, etc., the preference will be increased and the minimum duty lowered from 20 to 15 per cent.

These and other changes are apparently only temporary expedients. The plan of the government, to be worked out by a commission, is to have three tariffs : a maximum for countries whose tariffs are extremely high : a medium or ordinary tariff for low tariff countries ; and the preferential tariff for Great Britain and her colonies. The oil question will be settled for the present by reducing the duty on refined oil to 21 will be settled for the present by reducing the duty on reduces of crude oil. cents a gallon and giving a bounty of 1½ cents to producers of crude oil. A special duty will be imposed on "dumped" goods. The tariff bears all the evidences of a careful study of public opinion,

and especially of a desire to placate the weollen manufacturers, and to get the oil question out of the way. The commission, when appointed by the government, will give us three tariffs instead of two-one for enemies, one for neutrals and one for friends of Canada. We judge from Mr. Fielding's remarks that the idea of a percentage preference will be abandoned and the tariff arranged to meet the circumstances of each particular case.
