

be peddled about by persons who when they secure them have no intention of building the railways for which they provide, and forces the railways to give reasonable and equalized freight rates all over the Dominion, it will perform a service to the country of the first magnitude. This end cannot be reached, however, without a struggle with the great railway interests, and it is manifestly impossible to take up the whole transportation system during what remains of the present session. That the proposal to establish a railway commission will be the chief Government measure of next session will be greatly to the advantage of the country that the matter should be thoroughly discussed, by those having a special knowledge of the subject, prior to next session of the House. The question of how best to provide railway communication through the Crow's Nest Pass, while incident to this general railway question, will have to be settled during the present session. Mr. Blair, as has already been stated in this column, says there is in some minds doubt as to whether the general power to build branch lines possessed by the C.P.R. under its charter gives the right to construct extensions from lines of which it is lessee or applies to the proposed Crow's Nest extension. Proposals to confer further powers upon railways to run through the Pass are all to be deferred till the Government announces its policy. The central point of that policy is stated in the words of the Minister of Railways: "We want to assure the people of this country that for the future, for all time, they are going to have unrestricted railway connection through that Pass."

And in its editorial column The Globsays:

And in its editorial column The Globe His (Mr. Blair's) contention that Parliament should not give any powers for running through this Pass until the question had been thoroughly sifted is unquestionably sound. He declares that there is a goubt as to the legal standing of the C.P.R., that it is not certain whether the charter of the company gives it the right to build a railway through the Pass without fresh authority from Parliament. The question ought to be thoroughly investigated and every advantage taken of the rights which may be found to be reserved to the people.

Sequel to a Lost Bond.

A lost bond is the cause of a peculiar situation of affairs in connection with a little church and graveyard in a remote corner of York Township known as Pine Ridge Cemetery. Fears ago the Primitive Methodists, then a growing denomination in the vicinity, worshipped in the old school house, and on their numbers increasing, bought the site of the present church and burial ground from the late Joseph Rowntree. A clear title to the property could not be given at the time and in lieu of a deed a bond was handed to the trustees, which called for a deed so soon as there should be no incumbrance on the farm. Years passed by, peaceable possession was enjoyed, but the deed was never issued, and when Joseph Rowntree died he willed the farm to his relatives, not excepting that portion which had already been sold to the Primitive Methodists. The Wesleyan Methodists so increased in strength that about 15 years ago they absorbed the Primitive Methodists and there was an amalgamation of both denominations, the Wesleyan Methodists saking over the property owned by their Primitive co-religionists. Then the church fell into disuse and for the past 12 years no service has been held in it. Of late the church shed has been sold and taken away, and the organ, which was paid for by subscription among all denominations, has likewise been taken out of the church and sold. This, and the rumor that the church is likely to go the way of the shed and the organ, has led to considerable inquisitiveness among the residents of the vicinity, especially among those who have lots in the burial ground and who were under the impression that the purchasing money went to the Methodist Church. 

Property Qualification.

Chief Justice Meredith has given judgment in Reg. ex rel. Ferris v. Speck, dismissing the relator's appeal from judgment of County Court of Welland. The Chief Justice affirms the County Judge, who held that respondent has sufficient property qualification under sec. 73, Consolidated Municipal Act, 1892. Mr. Speck was duly rated upon the proper assessment roll as tenant of land assessed thereon for \$800. The land is worth \$1100, and with other land was mortgaged for \$800 prior to Mr. Speck's lease. It is held that the mortgage must not be taken into account in ascertaining value of leasehold. The man who drew section 72 has made it by no means clear, and should be hurried to an early grave for the trouble he has caused. If the mortgage could be held to affect the leasehold Mr. Speck would probably be entitled to marshal the securities so that recourse should first be had to the other land, but 4f not, the mortgage debt should be apportioned, sec. 12, C.B. 661, 664.
