Valuable Suggestion From Canada's

A: W. Donly, commercial agent for Canada in Mexico, writes to the executive of the Canadian National Exhibition: "In this connection, in view of the efforts being made by both the Canadian and Mexican governments to develop trade between the two countries and to become better acquainted, one with the other, do you not think that it would be advisable to procure that an invitation be extended either by the exhibition company, or, better still, by the Canadian government, asking that a Mexican government, asking that a Mexican exhibit might be sent to Toronto this coming fall? 

From Dunn-avenue to Dowling-avenue there is private residential property, and it is intended to swing the wall out from Spenceravenue to the end of the water lots at Indian-road at least 400 feet. This distance may be carried west to the Humber.




