union. ESTIMATES ENEMY ALIENS.

Census Director Figures There Are 4. 662,000 in America.

Washington, June 20—The natives of Germany, Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey now living in the United States aggregate approximately 4,662,000, or about 4½ per cent of the total population of the country. The foregoing estimate is announced by Samuel L. Rogers, director of the Bureau of the Census, Department of

Commerce, as the result of a calculation based on the census figures of 1910, the reports of the Bureau of Immigration for the period between 1910 and the present time, and the estimated mortality during that period. The foreigners are distributed, according to country of birth, as follows: Germany, 2,349,000; Austria, 1,376,000; Hungary, 738,000; Turkey, 198,000; Bulgaria, 11,000.

It is impossible to say whether the proportions of aliens—that is, persons who have not applied for naturalization certificates—among these foreigners are approximately the same in 1917 as they were in 1910, but, assuming this to be the case, the number of male aliens

the case, the number of male aliens twenty-one years old and more included in the total would be approximately 964,000, or about 3.2 per cent of the total of male inhabitants of the United States twenty-one years old and more.

The distribution of these aliens, according to country of birth, would be as follows: Germany, 136,000; Austria, 447,000; Hungary, 280,000; Turkey, 98,000; Bulgary, 8,000.

The proportion of aliens among male Germans twenty-one years old and more is very much smaller than the corresponding proportions for the other counsponding proportions for the other countries named, having been only a little more than 11 per cent. in 1910, as against approximately 68 per cent for

Austrians, 74 per cent. for Hungarians, 82 per cent for Turks, and nearly 90 per cent for Bulgarians.

STATE OF CROPS OF WORLD MAY

Report of International Institute of Agriculture en Conditions

As the season advances there is a proportionately growing anxiety for all possible information with regard to the coming cereal harvest. Those who wish to have details concerning the present condition of the crops will find some interesting reports in the Bulletin of Agricultural Statistics of the International Institute of Agriculture for May, which has just been published. It may be observed that in Europe generally the weather up to 20 April was rainy and cold, thereby causing delay in spring work and being unfavorable for growth. The last ten days of April were, on the contrary, very favorable, both for field work and spring sowing.

At the beginning of May the condition on the crops was an average one in Spain and the Netherlands, but only mediocre in France, Great Britain, Italy

in Spain and the Netherlands, but only mediocre in France, Great Britain, Italy and Switzerland. In Canada the result of an exceedingly severe winter was that a much more extensive area of wheat than in ordinary years, has been destroyed; spring is very late in coming. In the United States, the condition of the wheat crop has improved in the course of the last month, but it is still noticeably below an average one. If an index number of 100 is taken to denote the average yield of the United

Horses, asses and mules shew increases, though only to the small extent of less than 2 per cent. In the commercial section, the present issue furnishes information on the international trade for the principal products dealt with in the agricultural portion, and on visible stocks, and concludes with the prices obtained for these products in the principal agricultural markets.







Both the mover and the seconder have frequently expressed their firm belief in the benefits of the union of the lower provinces on many previous occasions, and only the limited time at the disposal of the legislature, if it is to adjourn this week, prevented many other members from expressing similar favorable views.







Flanagan Gives Advice To U. S. Army Officials

Visits Washington With Former Commander of Sportmen's Battalion and Explains System of Army Athletics

Washington, D. C., June 18—Canada's athletic training system will be adopted in its entirety by the United States government. This was decided upon yesterduy, when Lieut. Col. "Dick" Greer and Captain Tom Flanagan, of the Sportsmen's Battalion of Toronto, on invitation came here in reconstant. invitation, came here in response to an invitation and conferred with Commissioner Foudick, in charge of training

sioner Foudick, in charge of training camps.

"We know all about you and your work," said Commissioner Foulick, as he grasped the hands of the Canadian visitors. "We have been studying the results of your athletic organization in Canada. We are so impressed with the magnificent results that we have already began work on similar lines, and we will be very glad to have any assistance you can give us. The government has set aside one million dollars for the encouragement of sport in the army. couragement of sport in the army.

The commissioner has already begun to organize for the athletic and military training. College coaches and other handlers of athletic men will be used by the government in putting the Cana-dian camp training system into opera-

tion.

Col. Greer, comparing the fighting qualities of the warring nations, said:

"The German soldier has no sport, he is a machine; he is rigidly in his place. He can't understand the ideal that fighting is sport to the British. That long line of men charging, laughing and kicking a football along ahead terrifles him. That is why you read of fifteen hundred or two or three thousand men surrendering in a body, with hardly any rendering in a body, with hardly any rerendering in a body, with hardly any resistance. The English and Canadians never surrender like that. They fight while they have a cartridge left or a leg to stand on. It isn't in the game to quit. It's against every principle of sport."

"Why, at the capture of Vimy Ridge the fight was hardly over when the Canadians were clearing ground for a ball field, and forty hours later they were playing the final game in the battalion baseball championship series right on the ground the Germans had occupied. That's the sporting end of it."





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
