> Likely Many More Sailings Here This Season Than Last.

MORE EMPLOYMENT

Another Indication of Extension Comes in Query to C. P. R.

Mayor Potts this morning received from the steamship companies concerned in port charges here, a telegram of appreciation of the action of the Council in reducing the charges, and expressing their intention of working for the development of the port. It also stated they were arranging to continue the ser-

He also received a letter from Percy Turcot, manager of Mc-Lean Kennedy, Ltd., stating that the Scandinavian American Line had arranged to carry out their original schedule from this port. Of course this will mean great-

ly increased employment at this port, and the distribution of immensely more money in the city.

May Be 50 More Vessels.

May Be 50 More Vesseis.

This will mean that St. John can hope for between 40 and 50 additional sailings from this port during the coming winter port season. The Canada Steamships last year had 18 sailings and this year they had planned for at least 25 and possibly 30, an increase of probably 12 sailings. The Scandinavian American had five sailings last year and this year they had planned for 10, making an increase of five. The C. G. M. M. had a fortnightly service last year and this year they have planned for a weekly service.

The amount which the city stands to lose by the reduction, based on the same tonnage as last year, is \$29,441, but of this amount they expect to get practically half from the increased sailings of the Canada Steamships and Scandinavian Lines. The increased sailings by other lines which are expected will materialize are expected to make up the rest of the amount.



First Sod on Canada's Great Railway was Turned in British Columbia.

Friday was the thirty-ninth anniversary of the driving of the last spike in the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, an event which consolidated the work of Confederation, and made Canada a nation. 
Culver City Promoter Trying to Match Fuente and Champion.
