341 ALREADY NOMINATED FOR 245 SEATS

149 CANDIDATES CONSERVATIVES, 126 LIBERALS Progressives Have 45; Labor, 13; Eight Independents FEWEST IN N. B.

2,000,000 ENDANGERED BY FLOODS IN CHINA

Brokers Figure In Routing Goods Through U. S. Ports

MONTEAL, Sept. 27.—I find that the broker figures, perhaps to a considerable extent, in routing goods by American ports. It is not the habit, apparently, of steamship companies trading out of Canadian ports to pay brokers' commissions. Companies using American ports do so, and therefore it is to the brokers' advantage to have goods routed that way.

MR. WILSON, of the Factory Waste & Metals Co., Ltd., appreciates the situation in the Maritimes. He recalls that once in Yarmouth he was reminded that they could get goods overnight from Boston which he could not deliver from Montreal in four or five days.

JOSEPH LOGAN, of Watt & Scott, Ltd., said they had got a lower ocean rate from Mediterranean ports via New York than direct to Montreal. The new Italian line, had met the New York rate, and if an all-year service can be established it will get the business.

I had an interesting talk with Messrs. Francis and Dempster of McLean, Kennedy & Co. Their lines, the Head Line, Scandinavian-American and Houston, use only Canadian ports. They said they found some reluctance on the part of importers in using their line from South America, and felt that too much business is done through Boston and New York.

LIBERALS BACK CONSERVATIVE IN RENFREW, ONT.

Former Ottawa Chairman Assails King Government QUOTES FIGURES Ex-M.P. Denounces Cabinet as Not Having Carried Out Promises

RENFREW, Ont., Sept. 28.—"I appeal specially to protectionist Liberals," said Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, Saturday night, in his speech to a mass meeting in support of the candidature of Dr. M. J. Maloney, in South Renfrew. The leader of the opposition urged that Canada could not prosper without protection, and he asserted that it was useless to elect to Parliament a protectionist Liberal who would be compelled to vote for a low tariff government in order to gain Progressive support in the House.

"We don't want a tariff so high that you would have to use a periscope to see over it," Mr. Meighen said. He had been accused of favoring such a high tariff, he said, but what he aimed at was a tariff which would promise stability from year to year, encourage the investment of money for the expansion of industry, and keep the attention of Canadians directed to home instead of the United States.

LIBERALS SPEAK Supporting Dr. Maloney were also two Liberals, E. E. Pedlow, former M. P. for South Renfrew, and Russell Sparks, former chairman of the Ottawa Liberal Association. Both declared their intention of remaining Liberals, but denounced the policy of the Mackenzie King government as displayed in the last parliament. Mr. Sparks endorsed a protectionist policy and quoted figures to prove his contention that industries on such as the woollen industry in Canada had been "destroyed" by the policy of the present government.

PLAYS GOVERNMENT. Mr. Pedlow denounced the government as not having carried out its promises to the electorate. As a Liberal he could not stand for that sort of humbug in public affairs.

EFFORT BEING MADE TODAY TO LIFT VESSEL

Divers Report Efforts to Communicate With Crew Fail ONE SAFE AT HOME Workers Find Interior Bulkhead Of Craft Bent But Not Pierced

NEW LONDON, Conn., Sept. 28.—That the submarine S-51, sunk 14 miles east of Block Island, Friday night, when rammed by the steamer City of Rome, would, under favorable conditions, be raised some time today was the belief of naval officers at the submarine base here, from which the rescue work is being directed.

Only eight hope is held out that any of the 33 men who went down with the craft would be found alive. EFFORTS FAIL. Efforts to hoist the S-51 by means of a 100 ton crane last night were fruitless. The message, sent by NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 28.—Divers have found one of the interior bulkheads of the sunken submarine S-51 bent but not pierced, a radio despatch received here from the wreck today said. The compartment was described in the message only as an "interior" bulkhead.

TELLS OF GREAT WOMEN'S MEET

Mrs. H. B. Peck Gives Address on Washington Convention

Many Countries Represented in Assembly of International Council in U. S. Capital.

In her address before the Saint John Council of Women, Mrs. H. B. Peck gave a word picture of the unique gathering of women, the quinquennial convention of the International Council of Women, which was held in Washington this spring and lasted 10 days.

Charges were made that the convention was propaganda for the League of Nations, for Bolshevism and for pacifists, but these clouds were cleared away and the foreign delegates whose stop-off in New York had been cancelled for "economic reasons," were afterwards invited to the chief cities of the United States and to the homes of important hostesses.

Lady Aberdeen, who presided at all the sessions, Mrs. Peck said, had explained the International Council of Women's stand in the following statement: "We have always been considered so conservative. From the time the United States women started the organization of the International Council of Women here in Washington in 1888 we have taken the stand that the council could adhere to no one propaganda. Other groups have worked internationally for some one purpose but the council has forwarded only such united aims as after careful consideration by each country our constituent groups were ready to support."

FIGHTING PARASITES NEW WORK OF SCIENCE

Probably no group of pioneers on the frontier of science is doing more to guard human health and welfare than are the parasitologists, those scientists who devote their time to the study of parasites. Plants, animals and human beings are all attacked by various sorts of parasites.

Parasites change their form frequently. They move from one animal or plant to another. It doesn't seem that any animal could survive such a series of adventures. And indeed parasites would soon pass out of existence if it were not that the average parasitic organism will lay from a half million to a million eggs. Most of the new-born parasites perish, but enough survive to continue the damage.

The so-called "liver rot" of sheep will serve as an example to illustrate the complex life cycle of many parasites. It is fatal to the sheep and causes annually more than a million deaths among the sheep in Great Britain. The disease is the result of a so-called fluke, a parasitic flat-worm that lives in the liver of the sheep. Each fluke lays more than a half million eggs which pass out of the sheep and fall to the ground.

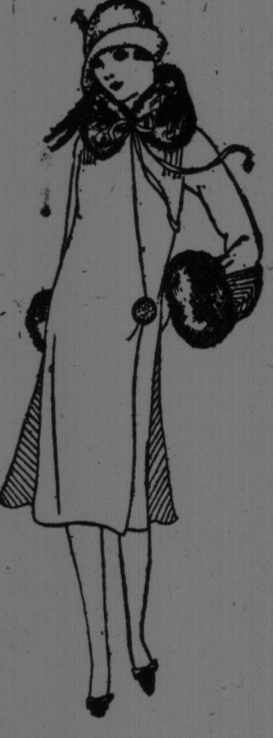

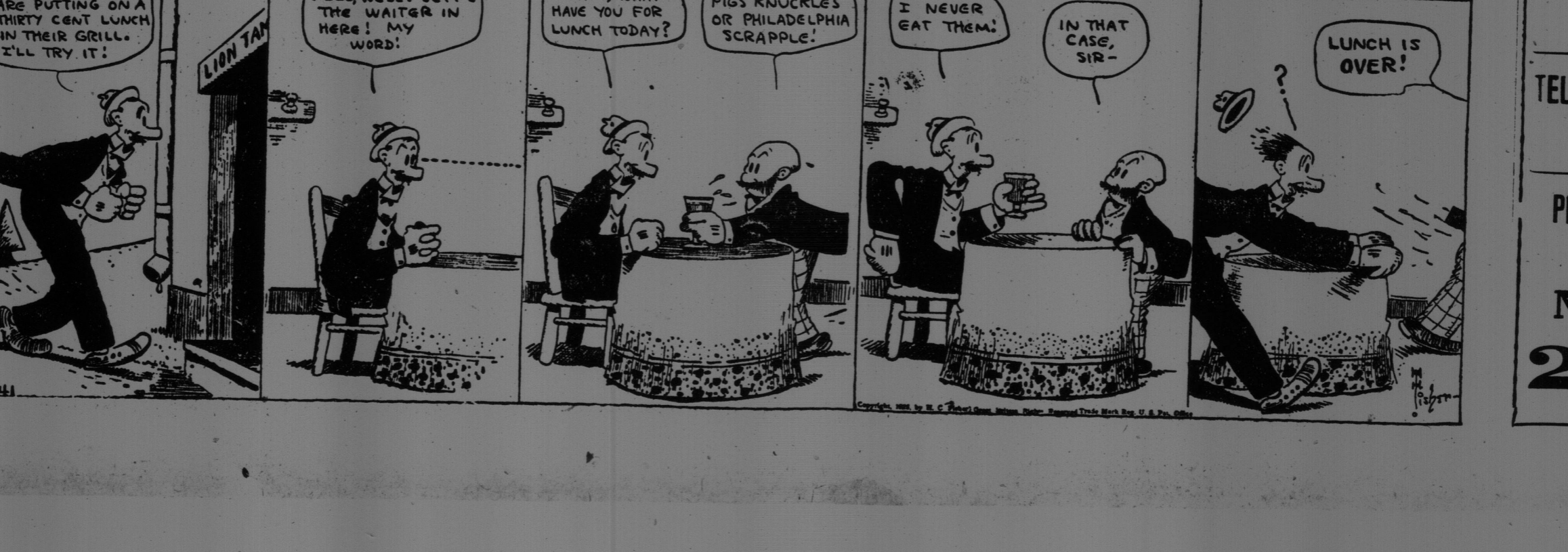

FORKE WOULD WRITE DOWN C.N. CAPITALIZATION

Progressive Leader Also Favors Elimination of All Duplication

SAYS AMALGAMATION FAVORED BY C. P. R.

Declares Neither King Nor Meighan Throwing Any Light on Problems

Canadian Press Staff Correspondent.

MORRIS, Man, Sept. 28.—"Mr. King and Mr. Meighan are not throwing much light on our problems. So far it has been a verbal duel," declared Robert Forke, Progressive leader, in a speech here Saturday night.

"The Premier thinks that everything is going smoothly," said Mr. Forke. "Mr. Meighan is inclined to have a gloomy view of life anyway, and when he looks at the government he decries. For him only a change of government will save the country. The truth is probably somewhere between these two."

DEBT INCREASES.

The Canadian national debt increased over \$100,000,000 last year. We cannot go on that way forever, and I am not going to shout blue sky, but that is the condition in which we find ourselves in respect to the Canadian

National Railway. There must be a change. What are we going to do? That is what I am waiting to hear Mr. King and Mr. Meighan say.

Mr. Meighan would cut out all capital expenditures but, argued Mr. Forke, that would mean the deterioration of the system. The Senate scheme of amalgamation would be very acceptable to the C. P. R. with its seven per cent interest guaranteed.

"I think what ought to be done would be to write down the capitalization of the national system to what may be its value as a going concern. I would like also to see the elimination of much of the existing duplication."

"The Progressives," he continued, "will be behind any government which will secure lower transportation rates on land and sea."

In regard to the Petersen contract, the Progressives had not been enthusiastic because they could not see how ten ships could break an Atlantic combing with 1,000 sailings every season from Montreal alone.

"We were not prepared to see \$10,000,000 spent on an abortive scheme. That great statesman, Mr. Meighan, well, the Minister of Agriculture, is almost a Progressive when he is in Ottawa," said the Progressive leader. "But when he comes west, he slips and slays Progressives. Let me tell you, if I get back to Ottawa, I'll have no mercy on the minister of agriculture."

Forecasts Announcement re Port Facilities—Will Direct N. B. Liberal Campaign.

Foster, former Premier of New Brunswick, who was sworn in as Secretary of State at Ottawa on Saturday and who returned to Saint John yesterday, announced that he would direct the federal campaign in New Brunswick for the Liberal Party and that every constituency would be contacted in the coming election. He also announced that if the Liberals of Saint John-Albert selected him as a candidate he would run in this constituency.

Arrangements are now being made for holding the primaries in the two counties and he expected Saint John would select delegates this week to attend the convention which would likely be held a week from tonight.

TO IMPROVE PORT.

In conversation with a representative of The Telegraph-Journal last evening, Dr. Foster said: "I have taken a deep interest in the development of the port of Saint John and while in Ottawa I took advantage of the opportunity to point out the needs of the port in the way of improvements and increased facilities for handling the export traffic that should come here over the C.N.R. and I hope to make an important and welcome announcement soon in this connection."

"I am very strongly impressed with the necessity of early plans being made to take care of the increased business that will naturally come to the Maritime ports in winter by reason of the going into effect of the new British West Indies treaty which provides for increased steamship service."
