TEN YEARS FOR TOMPKINS FOR ATTEMPTED HOLD-UP Hamilton and Guelph Junction Railway in Operation This Year - Engineers in Session.

HAMILTON, July 27.—(Special).—Mark Tompkins was sent down for ten years by Judge Monk this morning for clubbing and attempting to hold up Fred Fortescue. He pleaded guilty, and the judge said that if it were not for the prisoner's wife and babe he would have made the sentence heavier. He pointed out that Tompkins had served two terms already, being sentenced to twelve years for assaulting and robbing Jack Cauley. The prisoner pleaded guilty by the advice of his lawyer, as he had when sentenced to twelve years. On both occasions he demurred and criticized his lawyer for giving such advice. Edward Hughes, counsel for Tompkins, was fined \$50 for assaulting William Buswell, and John Wintermute went down for a month for stealing Martin Cleworth's boots.

It's the dump that is, after all, the most impressive. In the immediate neighborhood are Badger, Beaver, Cochrane, all about to make good by methods similar to those of the Temiskaming. These mines are four to five miles from the Kerr Lake Road from the town, are more south than the town, and getting close to the northern bound of the Gillies limit. But due south of the Temiskaming is the great acreage of the Pan-Silver, also a Cartwright proposition, but in its shafts and tunnels, it also made good. They must have big values at depth, and when they are struck it will be no ordinary affair. And this modern kind of deep underground mining is now characteristic of the whole camp: La Rose, Niasing, O'Brien, Buffalo, McKinley-Darragh, Trethewey, Colnager, Right Way, Central, Kerr Lake, Crown Reserve, and a score of others that will be great producers in a few more months. The big mining, the deep mining, is now in Cobalt, and the characteristic of this mining is system, the best plan, a view to extensive output at the lowest cost. Cobalt has rich mines, it has now highly organized mines, and the geological area is about to be enormously increased by the inclusion of the Keewatin formation as one of the largest fields of ore. 

Reports sent into department so far all seem to favor the Nelson River route.

Biggest Girder. To bear the entire weight of the gallery in Shea's new theatre a big girder was hauled to the works yesterday. It weighs 48,000 lbs., is 27 feet long and 4 feet deep.

HUDSON BAY CO. FINED FOR BREAKING GAME LAW

Magistrate Imposes Penalty of \$3240 for Having Unlawful Possession of Skins.

NORTH BAY, July 27.—(Special.)—Three thousand two hundred and forty dollars was the fine imposed upon the Hudson Bay Co. today by Police Magistrate Weegar, on the charge of having unlawful possession of 15 beaver and 39 other skins on June 29 last. This penalty is the result of a seizure made by Game Overseer Bias of the provincial department of skins at the Hudson Bay Co. headquarters at North Bay.

Crown Attorney Browning prosecuted and provincial Inspector Greer, Overseer Bias and Chief Game Warden Tinsley were in attendance. Leighton McCarthy appeared for the defence and contended that the skins seized were shipped from Quebec, Keewatin District, and Quebec; that the company were guilty of no wrongful act, but technically had infringed the act by shipping skins without the required affidavit.

Mr. McCarthy contended also that the Ontario game laws were not applicable to the Hudson Bay Co. The defence pleaded guilty to a technical breach of the act, in not having the required affidavits, and claimed that as a sub-section four, section 62, had been repealed, if a fine was imposed, only a total penalty of from \$20 to \$100 could be levied, as only one charge had been made.

The second charge, of having unlawful possession of 12 other skins on Jan. 17, was adjourned, as original information could not be located, date of which being necessary to determine whether action was brought within the required six months provided by law.

SAWMILLS BURN

Losses of \$75,000 By Peterboro Lumber Company.

PETERBORO, July 27.—About 1:30 o'clock this morning the saw and shingle mills of the Peterboro Lumber Co., on Burnham's point, were discovered to be on fire, originating from a cause unknown, in vicinity of the company's steam pump and hose. The place being difficult of access to the fire engine the mills were burned and two C.P.R. cars on the siding. The loss is estimated at \$75,000, besides the loss of business, the company having eight million feet of logs to cut. Some 25 men were thrown out of employment.

Almost simultaneously a fire broke out in a large warehouse at the corner of Bethune and Simcoe-streets, occupied by Florence & Co., junk dealers. The building and contents were destroyed. The loss is about \$5000 and insurance \$2500.

BLACKBURN WINNER

Gets Challenge Cup and Championship Gold Medal.

LONDON, July 27.—(C.A.P.)—Thru an error Private Galbraith of the Fifth Sussex Regiment was posted as the winner of the Service Rifle championship. Sergt. Blackburn to-day was officially notified that he was first and the cup and gold medal will be sent to him.

The Service Rifle championship aggregate is composed of scores made in the Grand aggregate (short ranges), Elkington (long ranges), Martins (rapid firing aggregate). Fifty prizes are awarded, the winner getting the Challenge Cup and championship gold medal.
