COBALT, July 21.—(Special.)—Much has been said and written about the Cobalt silver properties in regard to their surface indications: of silver found at the surface in big veins and blasted from there down amid the rock, the ore packed into bags, sent away to the smelters and immense values returned to the owners, some of them yielding as much as \$5000 to the ton. But that is hardly mining, and I am glad to say it is no longer characteristic of Cobalt. The camp has now many mines where mining in its true and significant sense is carried on: with engines to work compressor outfits for drilling into the rock and to run hoists that go down and up shafts (some now over 300 feet deep) of drifts and tunnels, winzes and up-raises, of galleries over a thousand feet in length, of mills to grind or concentrate the ore, and, soon to be, of plants for collecting the silver by various mechanical or soon to be, of plants for collecting the silver by various mechanical or chemical processes. I spent half a day in exploring the underground workings of one of these mines and it certainly was a revelation. It is for this underground work that all the fine plants and buildings that you now see dotting the Cobalt hillsides have been installed, erected, put in commission at so great a cost. What impresses the visitor now is no longer the "silver sidewalks," as they call the surface deposits of the white metal, but these great big plants and stacks visible in so many directions, with their columns of black smoke. Men who know mining and who come from all over to see the wonders of Cobalt take readily to these more important indications of substantial value. For they all want to know if there is deep mining, if the veins and values hold as you go down, if the thing is likely to last, That is why I wish-

So I selected a mine for inspection that would throw light in this regard, the Temiskaming. A year and more ago I met a London mining engineer who had been sent out to report on the camp, and, after he had spent several weeks there he told me how much he thought of it and how he had been impressed more than by anything else by what he saw at depth (then over two hundred feet) in the Temiskaming They will take out values there for many years, he said. So he said of

The Temiskaming has had a history and it is to-day a mine. One man has stood by it, staked his all in it, watched it, worked for it when more showy prospects were getting all the attention of the public and capitalists. The story of E. Burr Cartwright and Temiskaming would make a story of itself. But I cannot tell it now. But it's the story of the making of a mine at depth, and as such it is one of the

mainstays of the Cobalt legend. Temiskaming is now down over three hundred feet; it has thou-

sands of feet of tunnels and drifts, and, as a consequence, immense quantities of ore blocked out or in the process of blocking out.

Let us go down the shaft, which is now down over 300 feet, with two separate hoists and drums and a clear space between for the laddering. The hoisting plant above ground is carried by an open steel tower resting on concrete bases, steel instead of timber and, consequently, stronger, and yet as I learned not costing so much as wood, it is certainly the best looking and most finished hoisting plant in the camp. The engines are so powerful, the cables so strong, and the work so well finished that you drop the two hundred feet to the first landing level in less than ten seconds; you hardly realize that you have started before you are stepping out into one of the tunnels, which radiate in several directions. You have a couple of condes in your hand; the mine foremen You have a couple of candles in your hand; the mine foreman Mr. J. R. McVichie has a handy little tool that both picks the ore or carries a candle or hangs it on the wall, and under his guidance we begin to explore the passages. None of these tunnels are less than eight feet high and eight feet across; they are all in solid rock and they run straight either to catch a vein or in every direction where it is neessary to follow. The air is fresh and cool, the rough overclothing is comfortable, little water is encountered, there are no fumes. The exploration is comparatively easy and enjoyable. We saw vein after vein, free silver in sight verywhere, and such ore tho not showing the metal so clear indicated it still more markedly by its weight. We could break it off the veins and off the walls. are thus employed underground let alone what are told off for other And then, after we had explored these well-ordered galleries, we came to a further sinking of the shaft and getting into a bucket we were lowered fifty feet, and then by ladders down another fifty feet, to the three hundred-foot level. And still the rich ores were everywhere in sight. But none of the men were actually mining ore, they were opening up the mine so that mining in the full sense of breaking down ore and shipping it up above as such could be done later on. When I was there they were breaking down rock and ore and sending it up, but only so as to get their tunnels in position and their values located, so that later on it could be taken out in the most advantageous way. They will leave and pass big values if it in-

volves any delay in getting the tunnels driven. And all the energy, all the well-organized resources of this mine are directed to this end. For this reason the dividends have been suspended, not that the mine could not pay dividends out of the stuff it had to remove in getting the shafts sunk, the tunnels run, but that. the management had decided to use the surrous that was left, after wages and expences, for the erection of an enormous mill and concentrator plant that is now planned and underway, and which will be running within six months. # RECORD

With One Passenger Keeps Aeroplane in Air Over Hour and is Congratulated by President Taft

WASHINGTON, July 27. - The world's aeroplane record for two men, as to both time and distance, was broken this evening, in a beautiful flight of one hour, twelve minutes and forty seconds, upwards of 50 miles and at a speed averaging about 40 miles an hour, by Orville Wright at Fort Meyer, with Lieut. Frank P. Lahm, of the

army signal corps, as passenger, The former record was made last year by his brother, Wilbur, joint inventor with him of the machine in which both achievements were performed, at Lemans, France, with Prof. Painleve, of the French institute, as passenger. The flight was one hour, nine minutes and 31 seconds. Wilbur was an eager spectator of to-day's flight by his brother. "You just scotched your brother's record without really damaging it much," remarked a newspaper man to Orville, after the

"That's all we meant to do," replied Orville, with a smile, which his big brother appreciatively duplicated.

Taft Heads Cheering.

The cheering which heralded the setting of a new mark in the conquest of the air, was led by President Taft, who had sat, an interested spectator thruout the flight, and who insisted at its conclusion upon personally congratulating the brothers upon their success. The success was all-important to the Wrights in that it completed the first of two crucial tests of their many to the Wrights in that it completed the first of two crucial tests of their machine imposed upon them by the United States government, the so-called "endurance test" which required them to remain one hour continuously in the air with one passenger. Orville did nearly thirteen minutes better than that, and could have kept on indefinitely, three hours and a half, the limit imposed by the gasoline capacity

Thousands of people crowding the water front saw the fall and for nearly half an hour they were kept in suspense, not knowing whether the daring aeronaut had met death or had again been rescued from the water.

A flock of large and small craft raced to the scene of the disaster and a pinnace from the British battleship Russell picked up the unlucky five. Russell picked up the unlucky fives and put him aboard the French torpedo boat destroyer Escopette. After a surgeon had attended to his injuries the destroyer brought Latham ashore and he was taken to the Lord Warden hotel. His face was damaged and bleeding and his nose was broken. The machine, badly wrecked, was hoisted from the boat to the dock.

Speedier Than Bieriot.

Latham's flight to the moment of its sensational finish in some respects eclipsed Bleriot's. He made greater speed, being only twenty minutes in the air from the time he left the coast of France. Apparently he steered a straighter course than Bleriot, as he was making directly for Dover when

The disastrous ending of the flight furnished a dramatic scene. Shortly before six o'slock the clamor of sirent and bells in the harbor notified the town that another channel crossing was to be attempted. In a marvel-ously short time the water front, piers and cliffs were crowded. Soon two French torpedo boats which preceded

Fourteen minutes after six an air-ship was discerned heading straight for the centre of the town. The da-pidity of its flight was evidenced by larger and assumed birdlike outlines. Suddenly it began to slacken speed. at the same time gliding towards the surface of the ocean. It fluttered a few times and fell like a wounder

eagle. It was nearly 8 o'clock when the Escopette came alongside the Prince of Wales pier to land Latham and his machine, which was seen to be much larger than Bleriot's little flyer.

The crew of the Escopette said that the destroyer was ten miles from Calasis when Latham started and he over-

took them in a quarted of an hour.

and thousands of dump material that will, when put thru the new concentrating mills, give \$50 to the ton. This dump is so large that handling many tons ay the new concentrator will never be able to catch up if the men are as productive as they are to-day. Mr. Cartwright and the mine manager calculate that at least half a million dollars of silver is in this dump. The mine is doing all this work out of its own resources, encountered in the development work, building the big new mill, paying everything, borrowing no money. And yet speculators use the suspension of the dividends to bear the value of the shares of this property. Not that I do not think the management made a mistake when they started to pay dividends when they had so much work 'to do. Only close corporations or a phenomenal run of pure silver can justify such methods, and Crown Reserve happens to be one. The way that property has paid its debt for purchase, has put in and is putting in a fine big plant, for spot cash, is paying all expenses of all kinds and paying out 36 per cent, dividends, not to say royalties, is one of the surprising marvels of the camp. In 1910 Temiskaming ought to be paying dividends in the same way.

So much for what I saw underground and what it implies. I came up the shaft after three hours below none the worse for my trip. I then had time to have a look at the new concentrator under process of construction, to see the splendid quarters of the men, the ore house and the dump. It's the dump that is, after all, the most impressive.

In the immediate neighborhood are Badger, Beaver, Cochrane, all about to make good by methods similar to those of the Temiskaming. 


