LOCK THE DOOR AFTER THE THEFT

Great Precautions are Now Being Taken at the Louvre

PARIS NEWS BY LETTER

Some Labor Troubles Following on the Agitation Against High Prices of Food—To Erect a Monument to Brave Police Dog

Paris, Oct. 13.—It is nearly two months since Leonardo da Vinci's masterpiece "La Gioconda" known as the "Mona Lisa," was missed from the Louvre, but the theft is still in the mind of every one, and Parisians are constantly asking what is being done to prevent other thefts of notable pictures. Since the installation of the new director of the Louvre, in place of M. Homolle—fallen into disgrace in consequence of the theft—a great deal has been done to ensure proper guardianship for the treasures which the old royal palace holds in such numbers. Every nook and cranny has been searched, and as many as possible are being walled up or totally suppressed, thus reducing to the lowest number the possible hiding places of would-be thieves. Even the keepers of the old gallery are to be deprived of their rooms, several of which were historic secret hiding places, maybe in use in the time of Catherine de Medicis and Louis XIII. Special accommodation is being provided for them in what was formerly the hiding school of the present emperor.

Furthermore, the guardianship both by day and by night is being scientifically organized. The building has been divided into twenty-three sections, in each of which both day and night a special guardian is installed, continuously around the round of inspection. The new director of the Louvre has gone so far as to calculate the distance they have to cover, and so to allot their tasks with some attempt at fitness. In all, more than three miles and a half of ground and corridors have to be traversed and no fewer than 140 steps ascended and descended. Three times a night this whole distance is covered by one special guardian.

In order to obtain the maximum of results from the existing small staff, it has been arranged also that the services at the entries and the cloak-rooms shall be placed in the hands of women, and the service is now done by the keepers.

When this change has been brought about some attempt will be made to arrange in the letter the notice one sees almost everywhere: "It is compulsory to give up your sticks to the porter at the entrance, present neither part of this order is usually carried out."

Altogether the state of affairs is very different from what it used to be, and there is good reason for thinking that very soon the Louvre will be the antipodes of the museum which is notorious for the most loosely guarded in Paris—the Ethnographical Museum at the Trocadero. At this museum the staff is so unable to fulfill its duties, being only a quarter in number of what it should be, that it is an understood thing that a score or so of objects should disappear in the course of a week or two.

LABOR MATTERS

In proportion as the economic agitation against high food prices subsides, the activities of the General Confederation of Labor increase. The opportunity for the body to exploit the present discontent for their own revolutionary purposes is too good to be allowed to slip, and meetings have been called in Paris, Lyons, Lorient, Montevideo, and in other towns. An attempt was made to disturb the markets in some of the suburbs and in the east end of Paris the other morning.

At meetings held in different parts of Paris a resolution was adopted in which the advocacy of a general strike in case of war was combined with the protest against the increase in the cost of living. The next morning lands of agitators bore down on various markets in the poorer quarters of the town. Only at Levallois-Perret, however, did they succeed in causing a disturbance, since they got no support from the general public, and very where police were present in force.

The gravity of the situation created by the "C. G. T." was referred to at some length by M. Paul Deschanel, deputy for Eure-et-Loir, in a speech which he delivered to his constituents last Friday. Speaking of the revolutionary activity shown by that body during the Champagne troubles of last spring and the present economic unrest, M. Deschanel said:—

"To strike the man who removes a nail, who cuts a wire, or abandons his post to reach behind him the infamous propagandist who takes refuge in subtle equivocations and who slides hypocritically, not to allow to be formed within the state a state which is the avowed organizer of general strikes, sabotage, and insurrection in time of war; to punish crimes against persons and crimes against the nation—that is the elementary task of every government in a civilized society, that is an affair for the police and the law courts."

"But the task of a government is not completed when the police and law courts have done their work. Anarchy, like order, is a product, and the causes must be sought. What good would the police and the law courts be if, in compliance with the merely verbal wish of the government, they merely found within the government itself?"

At Mezières a manifesto has been published in which the army is insulted. It is signed by M. Poullin, deputy for the Ardennes, and M. Bontet, a member of the council general. According to the F. P. O. steps are being taken to prosecute its authors. M. Leroux, a member of the confederation of labor who was prominent in the riots at Lille, has been arrested. His sentences have been passed at Lille, where several rioters were given six months imprisonment for striking or insulting the police.

police officers in a struggle with "Apache." The monument is to be placed in the little dog's cemetery at Assisieres, where Leo was buried. It is hoped at the same time to get sufficient funds to provide a special hall for the burial of dogs which perish in defending the quarters of public order or in the attempt to save life. There are already some interesting dog monuments at Assisieres, including one to Barry, which the inscription belonged to him, and was not manufactured until long after his death. An indiscreet tourist, examining the languages read them the trade mark of Grand Freres. But the firm of Grand Freres came into existence only in 1880, succeeded to the business of Lie court sculptor Penon. This discovery led to further inquiries, which have established the fact that the dog which so long passed for that of the Roi Soleil, dates, in fact, only from the reign of Louis Philippe.

Daily Hints For the Cook

LOBSTER WITH TRUFFLE.
Put a level tablespoonful of butter into a saucepan and when bubbling stir in a tablespoonful of flour; smooth and stir constantly; then add quarter of a cup of good clear stock and a cup of cream, and cook until it thickens. Then add a tablespoonful of the boiled meat of the lobster cut in dice, and one truffle chopped very fine. Season slightly and simmer gently for about five minutes. The mixture when ready to serve should be creamy but not too soft.

FRENCH FRIED STUFFED EGGS.
Take four hard boiled eggs, remove the shells; cut a small bit of the end of each and carefully take out the yolk. Mash this yolk with a silver fork, until it is perfectly smooth and add to it some salt, pepper, a small piece of butter and some chopped parsley. Replace all in the whites and cover up end. Beat up the white of one raw egg and in this dip the cooled eggs, and afterward roll them in bread crumbs. Place all in a wire basket and let them cook for two minutes in boiling fat. Serve with tomato or cream sauce.

BETTER FARMING NEEDED

(Readers' Letters)

Per capita production of wheat in this country has steadily declined until it is now only about one bushel above consumption requirements after seed has been deducted. Unless this disparity is corrected, the country must soon face a grave aggravation of the prevalent social unrest. On every hand we are told the country needs more farmers. But a study of average yields suggests that a solution of the problem lies along the lines laid down by Piny, "Soil less and cultivate more."

On a state experimental farm in the northwest land that had been producing 123 bushels of wheat per acre was made by systematic farming, as is practicable for every farmer, to produce 30 bushels. This is only one instance of many. There is now an organization, known as the "Bow Corn Clubs," throughout the middle West and South, each member of which is pledged to raise one acre of corn under scientific instruction.

Last season these boys made records of from 50 to 200 bushels of corn to the acre, while the farmers' average for the United States was 25.9 bushels. In one district where the average was 20 bushels the boys averaged 74 bushels an acre. One boy raised 124 bushels of corn on a neglected farm that was a great soil exhauster, but after the farmers' average in the same county was 16 bushels. What would have been the result if the farmers of the county had employed similar methods on corn and the 40,000,000 acres last year planted to corn and the 40,000,000 acres sown to wheat? Don't we need more farmers, but also farmers with more sense?

Farmers who understand seed, soil and fertility are what we need, that seed time and harvest may not fail. In the agricultural colleges thousands of educated young men are studying to make farming a profession. They may not try to cultivate so many acres as the present average, but they will cultivate them so that the earth shall truly yield her increase. Not merely farmers, but educated farmers who will make farming a profession in the country's need.

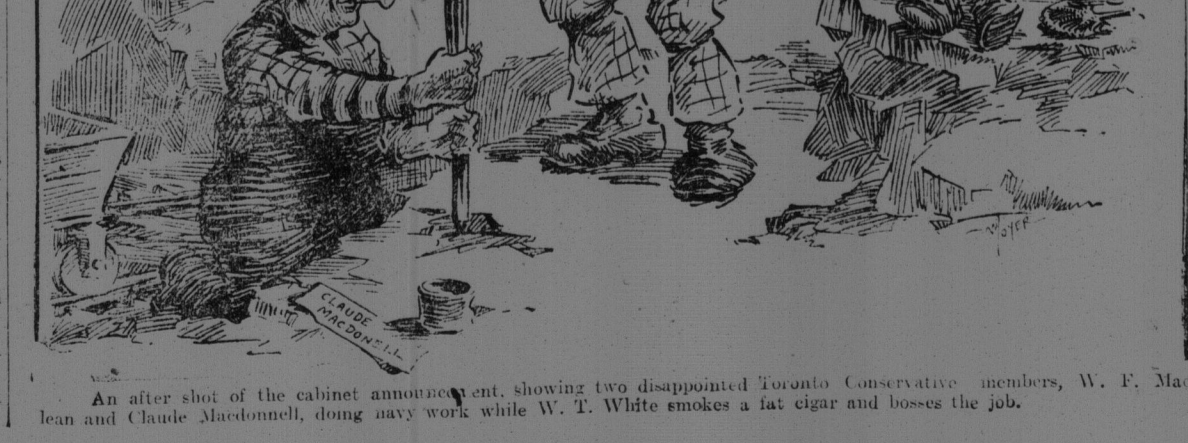

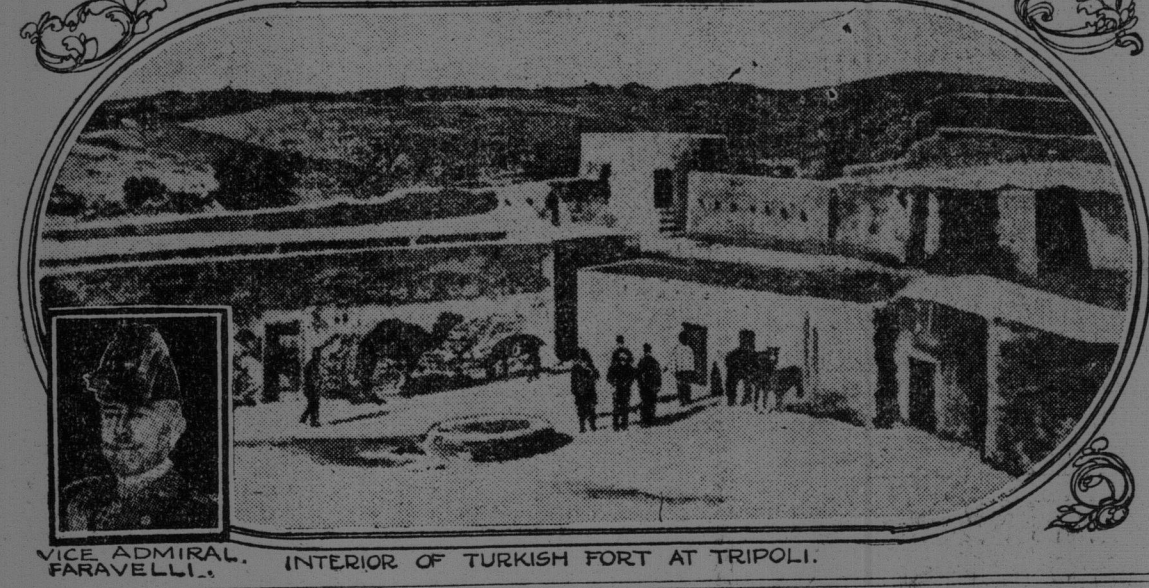
