However, if you exercise proper watchfulness, this trick, if it be attempted, will be detected.

It is not impossible that the trick by which the West Huron and Brockville elections were stolen, may be attempted in other constituencies, and you will do well to be on your guard against it. In the cases mentioned it was the D.R.O. who substituted bogus ballots. By proper vigilance, on your part you can prevent the success of such a trick.

The question of absence or temporary absence is only considered in getying the names on the voters' list. On the voters' list, the only question then is, if the voter is an actual resident, or domicited in South York.

Mere occasional or temporary absence from the mantepality in the prosecution of his occupation as a lumberman, mariner, fisherman or in attendance at an institution of learning in the Dominion will not prevent him from voting. Anyone whose name appears on the list, who has moved out of the Junction, but who is still resident in the constituency, may vote.


