OTTAWA, Nov. 24 .- (Special.)-"The statements of Fred Ward, manager in England of the Commercial Cable Company, published in the Canadian press, are devoid of accuracy and entirely misleading," said Sir Sandford Fleming to The World to-night.

"Mr. Ward states for example that there is a loss of £65,000 or \$320,000 a vear on the Pacific Cable. I can give this an emphatic denial on the authority of the accounts laid before the parliament of the United Kingdom by the Pacific cable board. Each year there has been an excess of earnings over expenditure, this excess having ranged from \$125,000 to \$278,000 a year. This surplus is regularly employed to reduce and pay off the original capi-tal expenditure connected with the establishment of the joint state undertaking. Our own auditor-general con-firms the fact that this highly importfirms the fact that this highly important work is in a prosperous condition; that the revenue from traffic not only meets all current expenses, but yields a surplus which already discharges half the annuity, designed to pay off in a fixed term of years the whole borrowed capital and at the same time provide a reserve fund to renew the

PORT AU PRINCE, Nov. 24.—The revolutionary movement against President Nord Alexis is spreading.

Deceased was a native of Leitrim County, Ireland, and came to this country at the age of eighteen, in the year 1869. He leaves a widow (sister of the late ex-Alderman John Irwin of this city) and six sons, John. William and Robert, of Port Credit; Henry and Irwin of Toronto, and Ellett of Niagara, Falls, Ont. The funeral will take place Thursday afternoon at 2.30 p.m. to Prospect Cemetery.

The Town of Aquin and Jeremie have both declared against the government. The Gunboat Croyant, which has fallen into the hands of the rebels, encountered the Gunboat Centenaire off Jeremie and a number of shots were exchanged.

Gen. Ieconte, the minister of the interior, who went out at the head of a government force against the rebels, was taken prisoner, and late advices received here apparently confirm the report of his execution. He was captured near Jeremie, together with his escort after a short struggle. The Town of Aquin, it is reported, has been pillaged by the revolutionary troops.



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

MONTREAL, Nov. 24.—(Special.)—The total exports of live stock from the port of Montreal for the season of 1908 were 19 330 cattle, 10,111 sheep and 104 horses. These figures, as compared with those of last year, show an increase of 2353 cattle, a decrease of 1474 sheep and a decrease of 70 horses. The increase in cattle is accounted for by the large movement of Canadian Northwest ranch stock, as the exports of American cattle for the season were only 10,398 head, which figures show a decrease of 9702, compared with 1907. The decrease in the sheep shipments is due to the fact that the markets abroad were in bad condition all season on account of the heavy exports from the United States and the large arrivals of chilled and frozen mutton from other sources.






