London, May 19—(Reuter's)—The Sunday Times editorially says:

"Alone among all our colonial premiers Sir Robert Borden will return as a living evidence that a people can and will render a service to their convictions, to their sense of right and justice to the call of blood and to the flag under which they live, at a vast and unreckoned cost to themselves, without either prepostulating and recompense or subsequently claiming any share or any indemnity or compensating spoil which might remain for distribution. OF GERMAN NOTES

Answer to Protest Against Economic Terms of Peace Treaty Regarded as Fine Piece of Work

Paris, May 19—(By the Associated Press)—A reply by the Allied and associated governments to the German note protesting against the economic terms of the peace treaty as being calculated to cause the industrial ruin of Germany has been delivered to the German peace plenipotentaries. The reply declares that the Allies in framing the economic terms "had no intention to destroy Germany's economic life."

On the contrary, the report points out that in the reconstruction of the world's affairs Germany will have her part in the progresive development, but also will share with the rest of the world in the economic losses and disadvantages inevitably resulting from the war.

The reply declares that the German note fails to take into consideration the fact that the disarmament of Germany and the end of militarism will relieve the German people of an immense burden of taxation and return to the ranks of useful production millions of men formerly in the army who have been entirely withdrawn from industrial or agricultural activity.

The Allies' answer is that the destruction of merchant ships, chiefly by German submarines has had the unfortunate effect of limiting the opportunities for the work of seamen throughout the world, the Allied powers being the greatest sufferers. 

"Another use for the aerial police reserve is that of observing the harbor and waterways," he continued. "The police boats cannot cover the distance so cfliciently as aviators. The point of observation from a boat is not so satisfactory. The waterways must be policed and information of violations will be learned through aerial photography and records. "With the coming of prohibition the air squad will undoubtedly be called on for there is every reason to believe that smuggling from one state to another through the air will develop. 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

Russellites Win In New Decision

onviction of Eight Men Under Espion age Act Has Been Reversed

Conviction of Eight Men Under Espionage Act Has Been Reversal of the conviction of Jos. F. Rutherford and seven other members of the International Bible Students' Association and allied organizations, who were found gulity of violation of the Espionage Act, was ordered in an opinion of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals here.

The opioion states that the defendants, who were convicted by a jury before Federal Judge Howe, in Brooklyn, did not have a fair trial.

After the convictions last June, Rutherford, president of the association, and six of the other defendants, were sentenced, to imprisonment in Atlanta Penitentiary each for twenty years. The association was founded by the late "Pastor" Charles T. Russell.

On the day the men were sentenced, the Department of Justice issued a statement declaring that "under the guise of religious work" the defendants circulated throughout the country, "including several cantonments, a large amount of vicious anti-war propaganda.

United States Judge Ward, in his written opinion today, Judge Rogers concurring, alludes to the examination of three witnesses called by the government. These three, members of the International Association, were not willing witnesses, Judge Ward wrote, and the action of the trial judge in regard to their testimony "in the presence of the Jury in the case, was most prejudicial to the defendants."


