## Pastoral Address.

---

*My Dear People :—*

There is one grace of the Christian life that a pastor finds it hard to cultivate, it is the grace of *hopefulness*. Some of us are doubtless doomed to a spirit of greater despondency than others, and for your pastor the past year has been one in which the skies have been more often clouded than clear. One would be blind indeed not to see in our work cause for encouragement ; few pastors have more willing helpers or more true hearts to respond to every call for service, but, looking over our congregation and seeing the splendid array of talent, so much of which, as regards public Christian work, is lying idle, it would be criminal to be satisfied. My own word to all, therefore, as we commence a new year's work, is a word which I would echo from your Master and mine, "Go ye into the vineyard and work." ## Report of the Managers.

*To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's  
 Presbyterian Church, London :*

RVILLE,  
 Session Clerk.

The Managers beg to submit to the congregation their Forty-ninth Annual Report, together with the Treasurer's Statement duly audited.

The total revenue received during the year, from all sources, was \$8,578.85, out of which the Managers have paid the current expenses of the year, and paid \$416.52 on the floating debt accumulated in past years.

The ordinary revenue for the year shows an increase of \$282.27 over that of 1898, as follows :

Considering the insufficient seating capacity of the Auditorium, and the unsettled condition of the congregation during the last three months of the year, the Managers consider the increase a good one, and they are sure that if we had been able to hold regular Sunday services in our own Church the increase would have been larger.

The Managers would also acknowledge receipt of \$652.62 from the Executors of the late George Dawson. By the terms of a resolution passed at the adjourned Annual Meeting of January 25, 1899, the sum of \$396.42 was applied to pay the balance of the mortgage against the Oxford Street Mission, and \$256.20 was paid to the treasurer of the Missionary Association.

The expenditure for the year, on account of the Oxford Street Mission, amounted to \$161.51. The expense of this Mission has now ended, and the property has been handed over to St. James' Presbyterian Church free of debt; the first of two yearly payments of \$200.00 has also been paid to that Church. The transfer of the property and the yearly payments were authorized by the congregation at the last Annual Meeting.

The London Junction Church is fast becoming self-sustaining. The evidences of prosperity, and the loyalty of the pastor and the people to the Church, being a source of gratification to this congregation as well as to themselves. The grant from this Church for the year amounted to \$445.83.

The Board feels confident that the congregation will approve its action in improving the basement of the Church. While the capacity of the rooms for Sabbath School work has not been interfered with, the room has been rendered more attractive and suitable for the weekly prayer meeting, which forms so important a part of the congregation's work, and for other gatherings, many of which have been

formerly held in the Church auditorium, but for which, it is hoped, the Lecture Hall will now be used. The atmosphere, it is expected, will be purer by the introduction of the electric lighting. The probable cost will be about \$175.00, of which \$89.28 has been paid this year, the remainder of the work not being completed.

Owing to the improvements and alterations to the interior of the Church, the Pew Committee hope to be able to allot sittings in a more satisfactory manner than formerly ; the re-arrangement of the gallery resulting in a number of desirable sittings being available.

In conformity with a resolution passed at the last Annual Meeting of the congregation, the Building Committee appointed by that meeting have proceeded with the work of decorating, carpeting, reseating and renovating the Church. As soon as the work is completed and the accounts all in, a statement will be published and submitted to the congregation at a meeting to be held for that purpose.

The Board desires to express its appreciation of the services rendered the congregation by Mr. Oliver B. Leslie, who for several years served as chairman of the Committee of Ushers. On his retirement last June Mr. Alex. G. Calder was asked to assume the duties, and it is needless to say they have been efficiently performed.

Owing to a considerable number of changes which have recently been made, and in view of still

greater changes in the occupation of pews, the Board feels that it will be a great advantage if they can become more familiar with the necessities of pew holders and the possibilities of some re-adjustments ; they therefore suggest that for the year 1900 ushers be not appointed by the congregation, but the work be left in the hands of members of the Board.

In view of the ever-increasing duties of our pastor, the Board felt that it would be acting in the interests, as well as in accordance with the wish of the congregation, and they therefore notified Dr. Johnston in May last that a horse and carriage had been placed at his disposal at a livery, which could be used by him at any time.

Clauses 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 were adopted.

It was moved by Mr. J. W. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. A. S. Macgregor, "that the whole of clause 7, which refers to the renovating of the church by a Building Committee, be struck out."

It was moved in amendment by Mr. C. R. Somerville, seconded by Mr. H. H. Wallace, "that the two first lines of the clause be deleted."

Clauses 8 and 9 were adopted.

In reply to Mr. Alex. Fraser, it was explained that there was no intention of dispensing with the present ushers who had done such good work, but simply that a committee from the Board of Managers act with them.

Clause 10 was adopted unanimously by a standing vote.

Clauses 11 and 12 were adopted.

It was moved by Mr. Alex. Fraser, seconded by Mr. James Mills, "that the grant of \$200 a year to Mrs. Murray, widow of our late beloved pastor, Rev. J. Allister Murray, be continued for the year 1900."

It was moved by Mr. G. A. McGillivray, seconded by Mr. D. McDonald, "that the Treasurer's report be adopted."

It was moved by Mr. J. W. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. H. H. Wallace, "that the report of the Managers, as amended, be adopted."

The usual grant to the Sabbath School of the expenses for the past year was passed.

It was moved by Mr. Alex. Purdom, seconded by Mr. J. W. McIntosh, that the Trustees of St. Andrew's Church property be authorized and requested to borrow the sum of ten thousand dollars from The Toronto General Trusts Corporation, or such other corporation or person as they see fit, and repayable at such time or times, and in such manner, with interest, as they deem prudent, and to execute a mortgage on the church property as security therefore ;

" And that the loan effected with the corporation of \$10,000.00, repayable with interest at four per cent. per annum, payable half yearly, be approved, and the mortgage executed by the Trustees, to secure the repayment thereof, confirmed ;

" And that the moneys borrowed be expended in payment of the alterations made in the church and the reseating thereof, and that the mortgagees be not bound to see to the application of the mortgage money."

It was explained that this motion was not a new motion, but was to replace one to the same effect already passed by the congregation, the former not being considered legally sufficient.

Messrs. O. B. Leslie, C. R. Somerville and A. G. Chisholm were appointed scrutineers for the election of Managers.

The following gentlemen were nominated for Managers: Messrs. James Mills, M. H. Rowland, James McSween, Thomas Sutherland, J. H. Stevely, Alex. Gillean, R. Ironside, J. A. Cairncross, James Smith, James C. Stewart, Samuel Stevely.

On a ballot being taken, Messrs. W. H. Rowland, James McSween, Alex. Gillean, R. Ironside J. A. Cairncross and James Smith were declared elected.

It was moved by Dr. Johnston (Mr. — in the chair), seconded by Mr. Alex. Tytler, "that the Managers be authorized and requested to spend \$75 on the cemetery, if necessary, to keep it in good repair."

We note with pleasure the spirit of earnestness and devotion exhibited by every teacher and officer.

Parents and friends are invited and expected to show their interest in the School by frequent visits. Changes are to be expected to occur quite frequently in a staff of fully forty teachers, and it is desirable that competent persons should tender their services either as permanent or substitute teachers and thus render the School real help, and they would at the same time, we believe, receive a rich reward from the Master Himself.

Our work, that of imparting religious instruction, has progressed favorably during the year, and a goodly number of our scholars have openly confessed Jesus as their Saviour and have united with the church.

There is reason to fear that there is a tendency on the part of parents to delegate much, if not all, of the religious training of their children to teachers in the Sabbath School, which is surely much to be regretted, as the teaching done here is meant to augment and not to displace the religious instruction that should be given in the home.

The total number on the roll, including scholars, teachers and officers, was 414, or 6 less than last year, while the average attendance was 311, or 14 more than last.

The members of the Chinese classes have been attending with fair regularity and seem to appreciate the faithful and patient instruction imparted by their teachers.

The members of the Chinese classes contributed \$33.35 for the Honan Chinese Mission—which sum will be remitted and applied as they have directed.

It is desirable that more of the larger boys and young men should avail themselves of the services of the Sabbath School, and we trust an effort will be made by teachers and parents to secure this result in the year we have entered upon.

Our Library is much in need of additions of new books, and we trust friends of the School will respond liberally to the call for help when such is made at an early date.

The total amount of collection for the year was \$448.95, including collection for the Century fund of \$119.24 and \$2.00 on account of supplies, leaving a balance of \$327.71, which was apportioned to the different Mission Schemes of the church as follows :
